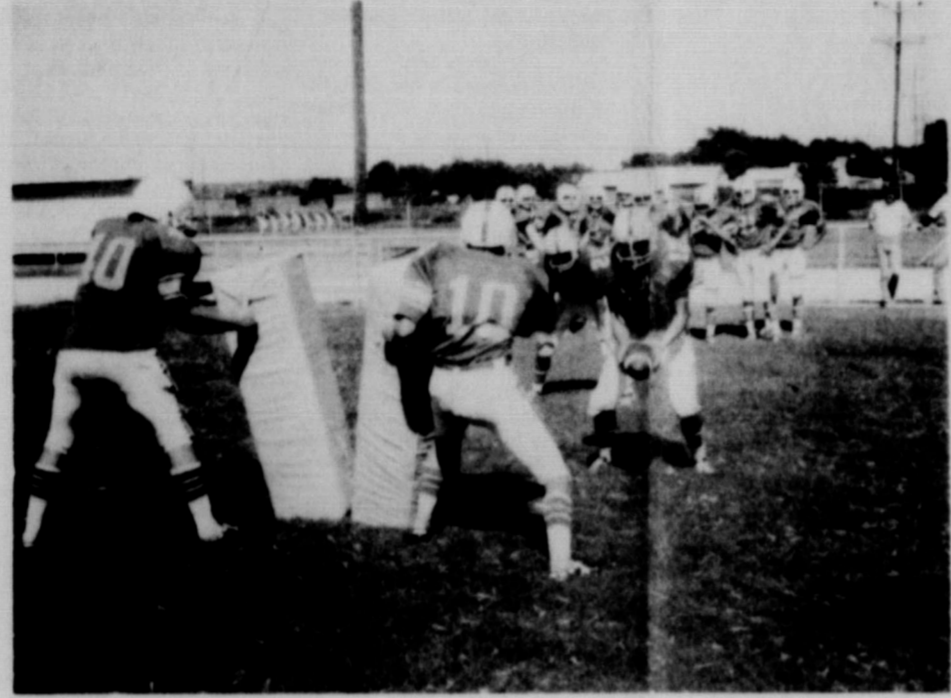

Weekend Rains Over Half Inch

Weekend rain showers contributed over a half-inch of rain to Ozona lawns and gardens. A heavy rain shower dumped .34 of an inch of rain on Ozona shortly before midnight Friday night. Another .25 of an inch fell Saturday.

The rain brought the total rainfall for August to 1.28 inches, according to the official gauge at the water district office.

Ozona School Enrollment Jumps Almost 8% Over Last Year

Total enrollment in Ozona schools was up 71 students over that of the first day of school last year, Supt. Foy Moody reported Monday afternoon. Enrollment usually takes a jump in all schools following the Labor Day holiday which is Sept. 1, and the first school holiday of the year.

Two hundred and forty-three students were enrolled Monday at Ozona Primary School. Of that number, there were 93 kindergartners, 71 first graders and 79 second graders. Last year, first day enrollment at the school was 210 students, so first day enrollment is up 33 students over that of last year.

Ozona Intermediate School enrolled 324 students Monday, up three students over the 321 enrolled at this time last year.

Danny Valadez Receives Master's Degree

Danny Valadez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Valadez, received his masters in Education during summer commencement at Angelo State University. This year Danny assumes his duties as assistant principal at Lincoln Junior High in San Angelo. He previously taught four years at Fannin Elementary School in San Angelo. He is a graduate of Ozona High School.

Law Enforcement Statistics For August 3-18

Crockett County Deputy Sheriff Bill Wildins gave the county law enforcement statistics for two weeks, the time period from August 3, through August 18.

Under violations, speeding led the list with 67 charges filed and 24 warnings given. One charge was filed for violation of signs and signals and seven warnings were given. One charge was filed on each of three counts, signal intention, driver's license restriction, and D. W. I. Two vehicles were charged with equipment violations and three warnings issued. Two charges were filed for parking violation and twelve warnings given.

