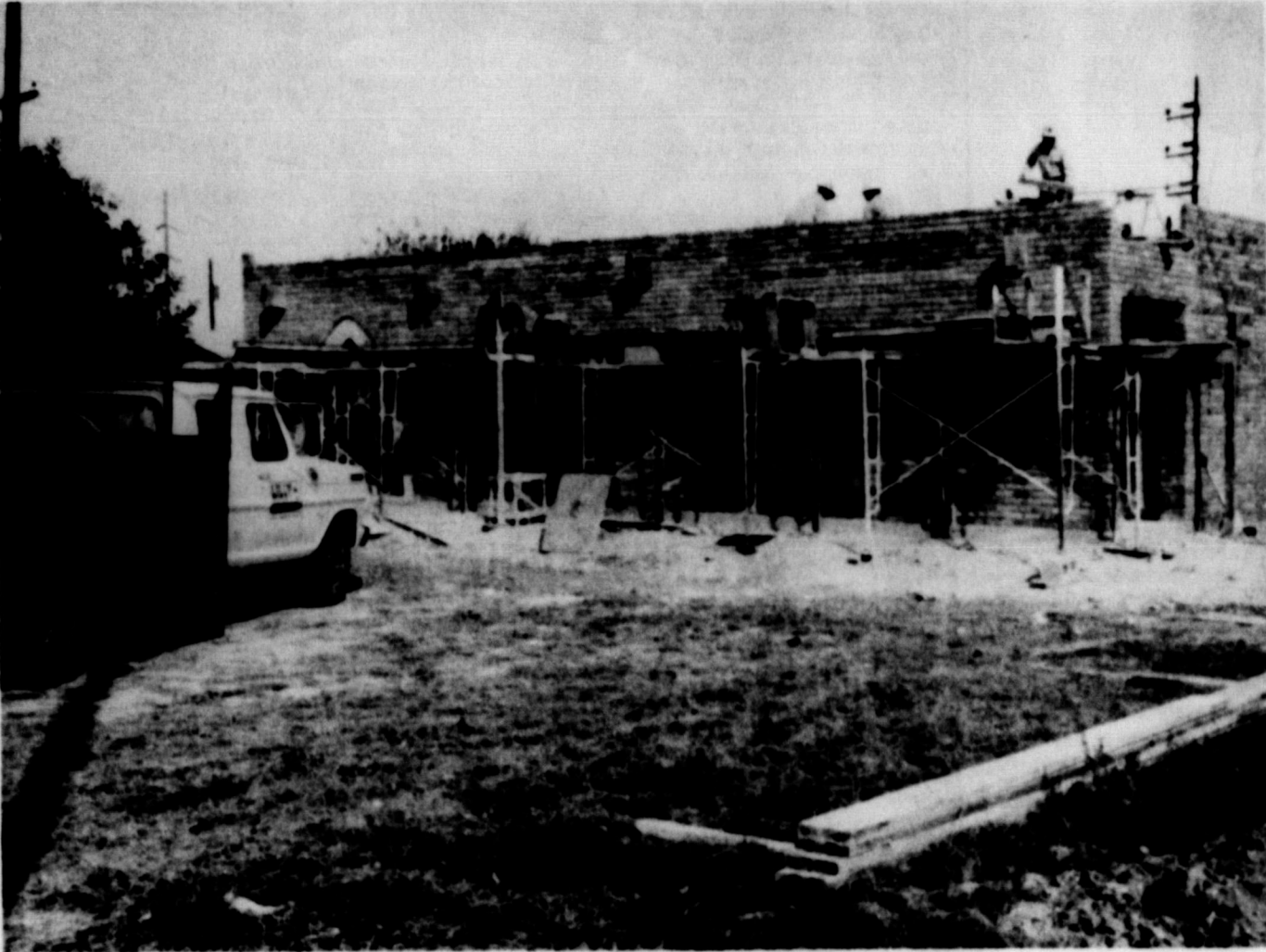

OZONA CONTINUES TO GROW -- And a new drive-in grocery is in store for local residents. Strictly a Lilly Welding and Construction project from top to bottom, the new structure is located in the 200 block of Ave E, or on State Highway 163 north

of downtown Ozona. Projected opening date is December 15. The store will be open at all hours, have a large parking lot, and cater to after-hours and holiday shoppers. It is steel and brick construction and will have attractive arched doors.

Deer Hunters To Gather Saturday For Record Hunt

The largest group of hunters in the history of Crockett County is expected to descend on the area this weekend for deer season which opens Saturday, Nov. 18, 30 minutes before sunrise.

