Funeral Service Sunday For Mrs. Graham

Funeral services for Mrs. N. W. (Della York) Graham, 94, were held at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon from the Ozona United Methodist Church, with burial in Cedar Hill Cemetery under the direction of James Funeral Home. Services were conducted by the pastor, Rev. Ben Bohmfalk.

Mrs. Graham died in the Schliecher County Medical Center Hospital Saturday afternoon, where she had been a nursing home patient the past four years.

Mrs. Graham had been a resident of Ozona sixty nine years. She was born in Milan County, July 30, 1880, and was married to Newton W. Graham in 1901. The couple moved to Ozona in 1905, following Mr. Graham's graduation from the University of Texas Law school. He served as county and district attorney and practiced law here until his death in 1954.

Active throughout most of her life, Mrs. Graham was a dedicated worker in the Methodist Church, serving in various posts in the church and women's groups, and in all phases of community service work. She was a long time member and served a term as president of the Ozona Woman's Club, the first women's study group organized in Ozona. The present Ozona Woman's Forum was organized in her home and under her leadership in 1929.

Survivors include three daughters, Mrs. Evert White and Mrs. Hugh Childress, Jr., both of Ozona, and Mrs. Clinton Glover of Abilene; one brother, C. W. York of Jayton; five grandchildren and twelve great grandchildren.

Mrs. Grimmer Buried In Winfield, Iowa

Funeral services for Mrs. W. J. (Nan Davidson) Grimmer, 78, were held Monday at 2 p. m. in the United Methodist Church in Winfield, Iowa, with burial in Winfield cemetery. Former classmates of the Grimmer children were pallbearers.

Mrs. Grimmer died Friday in Crockett County Hospital following a brief illness. Private family services were held Saturday morning at James Funeral Home Chapel. The body was flown to Winfield following services here.

She was a longtime resident of Winfield.

Mrs. Grimmer was born April 22, 1896 in Ozona, the daughter of the late Judge and Mrs. Charles E. Davidson. She was married to William J. Grimmer in Ozona May 19, 1922. She was a graduate of the University of Texas at Austin.

Survivors include her husband; two sons, Dr. Bill Grimmer of Davenport, Iowa, and E. D. Grimmer of Winfield; two daughters, Mrs. Bob Bailey of Ozona and Mrs. Duane Rosenberger of Fort Sumner, N. Commissioners Court In Routine Monthly Meeting Here Monday

The Crockett County Commissioners Court met Monday for its regular monthly meeting, and for the most part routine business was conducted.

In the first business of the day, the court passed a resolution to place a weight limit of 18,000 pounds on county roads in wet weather. Signs will be ordered and the resolution will be enforced as soon as the signs are in place.

The proposed General Telephone Co. rate raise for Crockett County was submitted. The court voted unanimously to oppose the raise due to poor service in the county.

E. M. Hunt met with the court to obtain its approval to place four dusk to dawn lights at the cemetery, one at the entrance to Lima Cemetery,

two at the entrance to Cedar Hill Cemetery, and one at his wife's grave. Hunt will make a donation to cover the cost of the lighting, and the county will assume payment of electricity. All improvements are subject to approval by the Cemetery Association.

E. L. Kirken, hospital administrator, asked the court's approval to hire an Austin attorney to represent the hospital board in the appeal by Dr. Don Carlisle for admittance to the hospital staff. A lengthy discussion on the Life Safety Code followed. The hospital has been instructed to install a sprinkler system and smoke sensors throughout the hospital. It was decided to have the work done by a local firm instead of a fire systems company.

Santa Claus To Make Annual Ozona Visit

Santa Claus will make his annual visit to Ozona Friday, Dec. 20. He will fly into town as usual and be picked up by the big red fire truck. After a spin around the square, he will set up shop between the courthouse and the annex and visit with children and pass out bags of candy.

All Ozona schools will dismiss for the Christmas holidays the same day. The Primary and Intermediate schools will dismiss at 1:45, giving the children plenty of time to be on hand at the square to welcome Santa at 2 p. m.

High school and Junior High will dismiss classes at 2:30 p. m.

