Villa Says Does Not Want Revenge

Villa has sent word that he will not retaliate on the Americans by raiding their side of the border, following the attack by U. S. Troops on Villa forces at the investment of Juarez. Of course, Villa understands and appreciates the fact that such retaliation on his part would be suicidal. But we cannot afford, either, to ignore the fact that Villa has been more considerate of American rights and feelings than the Carrancistas, although the government of this country has uniformly antagonized him. At any rate, it is well that every border city, town and ranch is being guarded by American troops, and detachments are scouting along the full line of the river to prevent any invasion. Small patrols of troops are in

constant motion, and the entire front is under strong military guard. The request of Governor Hobbs that Texas troops be mobilized to guard the river line was rejected. The Federal government announces that it has a great many more troops now under arms and in the service than the situation requires. T. P. Begin Actual Oil Operations

Oil prospects are brighter for immediate results in Crockett and adjoining counties than they have ever been. Actual work is beginning on several locations, and the towers and derricks are coming in.

On Blake Mauldin's ranch the derrick and tower have been completed and all is ready for the beginning of drilling.

Superintendent E. B. Kirk, of the Ryan Petroleum Co., New York, is here and preparing to prospect on the location on Roy Henderson's range right away. Material for the derrick is now on the ground and being erected. The heaviest rig yet known in this section is coming in, and is expected daily, having been shipped from Okmulgee, Okla.

Ozona Maintains Healthy Growth

Ozona continues improving right along. In fact, this town, under war, drought, or any other conditions, has never even seemed to hesitate.

The Christian Church is preparing to erect a handsome church building on their fine lots on Main St., south of the big school building. The plans have been selected and it is hoped soon to be prepared to let the contract for a house to cost something like six or seven thousand dollars. The material will be rock or brick, preferably rock.

Mrs. Mary Meinecke has the foundations laid for a several-room addition to her home on the West Side.

Among the real estate deals of the past week Joe North purchased the fine home of Rob Miller. Price \$4,500. Mr. North also bought a large lot from Mrs. Maggie Odom, 100 by 113 feet. Price \$500.

Property owners on the east side of South Powell Avenue are preparing to build cement sidewalks from the Fred Montgomery place to Broadway.

Ford Coates is planning to build a nice home, but the lot has not yet been selected.

In the Mexican part of town quite a lot of improvement is going on.

They have a twenty-inch casing, and Mr. Kirk states that it will not bother him at all to go four thousand feet deep, if necessary.

Rigs have arrived across country from Menard to begin drilling on the Massie Upper ranch. Material arrived yesterday, Wednesday, which was the last date allowed on contract. Eddy Ludlow & Thomas, of Stephenville, Texas, and Tulsa, Oklahoma, have this contract, and Manager Winfrey is here from Stephenville to get busy on this proposition.

Eddy, Ludlow & Thomas also have located sites on the Davidson ranch, south of Ozona, and the John Cannon ranch on the Pecos, material, etc., to be on the ground ready for business not later than next Monday night, June 30.

Capt. Beauvier, field man of the Ryan Petroleum Co., who has been in Ozona for some time, is now in New York personally reporting on this field to his principals.

Everything is in a way to be satisfactorily prepared for Ozona and Crockett county to have happy times next week, beginning Thursday morning, the 3rd, and continuing until Saturday night midnight of the 5th, to celebrate the return (and immediately prospective return) of the soldiers of Crockett, Upton and Reagan counties.

It is hoped that there will be enough of the boys in uniform to make a full company, and these will be drilled by Lieut. Smith, if they will agree to give us that pleasure.

The mayor of Ozona has authorized The Stockman to say that the town and everything in it will belong to the soldiers for three days, and then for as much longer as they can afford to stay with us. The chief of police has closed up shop already and gone fishing and the city marshal is taking a lay-off, so turn yourselves loose. And so are all the rest of you welcome.

The Red Cross and the citizens have enough money and meats in hand to give everybody who will come help us celebrate a good time, and plenty barbecue.

Of course the Mexico mess should be cleaned up.

Question of the Hour: "Going to help Ozona celebrate?"

Text for Today: "He that is slow to anger is better than the mighty; and he that ruleth his spirit than he that taketh a city." Proverbs 16:32.

You see Claud got that half million appropriation through to destroy predatory animals. He is a man who DOES things.