According to game warden Raymond Davee, there is also a record number of deer for the harvest with more and better antlers this season than in many seasons past. Davee says there are lots of deer in the county this year and that they are in excellent shape.

Hunters are allowed three deer, no more than two bucks. If landowners have antlerless tags and will issue them to hunters, a hunter may kill or have in his possession three doe or antlerless deer. Antlerless deer other than doe, are young bucks without horns.

The season continues through Jan. 1, thirty minutes after sundown. Shooting hours are 30 minutes before sundown until 30 minutes after sundown each day.

The turkey season also begins Saturday with one of the largest wild turkey crops on record. Bag limit for turkeys are two of either sex.

Postal Patrons Urged To Mail Gifts Early

Postmaster Floyd Hokit reminded local postal patrons that Christmas deadlines for overseas mailings are at hand and some forms of mailing are already past the Christmas deadline.

The deadline for airmail parcels to Armed Forces in Europe is Dec. 11, and for armed forces personnel stationed in South and Central America, the Near East and Far East the deadline is Dec. 1. Airmail for those stationed in Canada, the Arctic, Africa and the Azores, is Dec. 8 and respectively.

Parcel Airlift (PA) deadlines for Armed Forces personnel are as follows: Canada, Nov. 30; South and Central America, Nov. 17; Europe, Dec. 1; Africa and the Azores, Nov. 17; Far East, Nov. 27. SAM parcels or Space

The Bulldogs must lose or tie with Crane tomorrow night for the Lions to win the District. Also, the Lions must beat

Gerald Huff scored for the Lions on a 10-yard run to open the scoring in the first quarter and Ruben Tambunga caught a 22-yard pass from David Sewell for the second score. The kick failed for the point after following the first touch-down, and the run for two points after the second td also failed. However, the Lions led 12-0 going into the second quarter.

Stanton scored and ran for the two points in the second quarter bring up halftime with the Lions holding a 12-8 lead.

Both teams went scoreless in the third quarter, but Huff broke the game open in the

fourth quarter, scoring on a 5 yard run with the PAT failing, and moments later scoring on a 25 yard run after an interception of a Buffalo pass. Sewell ran for the two points, Tambunga scored the final tally for the Lions with the pass for the point after no good.

The Buffaloes upped their score to 15 on a score and a point after kick in the fourth quarter.

Ozona dominated the statistics with 21 first downs to Stanton's 7, 334 yards rushing to 132 for the Buffaloes, completing 2 passes for 25 yards out of 8 attempts, while the Buffaloes completed 6 out of 15 passes for 146 yards. The Lions intercepted 5 Buffalo passes while the Buffaloes only picked off one Lion pass. There were no Lion fumbles and two for Stanton. The Lions punted twice for a 22-yard average and the Buffaloes punted two times for a 23 yard average.

Mrs. Everett died about noon Thursday in Crockett County Hospital.

She was born May 21, 1883 in San Antonio, and had lived in Crockett County since 1895. She was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. T. W. Patrick. She attended the University of Texas and was a retired school teacher. She taught at the Howard Wells School at about the turn of the century.

She was married to Rufus Everett Dec. 22, 1906 in Ozona. He preceded her in death in 1965. They moved to their ranch on the Pecos following their marriage and operated their holdings there until 1953 when they retired and moved to town.

Survivors include two sons, R. J. Everett, and Thomas E. Everett, both of Ozona; a daughter, Mrs. Floyd Moss of Big Spring; a brother, Tim Patrick of Corsicana; a sister, Mrs. Samantha Finnegan of San Antonio; 11 grandchildren and 16 great grandchildren.

Commissioners Let Contract For County Road Maintenance Bldg.

The opening and letting of bids occupied much of the time of the commissioners when the Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday in regular session. Monthly reports were also read and approved.

Bids were opened for the new county road maintenance building which will be built on county property north of the city and will replace the county barn which is in the path of Interstate 10. G. O. Spencer was the low bidder and his bid was accepted.

Bids were also opened for steel door jambs for the hospital. West Texas Builders Supply submitted the low bid and it was accepted.

The road Department submitted a request for a new truck to haul materials for patching pavement in. Bids will be called for the vehicle as well as for a new pickup for the road department.

Maintenance superintendent Dudley McCary was directed to repair upstairs offices in the courthouse annex following repair to the roof. McCary was also instructed to enlarge a bathroom door in the Coliseum to comply with requirements for handicapped persons.