Officers served six warrants and citations, investigated seven accidents, went to the assistance of 12 motorists and investigated two burglaries. They investigated nine family disturbances and fifteen miscellaneous calls, dog calls, etc. A total of 13 illegal aliens were picked up during the two-week period.

Kirkkens Buy Lewis Grocery

Mr. and Mrs. Sonny Kirkken purchased Lewis Drive-In Grocery from Ted Lewis and took over the business Monday.

Lewis has operated the business in its present location since the building was built about 12 years ago. It was the first drive-in grocery store in Ozona.

Mr. and Mrs. Kirkken moved here several years ago from Dallas and he took over the job of administrator at Crockett County Hospital. Lately he and Mrs. Kirkken have been operating the big "O" Theatre and he has been an associate of Tom Mitchell's in the building of an elaborate truck stop east of Ozona on Taylor Box Road.

Better T-V Reception In Offing

Ozona Television System repairmen have had problems with reception since an air conditioner went out at the Big Lake receiver station earlier this year.

Equipment was lost due to the 100-degree heat, and they have been unable to get it repaired properly. This situation especially affects the reception of channel 4, or KOSA from Odessa.

Reception has been poor on channel 6, where normally KCTV in San Angelo gives CBS network programs. However, reception of this station is coming into Ozona fairly well on channel 13. The lost channel 4 is also a CBS station.

Other stations which give reception during this repair period are KMBD Midland, NBC, channel 2; KRBC Abilene, NBC, channel 7; and KMOM Monahans, ABC, channel 5. These are the channels those in the Ozona area should be able to get the various stations over.

New equipment is being ordered, and the speed with which it is delivered will depend on how soon good reception is restored to the area. Officials of the cable system ask their patrons to try to be patient and bear with them. They are doing all they can to try to bring good reception back to Ozona.

Discoveries Made, More Wells Slated

Resources Investment Corp., Denver, Colo., completed a Strawn reef oil discovery its No. 11 S. Todd, et al. 1/2 mile north of the two-well Strawn oil field of the Todd multiphase area of Crockett County and 21 miles northwest of Ozona, to pump 62 barrels of 38.8 gravity oil and 68 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 950-1.

Production was through perforations at 6,372-384 feet, which had been acidized with 85 gallons. The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,429 feet: Yates, 950 feet; San Andres, 1,960 feet; Strawn reef, 6,368 feet.

The Ozona Lion Band ended two-a-day practice Friday night with an ice cream supper and a swimming party. Lane Scott, band director, was pleased with the turnout for the band and says he feels it will be one of the best years for the band.

Managers this year are Jerry Weant and Jim Hokit. Brian Gries will be in charge of keeping the statistics.

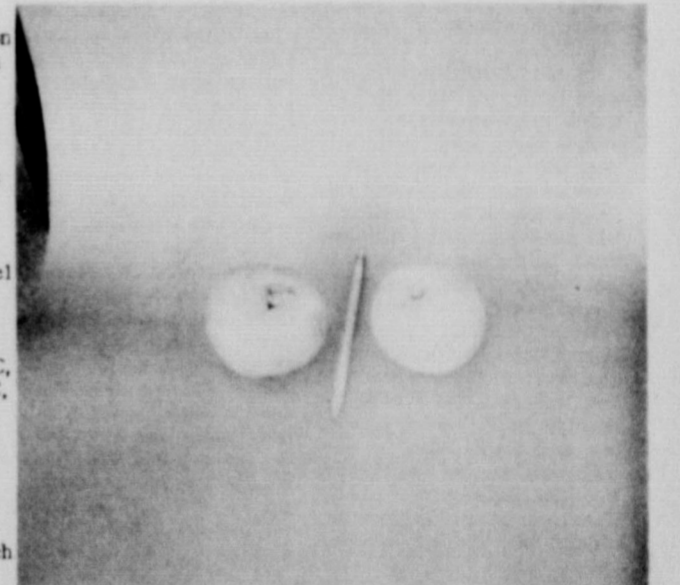
The Lions will officially open the season September 7, at Junction.

