High Speed Chase Results in Arrests



THE SHOT HEARD 'ROUND THE WORLD

Listen, my children, and you shall hear Of the midnight ride of Paul Revere,

Generations of Americans have thrilled to the story of the first skirmish of the Revolutionary War, when stalwart Minutemen responded to the call to arms sounded by Paul Revere, William Dawes and Dr. Samuel Prescott.

One if by land, and two if by sea; And I on the opposite shore will be, Ready to ride and spread the alarm Through every Middlesex village and farm

Forewarned that General Gage planned to seize gunpowder stored in Concord, Massachusetts, and to capture patriots John Hancock and Samuel Adams in Lexington, Dr. Joseph Warren, who headed the Committee of Safety, alerted Revere to sound the alarm. Today, sniveling "hate-America" critics seldom miss an opportunity to point to technical errors in Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's immortal poem, but the undisputed fact is that Revere accomplished his mission, and did it well.

A hurry of hoofs in a village street, A shape in the moonlight, a bulk in the dark, And beneath, from the pebbles, in passing, a spark Struck out by a steed flying fearless and fleet; That was all! And yet, through the gloom and the light, The fate of a nation was riding that night;

When the Redcoats arrived in Lexington, at dawn, the Minutemen were already assembled and waiting. Hancock and Adams had successfully escaped. In Concord, the prized cache of owder and arms was spirited out of sight. By the time the British had arrived at the North Bridge crossing the Concord River, over 400 Mimitemen were ready and waiting. Outnumbered by more than two to one, they courageously stood their ground; and it was there, as everyone knows, that they fired the first volley marking the Revolutionary War - 'iterally, "The shot heard around the world."

The British fled back to Boston, where they were kept under constant siege. Forty-nine Americans died for freedom on April 19, 1775; 46 more were counted as wounded or missing. Little did the surviving patriots realize that it was to be many hard years before the American Revolutionary War would end in victory at Yorktown on October 19, 1781. But because of the courage shown by that small band of Minutemen at Lexington and Concord, Americans throughout all of the Colonies were inspired o stand fast for the cause of liberty

THE FUTURE OF TAIWAN

The death of President Chiang Kai-shek of Nationalist China removes perhaps the last great world leader who refused categorically any form of accommodation or compromise with Communism. His long struggle with the Chinese Communists taught him the futility of coalition governments and cease-files. He predicted, with accuracy, that the Vietnam War would never end so long as mainland China was under Red rule. His dream was always that one day he would return to the mainland. He was convinced that if only his forces could establish themselves ashore, his people would rise in revolt against their Communist

Chiang never got the chance to prove himself right. The upheavals which wracked the mainland during the Great Cultural Revolution in the late 1960s were allowed to pass without action by Chiang. The U.S. would not support a landing, and without such support Chiang feared to move. History seldom presents a second opportunity.

Now the question is: what comes next for Taiwan? President Ford is pledged to visit Peking before the end of the year. The question of formal U.S. recognition of Communist China will undoubtedly arise. Peking will accept nothing less than a formal break in U.S. relations with the Nationalist Chinese on Taiwan as

a condition of "normalizing" relations with the U.S. With Chiang now gone, U.S. acquiesence to this demand will be that much easier, we suspect. Most native Taiwanese would probably prefer that their island become an independent country, and we suspect that many of the Nationalist mainlanders, who have lost hope of a return to their homeland, would be satisfied with that status also, But not Peking. To the Communists, Taiwan is part of China and they will be satisfied with nothing less than

their eventual control over it. Thus, the status of Taiwan will be a problem. We hope that President Ford will resist the temptation to sacrifice our commitments to Taiwan on the altar of "better relations" with Peking. Taiwan is a prosperous, stable friend. To withdraw our support and protection would be a disastrous mistake. As Chiang Kai-shek aiready knew, and as we will eventually find out, there can be no lasting settlement with any regime, anywhere, dedicated to the revolutionary principles of Marxism-Leninism.

AUSTIN - Statistics and on sense indicate the 64th Legislature is heading for a wild and crowded finale, and that more bills will die than survive.

This is inevitable with more than 2.200 House bills and joint resolutions and nearly 1,100 Senate bills and joint resolutions introduced. The system is overloaded and the tabulations of unfinished business on legislative computers effectively turn on the warning lights. Of about 2,400 House and Senate bills referred to committees, fewer

than 500 have emerged. About 900 bills and important resolutions have referred to Senate standing committees, and some 500 have come out. With the exception of constitutional revision, which

was effectively and promptly disposed of, most of the session's key business remains Budget bills are still in the Senate Finance and House

Appropriations committees. School finance reform measures are in sub-committees, and seem likely to stay there awhile. Agreement is far from reached on public utility regulatory legislation. Legislators have their hands full in the next six weeks, and the facts are stacked against any easy way out.

STANDARDS COSTLY Federal water quality standards may cost Texas cities, towns and industries more than \$6 billion before 1983, according to a Texas

Water Quality Board invenrederal requirements call for complete elimination of pollutional discharges into

waters by that date. The Federal Water Quality Act specifies that every river, stream, creek, lake and coastal area is to be fit for swimming, boating and fishing in eight years.

