



### NATION STILL NEEDS GREAT POULTRY INCREASES

Poultry production should be increased greatly, according to the department of agriculture's 1918 agricultural production program, especially in back yards and on farms where waste material is available and the purchase of expensive grains and other material is not required.

Increased poultry production may be obtained most economically, according to the federal experts, by early hatching, by confining mother hens at least ten days after the chicks are hatched, by reducing losses on account of rats, weasels, and thieves, and cold, damp conditions, by thorough sanitation, by discouraging the marketing of early-hatched pullets as broilers, by eliminating non-producing hens and keeping good layers through at least two laying seasons, and by the poultryman raising his own feed as far as possible.



"Workmen should be impressed with the fact," said Secretary Beitler of the committee, "that the labor situation must not be disturbed. While the government has announced that 250,000 ship workers are needed for the shipbuilding program, this does not mean that industrial employees throughout the country should leave their employment and seek work on the Atlantic





### Frederick Still Stands in Front of War College

MASHINGTON.—The deadly statue of Frederick the Great, the statue of the man who was termed by Dr. R. M. McElroy of Princeton university, "the head devil of the whole Prussian philosophy," still lurks in front of the



War college. Doctor McElroy announced at a luncheon in New York he was going to start a movement to tear down Frederick and turn him into bullets. But Washington so far has manifested an alarming apathy to the patriotic project.

So far as can be discovered, no body has yet burned Frederick in effigy since Doctor McElroy disclosed the insidious and secret wickedness of Frederick's teachings. The watchman at the War college says he hasn't sighted so much as one lynching bee on its way to bag Fred, and intimated

## Washington Women Open Their Homes for War Causes Federal Reports Give Gains Made

WASHINGTON women, always liberal in the matter of lending their homes for charity, have been especially so with regard to war benefit entertainments or enterprises. Mrs. Gaff's ballroom has been repeatedly placed at the disposal of committees in charge of

one benefit or another. Mrs. Jennings, at whose home the women who came to this country in behalf of the French orphans had their first hearing, has been equally generous. Mme. Jusserand has given a room in the embassy for the weekly rendezvous of the women connected with the embassy and with the French high commission who are knitting for the American sol-



Mrs. Henry F. Dimock's ballroom has been the regular meeting place on Saturday afternoons of the army women who are knitting for the engineers, besides having been loaned for several war benefits since the beginning of the winter. Mrs. Henry Huddleston Rogers of New York, who with Mr. Rogers is spending the winter here, has converted a portion of the handsome Duncan McKim house, which they are occupying, into a miniature factory for turning out articles knitted by machinery. A number of machines have been installed and are in motion every day manufacturing comforts for the soldiers. Mrs. Edward Beale Mc-Lean is making similar use of one of the large apartments of McLean house. where a group of women meet at regular intervals to make surgical dressings. Mrs. Junius MacMurray has loaned space in her house, in Massachusetts avenue, for the storing of wool to be converted into garments for the soldiers and for the weekly meeting of some of the army women.

### Weather Bureau Is Doing Important Work in the War

N EVER in the history of conflicts of the world has the weather proved such a potent factor as in the war that is now in progress in Europe. This is largely due to the use of airplanes, dirigibles and captive balloons, to the highly perfected and powerful artil-



lery and to the modern methods of warfare first brought into practice in this conflict. Foreknowledge of existing and expected weather conditions, both in the air and on the surface, has, therefore, become of the utmost importance.

When active preparations for the military preparedness of this country were begun-when the declaration was made by the United States that a state of war existed with the German gov-

ernment-it was apparent that the weather bureau had an important part to play. In recognition of this fact the secretary of agriculture communicated with the secretary of war and invited attention to the service which might be rendered by the weather bureau in furnishing the fullest information concerning weather conditions in the United States and adjacent regions. He also indicated the service that trained experts could render as aids to commanders in planning military operations. The secretary of war heartily accepted the suggestions, and preparations were made at once for the fullest co-operation in carrying out the plan.

It was obvious that the activities of the weather bureau for the time being at least would necessarily be extended to two primary objects: (1) The forecasting of the weather for purely military operations, and (2) the sounding of the upper air for the benefit of aviators, balloonists and artillerists.

The official in charge of the aerological investigations of the bureau has also been commissioned a major and placed in charge of the military serological work. The aerological work heretofore performed by the bureau will be continued, in addition to the enlarged activities made possible by congressional appropriation of \$100,000 for this work.

### More Names Needed for Uncle Sam's New Warships

THE unprecedented increase in the number of naval vessels since the outbreak of the war has given rise to at least one problem which is proving to be a source of much perplexity to the naval authorities. The department is confronted with a dearth of names.