The suggestion that the Mexican scappers be not allowed to pull off their Kilkenny cat fights within five miles of the international boundary line is some funny when you come to think of it. The bullet from a high-power modern rifle don't get into full speeding under five miles.

The people of this Mexican border have cause to congratulate themselves that, at last, they have a representative at Washington who is not only intimately familiar with conditions along the Rio Grande, but has the courage and the determination to tell the Washington people all about such conditions and just what we need. The fact that this country could interfere with Costa Rican, Nicaraguan, Russian, and many other countries' affairs, and yet has seen fit to ignore the miserable conditions right at its doors for the past seven years, is a source of wonder and amusement to the civilized world, and of worry and distress to our own citizens here who are continually injured and harassed. Congressman Hudspeth may be depended upon to tell the Washington authorities the true situation. Wish we could as confidently depend upon them listening.

"REBEL," OR "PATRIOT," WHICH?

The sentiments of the majority of the people in Mexico, and in this country too, are in favor and in sympathy with Villa in his fight for the liberties of the people of his unfortunate country. The Carranza crowd are rottener and more dangerous, if anything, than the Villa outfit.

There would probably be little objection to United States troops crossing into Mexico and cleaning up on the entire bunch, but, that one faction of the Mexicans should be singled out for attack, when all are equally vicious and criminal, is unreasonable and unjust. It is the easiest thing in the world for the Carranza partisans to fire into Texas and swear that it was Villa "bandits." Were those bullets that got into El Paso marked "Villa"? Bosh!

Even if they were Villa bullets, an assumption which no one could honestly swear to, the Carranza people are just as bad. Villa controls all Northern Mexico and would control the towns and cities right on the river if it were not for Uncle Sam's protection of Carranza—and all we get for it is contempt and insult.

If Villa shall finally succeed, and his prospects appear bright, he will be, in Mexican history, a "great patriot." If he fails, he will always be known as a "rebel." That is the difference.

The Sanderson Times remarks that "when the finishing touches" are put on that Susan B. Anthony amendment, "it will be interesting to follow the something else that the good women of the Nation will turn their attention to." Mrs. Ayers should not let it disturb her. The good women of the Nation are not in politics, as a rule, and their attention will not be turned from their God-given mission of bearing better babies and raising better children for the future hope of the world.

Villa states that he had Juarez taken when the Americans butted in. His men did not shoot across the river. It was done by Carranza soldiers to get the Villistas into trouble with this country. Villa says he sent his men up the river from the east, and they had special instructions not to shoot toward the American side, fully appreciating that such action would be suicidal. He says three-fourths of the Mexican people are with him in his fight, and if the Americans would just hands off and not help the Carrancistas, he would control and pacify Mexico within six months.

Sold to Will Noelke, of Irion county, for Rob and Roy Miller of Crockett county 150 cows at \$45, and for W. Miller 50 two-year-old steers at \$50.

Joe Blakeney shipped from Barnhart to Kansas City last Friday 746 mutton goats, and to Fort Worth Monday 460 mutton sheep. No returns have been received up to The Stockman's press hour, on account of the telegraphers' strike.

The sale of the Massie "Lower Ranch" of fifty sections, together with all stock, etc., by Robert Massie to T. A. Kincaid, was announced in The Stockman last week as probable. It is now confirmed, but the parties to the deal are not yet ready to give out the particulars, as the transfer will not be definitely concluded until next week.

It has been raining at least once every week for two months in this section, and to say that it rained is no longer news. However, it has been raining every day lately for a change. These rains are all spotted. Never has been so much rain here, but it falls in spots. Right here in Ozona last Sunday, for instance, it rained to beat Billy on the north side of the park and only sprinkled on the south side. Both Brooklyn and Garley rivers came down in a regular flood.

With the compliments of the Sheep and Goat Raisers' Magazine, published by Josh Billings at Menard, The Stockman duly received the following invitation: "Mr. and Mrs. Sheep and Goat Raisers request the honor of your company at the marriage of their adopted daughter, Miss Delaine Sheep to Mr. Angora Goat on the morning of Wednesday the twenty-fifth of June, at half past eight o'clock, at their home in San Angelo, Texas, President Jeff Moore officiating, Secretary Stricklen giving the bride away.

