Crockett Oil Activity Spurt Noted In Week

A Crockett County field gained a new pay, a wildcat yielded oil and water on a drillstem test and a field gained a producer.
Third pay, Queen gas, has been opened in the Crockett County portion of the Millard North (Queen and Soma oil) field with recompletion of M&G and Schneider, Iraan, No. 1 H. M. Half, former Queen oil opener, six miles southeast of Iraan, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 210,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day.
Production was natural through perforations at 1,259-80 feet.
Original completion was July 25, 1959 by R. E. Sutton, Midland, as the No. 1 Half Estate, for a daily flowing potential of 155,99 barrels of oil, no water, through a 23-64-inch choke and perforations at 1,250-81 feet, which had been fractured with 10,000 gallons.
Earlier it tested through perforations at 1,461-67 feet. Location is 460 feet from the north and west lines of 63-1-1&GN. (Original application was filed 330 feet from the north and west lines of the section).
The Soma gas opener, which was in Pecos County, has become depleted.

.62 In. Added To Wet Fall In Weekend Rain

A cloudburst Sunday afternoon left .64 of an inch of rain on Ozona. The storm came on the leading edge of a cold front which jumped up to 6 inches of rain northwest of Crockett County and hail was reported in some areas towns.
The front dropped temperatures several degrees in just a few minutes, after an uncomfortably hot Sunday. Mist and light rain all day Monday amounted to .08 of an inch, giving the city a two-day total amounting to .62 of an inch.
Sections in the northwest part of the county reported up to two inches of rainfall for the two days.
Tuesday brought warm sunshine and afternoon and evening showers were in the forecast for the remainder of the week.

The request was granted and until the county hires a full-time agent, Mrs. Mary B. Watson, HD agent at large will be assigned to Ozona for two extra days a month.

She has requested that all interested groups, such as 4-H leaders, HD Club members, Civic Center leaders and others meet with her at 4 p. m. at the Chamber of Commerce office to discuss the priorities and needs for a full time agent in the county.

Mr. Kirby was born Aug. 16, 1883 in Goldthwaite. He had lived in Lampasas County most of his life. He was a retired farmer and rancher, a member of the Lometa Baptist Church, and Masonic Lodge and Eastern Star.
Other survivors include two sons, two daughters, two brothers, two sisters, eight grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

The Lions suffered their second straight loss of the season at the hands of the Sonora Broncos Friday night, dropping their season record to 2-2, and will be looking for another pre-district win before the start of district play next week with Big Lake, here.

Sgt. Flores Wins Bronze Star In Vietnam Action

Award of the Bronze Star has been made to Ismael Flores, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leandro Flores of Ozona for his action in Vietnam.
Staff Sergeant Flores was cited for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam May 30, 1971.
He distinguished himself by heroic action while serving as Medical Advisor, Hieu Nhon District. Sergeant Flores with total disregard for his personal safety, ignored intensive fire while securing one side of the American advisor's bunker which the enemy was closing in on. Seeing one sapper within 20 feet of the bunker getting ready to throw a satchel charge on it and knowing he did not have a clear shot at the enemy from within the bunker, he came out within full view of the enemy to engage the sapper. Later he saw a wounded Vietnamese soldier lying on the ground. Again with total disregard for safety of his own life and with the enemy fire increasing, he ran to the wounded soldier. With enemy rounds exploding all around him, he treated the man without once thinking of himself; and only until the man was properly cared for did he take the soldier to a more secure area and return to the Advisor's bunker. After returning to the bunker and realizing that the Vietnamese medic was seriously wounded, he set up an emergency aid station and began treating the wounded. With the intensive enemy fire decreasing and all the wounded treated for their wounds, he successfully medicated them. Staff Sergeant Flores' heroic actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Army and reflect great credit upon himself and the military service, the citation reads.
Sergeant Flores is still serving in Vietnam. He is a fourteen year veteran of the U. S. Army. His wife, Gretel, and two sons, David and Roy, live in Aurora, Colo.

A NURSING HOME -- OZONA'S DESPERATE NEED

When Crockett county entered into a contract with Medica Diversified of Eldorado to manage the Crockett County Hospital, a nursing home in connection with the hospital and under common management was a projected goal of the county commissioners court.

Then came the furor that resulted in dismissal of Medica Diversified and payment of a forfeit by the county to void the contract.

Apparently with the dismissal of the Eldorado group from local hospital management went also dismissal of any idea of building and operating a nursing home -- a facility which Crockett county desperately needs.

