Lions Meet Owls In First Dist. Game Fri.

Ozona's Fighting Lions are braced for their first district game tomorrow night in Big Lake with the Reagan County Owls.

Coach Rip Sewell feels that the game will prove to be one of the toughest for the Lions, as the Owls have a versatile ball club and are playing sound fundamental football. The Owls have one of the toughest defensive clubs in the district and have given up only 24 points to their opponents in five ball games.

The Lions will be favored to win and rightly so. They have won four games in a row with impressive scores, having a 4-1 season while the Owls have won three, lost one and tied one. They are slightly behind the Owls in team de-

fense and second to Coahoma in offense, while the Owls are next to last in offense in the district.

Statistics show the Lions last in only one category. They have received fewer penalties than the other five teams in the district.

In individual statistics for the district the Lions own the top rusher, Ruben Tambunga, and have three other men in the top twenty rushers in the district. Gerald Huff is third and has a slightly better average per carry than Tambunga. Other Ozona backs in the top twenty are Tim Evans and David Sewell.

Ozona's Sewell is fourth in the passing department, but top in touchdown passes with 4. Huff is also in the top ten in district passers.

Huff is fourth in the top twenty receivers for the district, but has caught three touchdown passes to lead in that department.

Although Beal of Coahoma leads the district in scoring, Ozona players own the next three spots. Tambunga is second, Sewell third and Huff fourth.

Stanton is the only other team in the district besides the Lions to own a 4-1 record.

The Lions are in good physical shape with the exception of linebacker Gary Mitchell, who is still out with an injured knee and probably will not see action.

Game time changes for district play and kick-off time is 7:30 instead of 8 p. m. All Ozona fans are urged to be on hand early to get seats, as the game promises to be one of the biggest attractions in the district.

Welding Short Course Set For Local Ranchers

A farm arc welding short course for adult ranchers will be held October 30 under the sponsorship of the Ozona High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to L. B. T. Sikes, superintendent, and Jim Leech, teacher of vocational agriculture.

Bill Hollenback, welding specialist with the Agricultural Education Adult Specialist Program headquartered at Texas A&M University, will do the instructing in the course.

Mr. Hollenback holds a B. S. Degree in Agricultural Education from Oklahoma State University and an M. S. in Agricultural Education from Texas A&M University. Hollenback was a professional welder for Atlas Tank and Steel for five years with headquarters at Tonkawa, Okla. He has taught Vocational Agriculture for years prior to joining the Adult Specialist Program.

The short course at Ozona High School is scheduled to begin Oct. 30 at 7:00 p. m. in the vocational agriculture building. Other meetings in the series of four will be held Oct. 31, Nov. 1, and Nov. 2. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Hollenback will be available to assist ranchers and farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction.

Those interested in attending the short course should write or call the teacher of vocational agriculture, Jim Leech. An entry fee of \$5.00 will be charged. Farm Welding Short Course certificates will be presented to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Court To Call Bond Election To Finance Building Nursing Home

Assurance that an election will be called at the earliest practical date for a bond issue to build a nursing home in Ozona was given a group of interested citizens meeting with the Crockett County Commissioners Court at a postponed session Monday afternoon.

"If the people approve the issue, the Court further pledges its assurance that it will proceed with all due haste to bring about the construction and equipping of such a home for the county's senior citizens," County Judge Troy Williams further assured the group.

The meeting of the citizen group was arranged following last week's gathering with the county judge in the absence of other members of the court, just back from attending a meeting of the County Judges and Commissioners Association meeting.

Rev. John Berkley, pastor of the Ozona United Methodist Church, acted as spokesman for the group of citizens, presenting on behalf of those present a plea for action by the court to bring about construction of the nursing facility.

Rev. Berkley presented the proposal from the standpoint of community need and its economic advantage.

"A recent survey showed a total of approximately 20 aged persons from Ozona who are now receiving care in nursing homes outside the county," Rev. Berkley said. "The survey revealed the average cost at approximately \$300

to \$375 per month. Thus, by a little multiplying we can readily see that this means more than \$6,000 a month in funds for this purpose going out of the county.

