The following article from the Kansas Publisher and reprinted in the Texas Press Messenger, is so typical of the life of a newspaper editor, I couldn't resist passing it on to you. Just don't know why I didn't write it.

EDITOR'S LIFE: Tiring But Never Dull

You meet someone in the grocery store, (cafe, service station, in a shopping district) -- who gives you a bit of news, money for a bill, a picture important to them, a correction, or change on an ad.

The item is lost, strayed, put away, forgotten, and doesn't get in the paper.

You are called at home for a news item, or a change or order for a subscription, which you write down.

This item is promptly written on by a young child, thrown away by an enthusiastic cleaner, or eaten by the dog.

A picture is mailed, delivered, or stuck in the door, with no information at all on it.

Money is mailed to the office, always cash, with no bill, no address, no instructions for its use, and you don't know what it's for.

An important happening such as a party, dance, show, contest takes place, the paper is not notified, and you are met on the street, or in the office or receive a letter, or phone call demanding to know why it wasn't in the paper, with pictures.

Your deadline is Tuesday noon, the paper is printed on Wednesday and someone calls at one o'clock Wednesday and says "I know I'm late, but could you possibly put..."

Your phone rings at home, and a member of the family answers it, and is told, "I have an important news item for the paper." The caller then hangs up, no name, no phone number.

Your business phone rings constantly, people call to give information, place ads, or ask questions. And after a busy morning of taking care of the phone, and you settle down to get it all on paper, it rings again, and you hear an indignant voice say, "I tried to call you all morning and couldn't get in," and then they just want to visit.

An editor works seven days a week, and many evenings, and you decide to take a night off, not answering the phone, or attending a meeting, and the biggest story the town has had breaks.

You chase fire engines, check out ambulance calls, etc. and the fire alarm rings, and you decide not to go, and that fire is revealed only by the Chicago fire.

You are reprimanded severely for misspelling a name, and

Activity Continues Increase In County Oil and Gas Fields

American Quasar Petroleum Co., Midland, will drill a confirmation to one Crockett field and two outposts to another, all contracted to 8,000 feet, and approximately 15 miles southeast of Ozona.

The No. 1-26 Jones Ranch, a 3/4 mile west outpost to its No. 1-27 Jones Ranch, 2 1/2 mile northwest extension and into Crockett of the four-well Sutton-Glasscock (Canyon gas) field, is 1,500 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 26-1J-TCRR. Ground elevation is 2,408 feet. It is also 2 1/2 miles northeast of 7,980 Pennsylvania gas in the Davidson Ranch multipay field.

The No. 1-27 Jones Ranch, originally filed as a wildcard, was finalized Oct. 9, 1973 (filed Feb. 9, 1974) for a calculated, absolute open flow of 640,000 cubic feet of dry gas per day through perforations at 7,328-602 feet.

The No. 2-27 Jones Ranch, a 2-3/8 mile east-northeast outpost to 7,980 Pennsylvania production in the Davidson Ranch field, is 660 feet from the south and 2,600 feet from the east lines of 27-KI-TCRR. Ground elevation is 2,434 feet. It is also 7/8 mile south-southwest of the Sutton-Glasscock extender.

The No. 3-27 Jones Ranch, a two-mile east-northeast outpost to the Davidson Ranch field, is 660 feet from the

Hunters Find Tough Going During Week

Hunters in Crockett County found it "tough going" the first two days of the current hunting season. The two deer storage operators, Cleophas Cooke and Tom Allen, reported about half as many deer in over the weekend as were harvested last year.

No trophy kills were reported. Cooke said most of the deer were small with 4 and 5 point racks. He said he had one 8-pointer in his locker Monday, among about 80 hung there. He did report an unusual kill, that of a black-tail deer Monday morning on the Pancho McMullan ranch.

Game Warden Raymond Davee had to be called in to decide the case. As it turned out, the hunter got to keep the deer without using one of his white-tail tags, so he can still get his full quota of deer.

Tom Allen said deer storage business was down from the first two days of last year. He reported 78 deer as of Monday afternoon with no trophy kills. The most points counted there amounted to eight and at that a small rack.

