Pam Upton of San Angelo, Texas will be among 75 pretty young ladies participating in the Invitational Ranch Girls Barrel Race during the 1974 Fort Worth Stock Show Rodeo Jan. 25 through Feb. 3.

Riding under sponsorship of P. C. Perner Ranch, Ozona, Texas, she will be racing against the hands of the clock in four go-rounds scheduled during the 20 performances of the "World's Original Indoor Rodeo" in Will Rogers Coliseum.

With the Fort Worth Rodeo's "Invitational policy," audiences are assured that only the most skilled competitors will run the cloverleaf pattern of barrels in the rodeo arena.

Alien Reports Due In January

According to Mr. Joe F. Staley of the San Antonio Immigration and Naturalization Service office, the information furnished by aliens in reporting their addresses has been declared confidential by statute.

These reports must be submitted during January each year by all aliens in the United States, with few exceptions. Forms on which to submit the reports are available at any Post Office or office of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. Persons who are unable to pick up a form because of illness, or other reasons, may have a relative or friend obtain a card for them.

The card should have an 8 cents postage stamp affixed and placed in the mail.

Parents or guardians of aliens under fourteen years of age submit reports for such children.

Cliff McMullan exhibited the champion filly and colt and Lisa Mitchell showed the champion beef animal, a brahman heifer.

Sheila Southern exhibited the champion swine of the show and Cliff McMullan showed the reserve champion.

The fat lamb show was pretty well dominated by the Everett kids as R. J. Everett, III, exhibited the champion pair of finewool lambs, champion and reserve champion finewool lamb, reserve champion crossbred lamb, reserve grand champion pair of lambs of the show, the junior high school showmanship award and the Ozona Boot and Saddlery Junior Best Herdsman Award.

Rebecca Everett exhibited the reserve champion pair of finewool lambs, champion pair of crossbred lambs, champion crossbred lamb and grand champion pair of lambs of the show.

Regina Everett exhibited the reserve champion pair of crossbred lambs and was named to receive the Ozona Boot and Saddlery Senior Best Herdsman Award.

Change In School And Business Hours Result Of Daylight Time

After a hectic two days of Daylight Saving Time last week and trying to stay on schedule for the earlier time, the school board met and changed hours for all Ozona school children. Also, after this action was taken many Ozona businesses moved up their time of opening.

The school board changed high school and junior high school class hours from 8 a.m. until 3:30 to 9 a.m. to 4:30. Ozona Intermediate school hours were changed from 8:05 to 3:15 p.m. to 9:05 to 4:15 daily. Ozona Primary school will convene at 9:15 and dismiss at 4:15 p.m. with the exception of kindergarten which will dismiss at 3:30 in the afternoon. These hours will be in effect until March 4, 1974, when school hours will be returned to the regular time.

These hours were adopted to enable youngsters to begin school during daylight hours. After a hectic two days of trying the new hours, this schedule was worked out and went into effect last week.

Most Ozona businesses also changed opening times to correspond with daylight hours, opening an hour later than the clock time. A chamber of commerce survey revealed that the following stores will be open from 9 a.m. until 5:30 p.m.: Watson's, C. G. Morrison,

FFA Commercial Livestock Show Here Saturday
Members of the Ozona FFA Chapter are busy this week preparing for the annual Ozona FFA Commercial Livestock Show, which will be held at the show barn here Saturday.

Activities will begin Friday with the weighing and classification of livestock. Judging will start at 10:00 a.m. Saturday with Bailey Wheelless, Vocational Agriculture instructor of Pecos, serving as judge.

Some 45 FFA members will exhibit 40 swine, 3 calves and 60 lambs. Ribbons and banners will be presented in each of the classes. Championship trophies will be presented to each champion by Nathan's Jewelers of San Angelo.

Best gain trophies will be donated by Ozona Wool & Mohair Co., Ozona Boot & Saddlery Co., and Baker Jewelers. Showmanship trophies will be donated by Ranch Feed and Supply, the Ozona Stockman and Ozona National Bank.

A benefit barbecue will be served at noon by parents of the FFA members. Tickets may be purchased from any FFA member or at the show.

The show will conclude around 2 p.m. with the presentation of the championship trophies.

Baker Jewelers, Westernman Drug, United Dept. Store, Brown Furniture, Mae-Lu's, White Auto, Montgomery Ward, The Village Drug which usually opens at 7 a.m. will open at 8 and keep its usual 6 p.m. closing time. County Commissioners Hold Routine Meeting

The Commissioners Court met in regular session, Monday, January 14, 1974, with all members present.