Lion Boosters To Honor Team With Melon Bust

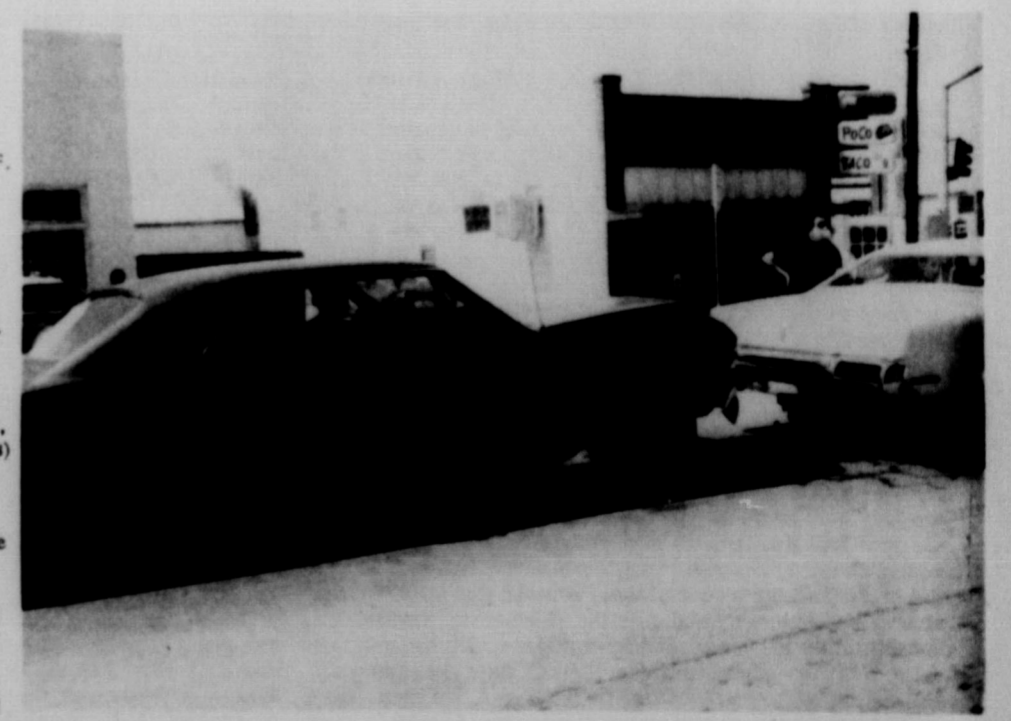

Friday 13th Brings Bad Luck To Ozona Family

Friday the thirteenth brought every bit of the bad luck every one always hears about to Don McHenry of Ozona, and it didn't stop there. His bad luck is holding and here it is past the middle of August.

Don, age 30, was a driller for Delta Drilling and was bringing home around \$720 every two weeks when payday came around until that unlucky Friday. Now, with a wife and three little girls to support, he gets \$70 per week and is disabled.

Controversy with some of the men working on the rig some 20 miles south of Sonora was the culprit. After an argument, Don was pushed or fell some 20 feet to the rig floor, breaking both feet and suffering other injuries. He spent 22 days in the hospital after the accident and has been out of work since that time. His injuries are such that he will not be able to work for at least five months.

Out of his workman's compensation pay of \$70 per week, he gets \$192 worth of food stamps a month for \$54. This doesn't leave much for rent and other expenses of raising a family.

He and his family, wife and three little girls, ages 8, 6, and 4, have been renting a mobile home at 313 Ave. H. They have been paying rent monthly until last month. The people they were renting from had not been making the payments on the mobile home and last month the McHenry family was told they would have to move as the home was going to be repossessed by the finance company. So far he's been able to keep a roof over his family's head, but has no idea how long it will last.