Hunters found pasture muddy and too brush-filled for good visibility. Most complained that they "just couldn't find the deer." Parks and Wildlife officials had predicted this situation after heavy rains before the season began. Most agree that a hard freeze and some dry weather will be necessary for really good hunting.

Another factor in the small number of deer reported is the lack of a hunting contest this year. In past years there have been prizes given for the largest rack, the most points and the heaviest field dressed. Deer were registered at both the above processing places. So many hunters may have field-dressed their harvest and headed for home with cold storage facilities.

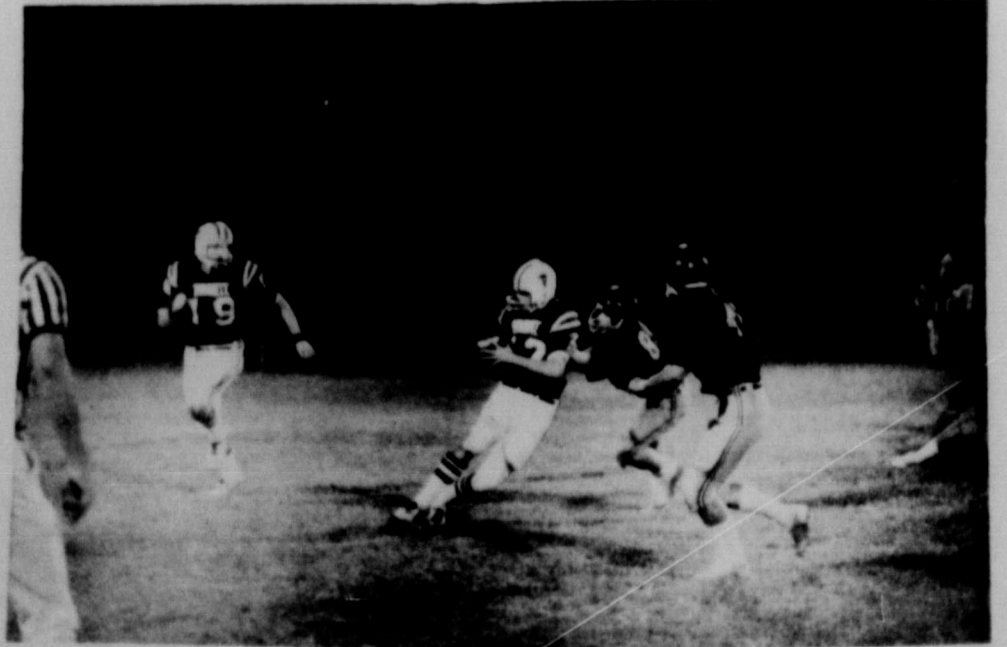
Many of the various species were reserved by the club for planting in the park and around town as a Bicentennial project.

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Tips For Gardeners
From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

From this date on through the winter months everyone will look forward to the beautiful sunny days we have most of the time. The temperature is just right to accomplish many tasks in your yard after our great rains and the soil is dry enough to stir. Take a critical look at the overall appearance, and make a list of improvements you may wish to work toward.

If you haven't prepared the bed for roses, it should be done for planting next month or in the spring. Select an open spot that gets at least six hours of sun each day, has good drainage, and has no competition for food and water from tree or hedge roots. Roses grow best in a rich porous slightly acid soil that is supplied with additional plant food each month during the growing season. Select your roses now while you may see them in bloom over our city or visit the rose park in San Angelo. It is to the left going into San Angelo on Beauregard just this side of the river bridge and is a mass of bloom at this time. Here they try out new roses for the annual All America Rose Awards. This is one of many parks over the U. S. that experiment with roses to determine the ones that will grow and bloom well in most areas.

You will find new varieties on the market in the hybrid tea, floribunda, grandiflora and climbers. Most climbing hybrid tea roses are "spring only" bloomers, but Big Splash and Don Juan (red) are favorites through the season. If you haven't planted pansies, now is the ideal time to get them started. Be sure the bed is located in sun or partial shade. The soil should be well prepared to the depth of 12 inches. Add peat or compost and a light feeding of a complete fertilizer. They should be planted at least 6 inches apart and cover lightly with a mulch. Keep beds moist during the growing season.

