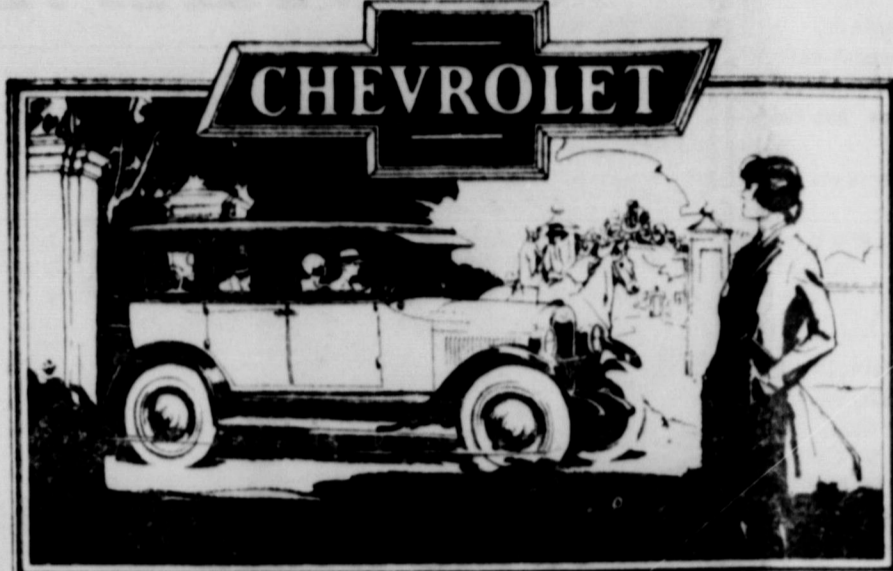

### TAX RATE CUT

Austin, Texas, July 19.—The State Automatic Tax Board for the first time since the closing of the administration of Gov. W. P. Hobby in 1920 Monday reduced the State tax rate trimming 12c off the general fund tax which had stood at the constitutional limit of 35c since the second year of the reign of Gov. Pat M. Neff and leaving a total rate of 65c against the present total of 77c.

The new rate will apply on tax payments to start Oct. 1.

The available school fund tax of 35c, the maximum and Confederate pension tax of 7c were not disturbed.

When Hobby administration closed the total was 62c, divided as follows: General revenue 22c available school fund, 25c and pension 5c. The first year of Gov. Neff administration saw no change in the rate but in the second year it was boosted to the constitutional limit of 75c and remained at that figure during the rest of the Neff term. By constitutional amendment the Confederate pension tax was raised from 5c to 7c which accounted for the present total of

77c.

Vote is 2 to 1

Fixing the 65c rate Monday was made by the tax board by a vote of 2 to 1.

Gov. Ferguson, who is chairman of the board, and State Comptroller S. E. Terrell voted for the reduction and Treasurer W. Gregory Hatcher, the other board member voted against a cut. Terrell offered the motion to reduce the tax. Others present at the meeting, held in the Governor's office were former Gov. Ferguson and Miss Marjorie Watson, chief clerk of the treasury.

Treasurer Hatcher opposed the reduction on the grounds that it would result in injury to the public schools. He urged that no change be made in the present rate.

### GOVERNOR RESIGNS

Austin, July 26.—The political fortunes which raised Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson from a quiet home in Temple, Texas, to the governorship are soon to turn her footsteps back to domestic life.

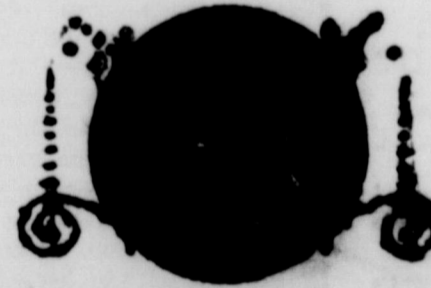
Governor Ferguson announced

Monday afternoon she would resign as a result of Saturday's primary in which Attorney General Dan Moody led her by more than 100,000 votes. She had promised to resign if Moody beat her one vote and he had promised to resign if she led him by 25,000 votes.

**Calls Special Term**  
Simultaneously with her resignation announcement, which also carried with it withdrawal from any possible primary runoff, Governor Ferguson called a special session of the Legislature to meet Sept. 13 to validate Texas district road bonds and to investigate any department of the State Government that the Legislature may see fit to investigate.

Her resignation will be effective just as soon as this special session has disposed of these matters the governor announced.

"I have determined that the lead of the opposition is so decisive that I would be doing violence to my own interests as well as to the interests of the people were I to further insist upon my candidacy," said her statement. "And I have no desire to further embroil the people in another campaign."

## Child's Health Maintained By Wholesome Diet

Modern educators are leaning more each year to the old Greek idea of rearing the citizens of the future. They are working on the principle of "a sound mind in a sound body."

Good health is built primarily on the foundation of right food. The sort of food the child has determines to a large extent the fitness of the man or woman.

Children have to be taught to like the foods that are good for them much in the same way that they have to be taught arithmetic and history. Boys and girls are not born with any particular desire for cereals or for bread. It's up to their parents to see that they learn the rudiments of a balanced diet and the reason for such a diet. Firmness and patience are often necessary in the teaching, but the job must be done.

Many mothers unconsciously put their children under health handicaps by allowing them to use their own discretion in the matter of eating candy, fruit, nuts and cookies. By so



doing they set a precedent in the matter of other foods and make the teaching of good nutrition harder.

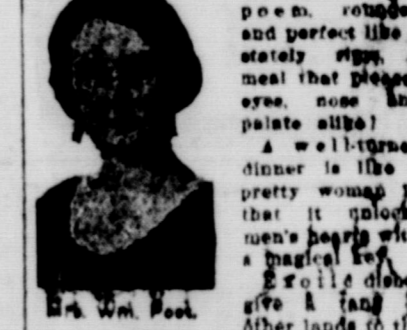
One or two articles are not enough to supply a child's needs for a meal. In order that there be normal development, there must be variety.

Fresh eggs, whole cereals, fruits in season and leafy vegetables should occupy an important part in the growing child's dietary. Then, too, a certain amount of concentrated food is necessary for children, because rapid growth whets their appetites to a razor edge, so that they crave more food than their systems can well dispose of. Evaporated milk, diluted with orange juice as a drink, or in custards or other baked foods, is especially beneficial for the growing child for the reason that it is concentrated to double the richness of ordinary cow's milk and is entirely sterile as well. The can of evaporated milk solves the problem of obtaining perfectly pure milk, as well as the problem of lack of refrigeration facilities, since this type of milk will keep indefinitely in the can.

## Livestock Quarantine

Be it remembered that on this 8th day of July, 1926, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Crockett County met at Court House in Ozona in special session, all the members of said Court being present, whereupon the following order and judgment was duly passed by said Court and spread upon the minutes.

"Ordered by the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, that whereas this county has two resident cattle and sheep inspectors duly commissioned by the State Livestock Sanitary Commission and have heretofore been instructed by this Court zealously to protect the livestock of Crockett county from infection by foreign livestock, and whereas, it has come to the notice of this Court that stomach worm, a malignant disease, now exists among some of the domestic animals in certain counties in West Texas, and also that anthrax exists in a mild form among some domestic animals in West Texas, the said inspectors are ordered to inspect all sheep and cattle entering Crockett county, and to issue written permission to enter all found clean and free from scab, fever ticks, stomach worms and anthrax, but to refuse entrance of any animals, flocks, herds or droves of livestock found infected with one or more of such malignant diseases.

No further business appearing, the Court adjourned sine die."
