## Postmaster Vacancy At Pandale

A Postmaster vacancy exists at the Pandale, Texas, Fourth-Class Post Office, Regional Postmaster General Frank Sommerkamp announced today.

Sectional Center Manager, David E. Holster at Midland, Texas, Post Office has been designated to accept applications from interested persons for this position.

Sectional Center Manager Holster said that applications will be accepted from December 2 to 16, and the appropriate forms may be obtained at the Pandale, Texas post office. The starting salary for the Postmaster position is \$2864.00 per year. No written test is required.

Holster said applicants must reside in the postal sectional center area in which the post office is located on the date of his or her appointment. The appointed postmaster will have to live within a reasonable distance from the post office so that he or she can adequately discharge the responsibilities of the office and the Postal Service, he added. At offices of the Fourth-Class Postmaster is required to furnish suitable quarters for the post office.

## Crockett Field Gains Extender

Canyon sand gas production was extended 1 1/2 miles northeast in the Ozona multiphase field of Crockett County with completion of Western States Producing Co., Midland, No. 1-W L. Friend, two miles northeast of Ozona, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 5 million cubic feet of gas per day, with gas-liquid ratio of 37,625-1. Gravity of the condensate was 66.4 degrees.

Production was through perforations at 6,445-6,519 feet, which had been acidized with 25,500 gallons and fractured with 80,000 gallons and 93,500 pounds.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west lines of 95-GH-GC&SF.

## Mother Of Ozonan Dies In Ft. Worth

Mrs. J. E. L. Harrison, mother of W. L. (Bud) Harrison of Ozona, died Monday at her home in Fort Worth after a lengthy illness. Funeral services were held in Fort Worth Tuesday morning with a graveside service and burial in Dublin at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon.

Mrs. Harrison's husband was minister of Ozona Church of Christ for many years. He preceded her in death as did two sons. Other survivors include another son, four daughters, several grandchildren and great grandchildren.

## Bicentennial Endorsement For Crockett County Is Official

Word that Crockett County has been endorsed as a National Bicentennial Community was received by the County Steering Committee this past week.

Mrs. Gene Brownrigg, State Executive Director, wrote "May we be among the first to offer our congratulations on the endorsement of Crockett County as a National Bicentennial Community. We feel that the action taken by the American Revolution Bicentennial Ad-

ministration is a significant step in the progress of your Bicentennial Celebration. . . . To formally recognize your community, we suggest that an appropriate National Designation Ceremony be scheduled for the presentation of the National Certificate, National Flag and State Certificate."

Also a letter of congratulation was received from S. L. Abbott, Regional Director, who wrote, "Be assured of my personal congratulations and deepest appreciation for your commitment to participate in the commemoration of our Nation's 200th Anniversary."

The Crockett County Steering Committee is in the pro-

cess of setting a date for the formal presentation of the National and State symbols, probably in late January. This should be an occasion in which the total community will take pride and participate and all local groups and organizations are urged to continue plans for sharing in the 1976 anniversary. It is suggested that all plans be coordinated through the local chairpersons: Horizons, Mrs. P. L. Childress; Heritage, Mrs. Joe Clayton; and Festival, C. O. Walker. The Steering Committee will be pleased to assist in every way possible in order that Crockett County's celebration may be a source of pride to all of its citizens.

Youths age 14-19 will com-

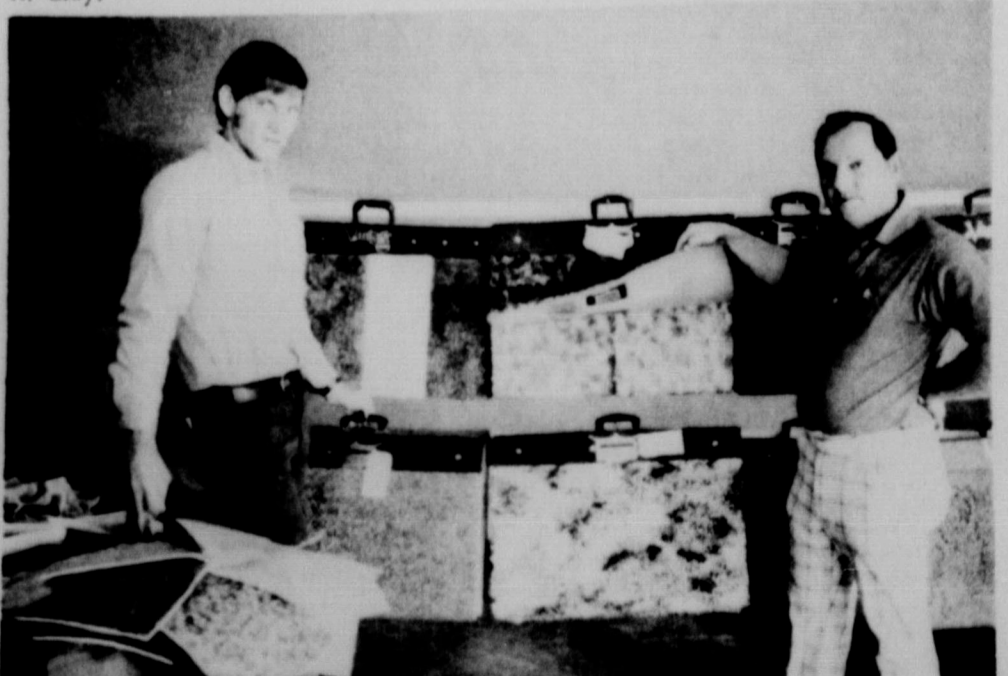
pete in the senior division, while the junior division involves ages 9-13 or younger.

