**TS&GRA Makes Plea** For Compound 1080

There is ample evidence Association as well as the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association, Dr. Turner advised the committee that it was certainly not the FIFRA Act itself which caused the problems to the sheep producer but the Environmental Protection Agency. The Agency acted without due authority when they removed the registration of certain chemical toxicants for predator control. Dr. Turner went on to point out that the sheep and goat industry may have suffered as much as a 50 million dollar loss to predators here in the United States. Much of this loss is blamed on the inability of the livestock producers to use chemicals for coyote control. Dr. Turner pointed out that there is data that shows the negative relationship of coyote density and that of sheep and goats, and also there is data showing a positive relationship of covote density and producer estimates of losses due to predators. Dr. Turner's information came from work conducted by Dr. Maurice Shelton and Dr. John Klindt on the interrelationship of coyote density and certain livestock and game species in Texas. One of the main points that Dr. Turner ex-

pension of the registration order states that there are known alternatives to the use of toxicants. These known alternatives, such as traps, snares, denning and aerial hunting, are being used but are inadequate to do the job and are very expensive in terms of cost per coyote. He further explained that one of the closing statements in the order to suspend registration notes that the order would not affect the supply of staple foods. Dr. Turner stated that lamb may not be a staple foodstuff, but it is a food enjoyed by many persons, and the supply i being profoundly affe this order. We have already had one lamb slaughter facility closed in the Midwest this year because of lack of lamb. The primary cause of the decrease in sheep and goat numbers is due to predators. He continued that the questions raised by EPA in regard to at least one toxicant has been answered in a manner favorable to registration of the toxicant. It is now time that registration of sodium monofluoracetate, or Compound 1080, be reconsidered, Turner stated.

Fall webworm moths are now laying eggs on leaves of poplar, cottonwood, mulberry, willow, pecans and other deciduous trees in the Trans-Pecos area. The fall webworm moth is snow-white in color with vellow and black spots on its body. These moths are normally observed flying around trees and shrubs, in the home landscape, in the early evening hours. The female moths lay eggs in masses of 25 to over 100 on the back side of leaves. The egg mass is partly covered with fine white hairs. When the eggs hatch, the small worms start feeding on the leaf immediately. As the small worms start feeding, they build a web around the leaves on a small

twig. Eventually the young worms will build a web around an entire branch. For effective control of fall webworms, early detection of the small webs is important. The small webs





#### **Chinese** Worries

The retreat of U.S. power is accelerating at such a pace that even the Chinese Communists seem genuinely alarmed. A recent issue of the Peking People's Daily newspaper noted that the United States is becoming "increasingly vulnerable and strategically passive." On the other hand, it charged the Soviet Union with stepping up efforts "to embark on Hitler's beaten track of world domination.

This Chinese appraisal of U.S. weakness is especially significant because Red China apparently takes no joy in it. China, no less than Russia, has no love for the U.S. Peking regards itself as the real center of revolutionary purity, and its basic antipathy to the U.S. is perhaps even stronger than Moscow's. But the Chinese are frank to admit that they need and want a strong U.S. and a strong NATO to keep Russia in check until their nuclear deterrent is large enough to provide an independent protection against a Soviet attack on China. Everything indicates that they regard war with Russia as a real possibility. They are fearful that Soviet power will move into the vacuum left by the retreating Americans and thus further surround and menace China.

The point we wish to make is simply this virtually everywhere in the world the U.S. is now perceived to be in a precipitous decline after our southeast Asia disaster. The Chinese, who have reason to know the Soviets better than anyone, fear\_ that this will lead to further Soviet adventurism on the Hitler model. If enough countries come to share this Chinese view, and there is evidence that many already do, then it could become a self-fulfilling prophecy, and events in the world could take on an irresistible momentum of their own.