Names are needed for the numerous destroyers, mine sweepers and patrol boats which have been added to the naval list or will be added in scores within the next few months. To make matters worse. Henry Ford is preparing to turn out in quantity a new type of vessel, something between a submarine chaser and a patrol boat, which must have a name of some kind, however informal the christening may be. And unless the Audubon societies, the

of



naturalist or ornithologists of the country come to the rescue the navy department will be in a dilemma. The difficulty is that in naming vessels the department has drawn upon certain classes of names. The destroyers are named after naval heroes, the mine sweepers are named after birds, the tugs after Indian chiefs and the colliers after mythological deities or heroes. There are enough deities to go around for the colliers, but the supply of

naval heroes after whom the scores of new destroyers are to be added is

running low and there are not many Indian chiefs left. The assistant secretary of the wavy, Franklin D. Roosevelt, admitted that

the appendix of Webster's Unabridged Dictionary afforded very little in the way of bird's names suitable for mine sweepers. He admitted that the secretary bird, which is pictured in the act of seizing a snake with its talons, is hardly appropriate, and the laughing jackass even worse. It has been found that the supply of suitable birds' names is very limited.

The situation is even worse with reference to the destroyers. The number of these vessels is increasing with extraordinary rapidity and the number of naval beroes, up to the present time, at least, remains stationary. Soon there will not be enough heroes' names to go around and the department is confronted with the necessity either of recognizing new ones or switching to some wher method of nemenclature.

### MORE MEAT ANIMALS NEEDED

Specialists Tell How to Get More Pork and Beef-Exports Have Increased 177 Per Cent During Past Three Years.

Live stock men are on the job. A gratifying increase in the principal classes of live stock during 1917 is reported by David F. ### ........ WAYS TO THE 15 PER CENT HOG INCREASE.

Pork production, to attain the 15 per cent increase declared • needed during 1918, according to the agricultural production program recently announced by the department of agriculture, will be increased economically by breeding for two litters a year, by saving through better care a larger number of the pigs farforage crops, by using wastes, especially town and city garbage, by proper rations of concentrated feeds, by the use of selffeeders, by pasturing alfalfa and other legumes and other forage crops, by hogging down grain sorghums and corn, by finishing hogs to heavier weights, up to about 275 pounds, and by preventive measures which will keep hogs free from cholera, tuberculosis, other diseases and parasites.

000; mules, 101,000; milk cows, 390,-000; other cattle, 1,857,000; sheep, 1,-284,000; swine, 3,871,000. The total number of horses is estimated at 21,-563,000; mules, 4,824,000; milk cows, 23,284,000; other cattle, 43,546,000; sheep, 48,900,000; swine, 71,374,000.

The increase of 4.5 per cent in numbers of "other cattle" is due to an increase of 4.2 per cent in calves, 22.7 per cent in heifers, a decrease of 3.2 cent in other heifers, a decrease of 3.2 | the amount of feed given them. per cent in steers, and an increase of 1.9 per cent in "other cattle" (milk cows not included). Swine over six months old increased 4:5 per cent: those under six months increased 7.8 per cent.

The number of live stock not on farms, that is, stock in cities and villages, is not estimated yearly, but their number in 1910 as reported by the census was: Horses, 3,183,000; mules, 270,000; cattle, 1,879,000; sheep, 391,000; swine, 1,288,000. The census of 1910 also reported 106,000 asses and burros on farms and 17,000 not on farms; 2,915,000 goats on farms

and 115,000 not on farms. In average value per head horses increased \$1.39, mules increased \$10.59; milk cows increased \$10.96, other cattle increased \$4.96; sheep increased ......

In total value the increases are: Horses, \$66,319,000; mules, \$63,058, 000; milk cows, \$278,388,000; other cattle, \$282,431,000; sheep, \$238,338,-000; swine, \$599,378,000.

\$4.69, swine increased \$7.76.

The total value January 1, 1918, of all animals enumerated above was \$8, 263,524,000 as compared with \$6,735,-612,000 January 1, 1917, an increase of \$1,527,912,000, or 22.7 per cent.

### How to Get More Beef.

The number of beef animals should be maintained, and in areas where it is clearly the best range and farm practice, should be increased, says the program for agricultural production in 1918 recently made public by the United States department of agriculture. Since the outbreak of the Euro-

pean war and the consequent depletion of the European supply of cattle, the task of meeting the increasing demands for beef and beef products, to a large extent, has been put upon the people of the United States.

The exports of dressed beef and beef products have increased 177 per cent during the last three years. The shortage of beef abroad, like the shortage of other meat products, doubtless will be accentuated as the war progresses.

Beef production can be increased in the settled farm areas of the nation, and especially in the South. It can be increased everywhere by preventing the loss of flesh by calves during their first winter and keeping calves growing during this period so that beef animals may be marketed at earlier ages. thereby requiring the maintenance of fewer stocker cattle and making possible the maintenance of larger breeding herds; by using a larger proportion of bulls on the range to insure larger calf crops; by using good bulls only; by reducing the tick-infested nating as far as possible the losses from disease and predatory animals; by transferring animals from regions of scarcity of feed to those where there is an abundance of feed; by providing a more ample supply of winter feed and better shelter, and by utilizing all roughage produced, either as fodder, hay, or silage, and supplementing these feeds with more nitrogenous concentrates and less grain.