Lawns should not be cut too short for the last mowing to provide more protection for the grass roots.

If you haven't planted the bulbs you purchased last week from the Garden Club, these few hints may help. The culture of bulbs is simple. Most of them grow in good garden soil, otherwise they would not be so universally popular, nor present in such great quantities. Bulbs must have a well-drained soil, preferably one with some sand and humus in it. The most important "don't" in bulb growing is, don't cut off the foliage when flowers are gone. Proper depth and spacing when planting bulbs is important. The depth depends on the size of the bulb—usually plant 3 or 4 times the depth of the bulb and large bulbs 4-6 and 8 inches apart.

Ponies should be planted so the crown where the eyes are will be covered only two inches.

Amaryllis bulbs should be covered only an inch or so if planted outside, but if in pots the neck and top just above the soil. The pot should be twice the diameter of the bulb.

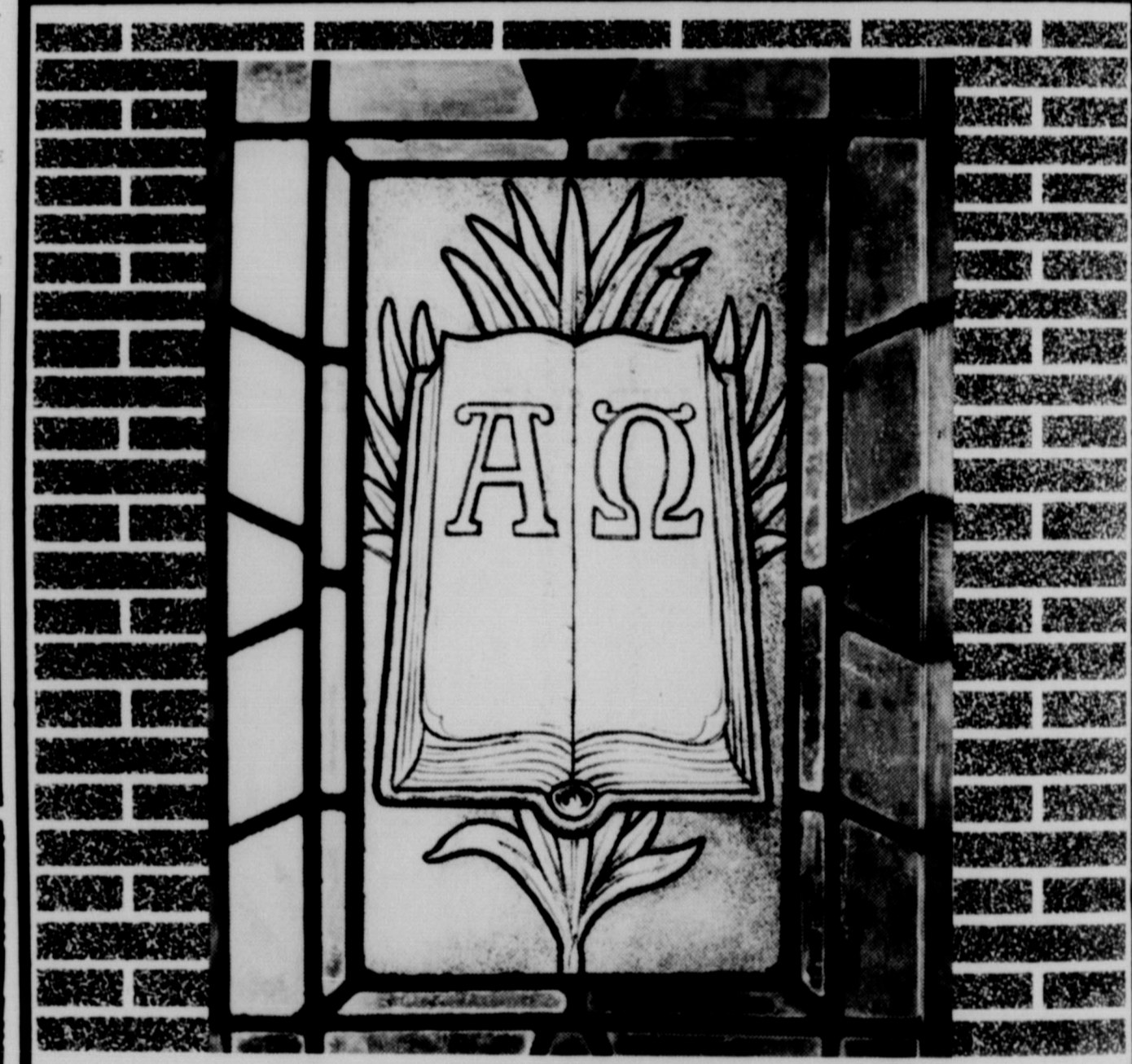