Santa's annual visit is sponsored by the Ozona Volunteer Fire Department, whose members are responsible for getting Santa back to his plane in plenty of time to make it back to the North Pole, harness his reindeer and load his sleigh for his Christmas gift-bringing visit.

The winners of the Lake View-Big Lake and Rankin Sweetwater tilt will play at 3:00 Friday.

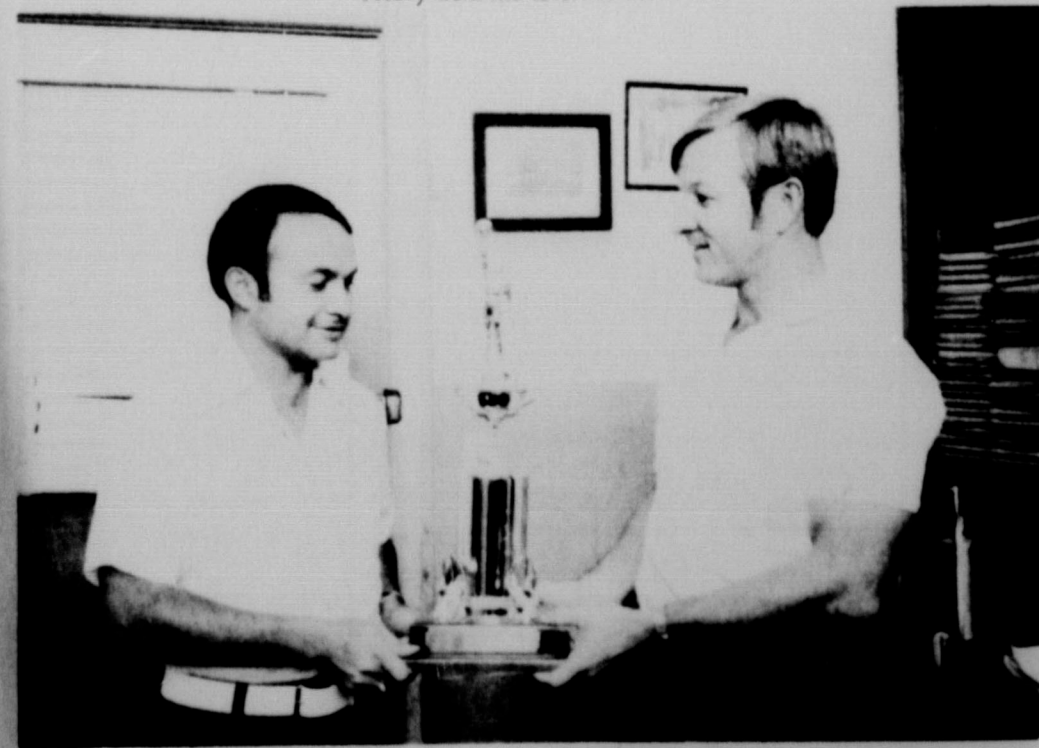

WHAT "CAP" AT VLADIVOSTOK?

Now that the hoopla has died down somewhat over the so-called "breakthrough" in arms negotiations at the Vladivostok Summit, the country is quite properly being exposed to some sober second thoughts.

The principal claim for success is a supposed "cap" of 2400 on total numbers of strategic delivery vehicles to be possessed by each side, and a similar "cap" on total number of missiles that can possess MIRV-type multiple warheads of 1320. President Ford reportedly told congressional leaders that the figures were "the best that could be negotiated," but most important: "we put a cap on and the cap is less than the Russian-planned program."

Well, how do we know this? How do we know what the "Russian-planned program" really is? All we know is that the President says our military spending will not go up by more than a small fraction as a result of the agreement. What we also know is that there is no limit imposed on the size or "throw weight" of the warheads, where Russia already has a huge advantage over the U.S., and that the number of MIRVed missiles to be permitted is considerably more than what the U.S. proposed at the Nixon-Brezhnev summit last June.

In the 1972 SALT agreement the Soviets were conceded a larger ICBM force than the U.S. because of the argument that the U.S. was far ahead in the total number of warheads. Now we are conceding the Soviets the right to MIRV far more missiles than we earlier bargained for, and to do so with much larger warheads than we possess.

