
The Lions came close to two school records when Clifford Crawford ran a 2:05 for second run with a 4:51, both times two seconds off the school record.

Ozona Lion golfers managed to hang on to the district lead but came in third at the Crane tournament last Saturday, behind Big Lake and McCamey.



#### STRAIGHT TALK ON THE ECONOMY

Now we have it straight from the top: the U.S. seems headed for a Latin-American style price spiral that "could send interest rates soaring" and ruin chances for stable prosperity.

The warning was sounded by Arthur Burns, chairman of the Federal Reserve Board. He told the Congressional Joint Economic Committee that the nation is facing "an exceptionally difficult economic situation" because "inflation is proceeding at a dangerous pace, unemployment is rising, strong inflationary forces are likely to continue in 1974 and international financial relations have become strained."

The somber tone of the Fed chief contrasts rather sharply with some of the official optimism we have been getting lately from other government officials, including President Nixon. The conventional view has been that, while the inflation rate is high now and prices may continue to rise for the first half of the year, the figures will surely fall in the second half as an expected bumper feed crop hits the market.

But the surge in January consumer prices, at a rate of 12%, "is a grim warning that we are on the brink of a two-digit inflation," Burns said. "If we go the Latin-American way - and that is the way we seem to be going - we will have interest rates on Latin-American standards, or a good deal higher than at present" and higher than ever experienced in the United States.

So much for what may be in store for us. Why? We think Burns defined it perfectly when he conceded under questioning that the Fed "could stop this inflation in a few months dead in its tracks" by severely tightening its grip on money and credit. But, he added, "we have no intention of doing it" because of the economic hardship such a policy would cause

We would point out, though, that economic hardship is by no means eliminated by inflating. It falls on all those who save, live on, or invest in, fixed income investments. This includes pensioners, bond or mortgage holders, savings account depositors, and owners of any life insurance policy other than term again taised its ugly head. A insurance. 




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