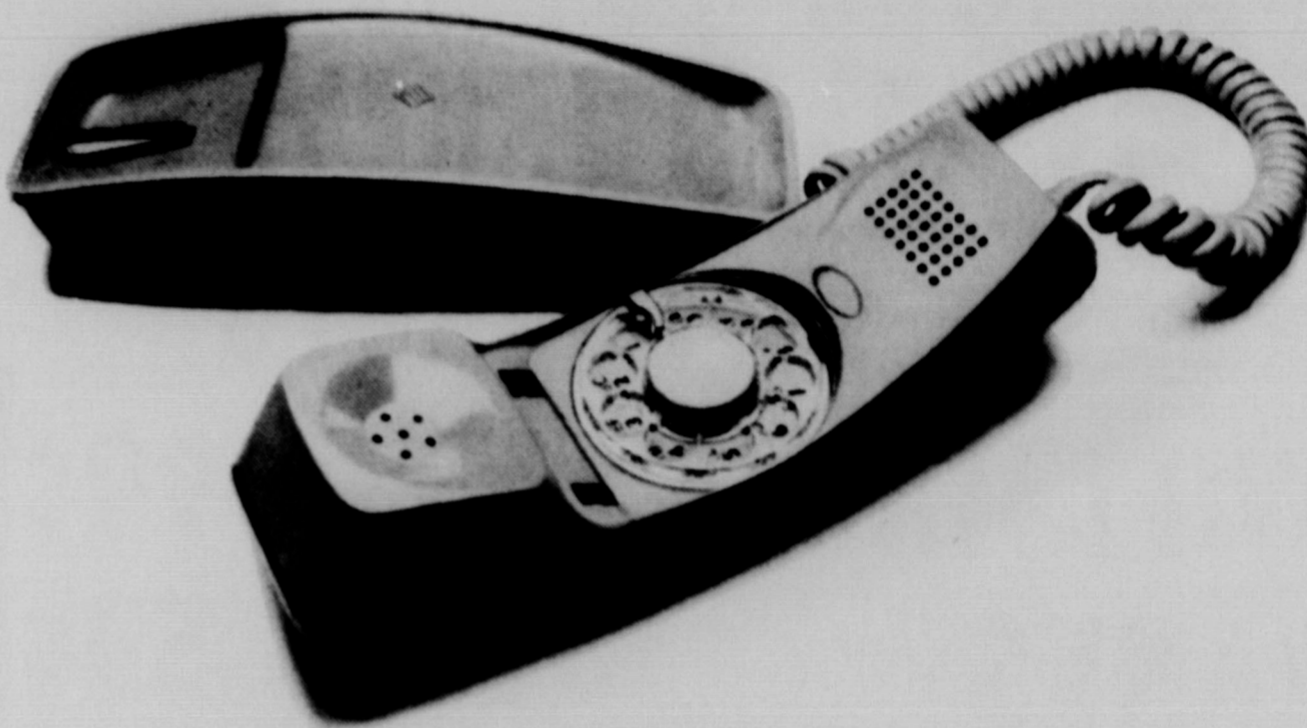

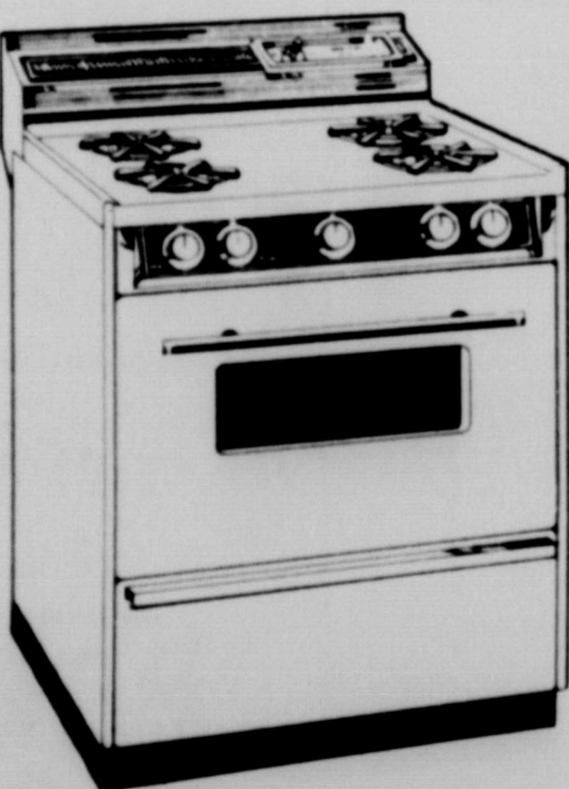

Ozona Students Complete Hunter Safety Course

Thirteen Ozona High School students of the Ozona FFA Chapter recently completed the Hunter Safety Course, sponsored by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department in conjunction with the National Rifle Association.

The course is designed to give knowledge of the care and safety practices in the field which can avoid gun accidents during hunting seasons. The course is not intended to produce either expert marksmen or full bag limits. It presents such subjects as knowledge of guns, proper gun handling, good shooting practices and the hunter's responsibilities.

The students received nine hours of classroom instruction from instructor Jim Leech and one hour of shooting at the rifle range.

Each student completing the course will receive a shoulder brassard and a Safe Hunter Certificate from the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. Turkey Tags Added To '74 Licenses

