Bond Sales Near Goal

United States Savings Bond sales in Crockett County totaled \$8,628 during the month of October. Sales for the tenmonth period were \$23,679 which represents 95% of the 1975 sales goal for the county, according to County Bond Chairman Lowell Littleton.

October sales in Texas totaled \$20, 266, 476 compared to sales of \$21, 154, 479 during the same period of 1974. Total sales for the January-October 1975 period were \$201, 801, 647, representing 86% of the \$236.8 million goal for the year.

All Aliens Must File Report

District Director, Joe F. Staley, San Antonio, Texas of the Immigration and Naturalization Service estimated that 120,000 aliens will report their addresses in the San Antonio Area during January under the Federal Alien Address Report Program

Mr. Joe F. Staley said that all non-citizens, except those in diplomatic status and foreign representatives of certain international organizations are required to file the address report.

He added that any alien who willfully violates the address report requirement may be subject to serious

In addition, aliens who are not in the United States during January must report their addresses to the Service within 10 days after their return to this country.

The District Director said that address report cards will be available at United States post offices and at the immigration and Naturalization Service office at San Antonio

Social Insecurity

WASHINGTON-The Social Security System is limping its way into bankruptcy court. You could be one of the creditors left holding the bag.

Millions of elderly Americans could find themselves suddenly deprived of their livelihood if Congress does not act soon to prevent the sickening erosion of the Social Security

The grim truth is that at the current rate of spending and income, the Social Security System will run out of money by 1981. That's right, Social Security will go broke in less than six years unless more revenues are raised or spending is cut.

Social Security will pay out roughly \$64 billion in 1975-\$2.5 billion more than it will receive in payroll taxes. The deficit is expected to leap to about \$6.1 billion next year, and to \$8.3 billion the following year.

By the federal government's own standards for regulation of insurance companies, a fund of more than \$600 billion would be needed to guarantee just the present Social Security obligations. Yet the total of Social Security trust funds stands at about \$36.5 billion-more than \$500 billion

What is happening is that the Social Security Administration is using today's premiums to pay today's benefits. If any private insurance company did that, it would promptly be indicted for insurance fraud.

But Social Security has long since ceased to be the permanent and productive trust fund it was supposed to have been. It has become instead a forced transfer of income from the working generation to the retired generation.

A rerious miscalculation-compounded by the eagerness of politicians to increase Social Security benefits and their extreme reluctance to increase payroll taxes to pay for the new benefits-is responsible for the financial plight of the

America's declining birth rate and increasing average life span have meant that fewer and fewer workers have had to underwrite higher and higher benefits to more and more beneficiaries. In 1935, the government thought there would always be 30 workers for each retiree. That had shrunk to 6-1 by 1955, and has been reduced to 3-1 today. It could drop to 2-1 within the next 20 years.

The result is that today's workers are paying far more in Social Security taxes than they can ever expect to receive in benefits. The maximum annual Social Security tax has doubled since 1971, and may have to be increased again by as much as 70 per cent just to keep the system solvent. Congress must make some tough decisions soon, or not even a 70 per cent payroll tax hike will be enough to save the Social Security System.

For the short term, a tax hike will be needed to provide for those who now depend on Social Security for a substantial portion of their income. We cannot afford to let the Social Security System go broke.

But we also cannot afford to continue the crushing burden the payroll tax imposes on working Americans. For the long term, substantial reforms must be made to cut down on spending. They will be unpleasant, and unpopular with powerful interest groups, but we can no longer afford to let politicians buy votes with our children's money.

Throwing Out The Baby With The Bath Water

"Throwing out the baby with the bathwater" is a joke dating back to great-grandmother's day. Now the Congress seems determined to bring the joke back into circulation - except they're not joking.

We refer to the action by the House Subcommittee on the Postal Service, headed by Congressman James M. Hanley of New York, to forbid public use of coin-operated photocopy machines in Post Office lobbies across the country.

This is what happened. In 1974, the U.S. Postal Service initiated an over-the-counter sale of postal-related commercial products, such as self-inking stampers, automatic stamp dispensers, postal scales, and so forth. A business lobby representing retail stationery stores took strong action against the practice. Retreating before the pressure, the Hanley committee ordered the Post Office Service to discontinue the practice. It is important to note that at no time did the lobby express opposition against the photocopy machines. However, somewhere in the bureaucracy - and no one seems to know where - the order was issued by the Postal Service not only to discontinue the sale of postal-related products, but to kick out the non-offending photocopy machines as well.

Far from "competing with private enterprise," the photocopy machines are bought, paid for, and serviced by private enterprise. The business firms providing the machines pay sales and other taxes, and a royalty to the Postal Service. Since there is no cost to the government, the photocopy service provides pure profit to the government. Most important, the public is provided a nient and popular service.