He will receive a settlement from the company, but not in time to help now. In fact, one official told him he would be lucky to come out with a few hundred dollars. He had just worked himself up to the position of driller and worries that he might never be able to be that well paid again.

He has paid social security for years, but discovered he must be disabled for at least six months before he would be able to collect disability payments. He went to the State Welfare office on behalf of his children, but found that since he was receiving the \$70 a week workman's compensation payments, the family was not eligible for welfare payments.

He was appalled that he couldn't even collect half of his salary after he was laid up. It seems that in Texas workman's comp, absolves the company of all liability, and if you are receiving workman's compensation payments you are not eligible for any kind of state aid.

The children did get started to school and will receive free school lunches. Some members of First Baptist Church assisted the little girls with school supplies and a group of local teenagers have become interested in the McHenry family's plight and have been a great help to them. He is going to try to do some odd jobs (with two broken feet and on crutches) with the assistance of some of the same teenagers who plan to give their time.

Ozonans are known for pitching in and helping out where help is needed. We don't believe any club, organization or church group could find a better cause, and certainly no more needy one, than assisting the McHenry family in their time of need. Keeping our noses to the grindstone here at the newspaper office prohibits our leading the fund raising, but we would like to be among the first contributors.

The "Subversive" Astronauts

It didn't make much of a splash in the Washington, D.C. papers, but to us one of the most significant stories to come out of the Apollo-Soyuz space mission came from the office of Sen. William Proxmire of Wisconsin.

Proxmire told reporters of this incident which took place during a training session in Moscow, preceding the joint space flight.

U.S. astronauts and technicians were watching a Soviet hockey game on television during a relaxed moment. One U.S. astronaut started to move his chair closer to the screen to concentrate on the action. As he began to move his chair, a Soviet "secretary" to the cosmonaut corps said, "Don't touch it! Take mine!"

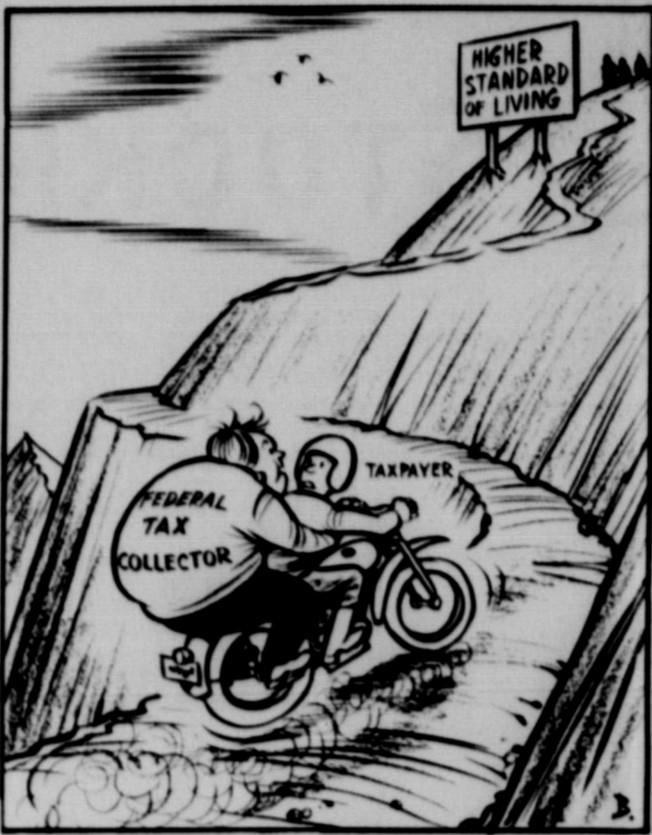
"By this time, however, the chair had been moved, snapping a wire leading from the bottom of the chair into the floor," Proxmire related.

Apparently the Americans reacted with an attitude of amusement and let the incident pass in order to avoid controversy.

