Public Hearing On Tap For Hunting Rules

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission has announced a public hearing to be held in the district courtroom at the courthouse in Ozona on Monday, March 26, for the purpose of discussing hunting, fishing and trapping regulations for the coming seasons in this county.

The Texas Legislature has made the Parks and Wildlife Commission responsible for setting seasons, bag limits and means and methods for harvesting the state's wildlife resources annually. These public hearings are held to hear comments and suggestions from citizens relative to such regulations.

Several changes were put into effect in this county last year as a result of such hearing. Some changes were made in deer season periods and a split season on dove hunting inaugurated, among other changes.

All persons interested in any phase of hunting, fishing, trapping and regulations controlling the taking of wildlife resources are urged to attend the meeting. Meeting time will be 8 p. m. March 26 in the district courtroom. Raymond Davee, game warden, will be in charge of the hearing.

Tuesday Storm Brings Hail, Wind And Rain

Lion Tracksters Make It Two In Row by Winning McCamey Meet

The Ozona Lions made it two in a row at the McCamey track meet last Saturday and won the championship by a big 143 points to second place Big Lake with 79 and third place Crane with 72.

Competing with teams in their own district, the Lions literally swept the field. They brought home three championship trophies, team, 440-relay and mile relay. David Sewell was high-point man of the meet and the team brought home 22 medals. Lion coach John Richey said "I felt this was an outstanding day's work."

The Lions will be in Iraan this coming weekend for that city's annual track meet.

The Lions won first place in the 440-relay, the 120 high hurdles, the 100-yard dash, and the mile-relay on their way to their second team

championship in two outings Saturday.

They set a new meet record in the prelims of the 440-relay with a time of 43.9. Members of the team are Ruben Tambunga, Timmy Evans, David Sewell and Gerald Huff.

Sewell won high-point man with 31 points, running on the winning relay team, winning first in the high hurdles, second in the 100-yard dash, third in the pole vault and fifth in the long jump.

On the injured list for the Lions are Ruben Tambunga who pulled a muscle in the finals of the 440 relay and will be out for a week or ten days; Huff, who strained a knee in the high jump, and Pete Maldonado who sprained an ankle when he broke a hurdle. Huff and Maldonado should be able to go this week

Wildcat Slated And Outpost Set In County Fields

American Quasar Petroleum Co., operating out of Midland, will drill another 9,200-foot wildcat in Crockett County, 18 miles east of dual production in the DePaul (Strawn gas) and 7,890 Pennsylvania gas in the Davidson Ranch multipay field, and two miles northwest of the one-well Angus (Strawn gas) field. It is the No. 1-10 Helen Henderson West.

Location is 660 feet from the north and 860 feet from the west lines of 10-11P, Scarp File No. 7919, Abst. 5117. Ground elevation is 2,442 feet.

The firm has five other deep tests in the same vicinity on which no information is being released.

Gulf Oil Corp., will drill the No. 1-B J. R. Childress as a 3 3/8 mile east outpost to a southwest extension area of Canyon gas production in the Ozona multipay field, in which Clearfork oil and gas production is assigned to the V. I. P. field of Crockett County, 18 miles south of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the north and 1,550 feet from the west lines of 17-000-CC&SF Abst. 3709. Contract depth is 6,600 feet.

He is also survived by Dr. Stewart Tabb of Waco, three grandchildren and one great grandchild.


Earl Acton Is Boys Ranch Wagon Boss

LITTLE RED RIDING HOOD

(A 1973 Revised Version)

Once upon a time, in an impacted area, there dwelt a minor child called Little Red Riding Hood. One day her liberated mother asked her to take a basket of food stamps to her ailing grandmother who lived in an urban development. It happened that a wolf smoking pot on the front steps overheard the conversation. He decided to take a short cut to grandmother's pad and get the trading stamps for himself to help support his habit. The wolf killed the grandmother, then dressed in her granny gown and jumped into bed to await the little girl.

When she arrived he made several nasty suggestions he had found in his High School English Book, "Catcher in the Rye" and then tried to attack her. The frightened child screamed. A woodcutter cat working nearby, who had been employed by the Urban Developers to remove all weeds in the neighborhood known as "trees," heard her cries and rushed to the rescue. With his trusty axe he felled the wolf, thereby saving Red Riding Hood's virginity, if not her life. All the people hurried to the scene of the attempted crime and proclaimed the woodcutter a hero.

But at the inquest, several facts emerged:

(1) The wolf had never been advised of his rights. (2) The woodcutter had made no warning swings before striking the blow. (3) The Civil Liberties Union declared that although the act of eating grandmother was in poor taste, the wolf was only doing his thing, and thus did not deserve to die. (4) The New Left contended that the killing of the grandmother should be considered self defense since she was over 30 and in any event the whole thing couldn't be taken seriously because the wolf was trying to make love, not war.