Neighboring towns of Sonora and Eldorado both have modern and well operated nursing homes -- and those nursing homes are proving all that is available to a number of aging Ozonans. A cursory look about one now will reveal a prospective continuing and growing need for nursing home facilities here.

There are presently -- and perhaps there have always been -- numbers of senior citizens in Ozona, many facing the prospect of spending their declining years in a home where they can be cared for. Among these persons are numbers who have spent most if not all of their lives here and who deserve a facility in which they can at least be in their home town until their time ends. Many of them have contributed much to this community in service and taxes and they deserve no less than an opportunity to complete their span of years in home surroundings.

That, you might say, could be the moral obligation which should stir the community. But there is more incentive for such a project. It could be an economic boon to the community in bringing in people and providing jobs for others. Such homes, for the most part, have been profitable for the operators.

No individual, so far, has come forward with a plan to build a nursing home and it seems all that's left is for the county to build the facility and either lease it or hire somebody to operate it. The solution might not be that simple, but certainly this county has the resources to provide every public need of its citizens and this is a most pressing need. Comparatively speaking, this county is virtually free of bonded debt and a move should be launched at once to bring about a nursing home in Ozona comparable to that being successfully operated by our neighbors.

WASHINGTON NEWS LETTER

By Congressman O. C. Fisher

The prestigious National Guard Association, which supports the Guard's activities throughout the country, held its 93rd annual Conference in Honolulu last week, attended by more than 2,500. As Chairman of the House subcommittee which handles all National Guard, Reserve, ROTC, and related legislation, I was a guest speaker at the gathering.

The National Guard, in peacetime under control of the various Governors, provides instant call-up service to cope with riots, civil disturbances and natural disasters.

A half million men are authorized to serve in the Guard. By and large, they are well equipped, well trained, and highly motivated. There were 147 Texans at the Honolulu meeting.

As we approach the zero-draft, the National Guard and other reserves are expected to play an increasingly important role in the defense establishment. It is essential that adequate incentives be provided to attract the necessary number of qualified young men into this branch of military service. Our committee has that objective in mind.

Resignations of two Supreme Court Justices -- Mr. Black and Mr. Harlan -- sent shock waves through Capitol corridors. President Nixon, in choosing replacements, now has his greatest opportunity for lasting service to our country -- more so than any President since Franklin Roosevelt, whose

appointees left much to be desired. Two "strict constructionists" are expected to be submitted to the Senate for confirmation. This probably presages long drawn out debates.

One of the appointees is expected to be U. S. Rep. Richard Poff of Virginia. Poff, a 20-year veteran in Congress, would in my judgment make an excellent choice. My next door neighbor, I consider him admirably qualified to serve on the nation's highest court.

Women's League Hears Speaker On POW Issue

The Ozona Woman's League met Tuesday in the home of Mrs. Tony Allen with Mrs. Buster Deaton assisting hostess.

Mrs. Herb Noelke introduced the speaker, Col. Jack H. Morgan, USAF Ret., who presented a program on prisoners of war. Col. Morgan, a 28-year serviceman and a Vietnam veteran, is currently in the news department at KCTV in San Angelo. Col. Morgan told the group that since the first prisoners were captured in 1964, a total of 1,500 men have been captured or listed as missing in action. Of this number 450 are known prisoners of war and of this number only a few have been allowed to communicate with their families. Since 1969 an extensive letter campaign has been waged by the citizens of the U. S. Morgan said that he feels these letters have "not endangered and have possibly helped the prisoners of war." "At least," he said, "now the world knows the plight of the POW's, who are being held for international blackmail."

Morgan feels that writing letters to Hanoi no longer have a great effect. He suggests writing to congressmen and representatives asking what is being done for the POW's. "Carry your convictions through communications," he said, "that's where the most good can be done."

Tips For Gardeners

From The Ozonia Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

"And when the silver habit of the clouds comes down upon the autumn sun, and with a sobered gladness the old year takes up his bright inheritance of golden fruits, a pomp and pageant fill the splendid scene."

- Henry Wadsworth Longfellow

Enjoy the color of October, but resist the temptation to be "just a spectator." Soon after the last rose blooms and dahlias taste frost, your garden will be preparing for winter. In the meantime, October decks the scene with bursts of burnished color.

This is the time to put into action some of the plans you made months ago. It's a time to visit your nurseries for more good ideas, and for solutions to some of your landscaping problems. You will find garden centers with many new varieties of plants as well as your old favorites. October planning will reward you when your garden awakens in the spring. For brilliant colors in your garden next spring you will get the best quality of bulbs this month.