But, what an incredible situation, that the Communists cannot even trust their own space flyers to meet in the same room with Americans, without being watched and bugged! This one incident proves most evidence of everything that Solzhenitsyn and other opponents of the Communist system have been trying to tell us for a long time: that the entire Communist state is ruled from top to bottom by the KGB — the Soviet Secret Police — who hold the power of life or death over every inmate in that "prison" nation, no matter how great his achievements or how high he may rise in the Communist society. Every person has an invisible chain around his neck, and while, to the uninformed observer, the individual may be "free," the fact is that the KGB can pull that chain back in — along with the victim's neck — any time the Dictatorship wishes.

Deal with the Soviets we must; but we hope that at no time will our representatives, from the President on down, have any illusions as to the exact nature of the vaunted "Union of Soviet Socialist Republics." It is a slave society, where even their astronauts, however brave and daring, are little more than monkeys on a string.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN — Governor Dolph Briscoe has assigned top priority to curbing soaring state governmental spending and thwarting predictions of a major state tax bill in 1977.

At the same time, the governor said all his political options for the future remain open, although he emphasized he is making no present plans for a third term.

Briscoe's predictions that the state can avoid a tax bill in two years fly in the face of forecasts by Texas Research League and Comptroller Bob Bullock. TRC only a week earlier said the legislature may have to raise \$750 million to balance the next budget in view of 1975 spending levels.

However, Briscoe stated: "I am optimistic that we can meet the fiscal needs of the state for a third time without new and additional taxes. We can't do it unless we try. That is our No. 1 priority. I will work toward that end."

Briscoe said he is hopeful the new Joint Advisory Committee on Government Operations will point the way to how to economize, increase efficiency and reorganize government effectively.

As for his own plans, the governor said it's too early for serious talk about a third term. But he acknowledged the subject has been discussed in private conversations — "just passing the time of day."

Hospital Savings
A new \$1.8 million state-federal program aims to save Texans who have to go to hospitals \$14 million a year.

Three centers will be established to make group purchases and collections for hospitals — the statewide center in Austin, with regional offices in Abilene and Texarkana.

The centers will try to reduce hospital management and bring about better distribution of other health personnel.

At the same time, Texas Hospital Association announced 189 hospitals have indicated they will participate in a proposed THA-backed hospital company.

Texas State Insurance Board set an August 21 hearing on the Texas Hospital Insurance Exchange application for charter.

Democrats Moving
Texas liberal Democrats are getting organized for the 1976 presidential preference primary, while, at the same time, challenging legality of the primary.

Democratic National Committeewoman Billie Carr of Houston and others are inviting Democratic presidential candidates to a September 20 meeting here. The group calls itself "Texans for Somebody Else" — somebody else, that is, besides U. S. Senator Lloyd Bentsen or Alabama Governor George Wallace.

Ms. Carr and others filed a challenge with the national Democratic Compliance Review Commission, contesting the 1976 presidential primary act, passed by the legislature this year, was largely to help Bentsen.

AG Opinions
Notice of meetings under the Open Meetings Law must be specific on subjects to be discussed.

Attorney General John Hill held. Hill said general phrases such as "new business," "old business" and "regular business" do not meet requirements.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded: Comptroller Bob Bullock should not release information on amounts of sales or use taxes paid or owed by an individual prior to a "final determination."

Texas Youth Council can furnish information on child abuse cases to the Texas Interagency Task Force on Youth Care and Rehabilitation under proper limitations on distribution.

There is no state agency with authority to license facilities to store human bodies.

A landscape architect must renew his license by August 31 each year to remain eligible to practice.

A paid fireman, who also serves as a volunteer fireman, may participate in pension plans covering both positions.

Short Shorts
Actual start of the Senate impeachment trial of 229th District Judge O. P. Carrillo may be delayed until September 22.

Texas liberal Democrats have filed a challenge of the Texas presidential preference primary law and proposed 1976 party delegate selection procedures.

Top brass of the Republican Party will be in Dallas September 11-13 for the 18th biennial convention of the National Federation of Republican Women.