Judge Williams reported a telephone conversation with John Chiles Allen, architect. Mr. Allen reported the papers have been sent to Washington to determine the federal wage scale regarding the Ozona Geriatrics Wing to the hospital. A reply is expected. Routine reports from the Auditor, Treasurer, Coliseum-Auditorium Board, Park Board and the Hospital Board were received. The Court approved placing the latest revenue sharing check in a Certificate of Deposit.

The Court authorized purchasing 2 new cars for the Sheriff's Department and the Auditor was directed to draft bids. All deputy officials were approved.

Hospital Gets \$4,000 In Drug Settlement
The \$4,886.01 check Attorney General John Hill mailed to Crockett County Hospital was that hospital's share of a total of \$1,707,084.80 Hill distributed to administrators of 145 Texas hospitals as their individual settlements in the State of Texas' antitrust suit against manufacturers of broad spectrum antibiotics.

The payment of the \$1,707,084.80 by the Chas. Pfizer & Co. to the hospitals was the third phase of payment to Texas health and hospital facilities as a result of the settlement of the Pfizer segment of the antitrust suit by Texas and the other 49 states in the Federal District Court, Southern District of New York.

The Attorney General's office already has distributed \$1.9 million in checks to individual consumers, as well as \$487,602 to State health centers and eleemosynary institutions. Settlement of the antitrust suit as it relates to other manufacturers of broad spectrum antibiotics is still pending.

Re-entry Set For Crockett Noolke Field

L. N. Anderson, Abilene, filed application to plug back to 1,700 feet, apparently for reclamation attempt as a Queen gas producer in the Noolke, Northeast field, at his No. 1 Bouscaren, former Queen oil producer in the Noolke field, five miles east of Iran.

Old total depth is 3,500 feet. Application to drill was filed as an oil and gas test in the Noolke, East field, however, there is no field by that name.

Location is 980 feet from the north and 330 feet from the west lines of 29-GG-HE&WT.

Crockett Field Gains Confirmer

The Howard Draw, Northeast (1165 San Andres gas) field of Crockett County gained its seventh well and a 3/8 mile north-northeast extension with completion of Texas Oil & Gas Corp., Midland, No. 1-B Todd Cattle Co., 20 miles west of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 850,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day.

Production was natural from open hole at 893 feet, where 7-inch casing was set, and 1,326 feet, the total depth.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 69-UV-GC&SF.

Lion Cagers Lose District Openers

District play in basketball began last week for the Ozona Lions. In the first game the Lions lost a squeaker to McCamey 53-50 in an overtime. Leading scorers for the Lions were Richard Sanchez with 21 points and David Bean with 16. Friday night the Golden Cranes of Crane crushed the Lions 75-56. Sanchez again led the Lion effort with 18 points.

The two losses give the Lions a 0-2 district record while the season record is 6-11. The junior varsity won one and lost one in district play. They beat McCamey 46-29 with Greg Thompson and Vince Huffman leading the attack with 13 and 10 points respectively. Crane beat the Lion JV 68-51. Again Thompson led the Ozona attack with 13 points, followed by Ricky Perry with 12 points.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

There have been very few days for several weeks that were warm and sunny enough to want to start garden chores. You may be as late as I am getting some bulbs planted, so get them out as soon as possible. I am hoping they will be just ready for the April Flower Show.

Too, I am experimenting with planting them in pots. I will pass on the results. Some will be placed in a south window inside, and others buried in dirt up to the top of the pot to keep the bulbs from freezing. They will need to be kept watered some if there is no rain soon.

I mentioned before about getting your vegetable garden plot ready early for planting. Have you been reading with interest of the growing trend of community gardens? Gardens for All is a new national organization with aspirations to extend the community gardening idea throughout the United States. There are many who would like to grow their own vegetables if they had a small space available with water. Perhaps some one or more in Ozona that have vacant lots would profit by such a project. One such project launched in 1971 with 200 families has grown to 2,000 families by 1972. One area of one-third acre now furnishes 60 garden

plots. In another place seven acres of land has 239 garden plots. Each family participating pays \$10 annually for one of the plots, which includes not only rental, but plowing and planting. Vegetables produced on each have an estimated market value of \$300 to \$500. In Boston Fenway Gardens 500 plots of land each 15 by 30 feet in size have been open free of charge since World War II. Last year there were many profitable gardens in Ozona. Perhaps others may want to try this spring. Looking at seed catalogues makes one want to try everything in the book. If dry weather continues, don't fall to water grass, shrubs, and small trees and especially new plants.

Texas Arbor Day, Jan. 18, will be a busy one if the weather is favorable, for many are planning to plant new shrubs and trees. At least get your plans and orders made by then. Don't take trees for granted -- recognize their beauty and value in the landscape.
