Needed Rains In Ranch Area Sound **Note Of Optimism**

Prospects Of Industry Brighten With Falls Of Past Week

Rains, falling in scattered sections at intervals for the past week, soaking most of the livestock raising section of West Texas, have brought back the bloom of confidence to the cheek of the industry, and, together with rising markets, have served to brighten the outlook for the balance of 1938

The rains settled down to soak the Ozona country Wednesday night, and, according to meager reports available this morning. were covering most of the ranch area. Falling slowly through the early hours this morning, the rains soaked the range country, becoming heavier after daylight. morning had amounted to nearly

Although the town of Ozona has missed most of the rains of the past few days, the surrounding country has, for the most part, received bountiful falls. The Barnhart area to the north received soaking rains early in the week and heavy falls were reported to the west and south, drenching sections that were badly in need of

The rains over the area resulted in a sharp tumble of temperature, bringing an almost fall-like tang to the atmosphere Wednesday. Continued low-hanging clouds give promise of additional mois-

These two mother cats, each with one or more kittens of her own, take turns at mothering a wild javelina pig which Mr. Morrison captured and brought to the ranch house as a pet for his son, Chappo.

The javelina pig was captured when not more than a day old. Despite his extreme youth, and the days he has spent among the cats and chickens and even a dog that roams the ranch house yard, the little wild porker shows every evidence of having inherited a vicious disposition common to members of his

Salt Recommended To Prevent Protration From Excessive Heat

Austin, July 20-If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration, add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take to help prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims as the Texas thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fag. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating. Alcoholic drinks should be avoided.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the adbominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea, and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur with out the knowledge of the indivi dual until there is a deficiency then the abdominal muscles be