Texas farmers produced a record wheat crop and the second largest sorghum crop ever. Agriculture Commissioner John C. White reported.

An end to the slide of the Texas economy is in sight, according to a Texas Business Review report. Industrial production is up for the second straight month.

Texans are paying higher long distance rates—but not nearly as high as requested originally by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company. Atty. Gen. Hill blocked the initial proposal and forced a court compromise last week.

Bob Krueger Reports U.S. Representative 21st District

The 94th Congress has been the subject of much criticism from the press and TV commentators, and much of the criticism is probably well-deserved.

But there is a consistent criticism which I would like to comment upon: that Congress is too expensive — salaries are too high, allowances are too big — a matter on which every Congressional office receives a great deal of mail.

I voted against the resolution to increase Congressional salaries, because I feel that at this point in our economic recovery the Congressional salary is adequate. But I have supported increases in allowances for the operation of Congressional offices, because a number of Congressmen have exceeded all of the allowances by now, and I am convinced that we in the 21st District are operating as frugally as we can.

Many readers of this column have tried to reach one of the offices in our District and found that the telephones are usually busy. Many of you have written letters and waited a long time for an answer.

Many of you have tried to arrange appointments with your Representative when he is in the District and discovered that the calendar is full. Some of you have come to Washington to see your Representative, and found that not only the Representative, but his staff are very busy. We don't have enough telephones, we don't have enough stationery or postage to answer the mail, we don't have enough staff to solve the many problems facing the residents of the 21st District as they deal with their government, and of course there is never enough time to do the job that should be done, a problem we share with all of you.

The cost of maintaining our office from August to December will come out of my pocket, and while I do not regret my opportunity to serve you, I know that many of my colleagues cannot afford to contribute part or all of their salary to their own Congressional operations — they have families to support, 2 homes to maintain, and high travel expenditures in the case of those who live far from Washington.

Contrary to popular understanding, all Congressional travel is not paid for by your taxes, all stationery is not purchased by your taxes, all telephones are not paid for by your taxes. Those of us who represent very large Districts necessarily spend more than those who represent Districts that are more compact, and there are no adjustments made to compensate for geographical differences.

It is easy and fun to ridicule on the basis of statistics that we don't understand. But when you see an article that suggests that your Congressman gets

It's The Law In Texas

A Continuing Series on Texas Law Brought To You by the County Sheriff's Office

Who determines whether a person is in fact a traveler? This is a question of fact for a trial court judge or jury to decide. The practical disadvantage in relying upon this provision to justify carrying a pistol is the potential risk of being arrested, jailed and subjected to trial and possible punishment in establishing one's status as a traveler.

A similar risk is involved when one must prove any set of circumstances entitling him to possess a pistol.

Is there any difference in Texas when carrying a pistol if one conceals it or displays it openly?

No, a person may not carry a pistol from place to place idly, or habitually or for an unlawful purpose. Deuschle v. State, 4 S.W.2d 559. Unless authorized by some other provision of the law, a person carrying an unconcealed pistol is in open violation of the law.

Do these statutes apply to persons traveling beyond the boundaries of Texas? No, each state has its own laws governing the possession of weapons, and Texas laws have no extra territorial effect for Texans traveling in other states.

Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Up to this date our summer weather has been very pleasant, for the hot winds have missed us. Even though the showers have been light, our area has stayed green and fresh in appearance.

Throughout this month and the fall our green thumbs should be ready to get busy again. Maybe you are one that wishes for a green thumb. That myth which would have you believe that all great gardeners are born is just not so. The real secret to relaxed and successful gardening is simply having a desire and enjoyment of the chores it involves, common sense gardening know-how, a few professional gardening tricks, practical information, and new ideas and experiments from several magazines available.

Start your root cuttings of most woody shrubs now to have them ready for fall or spring planting. Both broodie of evergreens (azalea, camellia, holly, ligustrum, platanus & others) and deciduous flowering shrubs (buddleia, crepe myrtle, forsythia, spirea, hydrangea and weigela) are commonly propagated this way.