It was therefore decided that there was no valid basis for charges against the wolf because Little Red Riding Hood had not resisted his advances with sufficient vigor. The woodcutter was indicted for unaggravated assault with a deadly weapon and because his axe had not been registered.

One year from the date of the Happening, the urban development was made a shrine for the victim of non-police brutality -- the wolf. All the government aid officials spoke at the dedication. Red Riding Hood, in a most touching tribute, said that while she had at first been mistakenly grateful for the woodcutter's timely intervention, she realized in retrospect that he had over-reacted. As she knelt and placed a wreath in honor of the poor, underprivileged wolf, there was not a dry eye on the block.


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NOTICE OF ELECTION

STATE OF TEXAS
COUNTY OF CROCKETT

TO THE RESIDENT, QUALIFIED VOTERS OF CROCKETT COUNTY, TEXAS, WHO OWN TAXABLE PROPERTY IN SAID COUNTY AND WHO HAVE DULY RENDERED THE SAME FOR TAXATION, AND TO ALL OTHER RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF SAID COUNTY:

TAKE NOTICE that an election will be held in Crockett County at the time and places and on the proposition as provided in the Order for Election, duly passed by the Commissioners Court of said County, which Order for Election is substantially as follows:

WHEREAS, each and all of the members of the Commissioners Court of Crockett County was duly and sufficiently notified, officially and personally, in advance, of the time, place and purpose of this meeting; and

WHEREAS, proper notice of this meeting has been duly and timely posted as provided by law; and

WHEREAS, a petition signed by ten per cent of the resident qualified property tax-paying voters who own taxable property in Crockett County, Texas, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and signed by ten per cent of the resident qualified voters of said County, has been presented to this Court, praying that an election be ordered for the purpose of determining whether or not the bonds of said County shall be issued in the amount of \$500,000 for the purpose of providing funds for the enlarging and equipping of the County Hospital in said County and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioners Court hereby finds and determines that said petition is signed by the requisite number of resident qualified property tax-paying voters of said County who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, and by the requisite number of resident qualified voters of said County, and said petition is otherwise in conformity with law, and the Commissioners Court deems it advisable and to the best interest of said County that said election should be ordered on the question of the issuance of bonds for such purpose in the maximum amount of \$500,000;

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE COMMISSIONERS COURT OF CROCKETT COUNTY, TEXAS:

That an election be held on the 17th day of March, 1973, in Crockett County, Texas, at which election the following proposition shall be submitted:

PROPOSITION
SHALL the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, be authorized to issue bonds of said County in the amount of \$500,000 bearing interest at such rate or rates as shall be determined within the discretion of such Commissioners Court, and maturing at such time or times as may be fixed by the Commissioners Court, serially or otherwise, not to exceed twenty (20) years from their date, for the purpose of providing funds for the enlarging and equipping of the County

Hospital in said County and for all other necessary permanent improvements in connection therewith, and to levy a tax upon all taxable property within said County sufficient to pay the interest on said bonds and create a sinking fund sufficient to redeem them at maturity, as authorized by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas?

The polling places, Presiding Judges and Alternate Presiding Judges for said election shall be as follows:

Precinct No. 1, voting place, Courthouse, presiding judge Mrs. Kaleta Shepperson, alternate, Bill Seaborn. Precinct No. 2, voting place, Ozona Intermediate School, presiding judge, Tommy Harris, Jr., alternate, Bob Bailey. Precinct No. 3, voting place, Auditorium-Coliseum Building, presiding judge, Mrs. Mary Deaton, alternate Buster Deaton. Precinct No. 4, voting place, Ozona Primary School, presiding judge, Joe Couch, alternate Earl Acton; Precinct No. 5, voting place, Powell Field, presiding judge Mrs. Roy Childs, alternate Mrs. Roy Joiner. Precinct No. 6, voting place, West Texas Utilities Plant, presiding judge I. A. Carroll, alternate Mrs. J. A. Carroll. The polls for regular voting shall be open from 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.

Absentee voting shall be conducted at the Office of the County Clerk in the County Courthouse, Ozona, Texas, for the period absentee voting is permitted by law, and the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 9:00 o'clock, a.m., to 5:00 o'clock, p.m., on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

That the following persons are hereby appointed to serve as a special canvassing board for canvassing ballots of absentee voters:

Bud Hoover, Presiding Judge; Bud Meinecke, Clerk; Jean North, Clerk.

