### ELROD BUYS MORE LAMBS

Ships 1,000 Ewes Sunday to Kansas and Colorado

Jess Elrod, San Angelo livestock commission dealer, has purchased an additional 4,000 lambs within the past few days. He shipped 1,000 ewes Sunday in four double-decked cars from Barnhart to Kansas and Colorado points.

Seven hundred and fifty mutton lambs and 350 ewe lambs were purchased by Mr. Elrod from W. M. Odom of Ozona. He bought 250 mutton lambs from J. H. Clark of Mertzon and 2,900 mixed lambs from Dock Friend of Ozona by delivery between Sept. 20 and Sept. 10. Six hundred and twenty-five mutton lambs were bought from Jay Montague of San Angelo. —San Angelo Standard.

## New Buildings Being Rushed To Completion

### New Hotel to Be Ready in Few Weeks, Work Rushed On Other Structures

The building rush in Ozona is getting down to business with several new brick business houses, the new hotel and the Methodist church rapidly nearing completion. With this activity at its peak rumors were afloat of several new projects in contemplation, with at least one from outside capital.

The walls are going up for the one-story brick building being erected for Mrs. Paul Perner. The building is 90x100 feet and will house five firms. Anderson Bros. of El Paso are the contractors. Fire last year destroyed the building located on the site of the new structure now going up.

Seventy-five per cent of the plastering has been completed on the new three-story Hotel Ozona and plans are said to be under consideration for the opening November 1. Delay in the arrival of some of the materials for trimming has held up the work slightly. Most of the furniture and all of the kitchen equipment are on hand. Swartz and Hamberlin of San Angelo are the architects.

The walls are going up rapidly for Joe Oberkamp's new building next to the Ozona National Bank and Mr. Oberkamp is planning on getting into the new location by the 15th of next month. The building has a basement and will be one of the most attractive business structures in the city when completed.

The First Methodist Church, being erected by Anderson Bros. of El Paso, will be completed in the next few weeks, it is declared. The finishing touches are being put on the structure and it is already looming up as one of the prettiest church buildings in this section.

The foundation has been laid for the new building being constructed for W. E. Smith, druggist, to house a second store. The Smith building is located on the corner lot across from the Dudley garage. Work on this building has been held up waiting for contractors and workmen at work on the Oberkamp building. As soon as the latter structure is completed work will be pushed on the Smith building.

In addition to the building work, Ozona is taking on a business like air in another sense. Gravel has been dumped on the main street for the purpose of smoothing out some of the rough places and getting it in good shape. The work is being done under the supervision of the county.

## Scattered Rains Help Range Grass

Scattered rains that will be of great benefit to the range in sections visited by the somewhat elusive Jupe Pluve during the past week have been reported from a considerable portion of West Texas. Ozona was visited by a fall amounting to about a half inch Monday and although this immediate territory was skipped by the heavier rains, from one to two inches of moisture were reported from some sections.

A belt through San Angelo and Barnhart reported heavy rains, while the territory in the direction of Junction and Sonora also enjoyed good falls. The fall was scattered in Crockett county but considerable territory in dire need of moisture was visited.

## Crockett Roads Good Condition

Crockett County roads are in fair condition, says Judge Davidson. A ten-ton tractor and a grader are being used on the Ozona-Barnhart road, but owing to heavy traffic it is difficult to keep the graded stretch smooth. This road is a connecting link between State Highway No. 99 at Barnhart and the Old Spanish Trail at Ozona, and is not designated state highway, although the main outlet of Crockett County and Ozona to the north.

Judge Davidson and Houston S. Smith are here for the trial of the civil suit of T. R. Henderson vs. R. L. Glaser, trespass to try title which was on call in District Court Monday morning. Henderson seeks possession of a section of land in Crockett, to which he received a deed of trust from Geo. Crothers, according to his petition. The case was transferred from Crockett to Tom Green Counties on a change of venue mainly for the convenience of the bar, but has been continued at each term of court for two years, Judge Davidson said.—San Angelo Standard.

## Church Ratifies Sale of Property

At the meeting of the special quarterly conference of the Methodist Church of this city to ratify the sale of the old Pleas Childress was ratified according to the pastor, Rev. Haver. The \$2,500 realized by the church in the transaction will be spent in the construction of the new church now nearly completed.

