Front Brings Over 2 Inches


Ozonans have enjoyed rainfall and cooler weather the past week, as the result of a cool front which moved into the area Thursday morning.

Supplement Pay For Aged Due January

State and Federal agencies are working together on the supplemental security income program that starts making payments in January to people with little or no income who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled. The program is "a Federal-State partnership with each partner doing what it can do best, " according to J. M.

Talbot, social security mana-

Mr. Talbot said the Federal program will "cooperate with State and local public assistance programs to establish the Nation's first uniform income floor for people in need who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled, " Social Security and the Department of Public Welfare are working together so the new payment system will get off to a smooth start in

January, he said, "People getting welfare assistance payments in December because they're 56 or over, or blind, or disabled generally will continue to get payments in January, " Mr. Talbot said, They don't have to apply. " Their combined State and Federal assistance payments in January will be at least as much as their welfare assistance payments were in December, " Mr. Talbot said. They will also be eligible for

Medicaid ' Medicaid, vocational rehabflitation for disabled people, and other social services, such as child care, family counselng, etc., will be administered the State Department of Public Welfare. The Social Security Administration will determine eligibility for supelemental security income, nake the Federal payments, keep records, and work to prevent fraud, according to , M. Beef Production Short Course Slated Here For Adult Ranchers

A beef production short course for adult ranchers will be held Nov. 5-8 under the sponsorship of the Ozona High School Vocational Agriculture Department according to Mr. L. B. T. Sikes, Superintendent, and Mr. Jim Leech, Teacher of Vocational Agriculture.

Dr. Elmer V. Krehbiel, Beef Production Specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Science at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Cattlemen interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Sikes, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Leech. An entry fee of \$3,00 will be charged.

Beef Production Short Course certificates will be presented to each cattleman who attends all the training sessions.

Dr. Krehbiel states that the field of beef cattle production must take a close look at efficiency of production in the future. With land prices, feed. and taxes rising, the producer is meeting more and more competition for the consumer's dollar at the meat counter. From the economic view of the beef cattle business, there is every indication that in comparing the producer of yesteryear and the producer of tomorrow, beef must be produced more efficiently in order to be a profit-making business. Dr. Krehbiel indicates that the beef production short course will deal with methods of producing beef at a lower cost and the ways of producing the kind of beef that the homemaker wants to buy. He also states that the course will include such important topics as cattle reproduction and pregnancy diagnosis, selecting bulls and replacement heifers, calf crop percentages, and supplemental winter feeding. The course can be changed to meet the wishes and interests of the ranchers enrolled.

"Short courses in beef production, as well as in other areas, are now available to ranchers throughout the state under the cooperative program between Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University, " states Bob Jaska, associate professor, Department of Agricultural Education at Texas A&M University, who coordinates the program for Texas

"This cooperative program," states Jaska, "is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational ser-

vices to ranch people. Specialists are now available in the fields of beef production, ranch electric wiring and safety, ranch electric motors, arc welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, pasture, and oxy-acetylene welding.



Three Months

Americans are rightly disturbed by inflation, especially sharply higher food prices. There are consolations, however, most of us should keep in mind.

First, American prices are still only half what the buyer in West Germany pays, for example. In most other advanced countries, including the Scandinavian countries, food prices are also much higher.

Second, there are indications many food prices have peaked. As farm production increases, some may recede. Third, there's a wider selection of foods available to Americans than to other buyers.

Fourth, although inflation has affected Americans, it's also true real earnings, (purchasing power) have risen. This

Of course, prices can't continue to rise during the rest of the year as they have in the first nine months without changing the picture. Thus the period from now to Christmas is probably the crucial test for the Nixon Administration in its efforts to slow inflation.

Peking's Position

The Chinese Communists continue to assault Russia's ruling hierarchy with passion and bitter recriminations; Chinese officials also constantly warn of a possible Russian attack on China.

The basic i sue between the two Communist countries hen the Russians invaded Czechostovakia, claiming the rig. to march into any socialist country when that nation's internal policies became dangerous.

The Chinese, like the Romanians, Yugoslavs and Albanians, had been resisting Russian calls for obedience to Moscow's line, and were alarmed by this forceful implementation of what is now called the Brezhnev doctrine.

Until the Russian leadership in Moscow repudiates this doctrine, relations between China and Russia are not likely to be relaxed; in this area, then, the Chinese are fighting for the same change in Russian policy Washington seeks.

