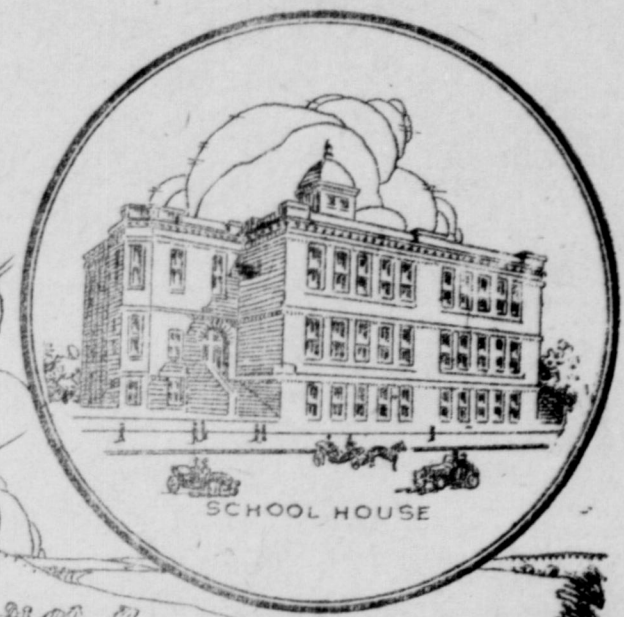
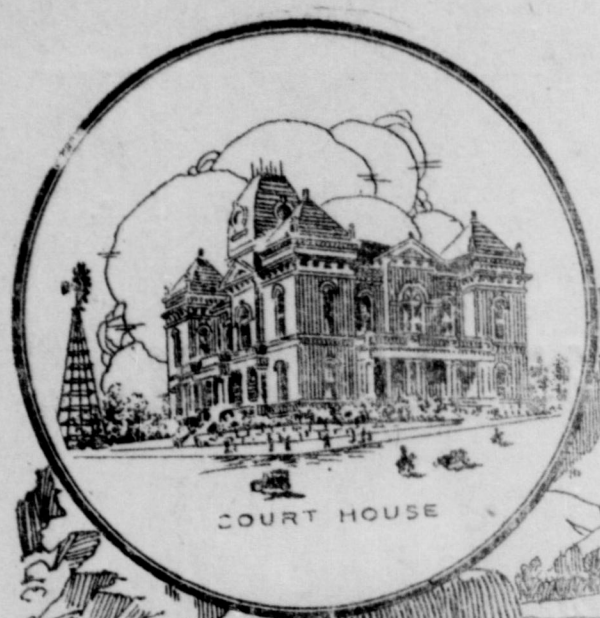

Barnhart is Growing

As remarked in the columns last week, Barnhart grows rapidly and substantially, and our friends there all as busy as bees and hois larks.

Going into town many directions of course, that the ad says—it is the final thing to do—you "Drop to the Drugstore." Then find Dr. Helbing, or an agent, ready to serve you "soght for your stomach's sake."

Back across the is again we find our long-time Ozona friends, Mr. and Mrs. Joslin, serving the best in the West (Friend Wife so) at the Joslin House, Missin is giving the Barnhart beautiful exhibition of Ozona and enterprise. In addition, the big hotel, and the bank, he is preparing for by twenty thousand in the new power house to supply Ozona with electric lights. The size of the building is to be 60 by 40.

Geo. W. Newberry, besides being vice-president of the First State Bank, is the presiding genius of the biggest general merchandise store in "that end of the county."

Then comes Clint. Shar's refreshment parlors, the big "Service Garage" of Ban Westfall and Roger Blaine.

Col. H. N. Garrett represents Uncle Samuel in the postoffice, and also sells lots of good goods cheap. He now has in process of construction, just across the street from his present location, a large two-story brick and rock

business house.

Tom Harris is in charge at the Old Reliable Barnhart Mercantile and Lumber Company, parent business of the Ozona Lumber Co., an institution owned by Ozona people, and which has sold more lumber and building material in this section during the past seven years than all others combined. Tom is making good, has a fine young family, and it is understood that he is to be the first mayor of Barnhart.

The ranchmen of Crockett and Irion counties are now organizing a wool storage company at Barnhart with a capital stock of fifty thousand dollars, quite a lot of which has been already subscribed. Through the efforts of President W. M. Noelke, of the First State Bank of Barnhart, a ninety-nine-year lease of a lot, 80 by 300 feet, on the railroad right-of-way has been secured from the Orient.

It is hoped to arrange a community of interests between the new wool storage company and the local bank whereby energies of both may be mutually conserved and necessary labor in operation economized.

And this brings us to the bank, where we might very well have started. Cashier O. A. Carr is

the right man in the right place. He says he's going to make some money for his stockholders, and it is a safe bet that he'll do it, too. In fact this pretty little baby bank has made a record already of remarkable development that has made the stockholders feel good, and is a fine advertisement for its location and for its management.

During the first thirty days of its existence the First State Bank of Barnhart showed a net surplus of more than seven hundred dollars over all expenses. The capital stock is only twenty-five thousand dollars. The current financial statement, issued June 30th, shows the net resources to be \$88,012.63; loans \$67,745.75; deposits \$62,188.00. How's that?