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THE CBS COVERUP Part IV of a series

During the years 1972-73 (and indeed, up to the present time) one of the liveliest public debates in both the private and political spheres has revolved around the subject of USSR-USA relations;

detente, the balance of military power, trade with the USSR, etc. Among the views expressed, and duly reported by our nation's newspapers, were the following:

- That the Soviet Union has steadily maintained the objective of world domination;

- That the Soviet Union has become more powerful in military might than the USA.

- That the United States should seek to achieve and maintain military superiority over the Soviet Union;

- That our U.S. defense budget should be substantially increased.

Writes Dr. Ernest W. Lefever, in the book TV and National Defense

"Such views were privately expressed within the councils of government, privately and publicly voiced by Members of Congress, endorsed by national organizations, advanced by writers in national journals, and expressed by journalists, scholars, statesmen and former military leaders. (These) views were often reported in major newspapers and magazines, as well as in specialized journals like U.S. News and World Report, Aviation Week and Space Technology, Fortune, Orbis, Reader's Digest, and National Review."

To all of this the average reader might well respond: "So what? There is nothing unusual or startling in this."

What is unusual, however — indeed shocking — is the following report, also by Dr. Lefever: "Though views such as these were held by many experts and by millions of Americans, we did not find a single one of them clearly reflected on CBS Evening News."

The "we" mentioned by Dr. Lefever was a team of experts who spent thousands of man-hours in an intense, sentence by sentence study of two solid years of the taped programs of CBS Evening News. And the news stories cited here were not the only ones blacked out by CBS. Many others suffered the same fate because of the mysterious pattern of censorship followed by CBS management.

The television code of the National Association of Broadcasters stipulates that "a television station's news schedule should be adequate and well-balanced" and "news reporting should be factual, fair, and without bias."

The pattern of bias followed by CBS has been well documented. The next move is up to Mr. Salant, President of CBS News. His responsibility to the public cannot be brushed off.

MAJORITY RULE AT THE U.N.

It is sad but no real surprise to see the United Nations acting more like a catalyst for war than an instrument of peace

That conclusion is difficult to avoid after the spectacle which the world body has made of itself in recent weeks.

First, there is the vendetta waged against South Africa at the very moment when the white government in Pretoria is making a major effort to reach a genuine settlement with Black Africa and thus to avoid a major racial conflagration.

On October 23 Prime Minister Vorster made a very conciliatory speech on the question of Rhodesia and South West Africa, and his U.N. delegate promised that South Africa would no longer condone discrimination based on race or color.

Did that help? Not at all. On October 30 only a U.S., British, and French veto in the Security Council prevented the total expulsion of South Africa from the U.N. And a few days later, the General Assembly, in total disregard of the U.N. Charter, suspended South Africa from participating in the current session.

Such irresponsibility by an unbridled majority, many of which, like the Soviet Union, trample on human rights and practice colonialism on other peoples to an extent totally unknown in South Africa, boggles the imagination. It can only make more difficult the search for a peaceful solution to the problems of southern Africa.

Then, in total contrast to this act of ostracism, there was the wild hero's welcome given by the U.N. to the Palestine Liberation Organization chief, Yasser Arafat, and to his uncompromising speech demanding the dismantling of the state of Israel. No nation can be expected to acquiesce in its destruction, so Arafat's speech was clearly a commitment to war, and the cheers of the U.N. delegates who heard him were a deathknell to the hopes for peace in the Middle East. The war scare which blew up in the aftermath of Arafat's appearance is an indication of the further damage which his reception at the U.N. has caused.