One reaction to Vladivostok particularly worth noting is that of Paul H. Nitze, a former top U.S. arms limitation negotiator, who says, "I am disappointed."

According to Nitze, "the real problem we face is the imminent deployment of a new family of Soviet missiles. I don't see that the new pact reduces that problem appreciably."

The new Soviet missiles which worry Nitze were discussed last month by Dr. Malcolm Currie, the Pentagon's top research officer.

"The coming year will probably see the start of the most massive deployment of new strategic nuclear weapons in history — Soviet weapons."

To be deployed by the Soviets are four all new intercontinental ballistic missiles, the SS-16, 17, 18, and 19. "We know," said Dr. Currie, "that each Soviet SS-19 can carry six fully MIRVed warheads." That's twice as many, each twice as big as the latest model U.S. Minuteman III provides.

The arms race was hardly halted at Vladivostok. It will be many years before the Soviets can fully exploit the MIRV "cap" even if they honor it. Meanwhile, according to Dr. Currie,

"The Soviet technical advances, their willingness to spend freely and the sheer massiveness of their new strategic missile programs are simply staggering. The concentration of Soviet research and development efforts, sophisticated new multiple warhead payloads, guidance systems and launch techniques and facilities far exceed anything previously seen in the history of missilery."

We take small comfort in Mr. Ford's agreement.

THE CAMPAIGN AGAINST TERRORISM

Carping critics of the FBI and our law enforcement agencies are so intent upon their attacks that they refuse to acknowledge the dangerous realities of present day extremism and violence. Indeed, some would seem to extoll violence by making "folk heroes" of the terrorists.

In the FBI's "Law Enforcement Bulletin," Director Clarence M. Kelley points out that in recent years "there has been in the United States a proliferation of groups with sinister and militant-sounding names that have adopted foreign-bred terrorist tactics as their creed." Thus far this year, for example, individuals affiliated with these groups have been linked with the killing and wounding of police officers, kidnappings, racist murders, bombings, jailbreak attempts, prison riots, bank robberies, urban guerrilla warfare and even the posting of public notices threatening death to any who oppose them.

"Surely," continues Director Kelley, "there are no rational philosophies, programs or grievances that need communication by such methods... despite its faults and shortcomings, this Nation offers more peaceable remedies for grievances, real or imagined, than any on earth... This is the strength of democracy; its capacity to accommodate a wide range of sharply divided opinions. Reasonable men advancing reasonable arguments need never resort to violence."

Toward the end of stopping the growth of terrorism and violence, the FBI Academy has held many symposiums and several hundred conferences have been conducted throughout the nation with local, State, and other law enforcement agencies, and more sessions are contemplated.

Little wonder, then, that the sneering cynics espousing the Marxist theories of violence should mount their malicious attacks against the FBI. It is the Marxist contention that democracy must be destroyed by violence. It is the FBI's contention that democracy can be preserved without violence. We'll stick with the Bureau, thank you.

Much concern is being registered concerning "reforms" that are being achieved, related to future processing of legislation on in the House of Representatives.

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Tips For Gardeners

From the Ozona Garden Club by Mrs. Bailey Post

Now that the holiday season is fast approaching, you will be thinking of and planning Christmas decorations.

Few holiday preparations bring a gardener more satisfaction than fashioning wreaths, sprays and roping from your own greenery. The type you make depends somewhat on the amount of material handy, but you do not need a lot. Most trees and shrubs benefit from a little pruning and by doing it now you fill two needs with one cut.

Cut and harden the evergreen branches in buckets of water and place in a cool room until needed. They may be mixed or the same species of evergreens.

The wreath process consists of attaching clippings to a frame. Those to be placed outdoors require stronger, more durable frames than those for indoor decoration. They can be made with very little cost by making your own out of a coat hanger, or other wire available. Or many florists will sell wire frames. If you have someone who will cut circles of wood or plywood, they are more durable than styrofoam. Wire frames work best if wrapped first with florist tape to prevent slipping as you wire branches of greenery around them. Florists sell spools of pliable wire painted green in several sizes. The finer type requires less effort to manipulate. To cut it, use a wire cutter and not the pruning clippers.