The site of the old Talley Hotel has been purchased and the house is being moved to make room for a new brick and stone bank building 25 by 80 feet.

School Election is Called Off

After ordering the School Tax Election for July 21st, and posting the notices, the Commissioner's Court discovered that a similar election was held May 5th, 1913, and the tax proposed to be voted at the election had as a matter of fact been voted as far back as May 5th, 1913. So there will be no election in any part of Crockett county before the Primary election on Saturday, July 24th.

On request of many voters at the Phillips box, known as Election Precinct No. 5, said Election Precinct No. 5 has been consolidated with Election Precinct No. 1, and all parties heretofore voting at the Phillips box will hereafter vote at the Courthouse in Ozona. Election Precinct No. 6 has been consolidated with Election Precinct No. 3 and will vote at the old Hat ranch on Live Oak creek now owned by Mr. M. Tippet. Formerly voters residing in Election Precinct No. 6

We have ascertained from the First National Bank where his account as secretary have been kept, that there is actually on deposit said bank on this date said sum of money.

We desire to make the following recommendations: 1st: That the secretary-treasurer be furnished a bound receipt for the receipts to be numbered and in duplicate, and the secretary to be required to give a receipt for each payment by him received, and a copy of said receipt be retained by him.

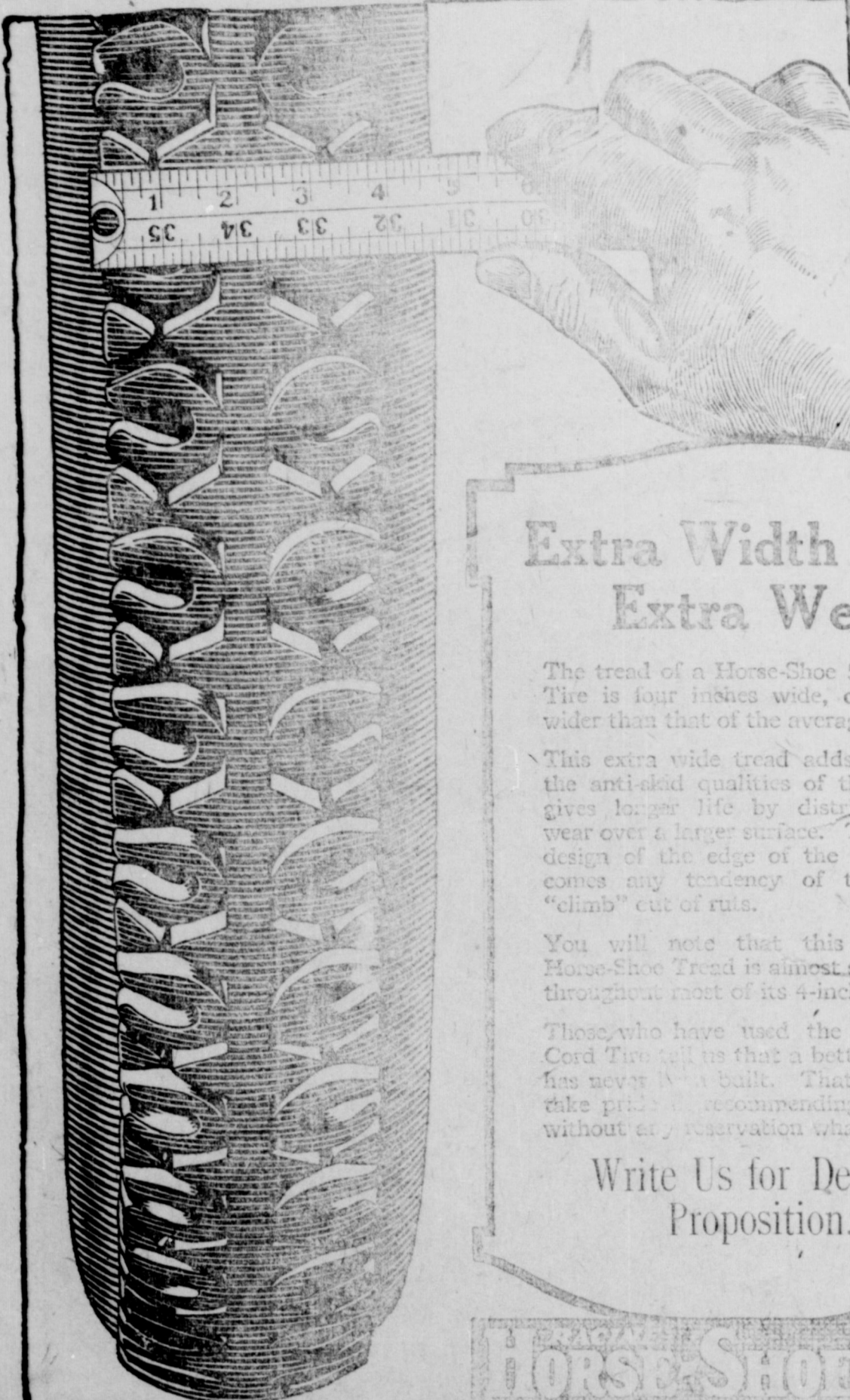