The once great hopes for the United Nations now lie in ruins. The "majority" rules. The result is a nauseous travesty where gross hypocrisy and the double standard have been enshrined as the highest standards of international behaviour.

The best service which the U.S. can render to the U.N. is to give it the back of our hand.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Lyndell Williams

AUSTIN, Tex.—Texas delegates will be heading for Kansas City, Mo., this week for a new kind of Democratic national convention.

Most of them are just as glad there has never been one like it before and hope that there will never be another.

The "mini-convention" or 1974 Conference on Democratic Policy and Organization was mandated by the 1972 Democratic National Convention.

Its job is to produce the first national charter or constitution in history for a major American political party.

It will also serve as a forum for discussion of national issues. Four panels will meet December 6 to discuss four general areas, in identifying the issues of greatest concern to the Democratic party.

The party charter will be adopted after debate by 2,038 delegates December 7, and issue panel moderators will make their reports and addresses December 8.

Gov. Dolph Briscoe is chairman of the Texas delegation, which includes as ex-officio members all members of the Democratic congressional delegation.

Texas liberals, unhappy with selection of Briscoe in a telephone poll, named Ms. Billie Carr of Houston, a national Democratic committee member, their chairwoman.

Prospective candidates for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1976—including U.S. Sen. Lloyd Bentsen of Texas—are expected to make strong bids for attention at the Kansas City sessions.

VOTES CANVASSED—Canvass of the statewide general election vote reconfirmed Atty. Gen. John Hill as the top vote-getting incumbent. He polled 1,170,253 votes to win over Republican Tom Cole, with 379,108 and the Socialist Workers Party nominee, with 30,577.

Land Commissioner Bob Armstrong came in second in the canvass with 1,136,321, and Agriculture Commissioner John C. White third, with 1,125,577.

All the incumbents scored more than a million votes.

High Republican vote-getter in the canvass was treasurer candidate Robert G. Holt, with 559,402.

Votes for governor and lieutenant governor will not be canvassed until the legislature convenes in January. The House of Representatives takes care of that. The Board of Canvassers canvasses the other races, including legislative, congressional and judicial.

COURTS BUSY — During January-June, 1,716,697 cases were filed in or appealed to county, justice of the peace and municipal courts of the state according to Texas Civil Judicial Council.

Fifty-three per cent of the county court criminal cases and 38 per cent of the civil cases were dismissed or settled before trial.

Justice of the peace and municipal courts received \$26.4 million in revenue during the six-month reporting period.

The council reported 184 of the 254 constitutional

county courts have judges who are not attorneys. Only six per cent of 934 justices of the peace are attorneys, and about 65 per cent of the 215 municipal courts (in cities over 5,000) are licensed lawyers.

RATE HIKES OPPOSED — A group backing utility regulation asked Attorney General Hill to investigate allegations of irregularities in rate practices by Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

At the same time, the chairman of the Texas Coalition for Utility Regulation said no city council should grant phone rate increases while questions raised in a suit at San Antonio against Southwestern Bell are pending.

The \$29.6 million damage suit by a fired Bell executive and the family of a deceased executive alleges the company kept a separate set of books for use in getting rate increases and indirectly channeled money into political campaigns.

State Rep. Roy Blake of Nacogdoches also advised city councils to refrain from rate increases until the charges have been proved or disproved.

Washington News Letter

Alcoholism and cigarettes are being pointed to as two major problems in our society. Cigarette smoking, when done excessively, may, according to the Surgeon General, produce lung cancer. That fact has been repeatedly confirmed.

But despite this finding, cigarette smoking continues to increase. During 1974, 590-billion cigarettes will be smoked in this country, compared with 576-billion the year before.

In the case of alcohol consumption, the picture is even more shocking. From 1960 to 1970, per capita consumption increased 26%.

Government figures reveal that about one in 10 of the 95-million Americans who drink is now either a full-fledged alcoholic or at least a problem drinker (defined as one who drinks enough to cause trouble for himself and society.)

Moreover, after heart disease and cancer, alcoholism is the country's biggest health problem.

As related to crime, half of all murders in the U.S., either the killer or the victim or both—have been drinking.

The dollar cost of alcoholism may be as much as \$15-billion a year, much of it from lost work time in business, industry and the Government.