Every effort is being made by the members of the church to raise the additional \$13,000 still unpaid on the new building. Through the work of a special committee composed of Mrs. Pleas Childress, Mrs. Will Baggett, Mrs. John Bailey, Mrs. Lee Childress, P. S. Seahorse and the Rev. Stanley Haver, \$8,000 has been raised this past week. Also the people of San Angelo have contributed \$1,200. It is expected that other contributions will make up the needed sum before long.

If this is done it will make possible the dedication of the church by Bishop Moore immediately before or after the session of the entire West Texas Conference which is set to be held at San Angelo from October 27 to November 2 with over 400 ministerial and lay delegates present. Because of the nearness of the conference it will enable large numbers of former pastors and prominent ministers of the church to be present for this important occasion who could not come otherwise, Rev. Haver declared.

## Hi Enrollment Drops Slightly From Last Year

### Fifty Per Cent "Turn Over" in Teachers Reported by Supt. Minatra.

School opened Monday morning, September 6, with a heavy attendance, Supt. C. C. Minatra reports. Informal addresses were made by Judge C. E. Davidson and Rev. Haver at the opening exercises. Judge Davidson urged pupils to persistent effort in their work. Rev. Haver stressed the value of religious education and outlined in a general way the work of the week-day school.

Of these teachers, Mrs. Smith, Miss Evans, Miss Burton, Miss Kaderit, Miss Thompson, Mr. Kirkpatrick and Supt. Minatra are experienced in the local schools. The other teachers are all new to the work. Thus, the "turn-over" of teachers totals exactly fifty per cent.

Every teacher has had at least two years' experience. Every teacher in the high school is a college graduate, some of them with additional graduate work. No elementary teacher has had less than two years of college training, most of them considerably more. The training average is decidedly superior to that found in the survey reports as the average for Texas teachers.

The enrollment presents several problems. The high school registration is light—only twenty-six—about twelve per cent lighter than last year. It is the equal of the initial enrollment of any year previous to last, however. A peculiar feature is the heavy all-girl senior class enrollment of nearly one-fourth the high school total.

The elementary school registered as follows by grades:

First grade, 25; second grade, 18; third grade, 25; fourth grade, 23; fifth grade, 27; sixth grade, 29; seventh grade, 27.

The total of 156 pupils in the elementary school gives 93 or exactly one-half to the upper three grades. These are the rooms that are small at best and unsuited to heavy enrollment. The lower four grades with ample rooms, register only a light attendance.

### Ozona Gridsters Do Battle With Winters Friday

### Purple and Gold Warriors in Trim For First Battle of Season There.

Moleskin clad warriors flaunting the Purple and Gold of the Ozona High School will trot out on the field of combat for the first grid contest of the season Friday when they journey to Winters to meet the fast high school eleven there, according to Coach J. S. McCreary. Although most of them are raw recruits, the locals are showing up good after two weeks of hard practice, Coach McCreary said. Under the guidance of the coach and Principal John W. Bishop, the squad has been out every afternoon for the last two weeks at the fair grounds for an hour or two of strenuous practice in preparation for the opening of the season.

Ozona's buckies who will uphold the local high's claims to glory on the gridiron this year are a bit light, the coach declared, but he hopes to make up for their weight with speed and pep. The lads are showing plenty of pep and ginger and are likely to cause some championship contenders considerable worry before the season is far advanced.

Robert Augustine is captain of this year's team and is working hard to put the squad in shape. Movement of Crockett County lambs for shipping continued active during the past week and as the week closes the road to the Barnhart shipping point is lined with flocks of fat mutton and ewe lambs being trailed to the railroad.

An idea of the rate at which the 1926 crop is being moved from this section may be gained from the report of J. B. Westfall, weigher at Barnhart, of the shipments on Wednesday alone. Between 8,000 and 9,000 head were loaded at Barnhart that day, the report shows and the pens were crowded Thursday with many shippers on the road.

Among the Crockett county ranchers loading lambs at Barnhart Wednesday were W. R. and J. M. Bargett, who delivered 1,623 head of muttons to Jess Elrod of San Angelo. The lambs averaged a little over 66 pounds. Ralph Watson loaded 1,330 head of mutton lambs, averaging around 66 pounds, for Boswell and Kahn of Fort Worth.