The World's Governments

While complaining about the weaknesses of our own government, the failures of our elected leaders, it's also proper to keep in mind the long-term comparative record of American government compared to the record of the rest of the

Many countries are still saddled with "royal" families. Half the world is under the yoke of Communism.

To the south few of the Latin nations exhibit stability, very few offer their citizens democratic freedoms. Argentina has just recalled an ex-dictator, 78, and in ill-health, foolish enough to install his wife, unpopular and unqualified, as Vice President.

Chile, wrecked by a Marxist trying to accomplish the impossible, is now under military rule. Brazil is run by the military. Revolutions plague other Latin countries period-

U.S. democracy far from perfect but functioning under a constitution written by remarkable men two hundred years ago, continues to offer Americans more freedoms, more economic hope, and a better life than any other form of government in the world.

A federal district judge in New York recently ruled all amendments, propositions and voting instructions in a November 6th election there be printed in Spanish as well as

It is, of course, an admirable and idealistic gesture. if questionable constitutionally. But it is also a dangerous

What other languages will be next? For what other special

The question arises whether any American citizen can understand this country and its laws, and the responsibili-

The goal must be to encourage all citizens to learn the language of the land, for their and national interests; if we are to set forth on such an idealistic judicial experiment, the freezing and splintering of the citizenry into racial and ethnic blocs is inevitable.

The whole story of this nation is to erase these differences, to build a nation from among diverse groups into a cohesive, unified country. This is possible only if there is a common language. The judiciary and politicians forget this at their peril, and the nation's future peril.

The chairman of the State Railroad Commission has issued a grim new warning that natural gas shortages will hit Texans hard this winter.

In a speech to Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association at Dallas, Chairman Jim Langdon said:

-- Propane already is in short supply due to stockpiling to offset the natural gas shortage. -- As much as 500, 000 barrels daily of distillate fuel oil will be needed from November to March.

-- If distillate use is as high as predicted in the state, three to five times above normal. shipments to out-of-state consumers may have to be cut 50 percent.

Out- of- state commitments, mandatory federal allocations and other factors may require that Texans share proportionally in shortages.

This means that Texas might not only be denied access to its total distillate needs, but that access to its normal requirements could be cut." said Langdon. "The gasoline supply-demand situation, as well as every other petroleum product, will experience shortages this winter. As in the case of natural gas, a shortage in any type of fuel which results in an unsatisfied demand will exert pressure on available supplies of other fuels, setting up

a domino-like effect," Langdon recommended early construction of offshore deep-water ports to accommodate super-tankers from foreign

countries and stepped-up development of domestic reserves of oil and gas (including shale oil) and increased use of coal.

Meanwhile, only one maor customer of Lo-Vaca Gathering Company, Lone Star Gas Company of Dallas, rejected a Railroad Commission temporary rate increase -- to 29, 55 cents per 1,000 cubic feet-on natural gas delivered by the big Houston-based company

to its customers around the CREDIT INSURANCE CUT

UNCERTAIN -- Credit life insurance rates, which haven't been cut since 1968 in spite of reductions in losses, are going down, but it isn't certain now much.

The subject caused a minor hassle between State Insurance Board Chairman Joe Christie and Marcom Shockley, Board life insurance division head, at a hearing on credit insur-

Shockley recommended a 23 per cent cut in single premium reducing term rates and 10 per cent reduction in rates for level-term coverage based on a three-year experience

Christie wanted to figure on the basis of 1972 losses only, which would cut reducing term rates 25, 3 per cent and level term rates 18, 6 per cent. The chairman later told newsmen Shockley had recommended the larger reduction during Board conferences.

Board statistics point to \$15 to \$18 million overcharges





The amount of the supplemental security income checks people will get will depend on other income they might have. "People with no other income at all will have a basic cash income of at least \$130 a month for one person and \$195 for a couple, " Mr. Talbot said. "People with other income may get reduced supplemental income checks, "

Although the supplemental security income program will be administered by the Social Security Administration, payments will be financed by Federal general tax revenues -- not by social security contributions from workers and employers. Mr. Talbot said.

Social security offices are taking applications from people who are 65 or over, or blind, or disabled and aren't getting public assistance but who think they might be eligible for supplemental security income payments. "People getting state or local assistance don't have to do anything about supplemental security income, " Mr. Talbot said. "They'll get additional information about the program from social security and the Department of Public Welfare. Until the supplemental security income program starts in January, " Mr. Talbot said, "the Department of Public Welfare will continue to make payments in the usual