April brings no let-up in garden work. Usually there is more to do now than in any other month of the year. Much of the success of your summer garden and lawn depends on what you do this

month. If you haven't repaired winter storm and freeze damage it should be done now. Remove dead ends of branches on shrubs and trees before too much new foliage begins.

Feed roses with a rose food and be sure to follow directions on the label. Or, you may want to use a complete fertilizer to stimulate new growth and extend the flowering period.

rune early flowering shrubs as they finish blooming such as dogwood, spirea, weigela, mock orange, forsythia, pink hawthorne.

The latter part of this month is a good time to fertilize newly planted lawns again so they will be well established by the time hot weather begins, Also, a light fertilizing to established lawns will help maintain a beautiful lawn for the summer.

Chrysanthemums should be lifted and replanted this month for specimen plants, borders, potted for the patio, or moving from place to place where color is needed. Rework the bed where they are to be planted and separate into single plants. If too tall, cut back top to 6 or 8 inches in height. For the border, plant about 10 inches apart, and for large flowered plants, about 15 inches at least, Discard the old root stem, using new side branches for better



often turn their attention to garage sales. This is one of the best places to buy secondhand portable appliances. Large coffee urns and roaster ovens used only a few times a year may be priced low enough to make it practical to own

It is best to try the appliance before you buy. Other considerations are general condition and cleanliness of the appliance; fitting of lids and other parts; presence of the UL seal; convenient and safe handles; and whether the open hearing coils have broken wires.

When buying a portable with detachable cord, check appliance terminals where the plug is inserted. Pitted terminals indicate that the cord has repeatedly been attached to the appliance after the plug was inserted into the wall outlet. Arcing and subsequent carbon deposits resulting from this practice reduce the electrical conducting ability of the terminals and shorten the appliance's life.

If open heating coils have broken wires, replacements are simple and inexpensive. Broken coils should never be stretched and reattached. If it's possible to plug in the appliance before buying it, the thermostatic controls can be checked for accuracy. Before buying an item that obviously needs repair, you may want to check with an appliance service center or repair manual to estimate the cost of repairs.



Boys And Girls Hanging Baskets To Continue In Popularity

Hanging baskets continue to gain in popularity, adding a touch of nature to many sur-

According to Dr. William Welch, landscape horticulturist seed pods or leaves and pruning for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, hanging bas-kets can be hung in carports, terraces, porches, under trees or inside the home.

"Any plants with drooping foliage such as ferns are excellent for hanging baskets," says the horticulturist with the Texas A&M University System. Asparagus sprengeri ferns are popular because they can tolerate a lot of direct sun and some cold, but Boston type ferns need high humidity and partial shade to do well."

Succulent plants such as hen and chickens or burro tail sedum make good plants for hanging baskets and can tolerate considerable heat and

"Periwinkles and portulaca will bloom through the hottest weather on into fall, " says Welch, "and petunias do well during spring and early summer.

Galvanized wire baskets with pressed or sphagnum moss liners and wooden and terra cotta hanging planters all make good containers.

"Fill the basket with a good potting soil high in organic matter such as peat moss, " recommends Welch, "and place plants at the same depth they

were originally growing. "Because hanging baskets are exposed to hot dry air on all sides, plants should be watered two or three times a week," Welch suggests watering the plants by immersing the bottom of the container in a tub of water.

situation for the young bride. Building, 111 East 17th Street, On April 11, 1894 their Austin, Texas until 11:00 am first son, Kenneth, was born in San Antonio and on May 30, 1896 a second son, Vernon, was born in San Angelo. In 1897 Mr. Cox sold his ranch holdings and moved to Ozona where he established a mercantile business which played a large part in the development of this community. On April 29, 1898 a third son, Lemuel Bascomb, Jr. was born in Ozona and still lives here. In 1899 they built a home and soon after a native stone building for the business which still stands and is now occupied by Jack's Grocery

On Sept. 1, 1900 their only daughter, Ona Mae, was born. She died during an influenza epidemic while a student at Southern Methodist University

at Dallas. Until the Ozona National Bank was organized in 1905, the Cox store served as a bank and checks were issued on it. The bank was organized in the rear of the Cox store and Mr. Cox was elected its first vice president and was cashier

in 1907. In 1917 with Mr. Pat Lee he bought land in western Crockett County and in 1918 bought out Mr. Lee's interest. The ranch is still owned by L. B. Cox, Ir. and operated by his son and

Mr. Cox also built the first store in Barnhart. In 1915 they built another home in Ozona where they lived until their deaths. In 1925 Mr. Cox disposed of his business interests and retired.

Mr. and Mrs. Cox were always interested and active in their community, their church and their family. Mr. Cox signed the first bond to build the first Methodist Church in Ozona. At his death he was Chairman Emeritus of the Official Board, Mrs. Cox was the first president of the Methodist Women's Missionary Society and was active in musical events. Mr. Cox befriended many ranchmen. never pushing for accounts due, some for as long as three years. He was a master carver of wood and shared the intricate pieces with his friends, especially children.

Mr. Cox died May 3, 1927 while visiting in Clovis, New Mexico. Mrs. Cox remained in her home until her death on January 8, 1932. The heritage they left has enriched Crockett County.