This is why we think that the U.S. made a very serious mistake in withdrawing support from South Vietnam and Cambodia in nent voter registration bill their hour of agony. We have opened up a crisis of confidence in

#### And Now Laos

It hardly seems possible, but fourteen years ago the "Laos Crisis" was in the forefront of this country's foreign policy problems. The departing President Eisenhower warned the incoming John Kennedy that the U.S. might have to intervene with troops if the Communist Pathet Lao, backed up by the North Vietnamese, persisted in their efforts to take over the country militarily. Kennedy declined this course, opting instead for a patchwork coalition government that left half the country in the hands of the North Vietnamese. They in turn used it as a corridor to feed troops and supplies into South Vietnam. The battle that was avoided in Laos was joined, and finally lost, in Vietnam.

Last week the wheel of tragedy turned full circle. The bamboo curtain rang down on Laos and the last of the Indo-China dominoes toppled.

It hardly drew a headline. As the non-Communist elements in the coalition government resigned and fled and the Royal Laotian Army disintegrated without a fight, the veteran neutralist premier, Souvanna Phouma, could only tell his people that it was necessary to look at the facts and prepare "to reach an accord with history." Who would dare to oppose the Communists now, with the momentum of their victories in Cambodia and Vietnam sweeping all before it in Southeast Asia? Certainly not Laos. And certainly not Thailand, with its whole eastern frontier from China to the Gulf of Siam now open to attack or infiltration. And how long can Malaysia, Singapore, and Burma hold out?

The "unmitigated disaster" which Singapore's Prime Minister Lee Kuan Yew labeled U.S. Southeast Asia policy at a White House dinner cannot be denied and should not be underestimated. Czechoslovakia seemed like a "far away country about which we know nothing" to some Britons in 1938. Laos may appear that way now to some Americans. But in this interconnected world, when history tolls for one people, it sounds a warning for all others as well. Americans take heed, lest one day we have to reach our own "accord with history."







## Safety Told

Economic and health benefits from bicycling have increased the number of riders lately.

So it's more important than ever to remember that Always Be Careful is the ABC of bicycle safety, reminded Dorthy Taylor, family life education specialist.

"Bicycling shouldn't be a game of chance, nor should the ride end in the hospital emergency room if bicycle safety rules are observed, " the specialist with the Texas

Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System, said. More than 15 per cent of

bike accidents are caused by mechanical and structural problems. This makes it important for the rider to

observe safety rules--but it's also his responsibility to ride a safe bike, she said. Bicycles come in different

sizes, just like people. --Sidewalk bikes are for

beginners (children) and may have training wheels to steady the child's balance.

-- A middle-weight bicycle has one or two speeds, balloon tires and coaster brakes. It

offers stability and strength for everyday riding. --High-rise bicycles usually have high-rise handle bars, banana seats and are small in size. High-rise bikes





common in tomatoes which bloom late. The usual cause for poor fruit set is high emperatures-- either at night or day. Nighttime temperatures above 72 degrees F. along with daytime temp-eratures above 90 degrees F. often result in heavy blossom drop. On the other hand, unseasonally cool weather may also cause blossoms to drop in addition to causing abnormalities in fruits.

Other factors causing lack of fruit set or abnormal fruit include unbalanced nutrition, extended periods of warm, windy weather with low humidity, extended periods of showery, cool, overcast weather in the early spring, and insects and diseases,

Therefore, providing a balanced fertilizer and controlling insects and diseases will help in controlling blossom drop. Of course, little can be done about weather conditions.

Poor fruit set is most common in the large slicing types of tomatoes, notes the agent. However, such varieties as Early Giant, Spring Giant, Spring Set and Improved Summertime have the ability to set fruit during somewhat higher temperatures.

Smaller sized tomatoes that normally do not have the fruit set problem include such varieties as Small Fry, Red Cherry, Roma and the new Texas Agricultural Experiment

Station variety, Saladette. In areas where blossom drop seems to be a common problem year after year, Reagor suggests planting some of the smaller type tomatoes or those varieties that tend to be more tolerant to higher temperatures.