Tip cuttings should be 4 to 8 inches long, with foliage removed from the lower half of each cutting. Insert cuttings 3 or 4 inches apart in a well drained rooting medium of sand, soil, peat or a mixture of these. Keep cuttings moist but not wet and in a shaded location.

After 6 weeks, examine cuttings for a callous formation at the cut area. Rooting should occur about a month after a callous forms. Place rooted cuttings in containers until they are the desired size to plant.

For rooting roses, select healthy, vigorous shoots to include four leaves and cut with a sharp knife. Remove the two lower leaves, and stick the cuttings about half their length into the rooting mix. They will root better if soil is placed in a container that can be covered with plastic to reduce evaporation, and place in a shaded place. Rooting should take from 2 to 4 weeks.

One August task is to remove dead bloom stalks from hemerocallis (day lilies). The best way to remove is to pull sharply on them and they will come up neatly from the crown.

All annuals continue to bloom, but many have lost their earlier luster. Removing old blooms will help put on new blooms. Now looking particularly good are the gloriosa daisies, perennial phlox, various celosias, marigolds, begonias, and sultana.

If your petunias have straggly stems and a scarcity of leaves and flowers, they need your attention for a second time blooming. Trim plants to reshape them, but avoid cutting back into the hard woody growth. Give them an application of complete fertilizer and water thoroughly.

Debra Says

Too many garden fresh vegetables present a problem to homemakers with limited freezer space or canning equipment.

Fruits and vegetables can be preserved by drying--the oldest method known to mankind. Drying is removing enough moisture from the food to prevent spoilage, because both enzymes and microorganisms require moisture.

Although many different recommendations for types of drying treatments exist, the "trial and error" approach may be best to find which technique works in certain situations. Drying methods include sun-drying, oven drying and sun (solar) heaters. Successful drying depends on enough heat to draw out moisture, but not enough to cook the food material. It's also necessary to have dry air to absorb released moisture and air circulation to carry off the moisture.

Sun drying was invented at the same time as agriculture. Man dried fish, meat and fruit to preserve them for another day. In the 13th century, Genghis Khan's nomadic warriors sun-dried mare's milk to a light-weight powder and put some of it in a water filled saddle bottle at the beginning of each day's journey. The joggling of the horse stirred the mixture to make a thin porridge by night-fall.

Today sun-drying for preservation is especially important to underdeveloped nations. In Turkey, yogurt made from cow or buffalo milk is sun-dried into a chalky powder that can be stored indefinitely. To this is added flour, bits of carrots, beans or pepper.

Amoco Production Co. will drill the two Crockett County wildcats, 17 miles southeast of Ozona, three miles south-southeast of the Joe T. (Strawn and Canyon gas) field, but separated by a depleted Strawn producer, and in the vicinity of the firm's No. 1-C Joe T. Davidson, active wildcat.

The No. 1-E Joe T. Davidson, a 9,110-foot test 1/2 mile east of the No. 1-C Davidson, is 1,320 feet from the south and west lines of 18-TG-GC&SF.

The No. 1-D Joe T. Davidson, 1/2 mile south of the No. 1-C Davidson, is 1,320 feet from the north and east lines of 7-TG-GC&SF.

The No. 1-C Davidson, in 6-TG-GC&SF, drilled to 9,820 feet, was testing, no gauges, through perforations at 9,056-72 feet.

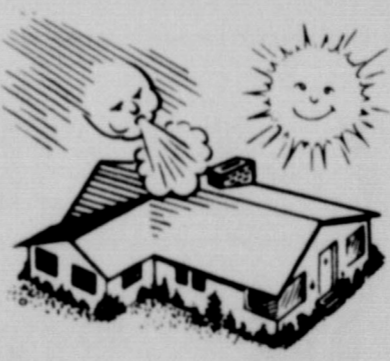