S. S. Millspaugh delivered 595 head of muttons consigned to Jess Elrod, the animals averaging about 65 pounds.

O. W. Word consigned 602 ewe lambs, averaging nearly 68 pounds, to Boswell and Kahn.

George Murphy loaded 430 head, averaging about 57 pounds, to Boswell and Kahn.

E. F. Noelke delivered 428 head, averaging around 57 pounds, to Jess Elrod.

O. W. Word loaded 1,103 head, averaging nearly 73 pounds, to Boswell and Kahn.

S. S. Millspaugh consigned 78 head of aged muttons to Jess Elrod. Other movements reported were 300 head of mutton lambs by Boswell and Kahn to Middletown, 600 head by Boswell and Kahn to Humes, 625 ewe lambs by Boswell and Kahn to Claude Linthicum and 911 head of mutton lambs by Claude Linthicum to Boswell and Kahn.

Paul Perner, Pat Lee, H. B. Cox and others shipped several thousand head earlier in the week. H. B. Cox delivered about 1,800 head of ewes to Henry Moore, of Pecan county, Tuesday. George Harrell delivered about 1,100 ewes to J. J. North of Ozona, who is trailing them across country to his ranch in Terrell county. W. E. Cooper of Las Animas, Colo. received at Barnhart Wednesday about 2,900 ewes purchased from Clayton Bros.

A. W. Clayton, Pat Lee, H. B. Baker and H. B. Cox. The lamb crop is moving out early this year and it is estimated that more than 75 per cent of the crop has already been sold, most of it going at 10 cents. The market is a little stronger now, however, and buyers are reported offering 10 1/2 and 11 cents.

## Mohair Buyers Get No Takers

Mohair buyers in the section, offering fifty cents a pound for grown hair, more than ten cents a pound lower than was given in the spring are meeting with no response, according to reports here. The buyers are reported to have offered to "stand the rise" in price. The buyers are beginning to arrive here and daily the faces of the men who have for years been buying the mohair are being looked for. In the meantime, the shearing of goats is going on at a rapid rate. The quality of the hair is good and such men as Bob Davis down at Rio Flro, one of the leading goat men in the State, says they expect at least sixty cents a pound for their grown hair. No offers of contracts for the kid hair are reported here.—San Angelo Standard.

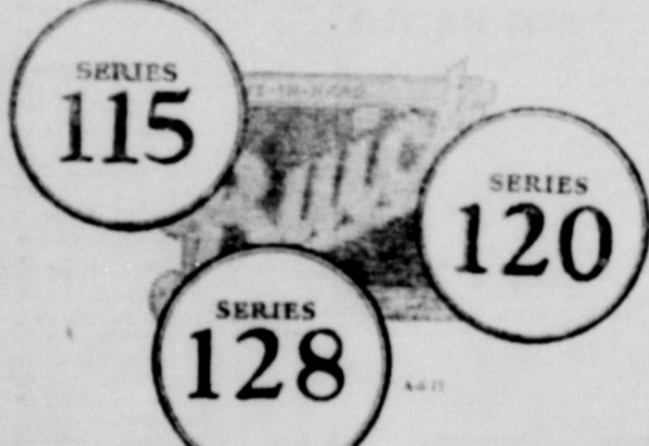

**Quarantine**

Be it remembered that on this 8th day of July, 1926, the Honorable Commissioners Court of Crockett County met at the Court House in Ozona in special session, all the members of said Court being present, whereupon the following order and judgment was duly passed by said Court and spread upon the minutes.

"Ordered by the Commissioners Court of Crockett County, Texas, that whereas this county has two resident cattle and sheep inspectors duly commissioned by the State Livestock Sanitary Commission and have heretofore been instructed by this Court zealously to protect the livestock of Crockett county from infection by foreign livestock, and, whereas, it has come to the notice of this Court that stomach worm, a malignant disease, now exists among some of the domestic animals in certain counties in West Texas, and also that anthrax exists in a mild form among some domestic animals in West Texas, the said inspectors are ordered to inspect all sheep and cattle entering Crockett county, and to issue written permission to enter all found clean and free from scab, fever ticks, stomach worms and anthrax, but to refuse entrance of any animals, flocks, herds or droves of livestock found infected with one or more of such malignant diseases.

No further business appearing, the Court adjourned sine die."