Hunters nervously fingering their hunting licenses might notice some additions to this year's licenses: turkey tags.

Law enforcement and wildlife officials at the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department say that the new tags will "put teeth in enforcement of bag limits on turkey."

In Texas counties which have a turkey season, the bag limit varies from one to three birds.

In the past it has been difficult to enforce bag and possession limits on turkeys and the "gentlemen's agreement" was not always honored by a minority of hunters.

Now, the laws are clear on the matter.

"It is unlawful for any person to kill and possess a turkey without attaching the turkey tag from a valid hunting license to the bird."

"No person may possess any turkey that has not been properly tagged and this tag must remain attached to the bird until arrival at its final destination."

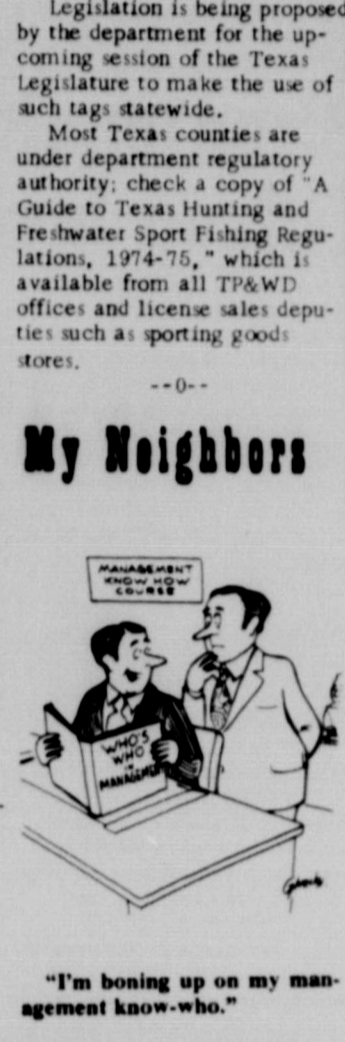
Much like the rules which apply to the disposition of deer, "final destination" is defined as the residence of a hunter or a commercial meat processing facility.