At least half of each year's 55,000 auto deaths and half of the one million major injuries suffered in auto accidents can be traced to driver or pedestrian "under the influence," according to confirmed figures.

These statistics are shocking—but they are true.

Isn't the time overdue for more education and warning of the dangers and cost inherent in over-indulgence of cigarettes and alcohol? The warning should, of course, be concentrated in the homes, in schools, churches, and in the clubs.

Human lives, health, and happiness are all very directly involved. It's up to the individual to practice restraint and moderation.

Our foreign relations are apparently all poor relations.

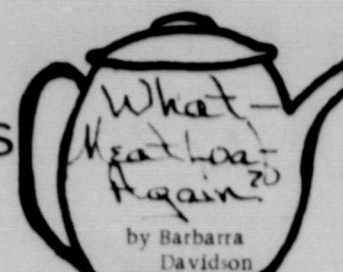
Figures for family food expenditures last year show that consumers are changing their shopping habits and food use to meet the times.

## Javelina Hunt Applications Still Available

By the middle of November, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department officials had received only 54 applications for public javelina hunt to be held on two department wildlife management areas. A public drawing will be held Dec. 12 to determine which 150 hunters will take part in a Jan. 11-12 and 25-26, 1975, javelina hunt on the Chaparral Area in South Texas. Another 150 names will be drawn the same day for a Jan. 18-26 hunt on the Black Gap Area out in the Trans-Pecos. TP&WD officials remind javelina hunters that they have until Dec. 9 to submit their applications to the Austin offices of the department.

Each hunter selected will be allowed to hunt two days with a bag limit of one javelina. To help defray costs of the hunt, a \$3 fee will be charged for each permit issued.

## Help For Incorrect Billing

Nobody likes to be billed incorrectly, but there are several steps to take if it happens to you, one expert noted. She's Lynn Bourland, home management specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. "Accurate records and a businesslike approach will help you resolve most billing problems," she said. However, sometimes more specific procedures may be necessary to deal with billing mistakes. --Check your bill as soon as you receive it. If there is an error, notify the store or credit card issuer immediately. --Make a note of the date and the name of the person you call. You may need this information later. --If you write rather than call, send your complaint separate

from your bill payment. Remember to include your credit card number and copies of the bill or other documents. Keep the originals yourself, along with a copy of your letter. --If you have trouble getting a billing error corrected, send a letter relating the problem and what you have done to the credit manager or president of the company. Also include copies of bills, sales slips or other documents with this letter. --If this still doesn't bring results, send the details and evidence of your efforts to the local Credit Bureau. Send a copy of that letter to the merchant who has not corrected the billing error. --0--

## Ceramic Roads Coming Soon?

A cooperative project of the New York State Thruway Authority and the Carborundum Company of Niagara Falls involving the installation of ceramics at the Hamburg toll booth lanes was recently completed.

Ceramic materials are considered ideal because they are extremely wear and abrasion resistant and offer permanent anti-skid texture. According to Carborundum, areas paved with ceramics should last the planned life of the highway with little or no repair.

According to a spokesman for the Thruway Authority, high traffic points are a major problem in state highway systems because of rapid wear and resulting inconvenience to motorists. And with greater frequency, repairs to areas such as exits and entrances, toll lanes and bridge decks, must be made at night when traffic is slow, which is costly.

Introduction of zero-maintenance materials for heavily traveled road surfaces, even if they cost more initially than conventional materials, is expected to lower total construction and repair costs.

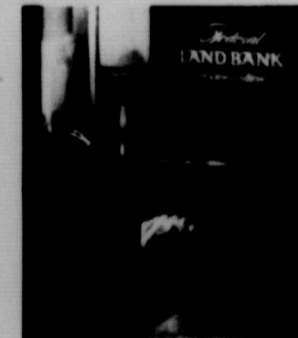

The paper should extend over the top and bottom of the box slightly. Snip the ends of the wrapping paper even with the edges of the box. Secure with paste or tape. Attach the circles to the top and bottom with paste or concealed tape.

More deer were taken during the four days than the

entire early part of the season when the weather was warm and brush heavy.

Christmas shoppers were busy even before the Thanksgiving holiday and the annual Woman's League Bazaar was almost sold out in the first fifteen minutes of the opening last Tuesday. The cold weather kept shoppers indoors for the most part over the weekend, but Ozona shops and stores were doing a brisk business again by Monday. Residents who were not raking leaves seemed to be shopping in the downtown and village areas of Ozona, all this week, and the recession or depression in other parts of the nation seemed alien to these parts.