The said election shall be held under the provisions of Chapter 1, Title 22, Revised Statutes, 1925, as amended, and the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

The ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT
 FOR) THE ISSUANCE) OF BONDS) AND THE) LEVYING) OF THE TAX) IN PAYMENT) THEREOF

Each voter shall place an "X" or other clear mark in the square beside the statement indicating the way the voter wishes to vote on the proposition.

That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to wit: one election at which only the resident qualified voters, who own taxable property in said County and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote, and another election at which all other resident qualified voters of the County shall be entitled to vote. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned and canvassed separately. Where the term "election" is used in the order, it shall mean the separate but simultaneous elections. In further explanation, if need be, the taxpaying voters vote in one box and the non-taxpaying voters vote in the other box. A notice in substantially

the same language as this order, signed by the County Judge of said County, and attested by the County Clerk of said County, shall serve as proper notice of said election.

The County Judge is authorized and directed to cause said notice of election to be posted in each election precinct and at the County Courthouse door, as provided by law, prior to the date of the election. The County Judge is further authorized and directed to file a copy of said notice with the County Clerk to be posted on a bulletin board in the office of the County Clerk before the election.

THE COUNTY JUDGE IS FURTHER AUTHORIZED AND DIRECTED TO CAUSE SAID NOTICE OF ELECTION TO BE PUBLISHED IN SOME NEWSPAPER OF GENERAL CIRCULATION PUBLISHED WITHIN SAID COUNTY, OR THE SAME DAY IN EACH OF TWO SUCCESSIVE WEEKS, THE DATE OF THE FIRST PUBLICATION TO BE NOT LESS THAN FOURTEEN (14) FULL DAYS PRIOR TO THE DATE SET FOR SAID ELECTION.

PASSED AND APPROVED at a meeting open to the public, this 19th day of February, 1973, after public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given and posted as required by law.

In Mass. the winter has been extremely mild according to the local natives.

The first snow was Nov. 17, and there has been some snow on the ground ever since. In Nov. and Dec, it snowed about twice a week. Although the average snowfall was only 2 or 3 inches the snow really began to pile up.

Of the two big snows we've had since Jan. 1st, one was 10 in. within 24 hrs. and the other 14 to 20 in. in 24 hrs.

Our house stays pleasantly warm although on the coldest days there is sheets of ice on the inside of our windows.

We will really be glad to come back to Ozona to the blizzard conditions there.

Supposedly the worst is yet to come according to some people here.

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

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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Though we have had very spring-type weather as of late, and the lovely week-just-past was a reminder. Perhaps a few ideas on how to make ornamental plants useful will be helpful in your selection of shrubs. You can put your garden's most practical plants to work in most practical ways. They fill jobs like bug control, bird havens, replace fences, produce food and support other plants.

Choose some plants that courage birds to linger in our area. Our winged friends like rapid work of bugs and the same time will cheer us with their color, song and action. A few plants which encourage birds are honey-suckle, chokeberry, dogwood, elderberry, Russian olive, Hawthorne, holly and sunflowers. Many of these provide suit and cover for the birds.

The apple blossoms, a cheerful sign of spring, come attached to plants that decorate gardens and help feed the gardener. Also include some ornamentals that produce food for our table. Make your selections for eye-appeal as well as for food value. The fast growing elderberry has a profusion of early spring blossoms which produces loads of sweet berries, rich in Vitamin C as well as flavor.

Others are the flowering quince, which blooms in many shades of pink, white and coral; the unique rugas, and a rose if you have plenty of room. Dwarf fruit trees are also nice.

Many of the herbs are useful for spices and flavoring, such as the upright Rosemary, which makes a good hedge. The Dwarf plant is fine for the rock garden.

Select some ornamentals to provide shade for other plants. Some vegetable crops do best in cool part shade. Particularly greens like lettuce, kale, Brussel sprouts, cauliflower and cabbage. Let vegetables that grow on tendrils, such as pole beans, squash and cucumbers, use other plants

for support, for example corn-stalks. Front yards usually need an "eye catcher," a single flowering, bearing or unusual foliage plant. Often used are white and pink dogwood, hibiscus, flowering crab, butterfly bush, spiraea, azaleas, crepe Myrtle, lilacs, forsythia, etc.

Where there is a boundary, choose plants to make a living fence. They will curb noise, improve the air and give forth with delightful aromas. Some of these are mock orange, spirea, deutzia, lilac, holly, abelia, to mention a few. Companion planting, as I have mentioned before, should assist a gardener with insect control. The marigold, for instance, discourages the Mexican bean beetle from vegetable rows, may clear an area of wire worms, and discourage nematodes which attack potatoes, bulb plants and strawberries. Other flowers that help are cosmos, asters, mums, daisies and nasturtiums, all of which have strong aromas.

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
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
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
