Tips For Gardeners
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that fall is here, it's bulb ordering and planting time. Of all the spring-flowering bulbs, daffodils are the most popular for modern gardens. Once the bulbs are planted in the fall, their cultural demands over the next years are few. Year after year the flower display is repeated. There are early flowering varieties ('Peeping Tom', 'February Gold', 'March Sunshine') and others that may become the most enjoyed because of their early arrival.

Midseason varieties include 'Louise de Coligny', 'Liberty Bells', 'Kings Court', 'La Rianta', and 'Cantalrice'.

The latest golden trumpet varieties are the most represent-

tative of the daffodils and the ones most likely to be pictured when they are mentioned. Two of these are the 'King Alfred' and 'Polar Ice'.

In the bi-colored varieties where the trumpet is yellow and the perianth (petals) are white is the 'Queen of the Bicolor'. Some of the double-flowered daffodils are 'White Lion' and 'Golden Ducat'. Others in which several flowers are balanced on one stem are 'Liberty Bells', 'Silver Chimes' and 'Tresamble'.

In the modern varieties, some of the loveliest of the pink daffodils are 'Pink Rim' and 'Pink Glory', a long lasting variety whose color deepens as it ages.

For contrast in size as well as flower form, there is the species, the hoop petticoat daffodil (narcissus bulb-ocodium, variety 'Conspicuous'). This little daffodil grows only six inches high, so is suitable for small gardens.

The above named varieties are only a few that are available in daffodil beauty. There are many other outstanding and interesting varieties. Study your fall catalogues to choose the ones you may want.

A colorful combination is to plant Grape-hyacinths in groups in bed or border with daffodils. They too need to be planted in the fall.

If your garden space is limited, order bulbs by the half-dozen or so, choosing from early, midseason and late varieties. Plant in groups or clumps (keeping each variety together) in front of shrubs, around the terrace, at entrance or among other spring flowering perennials.

Daffodils must have well-

drained soil and unless your soil is especially rich, you should mix a complete fertilizer (5-10-5 or the like) in the soil at planting time. They should grow and bloom well for several years in the same location, but when their leaves appear to dominate over the flowers, they need dividing. Do this as soon as the leaves have browned, fertilize the soil and replant. Remember not to cut off the daffodil foliage while still green.

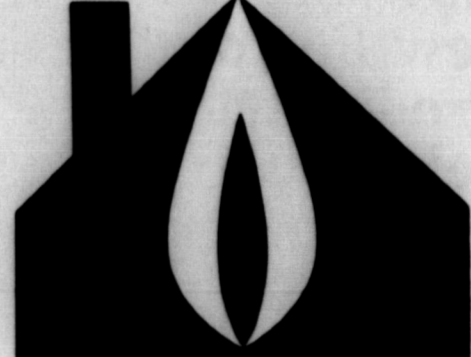

Dobra Says:

It is no fun to admit, "I can't afford that". For that very reason, people often spend first and think later. Not knowing where the money goes is a major reason families have problems managing their money. Too often the money just seems to "disappear" before all the important items have been paid.

To get the "bugs" out of the family budget, make a "keeping can"--such as a three-pound coffee can. Decorated or not, it must be in sight. Put in every sales slip, cash register receipt, and bill.

If the date and item purchased aren't listed on these, make a note on the slip. Other expenses like babysitting, school lunches and any item that doesn't have a receipt can be recorded by writing a note and putting it in the keeping can.

At the end of the month, make a list of dates, what the purchase was, and the price. Some expenses will be seasonal, but they'll be replaced by other seasonal expenses next month, so don't cross them out on that account.

Take a look at any items not really needed or any that could have been purchased for less during sale times. If there is a consistently high expenditure in some unnecessary area--such as too many meals out of too many pairs of shoes--then perhaps you've caught the bill bug. Once you catch a bill bug, do something about it--and get control of your money.

CRANBERRY-APPLE RELISH
Cranberry relish adds color and zest to any meal, be it chicken, turkey, meat or fish. Make your own Cranberry-Apple Relish using canned cranberry sauce and fresh apples. 1 apple, medium tart 1/2 cup diced celery 1 tsp. salt 2 tbsp. bottled horseradish 1 lb. can whole berry cranberry sauce

Core apple. Put through coarse blade of food chopper, or dice finely. Mix other ingredients. Let stand in refrigerator several hours for flavors to blend. Makes 1 pint relish. --0--

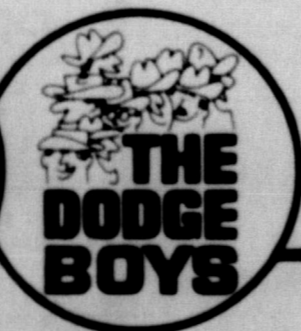

The amount of the supplemental security income checks people will get will depend on other income they might have. "People with no other income at all will have a basic cash income of at least \$130 a month for one person and \$195 for a couple," Mr. Talbot said. "People with other income may get reduced supplemental income checks."

Although the supplemental security income program will be administered by the Social Security Administration, payments will be financed by Federal general tax revenues—not by social security contributions from workers and employers, Mr. Talbot said.

Social security offices are taking applications from people who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled and aren't getting public assistance but who think they might be eligible for supplemental security income payments. "People getting state or local assistance don't have to do anything about supplemental security income," Mr. Talbot said. "They'll get additional information about the program from social security and the Department of Public Welfare. Until the supplemental security income program starts in January," Mr. Talbot said, "the Department of Public Welfare will continue to make payments in the usual way."

of a disastrous year for the species.

The deer, biologists say, are suffering from theileriosis, a blood parasite which doesn't bother deer until they are suffering from malnutrition.

According to Rod Marburger, project leader for the department's wildlife disease project, nature threw the whitetails a curve this year when heavy spring rains brought optimum fawning conditions, boosting deer population. But a summer drought cut drastically the amount of fruits, buds and seeds available to deer in the late summer and early fall.

The prognosis is not bright for the rest of the year because a late spring freeze accounted for the worst acorn crop that biologists can remember. Deer are heavily dependent on acorns to get them through the winter.

Heavy rains during the past week will help some, say biologists, but they will only forestall for a few weeks inevitable widespread deer starvation.

According to Marburger, deer at this time of year should be in prime condition. But census lines reveal that this is not the case. One biologist reported seeing 38 deer on his census line, and only one was in fair condition. The rest were in poor condition.

As an ironic twist, bucks in the Edwards Plateau have fine antlers this year because of good available food during the period of antler growth in the spring. Biologists say it is not unusual to see deer with huge racks and protruding ribs.

Biologists say two courses of action are available to land-owners who want to keep their deer population healthy—supplemental feeding, which is extremely expensive, and allowing more hunters to kill more deer, thereby thinning the population.

Biologists advocate a thinning of the deer herd. This would mean more food for the deer which survived the hunting season, giving them a better chance to survive the winter.

The whitetail's great reproductive capacity will help the deer population to rebound when conditions get better, say biologists.

Marburger said the deer began dying on ranches which had been overgrazed this summer. But as the weather increases its severity, the die-off could extend to nearly all the ranches in the Edwards Plateau.