Beware of ordering or buying plants from nurseries that you do not know about, which advertise new, unusual, rare and fast-growing plants. Many of these will not grow in our area, even with good care. They cause the waste of thousands of dollars each year.

Prepare flowering vines and others for winter by pruning them this and next month. Prune out dead and diseased wood and excess growth. An ideal schedule is to remove old wood every second or third autumn, leaving some old wood for flower bud formation. Among vines that can be cut back to the near ground or within a foot or two of the ground are the autumn-flowering clematis, jasmine, honeysuckle, perennial sweet pea, silver vine and queen's wreath. Other vines that benefit from fall pruning include Boston and English ivy, hybrid clematis (this blooms on new growth),

fell on a Sonora fumble in Sonora territory and on the first play from scrimmage Tambunga picked up the Lions' first first down of the game. The Lions bogged down on the Sonora 36 yard line, but with fourth down and six yards to go, Tambunga made it another first. A fifteen yard penalty against the Lions made it first and 25, but Tambunga and Huff did the honors and the Lions were knocking on the Bronco door with third down and goal to go. Quarterback Sewell boogied around left end for the Lion score. Sewell hit Webster in the end zone on a fake kick and the Lions led 8-7. Adjustments in the Ozona line stopped the Bronco's ground game and they were only able to chalk up two first downs in the entire second period, allowing the Lions to take the one-point lead with them to the dressing room at the half.

The third quarter was fairly even with neither team able to score. One Sonora drive was ended when David Sewell intercepted a Bronco pass on the Ozona 30-yard line. The Broncos tried a field goal from the Ozona 30 later in the period, with no results. The Lions were on the Sonora 25 at one point and tried to run it on 4 and 8 but the ball went over.

The fourth quarter belonged to the Broncos with Noel and Street both breaking for some spectacular runs and the Lions unable to move the ball. The Lions were unable to complete a pass throughout the game and the Sonora defenders evidently were well informed that stopping Tambunga would stop the Lions' ground attack, which is exactly what they did. Tambunga left the game with an injured knee in the fourth period of play.

The Bronco's Noel got loose in the middle of the quarter to give the Sonora crew a first down on the Ozona 10 yard line. It looked like a sure touchdown for the Broncos, but Lion defender Bill Edger-ton managed to get to the Sonora signal caller a couple of times for losses and they were forced to settle for a field goal by Mata, which gave them the victory. 10-8.

Lady luck smiled on the Lions again, however, when a bad punt by Sonora gave the

Lions the ball on the Bronco 25. Luck ran out with the downs and the ball went over to Sonora in almost the same spot the Lions received it. The Broncos drove into Lion territory despite a 15 yard penalty before the clock ran out. Sonora had 14 first downs to 8 for Ozona, picked up 229 yards rushing to 116 for Ozona, completed two out of five passes with one interception, while the Lions were 0 for 5.

The Lions out-punted the Broncos with David Sewell punting five times for a 40 yard average, his best of the season; and the Broncos had 3 for 27 yards average.

northwest of Iraan, five miles northwest of the depleted Meek (Strawn and Canyon) field and one location southeast of the depleted Hanson (Grayburg) field, reversed out 28 barrels of 36 gravity oil and 17 1/2 barrels of water on a drillstem test in an unidentified zone, probably Ellenburger.

Tool was open 165 minutes on the test taken at 7,698-770 feet. Recovery from the sample chamber was 50 cubic centimeters of oil and 33 cubic centimeters of water.

Flowing pressure was 1,026-1,962 pounds; one-hour initial shut-in pressure was 2,904 pounds; and two-hour and 40-minute final shut-in pressure, 3,276 pounds.

Drilling continued below 7,845 feet on an 8,800-foot contract.

Texaco Inc. Midland, No. 2-B C. E. Davidson Jr., lower Canyon producer 7/8-mile east-southeast and the same distance east-northeast and 1 1/2 miles west of lower Canyon production in the DePaul multipay field, eight miles south-east of Ozona, was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 1,806 million cubic feet of gas, with gas-liquid ratio of 105,263-1. Gravity of liquid is 60 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 7,859-995 feet, which had been acidized with 32,000 gallons and fractured with 32,000 gallons and 74,000 pounds of sand.

The Canyon sand was topped at 6,320 feet and the lower Canyon sand at 7,859 feet kelly bushing elevation of 2,479 feet.
