

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THE RIGHT TO BE INFORMED

Senator William Proxmire (D. Wisc.) is placing a Bill before this Congress to limit the powers of the Federal Communications Commission, particularly in regard to the Fairness Doctrine and the Equal Time rule. He states that his concern is the power of the FCC to deny the renewal of a license to a radio or TV station - or network - if that licensee fails to abide by the Fairness Doctrine or the Equal Time rule. To Senator Proximire, primary bill was voted out this power of the FCC amounts to an infringement of the First of the House Elections Com-Amendment right of freedom of the press.

Originally, the FCC had responsibility only in technical areas, such as, allocation of frequencies, power output of stations, and directivity of antennas.


In the late '20s and early '30s the Congress discovered that some licensees were abusing their freedom. They were, for example, allowing some candidates to speak, but denving that right to others. They were also stumping for favorite bills and blocking out counter-arguments from opponents. The Congress corrected these abuses by establishing the Equal Time rule and his interest in seeing a prefthe Fairness Doctrine. The former insures that all bona fide political parties would have equal opportunity to take their case to the public. The latter protects the public's right to hear all viewpoints on controversial issues of national importance. As the Congress expressed it, they wanted to insure "a market place of gates to presidential nomiideas.

In thinking about the freedom of the press, it is important to understand that the Founding Fathers were concerned with censorship by the government. They wanted to make sure that the press was not controlled by the government, that it would advanced remain free to criticize the government. But the FCC does NOT censor programs in the name of the Equal Time rule or the Fairness Doctrine. It does NOT review programs, after the fact, to see whether a licensee has abused its power. It simply looks into complaints by the public of abuse of power by radio or TV licensees.

The FCC, therefore, is concerned with protecting the public's right to know, to be informed. Its effect is to prevent censorship or biased programming by radio and TV.

It is always potentially unfair to question the motives of an individual. Congress, the result could be that radio and TV stations will censor all but one political party and TV networks will carry on full-scale propaganda on behalf of their favorite national policies. The basic right of the public to be informed would be lost - and our democracy would be in jeopardy.

A CHAMBER OF HORRORS

While alcoholism has long been recognized as a serious problem in America, recent findings concerning alcoholism among women comes as a shocker. Experts now estimate that as many as 50% of the nation's alcoholics are the "hidden housewife." The studies indicate that the hidden housewife alcoholic is typically between 35 and 55 years old and from the middle, upper-middle, or upper income groups. And no one

knows about it because the family works full time at keeping the word of Mother's drunkenness from being known in the community. Thus the truth is kept from the neighbors, family friends, the children's playmates, and the husband's employer - and many times, even from the doctor or organizations such as A.A., from whom help could be obtained.

If the guesses concerning the numbers of hidden housewife alcoholics is correct, then alcoholism ranks as the number one disease in the United States today, leaving heart disease and cancer in second and third place. Of all the suicides in the United States this year, one-third will be attributed to alcoholism. Some 60,000 people will be killed in automobile accidents this year and over half will be due to drunk driving.

But, most blood-chilling of all are recent studies of babies born to alcoholic mothers. In every instance, barring none, it was found that the infants had suffered damage; some slight, many serious. There were no exceptions. All of the babies were below normal in intelligence, weighed less, were 20% shorter than the average infant and were all permanently retarded in growth. Some of the babies suffered from malformation of the head, face, legs, arms, or heart. Dr. Kenneth Jones at the University of Washington estimates that as many as 20% of alcoholic mothers give birth to deformed children.

Truly, here is a chamber of horrors that demands immediate and intense action on the part of every type of agency, whether public or private.

Tips For Gardeners From the Ozona Garden Club Mrs. Bailey Post

In anticipation of spring, the fleeting days of February call for increased gardening activity. It's about the last chance for dormant pruning of summer-flowering trees, shrubs and evergreens, and for rooting the cuttings.

Finish planting bare-root roses, fruit and nut trees while they are still dormant.

Begin to prune roses by the end of this month or March first until March 15th, Use good shears that will make clean cuts. Prune to regulate the size of the bush and to increase the length of the blooming stems. Remove all dead, dying and weak canes that will produce poor blooms, Leave four to eight healthy canes. On vigorous varieties, cut back to within 12 to 15 inches of the ground. Less vigorous plants should be cut back to between 18 and 20 inches. Do not prune climbing roses in the same manner as bush roses. Since climbers produce roses on the previous year's growth, wait until after blooming to prune them. Only the dead or dying canes should be removed now. Properly treated roses are out-doing azaleas in blooming for our area garden Try weekly dusting with sulfur insecticide to gain the most from them.

This is a good time to root geranium cuttings to increase plants for the summer and fall. Soft wood cuttings 2 to 4 inches water. Stir with fork till dough long, can either be snapped off or cut right at or just below a node. Remove the lower leaves and stick cuttings immediately in clean sand, inserting cuttings only 1 inch deep. Shade the cuttings lightly. They should callus in about 10 days and be rooted in 15 days, especially if bottom







SHMMARY OF CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

UMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of efits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivisons of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of bene fits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the agcompensation gregate paid to individuals."


Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month. Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate pre-scribed by law for em-ployees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state em-ployees."

The Holt Ranch multipay field of Crockett County gained its fourth San Andres gas producer with completion of C.F. Lawrence & Associates, Inc., Midland, No. 1-84 Vaughn, 7/8 mile east and 3/4 mile west of production, 14 miles north of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 900, 000 cubic feet of dry gas per day.

Production was through perforations at 1, 443-448 feet, which had been washed with 500 gallons of mud acid.

Originally scheduled as a 1, 500-foot wildcat, it was drilled to 1, 517 feet, where 51-inch casing was set, and plugged back to 1, 490 feet. Operator amended the project to the above field.