As yet, the use of turkey tags applies only in those counties which are under the fish and wildlife regulatory authority of the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Legislation is being proposed by the department for the upcoming session of the Texas Legislature to make the use of such tags statewide.

Most Texas counties are under department regulatory authority; check a copy of "A Guide to Texas Hunting and Freshwater Sport Fishing Regulations, 1974-75," which is available from all TP&WD offices and license sales deputies such as sporting goods stores.

Sterile Fly Cutback Postponed Till Dec.

A cut-back in sterile screw-worm fly production scheduled to begin Nov. 11 has been postponed until Dec. 1, according to officials of the U. S. Department of Agriculture (USDA).

The reduction from the present level of 200 million flies per week to a new level of 75 million flies each week was announced by USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) on Nov. 6. The reduction would have involved furloughing of over 280 personnel at the sterile screw-worm fly production plant in Mission, Texas, in shifts beginning Nov. 11. All furloughs have now been delayed until Dec. 1.

Screwworms--the larval form of the screw-worm fly--feed on living flesh and have caused billions of dollars in livestock damage over the years.

Screwworm eradication is accomplished by releasing millions of artificially raised and sexually sterilized screw-worm flies to mate with native fertile flies. Eggs produced by such matings do not hatch. Since the female screw-worm fly usually mates once in her lifetime, increased sterile mating reduce the native population and screwworms are eventually eliminated.

The Mission, Texas, plant has been producing sterile screw-worm flies for dispersal since 1962.

Thomas & Kidd Oil Production Co., Denver City, will drill the No. 7 Joe Bean as a location south off to the San Andres gas re-opener and lone producer from that pay in the Donham multipay field of Crockett County 14 miles northeast of Ozona.

Location is 2,650 feet from the north and 1,900 feet from the east lines of 48-UV-GC&SF. Contract depth is 1,250 feet. The re-opener, the same firm's No. 2 Joe Bean, was finalized Oct. 25 for a calculated absolute open flow of 2,950,000 cubic feet of gas per day, through perforations at 1,198-203 feet.

The field currently has three Grayburg gas producers. It formerly produced oil from the Wolfcamp.

Bicentennial Urges Citizen Involvement

Speakers at the State Bicentennial Meeting Nov. 12-13 in Austin stressed the need for all persons to become involved in efforts to help plan and celebrate the 1976 activities in their individual communities. Mrs. P. L. Childress, chairman of the Horizons Committee of the Crockett County Bicentennial Steering Committee, reported.

American Revolution Bicentennial Administration head John Warner said Tuesday that countrywide Bicentennial festivities may stimulate the economy.

Warner recalled that originally Bicentennial celebrations were to have revolved around major cities, with exhibitions and fairs located in the East, primarily. "Thank the good Lord that plan fell into the dustbin," he said.

He noted he was "ordered by law" to establish some sort of commemorative sales program, but cautioned against excessive commercialism. He said he would select approximately 20 souvenir historical items to be mass produced and affixed with the official Bicentennial logo. The items are to be priced so all persons can afford them, with proceeds to go to state Bicentennial commissions.

"America's strength lies in her free enterprise and free political systems," White said. Apportioning the \$240,000 in federal funds to the 220 Bicentennial communities in the state will be difficult, said Mrs. Gene Brownrigg, Executive Director of the State Bicentennial Commission. "We know that amount won't go far but it's all we have," she explained.

Individual communities were urged to have Bicentennial fund-raising projects which could involve every citizen, Mrs. Childress said.

Mrs. Childress noted that Lubbock and several other communities had an official Bicentennial logo for their city, and perhaps Ozona could work on a logo as part of its town awareness of the Bicentennial.

Other suggestions from the conference included the possibility of involving school children of all ages in the county celebration plans, as well as trying to increase public awareness of the Bicentennial celebration through the news media.