After a brief visit to his Crockett county ranch properties, Robert Massie returned Tuesday to San Angelo, where another big wool sale will be consummated this week by the great company of which he is president—the Wool Growers' Central Storage Company. The company has already sold about 800,000 pounds of long wool, but not any short wool yet. On account of the difficulty of securing shearers, the shearing is not by any means finished, and will not be for several weeks yet. At a rough estimate, Mr. Massie says, his company will expect to handle one and a half million pounds of wool.



VOTE \$250,000 FOR GOOD COUNTY ROADS

The regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will be held at the Court House next Tuesday night, July 1, at 8 o'clock. At this meeting the all-important question of GOOD ROADS will come up for discussion.

Crockett county must not be left behind in the progressive rush of West Texas counties. All the other counties are voting bonds of several hundred thousands each. A minimum estimate of this county's needs, compared to what other neighboring counties are doing, is a quarter of a million. With State and Federal aid, this will give us a half million to spend.

If the bonds are not voted, and the roads put in first-class condition, Ozona will be left on a sidetrack. We are now on the Robert E. Lee Highway, the El Paso and San Antonio route, the "Old Spanish War Trail."

County to Issue \$250,000 Bonds

Representative W. W. Stuart, of the 120th Legislative district, and B. W. Vanderen, president of the Toyah Valley Good Roads Association, both of Balmorhea, were in town Tuesday evening, and left yesterday morning, Mr. Stuart to go on to Austin and Mr. Vanderen returning home.

These gentlemen were enroute to a prospective good roads meeting at Sonora, but the meeting at Sonora, but the meeting did not materialize, on account of the threatening weather east of Ozona, the sheep and goat raisers' meeting in San Angelo, and other causes.

Secretary Cox, of the Ozona Chamber of Commerce, rounded up a number of citizens and talked the good roads question over at the court house Tuesday night with the result that a petition will be presented to the next session of Crockett county Commissioners' Court to order an election to issue road bonds for a couple of hundred thousand dollars.

The issue should be for two hundred and fifty thousand dollars. This amount will be supplemented by State and Federal funds in an equal proportion—thus giving us a fund of half a million to spend on good roads in this county.

A mass meeting will be held at the court house next Tuesday night to discuss this matter. The regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce will also then be held.

"A defeated nation is being violated, body and soul, to the horror of the world. We will sign but our hope to the last breath is that this attempt against our honor will recoil against its authors."

President Wilson, it is stated, will declare demobilization completed, wartime prohibition therefore automatically inoperative.





Situation on the Mexican Border

Our representative in Congress, Claud B. Hudspeth, succeeded in telling the third assistant clerk to the fourth assistant secretary to the second assistant secretary of State, at Washington, a few of the facts that express our situation here on the Texas border. This was getting pretty close, considering the fact Secretary of State Lansing, and the rest of the American royalties, are living high in European palaces, and only take time to cable occasionally: "WE SHOULD WORRY!"

At any rate, what Hudspeth told the clerk was the truth, and it has been sent out to the American people through the faithful press of the Nation.

Here it is: "Permitting U. S. troops to enter Mexico and then, at once, withdraw them, constitutes nothing less than an outrage."

"This course has greatly endangered American lives and property, making the situation for Americans more precarious than ever before. The Villa forces, feeling now that they have a just grievance against the Americans for assisting their enemies, will now consider revenge and retaliation justifiable, and will seek it at the earliest possible moment. Instead of American interests being assured of safety, they have been endangered."

"Our people feel that the American government ought to protect them, wherever they may be and this action will have the very opposite effect."

"The government has also made a very painful mistake in making profuse apologies to Carranza. No apology was necessary, and it will not be in the least appreciated. On the contrary, it will be misinterpreted and given wide publicity in Mexico as another example of 'American cowardice,' and the Carranza faction's insults will continue worse than ever."

Hudspeth left the department of State "very much discouraged."

Mexicans Wrathful

El Paso.—That U. S. troops crossing the border only served to stir up enmity toward this country is indicated by the actions of Mexicans toward Americans who have gone to Juarez since the troops were withdrawn. Workmen who crossed over the river to repair street car tracks were assaulted by Mexicans and forced to flee to the bridge and seek protection from the soldiers.

Business men with civil passports and military passes have been denied entrance. At each bridge Mexicans threatened to confiscate American automobiles entering Juarez. El Paso citizens with interests in Juarez were spit upon by Mexican women and stoned and cursed by boys.

Mexicans openly declare that United States soldiers shot up adobe homes and other property, and killed Carranza soldiers. All damage done in Juarez is blamed to United States troops.


