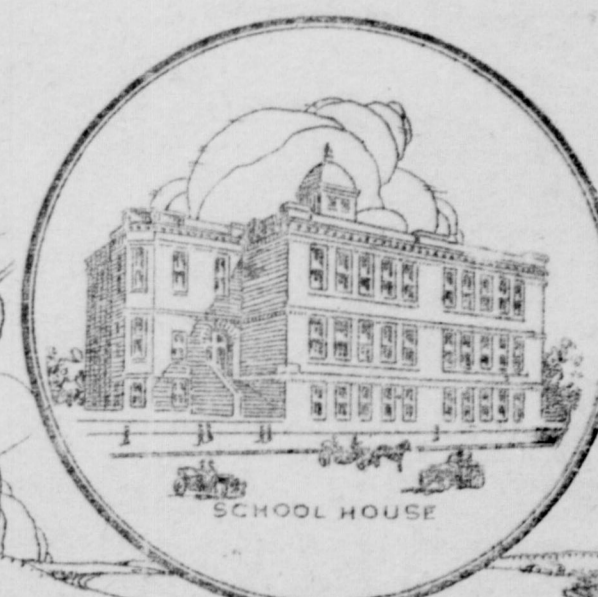
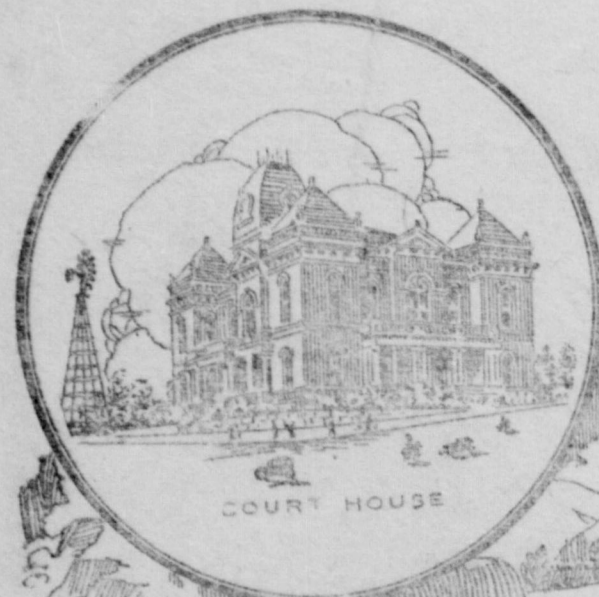

## News and Notes for Busy Readers

Terence McSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, Ireland, completes fifty-fifth day of hunger strike.

Cuba will have a presidential election Monday, November 1.

The Zionist organization is appealing to the Jews of the world to help rebuild Jerusalem.

Japan is taking its first census. The population of the empire has heretofore been estimated.

El Paso Herald says lots of us have not sat for our photos, but many of us have been done in oil.

Chicago banks are using armored cars to transport money, on account of the bandit epidemic.

Viscount Grey, former ambassador to the United States from Great Britain, says that Ireland should be given a fuller home rule.

Pancho Villa, ex revolutionist in Mexico, has bought more than sixty thousand dollars' worth of American-made machinery for his farms in Durango.

1,000 Texas cattle will be shipped to Germany to restock devastated areas. The first shipment will go from Galveston next week.

Nick Kaklikakis, a Greek of San Angelo, was shot dead by a masked man on the sidewalk, as he was nearing his home last Wednesday night. His slayer has not been apprehended.

It is now a practical certainty that there will be no reduction of taxes on business until after the inauguration of a new president. Any changes in the law then effected will apply to the calendar year 1921.

The first annual Sabinal Fair, September 29th and 30th, is reported to have been a big success, notwithstanding wet weather. C. A. Pepper, of Edwards county, won the prize for the best four goats.

Del Rio will celebrate two days, October 12th and 13th, next Tuesday and Wednesday, under the auspices of the Park Association. A big time is promised all who attend, and it is sure that the attendance will be considerable from this section.

A cat saved the life of John Jameson, a San Antonio railroad man. Jameson was sleeping in yard when he was awakened by the cat springing on his body. A rattlesnake was coiled near him ready to spring, when the cat jumped on the snake and worried it until Jameson recovered from his fright sufficiently to kill the reptile. Jameson wants a medal for the cat.

Cities are increasing in population seven and one-half times as fast as rural districts, the Census Bureau disclosed in a compilation of figures covering approximately 80 per cent of the new census.

## El Paso International Exposition

The El Paso International Exposition opened Monday morning and will close Saturday evening, the 9th. Two nations and three American States are taking part in this exposition, and it is a big thing in every way.

Tuesday was "Texas Day." The Governors of Texas, New Mexico and Arizona, and those of several of the Mexican border States, are supposed to have met and jollified.

Yesterday, Wednesday, was "Mexico Day," also "Editors' Day," and it was a big day all round. The editors of Texas, Arizona and New Mexico, and the governors of the Mexican border States were guests of honor. The famous Mexican band, of one hundred pieces, from the City of Mexico, furnished part of the musical program. This band is enroute to the State Fair at Dallas. Music is plentiful. The numerous military bands of Fort Bliss, the El Paso Municipal Band, the Juarez Garrison Band, the Chihuahua Orphans' Home band, the Mexican City Band, and others are touring the exposition.