### Growing Calves for Best.

In order the raive, may be qualified for the production of baby beef, that is, fattened and matured for market between one and two years of age, they must have quality and good finish. The consumer does not want the unfinished yearling, and the calf that does not have quality will not take on a high finish. Neither will the calf lacking in early-maturing qualities fatten properly during the latter part of the feeding period, but instead it will use most of the feed which it consumes for growth. The feeder should keep this in mind and first determine whether his calves are good enough to compete on the fat yearling market, and if he decides that they are not, they should be finished with coarse feeds and marketed later.

The deep, wide-bodied, thick-fleshed calf with short legs and an abundance of quality as indicated by fineness of hair, texture of skin, smoothness of flesh, and general refinement about the head and other parts of the body, is the type best suited for making prime baby beef. Uniformity in size, weight and color should not be overlooked either, because such factors are an advantage in marketing. These points are of great importance in selecting calves that will make rapid gains and return the most pounds of meat for

### \* BILLIONS IN FARM PROD-

UCTS.

The total estimated value of all farm products, including animal products, for 1917 is given as \$19,443,849,381 in a recent report of the secretary of agriculture. This compares with \$13,-406,364,011 for 1916 and \$9,388,-765,779, the five-year average for 1910-1914. These valuations are based upon the prices received by producers, which will apply to the total output regardless of whether the products are consumed on the farms or sold.

### FEEDING HOGS MORE BARLEY

Tendency on Part of Farmers to Use More of Crop Than in Past to Conserve Wheat.

There is a distinct tendency for farmers to feed more barley to hogs than in the past, owing to the great need for wheat conservation. The movement may result in the development of barley as a great hog feed like corn is in the middle West.

Care in Fattening Calves. More care is necessary in fattening calves than in feeding grown cattle. but, wherever possible, it is best to raise and finish beef cattle on the same

## 13-YEAR-OLD BOY VICTIMIZES BANKS Arrested While Selling Coal to

Innocent Smile of Youth Served as an Indorsement of His Honesty.

### CANADIANS ARE HIT pended.

Made It Point to Call on Bank During Busy Hour and Simple Methods Banish Suspicion-Makes Full Confession.

Winnipeg .- Immigration authorities at Edmonton are writing the final poor. chapter in perhaps the most unusual case in the history of Canadian crime, in preparing for the deportation of thirteen-year-old Walter Zeil, who two weeks ago defrauded Winnipeg banks with worthless checks during the course of a crime tour which had stretched across the Dominion and occupled his time for several months. During his stay in Winnipeg young

Zeil visited practically every bank in the city and succeeded, through his boyishness, in inducing two institutions to cash fraudulent papers.

He made it a point to call during a busy hour, presenting to the teller a check which was made payable to John Carter, whom he claimed to be, asking that it be placed to his account after deducting \$15.

### Accountant Marks Check.

At one bank he said to the accountant: "Would you mark this check?" The teller won't cash it. I only want \$15 on it anyway, and I want to change my account from the National

Trust company to your bank.' His innocent appearance did not lead the accountant to suspect deceit and the check was readily marked. At another bank the boy was without a coat and told the accountant that he was in a hurry to get a few dollars on a check which he wished deposited to his account. Here he succeeded in getting \$15 more. At the National Trust com pany offices he tried the same method, on the Bank of Montreal, tendering two checks each of which called for \$50, The teller and accountant refused to cash them but put them to his account. They were later found to be worthless When asked for his address he gave a

number the premises of which are not occupied. When he called at the Union bank he again appeared to be in a hurry, but the teller insisted that the young crook be properly identified.

Simple Methods Banish Suspicion. The boy, who was apprehended at Edmonton, is a native of Buffalo, N. Y. Although he wears knickerbockers and a boyish smile, young Walter was sufficiently clever to defraud Canadian hill. They were bones of a man, a banking institutions out of sums of money which in the aggregate are believed to total several thousand dollars. He would approach paying tellers at the different banks, he visited. generally during the rush hours, and after presenting a check would ask for cash, saying that the check was drawn on his savings account. In many cases the hurried teller, never suspecting deceit from a small boy, would hand over the bills without further question. Did he adhere strictly to the rules and tell the lad that he must have the check marked by the ledger keeper. Walter would approach that individual, press through the crowd that surrounded him as closing time approached and standing on tiptoe would proffer his paper with the request in a boyish treble, "Please mark this." A glance at the lad's frank face, a hurried imprint of the blue stamp, and Walter had in his possession a perfectly good

The favorite amount for which the boy crook made out his bogus checks was \$50.

Zeil, in a confession made at Edmonton, admitted a number of robberjes in addition to his bank transac-

Walter is able to converse fluently in five different languages. He has admitted passing bogus checks in Niagara Falls, Buffalo, Lockport, Rochester. Edmonton.