First wire each bunch of clippings together by winding the wire tight around the bottom inch of the stems so they cannot work loose. Use wire long enough that several inches are left after the twisting to allow you to fasten the bunch to the frame with the same wire. Hide stems of each cluster under the next. Attach your ribbon or other decoration to hide any imperfections.

Another frame may be bought or packed with wet-squeezed out moss, uniformly and fully. Wind waxed cord spirally around frame and fasten to hold in moss and provide added anchorage for greens. Cover frame and moss with plastic weath wrap, pull fairly tight, overlapping rounds completely, and anchor and under adjacent lap. Insert prepared greens, posing slant-cut bases through plastic into moss. Lay all the same way, spaced evenly. Advance in circles around frame, filling outside first, then inside, then middle. No bare stems or plastic should show.

Lightweight ornaments, cones, pods and bows are preferred to picks which may be inserted where desired. Heavy items are best wired to the frame. Wreaths look best with heavier decorations near the bottom.

Your final result is a fresh and original creation that lasts well indoors or out. After holidays, dismantle and save everything but the greens for reuse next year.

Another informal door or wall decoration is the popular greenery spray made with branches of several varieties of juniper, pine and other evergreens you may have. Use heavier wire to secure the heavy branches together at the top. Pine cones, or ornaments may be attached in small groups or along the branches with smaller wire. All weather ribbon should be used for outdoors.

But others, less thoughtful, may base their choices on well-advertised "gimmicks" or on emotions. They may select something they themselves would enjoy playing with, even though it is inappropriate for the child receiving it. They may give "things" in place of love and attention. Toys can be expensive. Many people spend more on toys at Christmas than they can really afford. Many expensive toys turn out to be a waste of money because they are seldom played with after the holidays.

Select toys that are right for his age and stage of development, appeals to his special interests, gives him something meaningful and fun to do, such as create a product, use his imagination, develop a skill, learn about his world, imitate adults, or socialize with playmates; used in different ways; durable enough to last; can be stored in a handy place.

An unsuccessful toy can be cute, colorful, elaborate, labeled educational, and so cleverly advertised that a child is sure it is exactly what he wants.

This toy is a failure because it has no real play value--it leaves nothing for the child to do. The toy, or its parts, are soon broken or the batteries are exhausted.

Perhaps the toy doesn't fit the child's interests or abilities. The child has no appropriate place to use the toy--or setting it up and taking it down are too much bother.

Be a wise shopper and have a very Merry Christmas.