Debra Gentry, Crockett County Home Demonstration Agent, appeared before the members of the court and discussed plans for her program, which includes training adult

4-H leaders for various programs, forming a newly marrieds HD club in conjunction with the regular Home Demonstration Club, and plans for working with the elderly in the community.

Pete Jacoby, county agent, reported that the Brucellosis recertification program should be completed this week. The program takes in the testing of 15% of the cattle in the county every three years. The program started this year in August, testing 29 cattle herds in the county, all tests being negative.

The hospital report was given by Sonny Kirkland, who reported an average of 6 persons per day in the hospital during the past month. The remaining \$18,000.00 of county funds budgeted for the hospital was transferred into

the hospital account.

The court gave some discussion to the nursing home and the recently passed revenue-sharing plan for the federal government. There was some discussion on whether the money could be used for the nursing home or not. A check in excess of \$80,000 should be received by the county by November for the first six months of 1972.

The recent election returns were also canvassed and certified by the court.

Dual Completion For Crockett County Field

A Crockett County field gained a dual confirmation and location was staked for one in another field.

Gulf Oil Corp. has dually completed its No. 1-A V. I. Pierce-State as a tenth Clearfork gas producer and a 5/8

mile east extension to that pay in the V. I. P. multipay (Clearfork oil and gas) field and as a 1/8 mile north-northeast extension to Canyon production on the south side of the Ozona multipay field

19 miles south of Ozona. It was finalized for a calculated, absolute open flow of 4.4 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 2,090-93 feet and 2,114-116 feet, which had been acidized with 7,000 gallons and fractured with 20,000 pounds and gallons.

It was finalized for the Canyon for a calculated, absolute open flow of 2 million cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 5,578 feet to 6,347 feet, which had been acidized with 8,000 gallons and fractured with 32,000 gallons and 20,000 pounds of sand.

Drilled to 6,500 feet, where 4 1/2 inch casing was set, it is plugged back to 6,433 feet.

Location is 1,455 feet from the most northerly south line and 1,520 feet from the most westerly west line of 106-WC-N. Aquilar.

McCulloch Oil Corp. of Texas and IDS Midland, will drill the No. 1-172 Chandler as a 1 1/2 mile southwest out-post to the three-well Miller (Ellenburger gas) field 22 miles south of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 172-0-GHSA Contract depth is 11,700 feet.

OUR NON-SERVICE POST OFFICE

How is your mail delivery recently? Better or worse? If it seems to be worse, don't be surprised. According to Postmaster General Elmer Klassen, reported by U. S. News and World Report, only one half of the postal service workers are putting in an honest day's work for a day's pay. The other half, according to Mr. Klassen, are merely going through the motions of an 8-hour day, goldbricking, or actively engaged in sabotaging attempts to improve postal service.

Klassen told U. S. News & World Report that there are "a lot of very fine people in the postal service--dedicated people. If there weren't, you would be getting no mail. But we also have an element that couldn't care less."

It is interesting to note that the head of the Letter Carriers Union, James Rademacher, does not disagree with the charge that only one-half of the postal workers are doing a good job. The Union boss even commends Postmaster General Klassen for his "business savvy." But Rademacher offers the peculiar argument that Mr. Klassen, as former head of the American Can Company, fails to understand that "the post office is not a business, but a service."

Which causes us to exclaim; what in the world does Union boss Rademacher think a "business" is, if not a service? Any business that does not provide service to its customers, in the form of economy, or quality, or convenience, or speed, or safety, or some other feature which customers want and demand, will very soon be out of business. Permanently.

The one outstanding feature of the capitalist, free enterprise, competitive business system in the United States is that it has provided better service to more people than any other economy in the world. And not one of these competitive, capitalist companies could stay in business if one-half of their workers goofed off.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club By Mrs. Bailey Post

These beautiful fall days should give everyone a chance to prepare for protection of plants that will need to be moved inside or mulched to prevent the soil from freezing so deeply. If mulch is used in flower beds, remove all dead annuals, and cut off tops of perennials close to the ground. For roses, remove all dead and diseased leaves before adding mulch.

After the first killing frost, cut back dahlias 2 to 3 inches of the ground. Let plants remain in the ground for about a week, then dig roots, wash and dry in the shade. Keep tuberous roots from freezing and drying out by storing in peat moss or vermiculite. Some prefer to leave dahlia roots in the ground, but they should be protected with soil or mulch.

To care for indoor plants properly there are several requirements:

Light: Low, no direct light needed. Medium light, diffused or filtered light. High-bright light or full sun. The type of plants you have will determine the light intensity, quality and duration.

