

PRESIDENT AND PARTY LEGISLATURE PASSES ARE NOW IN FRANCE

NUMEROUS DECORATIONS HUNG OUT IN WELCOME AT BREST BUT NO CEREMONIES.

WARMLY RECEIVED AT DOCK

President Raises His Hat to Immense Crowd of American Soldiers Gathered at Brest.

Brest .- The steamer George Washington with President Wilson on board entered the harbor of Brest Thursday night, and the president and the party which came with him left for Paris immediately.

Though numerous decorations had been hung out to welcome the return of the president, his reception was entirely without ceremony. Those who went aboard the George Washington to extend their greetings were the French ambassador to the United States and Mme. Jusserand, M. Leygues, minister of marine, and several other representatives of the French government. Major General Eli A. Helmick and Brigadier General William Harts and Colonel House met the president at the dock.

The presidential party came ashore on an American tug and while on board Mrs. Wilson was presented with a bouquet by M. Leygues. There was a little flurry of mist during the trip from the steamer, but this lasted only a short time.

Immense crowds of American soldiers stationed at Brest endeavored laid over on motion of the author. to get a view of the president, and the moonlight afforded an excellent opportunity, aided by extra lights which had been installed for the occasion. The soldiers awaited the president eagerly and he raised his hat as he observed their anxiety. Mrs. Wilson followed the president smiling graciously as she proceeded along the walk betwen the Quay and the train.

PLANS ARE MADE FOR FINANCING RAILROADS

RAILROAD EXECUTIVES AND REPRESENTATIVES OF GOV-ERNMENT CONFER.

Washington. -- Railroad executives and government representatives have laid the foundation on which loans from banks and the War Finance Corporation will be made available to railroads during the next few months in lieu of the funds which congress failed to provide.

After conferences between a number of leading railway corporation officials and officials of the War Fimittee of seven, headed by Howard Elliott, president of the Northern executives to co-operate with government agencies as a clearing house or financial arrangements.

Bond issues for road improvements aggregating more than \$310,000 were voted in four districts in Collin couny last week.

The famous Dimmit county strawberries have begun to move. The first o be shipped were sent out a few days go from Carrizo Springs, Texas.

Work on the hydroairplane station at Galveston has been stopped by reason of the failure of the naval appropriation bill in the closing hours of congress.

Land sales and leases for the month of February in Texas amounted to \$145,938, of which \$78,138 went to the various available funds and \$67,799 to the permanent funds.

For the purpose of teaching the English language to all foreigners who are unable to speak it in Washington county, a school of instruction will be opened in Brenham March 17.

The railroad commission has granted the application of the Rio Grande Railroad Company to issue and register \$215.430 mortgage bonds on a valuation of \$305,430. The road operates between Brownsville and Point Isabel, a distance of 22.5 miles.





the honored president for several years, it has been definitely decided to unveil the statue Monday, April 21, which is San Jacinto Day.

Five thousand bales of cotton and 75,537 sacks of breadstuffs constituted the first cargo to depart from Galveston for the port of Antwerp, Belgium, since August, 1914. The cargo, together with 1,351 pieces of gum dunnage lumber, according to the ship's manifest, was carried by the Greystoke Castle, Captain A. G. Howe, which stood out to sea Friday.

That a vast field of operation has been mapped out for exploiting the resources of Texas, encouraging the location of important industries and reaching the markets of the world with Texas products with the organization of the Texas Chamber of Commerce, is the statement of James Z. George, who was elected general manager of the State organization at a recent meeting in Dallas.

Williamson county is making special efforts this year in the direction of growing high-grade cotton and breeding pure seed, and for increasing interest along this line clubs of boys under 15 are being formed throughout the country who are to experiment on three-acre plots of land. Government certified pure seed is to be furnished and the boys instructed in cultivating their crops by an expert cotton man.

The attorney general's department has just handed out a ruling to the effect that the fish in the waters of the state and the game in its forests belong to the people of the state in their sovereign capacity, who, through their representatives, the legislature, have sole control thereof, and may permit or prohibit their taking. The opinion holds that it is unlawful for any person in the state of Texas to take or destroy the nest or eggs of any wild bird, or have such nest or eggs in his or her possession, except English house sparrows, hawks, crows, buzzards, blackbirds, rice birds and owls.

Five good road projects in Harris county are receiving either state or federal air. The estimated cost of these projects is \$482,184.55. With state aid in road work amounting to \$79,087.16 and federal aid amounting to \$50,000, a grand total of \$129,087.16 is reached in the county. These figures represent only a part of the road work being done in Harris county, as there are many projects for which no aid, either state or federal, has been extended.