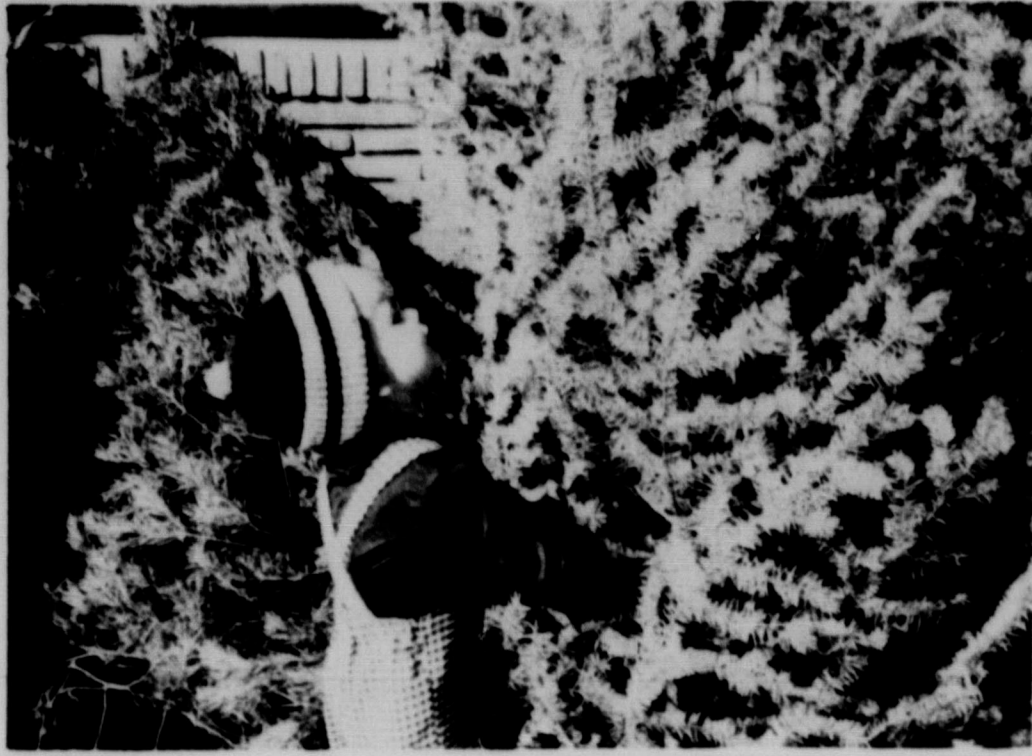

Oil Exploration In County Continues

John L. Cox, Midland, will drill an 8,800-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, eight miles east-southeast of McCamey, 1-3/4 miles east-northeast of Pennsylvanian and 2 1/4 miles east of Ellenburger production in the Tripoli field, 1/2 mile south of a depleted Wolfcamp discovery and 1/2 mile southeast of an 8,790 foot failure. It is the No. 1 Wooley.

Location is 2,073 feet from the north and 1,980 feet from the east lines of 1-8-GG&SF, Abt. 3952. Ground elevation is 3,039 feet.

The Wolfcamp discovery, Broseco Corp. No. 1 I. W. Robbins, was finished May 9, 1964, to pump 72 barrels of 37.1 gravity oil, plus 50.7 barrels of water, with gas-oil ratio of 576-1, through perforations at 6,762-763 feet. It was assigned to the Tippet field to test for 30 days to confirm or disprove existence and was abandoned June 25, 1964.

Drilled to 8,302 feet, it indicated Ellenburger production with the recovery of 1,400 feet of gas, 280 feet of 30 gravity oil, 180 feet of oil-and gas-cut mud and 220 feet of drilling mud on a test at 8,200-272 feet.

The following tops were picked on ground elevation of 2,708 feet: Yates sand, 1,329 feet; Grayburg, 1,880 feet; eroded Devonian, 6,800 feet; Silurian shale, 7,205 feet; Montoya, 7,319 feet; Simpson, 7,380 feet and Ellenburger, 8,200 feet.

The failure, Tennessee Oil Co. No. 1 Wooley, was abandoned Dec. 8, 1963, after recovering salty sulfur water on a test of the Ellenburger at 8,605-787 feet; water on a test at 7,959-83 feet and slightly oil-and gas-cut salt water on a test at 7,111-125 feet, both in the basal Pennsylvanian; and salt water on a test of the Wolfcamp at 5,599-634 feet.

H. L. Hunt, Dallas, will drill the No. 1-31-8 University, a 9,800-foot Ellenburger wildcat in Crockett County, 13 miles west of Ozona, 1 1/2 miles east southeast of the University 30-32 (#250 Fuvselman gas) field, two miles north-northwest of the one-well Howards

Creek, East (Pennsylvanian gas) field and 7/8 mile northwest of a 9,748-foot failure.

Location is 740 feet from the south and 467 feet from the west lines of 8-31-University. Ground elevation is 2,240 feet.

The failure, Humble Oil & Refining Co. (now Exxon Corp.) No. 1-X University, abandoned in December, 1963, topped the Strawn at 8,440 feet and the Ellenburger at 9,106 feet on elevation of 2,317 feet.

Hunt will drill the No. 1-32-1 University, as a 9,800-foot Ellenburger wildcat and as a 1 1/2 miles west outpost to the Howards Creek, East field, 16 miles west of Ozona.

Location is 1,320 feet from the south and 1,720 feet from the east lines of 1-32-University. Ground elevation is 2,213 feet.

The Howards Creek, East opener, Texas Oil & Gas Corp. No. 1-6 University, was finished May 31, 1974, for a calculated, absolute open flow of 3.5 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 8,776-810 feet. It was drilled to 9,814 feet.

The University 30-32 opener, McMoran Exploration Co. No. 1 University, was finished Aug. 8, 1974, for a calculated absolute open flow of 5.3 million cubic feet of gas per day through perforations at 8,250-60 feet. It was drilled to 8,500 feet.