Water: Moisture in the soil requires careful management. Not enough water causes leaves to turn yellow and drop off. Plants that need dry soil conditions require water only at 3 to 4 week intervals, but thoroughly moisten the soil each time. Plants requiring moist soil conditions like for the soil to remain uniformly moist, but never wet. Do not allow soil to dry out around plants needing wet conditions, however, provide good drainage, and never allow water to stand in saucers.

Temperature - Since mod-

ern buildings and home interiors are usually kept at about the same temperature year-round, most plants adaptable for in-doors are suited to this environment. Good cultural practices include pinching to maintain the plant's shape, feeding lightly, and infrequently.

Plants should have a loose, friable soil mixture and control any disease or insect problem. Plants for dry soil include aloes, Chinese evergreen, croton, Moses in the cradle, pandanus, peperoni, Schefflera, jade plant, sansevieria, wax plant.

Moist soil: aralia, caladium, dracaena, dieffenbachia, ferns, fig, Chinese hibiscus, ivy, palms philodendron, pine, rubber plant, velvet plant.

Wet soil (but not standing in water, fern, palm, lady Phopis.

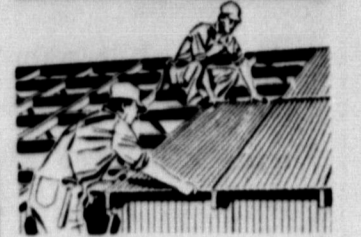

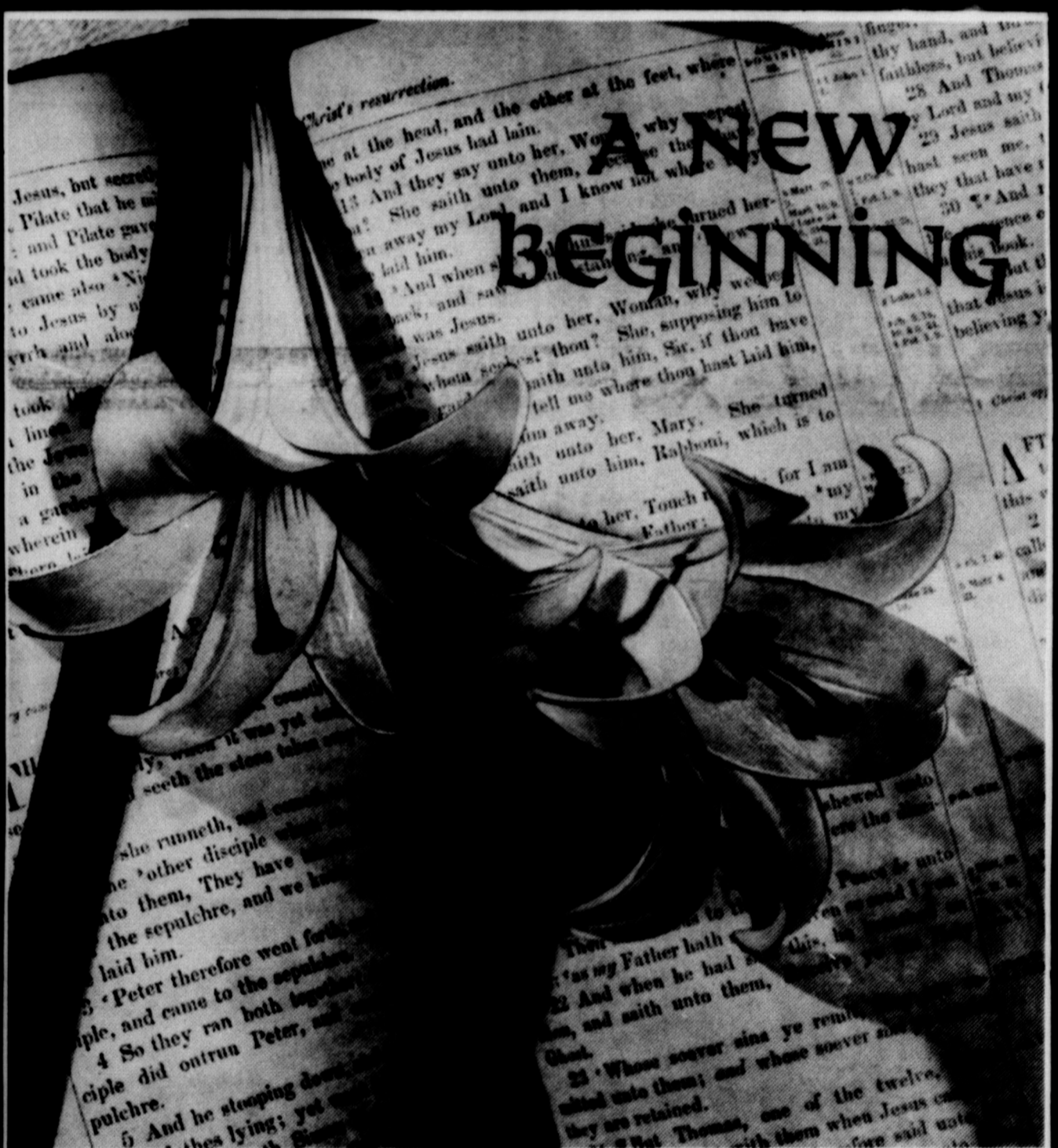

Walking Through Glass

Leaving her dentist's office, Martha headed for the lobby of the building. But as she reached the exit, she mistook a glass panel for the door and pushed right through it.

Cut and bruised, Martha decided to seek damages from the owner of the building. "The door is glass and so is the panel," she complained in a court hearing. "It is all very confusing."



But the building owner saw no good reason for her confusion. He pointed out that the door had a metal frame, a hydraulic mechanism, and a handle—all plainly visible. Result: Martha's claim was turned down. As one judge put it:

"The injury was due to her own lack of care. She was the author of her own misfortune."

The growing use of glass in homes and buildings has led to numerous lawsuits in which someone inadvertently "walked through glass." In homes alone, such accidents happen about 40,000 times a year.

How alert does the law expect you to be in discerning danger? One key factor, as in the case above, is the presence of visible features that should put a reasonably careful person on guard.

Another factor is your familiarity with the premises. A woman shopper barged into the glass panel beside the door at her neighborhood supermarket. But a court rejected her damage claim largely on the ground that she had been using the same door for years without any difficulty.