At this writing, however, the attitude of the Hanley committee ears to be, "to hell with the public." And clearly the attitude eaucracy is: "We made a mistake. But rather than admit it ect it, we'll let it stand."



STATE CAPITAL Highlights

AUSTIN — Texas political parties are gearing up for the 1976 presidential elections-and the state's first (and perhaps only) presidential preference primary

Republicans launched their primary plans several weeks ago, and organizations are forming to support candidacies of President Gerald Ford and former California Gov. Ronald

Democrats met in Fort Worth last week to finalize delegate selection rules changes. They also approved a proposal to streamline their state conventions (making them double-header, two-day sessions, instead of one-

day, 24-hour marathons). U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen and Alabama Gov. George Wallace are moving out front among Democratic presidential candidates in the Texas primary May 1 with preliminary petitiongathering and organiza-

Liberal Democrats met in San Antonio Saturday to map their strategy to try to minimize the delegate strength of Bentsen and

Former U.S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough said he may become a candidate in the preference primary, although he will reach no firm decision before the end of the year.

Former Georgia Gov. Jimmy Carter is also making plans to enter the primary, as is former Oklahoma Sen. Fred Harris. Other candidates are undecided.

Metric Conversion

Texas industry may be converting already to the metric system of measurement, according to testimony before a House

sub-committee. State agency spokesmen discussed with the panel a possible overhaul of the state tax structure if the change from the English system of measurement (feet, yards, pounds and

pints) is adopted.

The U.S. is the only major industrialized nation not using the metric system. Congress has been considering several bills which would convert to that

Race Opens

Chief Justice Charles Barrow, 54, of the San Antonio Fourth Court of Civil Appeals last week mounted a campaign for an upcoming State Supreme Court

Barrow so far is unopsed, but he said he will run like a scared coyote, expecting another candidate will emerge before fil-ing deadline. The veteran of 13 years on the intermediate appellate court bench paid his filing fee as a Democratic candidate.

Texas legislators are now squarely in the middle among those of 50 states when it comes to the

They rank 25th at \$600 a month, with \$30 per day living expense allowances during sessions.

California legislators are paid the most-\$21,120 a year plus a \$30 per day expense allowances, a leased auto and gasoline credit card and \$4,556 a month to pay for staff operations during annual sessions. New Hampshire pays \$100 a year-with no expense ac-

Price Of Coffe Due

To Rise

It's going to cost more to wake up in the morning, at least if you depend on coffee as an eye-opener.

Coffee prices are expected to jump sharply in the coming months due to a July freeze in the top coffee producing states of Brazil, which annually produces about a third of the

world coffee crop. "The freeze is expected to cut in half next year's harvest of coffee beans in Brazil, " points out Dr. Russell McDonald till 7:30 a.m. beginning economist in marketing with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "Furthermore, this year's world coffee crop is down about 8 per cent from

that of last year. Buyers in the United States generally have small inventories and were anticipating a large coffee crop for the 1975-76 crop year, which would have meant lower prices. But, they must now build their stocks in the wake of the

"Following the July freeze, the New York cash price for green coffee jumped about 20 cents per pound from the June average of 55 to 65 cents for Arabica coffees, Retail coffee prices may increase 25 to 75 cents per pound during the next three to nine months, " speculates McDonald,

Despite the lowered production forecast for the coming crop year, there will be enough coffee to go around, notes the Texas A&M University System economist, However, reserve stocks will be down sharply. U. ? Department of Agriculture off cials estimate that Brazil now holds about 21 million bags of coffee in reserve. The country annually exports about 18 million bags and itself con-sumes another 8 million. So, carryover stocks going into the 1976-77 crop year are highly uncertain at this point and will depend heavily on just how short next year's harvest is in Brazil.

"One thing is for sure though, " says McDonald. "That cup of coffee is going to cost more."

Food Prices Up But Consumption Down

Americans are eating less, and it's a good bet that high food prices have something to do with that fact.

"Overall, retail food prices will probably be up about 9 per cent this year, " points out Dr. Russell McDonald, an economist in marketing for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, "Of course, that increase is considerably less than in 1974 when retail food prices rose about 12 per

During the remainder of 1975, McDonald sees slightly lower prices for beef, poultry, fresh fruits and potatoes. However, consumers will see higher prices for most other foods, with pork, eggs, dairy products and fish leading the

Turning to the food consumption issue, the economist points out that Americans will eat 1, 5 per cent less food in 1975 than last year and that this will be the lowest level in seven years.

"Most of the drop in consumption is showing up in animal-related food products,

tinue to decline in 1976 remains to be seen. "Americans are definitely becoming more cost conscious of food items and are paying more attention to their eating habits. These and other factors may entice many to 'push away from the dinner table' just a little sooner, " notes the economist.