"Aside from the responsibility we should feel for our senior citizens, many of whom have formed the backbone of this community in years gone by, we can see an economic advantage of considerable proportions in the building of a nursing home here. It would

Deer Seminar Set For Wed. At Civic Center

A deer husbandry seminar will be held at the Civic Center next Wednesday for all ranchers and business firms interested in this economy in the county. The seminar is sponsored by the Ozona Chamber of Commerce in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The program with Tony Allen as Master of Ceremonies will get underway at 10:00 a. m., preceded by coffee drinking at 9:30. Mr. Allen heads up the chamber of commerce hunting and ranching committee. There will be a noon barbecue for those in attendance. The program will conclude at 3:00 p. m. All interested are invited to attend all or any part of the program during the day.

The complete program is as follows: 9:30 a. m., Coffee drinking; 10:00 a. m., Why Manage Deer, Extension Economist; 10:45 a. m., Marketing Recreation, Dr. Milo Shult, Extension Wildlife Specialist,

will be badly needed if the oil industry should dwindle in the county and after the highway construction program is completed.

Mrs. R. A. Harrell, another citizen-worker for the nursing home, pointed out the urgency of the need, citing the experience here and in other counties where those most in need of care are gone before facilities can be completed. Careful planning, of course, is necessary, Mrs. Harrell conceded but there is such urgency behind this project as to merit immediate and serious planning and execution.

Judge Williams pointed to another obvious fact for citizens to consider--that "when you go to capital expenditures you are going to face a raise in taxes."

"We are hopeful, however," the Judge continued, "that the raise in taxes can be kept at a moderate figure." We have recently been informed that this county will receive some \$82,000 from the federal government under the revenue sharing plan recently passed by the Congress. If this is so, it appears to me that this will be an excellent place to use such a fund, thus reducing the county's obligation in the construction cost.

"On behalf of the court, I want to thank all of you for coming and showing your interest in this matter. And I want to again assure you that this court will carry out the plan to set the bond election and if it is approved by the electorate will proceed with the award of construction contracts as rapidly as possible."

Mrs. Roy Thompson spoke briefly in favor of the plan to provide care facilities for the senior citizens.

"We have done a good job for our youth and I think that is excellent," Mrs. Thompson said. "Now I think we should get on with the job of providing care facilities for our senior citizens. It, no doubt, will cost the county something but the dividends will be great. I believe it will help stabilize the doctor situation and prove a means of increasing the nursing corps."

Also speaking for the project were Mrs. Tom Prowers and Mrs. Larry Arledge, Mrs. Arledge president of the Ozona Woman's Forum, offered that organization's endorsement of a nursing home bond issue and Rev. Berkley spoke for the Ozona Rotary Club, declaring that organization membership favoring the plan.

Rev. Berkley expressed the group's appreciation to the court for its good work so far in the planning and for its attention to citizen requests.

Monday Holiday For Schools

Letters To the Editor

Dear Editor,

One of the duties of a Christian pastor is to visit the sick and elderly of his congregation. As I make my rounds in Ozona, and survey the needs of my own congregation, I am constantly reminded of our need for a nursing home.

At the present moment Ozona has between 20 or 30 in nursing or retirement homes outside of our community. In addition some of my members compiled a list of over 202 who may need a nursing home within the next 5 to 10 years. One of the human tragedies is that our elderly must be sent away from their home, community, family, and friends into a strange community to spend their declining years. In addition most of their friends who could visit them are not able to because of distance.

It is a natural human trait to set aside unpleasant thoughts. None of us likes to think of a time when we may need extended care. But with increasing life expectancy and increasing percentage of elderly, plans must be made now.

From another point of view, every town needs some kind of an industry or business to keep the economy moving. The community needs some activity that will either keep

our money working in the community or bring outside money in to make it prosper. A nursing home is a ready-made industry which will not only serve the physical needs of our people, but will also create new jobs. Someday our oil activity, highway construction, and pipeline work will be more or less completed and economic benefits from these activities will decline. We will need something to fill the gap created by these economic changes. If the proposed 40 bed nursing home were completed and in full operation at that time, it would be operating at about \$144,000 or more in revenue per year. And a good part of that would be from Federal Funds. At least we would not be losing the \$6,000 or more being spent per month by those 20 or more living outside our community now. Economically it is better for us to have that money spent here even if the nursing home operated at a slight loss.

I believe that Ozona should build a nursing home that is so attractive and well planned that it will be ahead of any other and insure that it will be selected when a choice is made. I also believe that it should be designed for semi-residency where by people can live, have their meals furnished, and have immediate assistance if needed. This latter suggestion is incorporated in the present plans.