However, in other circumstances, inattention may well be excused. Consider this case:

An eight-year-old child, visiting at the home of some family friends, ran into a sliding glass door. But it seems that the lighting was poor, and that the door—kept spotlessly clean at all times—had no telltale fixtures to make

it noticeable.

A court accordingly found no fault with the youthful victim. Ordering the home owner to pay damages, the court said he could easily have called attention to the hazard with a strategic strip of

colored tape.

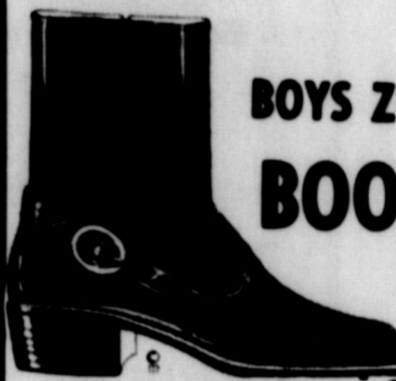

Clean Up Aids Make Good Home Gifts

A "clean-up" gift on the Christmas list could reduce kitchen problems and clean-up chores all year long. "Appliances are on the market that make clean-up easier and help end kitchen drudgery," Lillian Cochran, home management specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service of Texas A&M University pointed out.

Before placing any appliance on the gift list, the prospective purchaser should consider some hints on its use and care, the specialist advised.

"A food disposer fits in the kitchen sink drain and takes care of the messiest cooking job—emptying food scraps.

"When purchasing this handy appliance, look for models which can take most kinds of scraps—including stringy vegetables or small bones—and can eliminate 'jams' automatically.

"Some disposers require manual unclogging with a long wooden spoon, tongs or a broom handle.

"The disposer's safety features also are very important consideration.

"As a precaution against utensils falling into the mechanism while it's grinding, some new models will start only when a cover is placed over the drain. The cover also eliminates splashback.

"If the disposer is operated by a wall switch, make sure it is placed out of the reach of children."

Turning to operation of the food disposer, the home management specialist said cold running water plays a dual role.

"Cold water washes the scraps into the mechanism and serves to congeal and harden greasy substances for their mechanical breakup."

Immediate action on the scraps is a must—if they're simply left in the disposer, unpleasant odors can develop.

"Very little maintenance is required of this appliance since it's largely self-cleaning when used properly," the specialist concluded.

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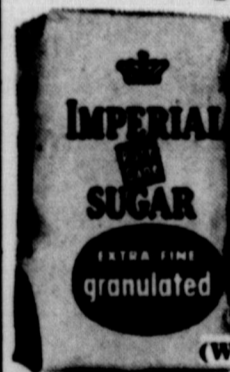