## Galveston Docks Swept by Fire

Galveston, Sept. 30.—Lashed by a 30-mile-an-hour northeast wind and rendered difficult to cope with fumes from burning sulphur, the fire which started on the docks today was brought under control after doing damage estimated at between \$1,250,000 and \$1,000,000. The latter mark will be reached, according to underwriters, if the cargo of wheat of the Calian Steamship Company proves a total loss.

The fire originated in the plant of the Texas Gulf Sulphur Company at 2 o'clock and spread rapidly until all of pier 35 was ablaze. An explosion of oil drums in the plant of the sulphur company occurred shortly before firemen reached the scene and the plants of the Cotton Concentration Company, the Anchor Milling Company, and the superstructure of the Italian vessel Etna caught fire.

For a time the blaze menaced the entire west end of Galveston. Directly to the windward of the blaze and about four blocks distant were five tanks of the Magnolia Petroleum Company, each with a capacity of 50,000 barrels of oil.

## Blackjack Poorly Paid Women

Aberdeen, S. D.—Evidence showing that women clerks and stenographers are being "assessed" for the Democratic campaign fund has been uncovered here. There is a Federal law against collecting from female employees. Fourteen years ago women in the office of the Collector of Internal Revenue for South Dakota were called into a hotel room here yesterday and asked to contribute \$40 each to the Democratic campaign fund.

Each of the young women gave their check to the "collector," who gave the name of E. M. Waterbury of Centerville, S. D. and said he was acting for Clarence H. Mee, also of Centerville.

Mr. Mee is a member of the Democratic State Committee and the father of J. Walter Nee, Collector of Internal Revenue for South Dakota, in whose office the young women are employed. The other eight girls promised to send in their checks. Owing to the tactics used, this attempt to "blackjack" poorly paid women employees of the Government leaked out and Congressman Mee is being investigated as an "outrage." He sent a report of it to Republican National Headquarters in Chicago, and the matter was laid before the Senate Campaign Funds Committee.

**SOME OF THE THINGS I STAND FOR.**

I am a candidate for Congress, and the regular nominee of the Republican party for that office in this, the 16th, Congressional District of Texas.

I do not expect to be elected, Then why do I run?

I run as a protest against the custom, which appears to be regarded as a matter of course, of electing a Democratic Congressman in a district in which the Republicans are in a decided majority. I would be elected if the Republicans would vote the Republican ticket.

What is a Republican?  
A Republican is a person who is in favor of protecting our own industries and vital interests against all foreign competition. If we protect our wool, mohair, meats, hides, etc., against the importations from Australia, New Zealand and South America, we can get better prices for these products, we can spend more money, we can pay better prices for the necessities that the farmer produces, better prices for labor, live better and have more. Is not that a fact?

A Democrat is one who wants free trade. That means that all the world can come into this country, with the products of their cheap labor, and compete against our ranchmen here who must pay high wages and high prices generally.

I assert that two-thirds of the people of this district are in favor of protection, and are therefore Republicans. Yet, they vote the Democratic ticket, and in favor of free trade. If they do not vote for their own best interests, they ought to blame no one but themselves.

A protectionist is a Republican. Therefore I say that if all Republicans would vote their honest convictions I would be elected to Congress from the 16th Congressional District of Texas. It is a question of principle.

I am opposed to the League of Nations. If we continue to meddle with the affairs of Europe and the rest of the world, Europe and the rest of the world will consider it justifiable to meddle with ours. I believe we, as a Nation, should be true to our own business and let other countries do the same thing. The League would mean that the young men of this country would be continually fighting, suffering, dying, in foreign countries to maintain quarrels with which we have nothing to do. I believe we ought to have peace with Germany and peace with all mankind.

I do not hate the German people simply because the Kaiser wanted to rule the world, and I do not believe that the people of Germany endorsed the Kaiser in his unholy ambitions any more than we endorse President Wilson in keeping us at war with Germany until we swallow his League of Nations monstrosity that he made on his own responsibility and initiative, and without any authority from the people, or the government, of this country.

I believe in State's Rights. And our great President (that is to be) Warren G. Harding, promises he will help restore such rights to us. The people of this country believe in State's Rights. Congress and the State legislatures have robbed us of such rights.

I would hold myself a cowardly recreant if I should fail to endorse the great principle of human liberty comprehended by the term, "States' Rights,"—that principle for which my father fought and suffered, my mother endured heart-breaking despair, and my beloved South spent four dreadful years in the valley of the shadow of death. It does not comfort me to reflect that the North is now pleading for the rights of which they fought to deprive us, and that Southern legislatures have forced prohibition over the people of the North against their will. If the South has turned the tables upon the North, that does not make it right. I do not hate the Yankees. If any man in the South could furnish a reason for hatred of the Yankees, I can. I was born in the city of Mobile. Everything the family possessed was in Southeastern Mississippi and Southwestern Alabama. The family was ruined, and everything destroyed. My aunt Dora Dees, my mother's youngest sister, perished in the flames set by Yankee soldiers. My people were in the lowest depths of grief and despair. But I do not hate the Yankees. Those brave northern soldiers did not know the child was in the burning building, and many of them were stricken with grief and horror.

All wars are brutal. I want no more wars. I am only willing for this country to fight when it is compelled to do so in defense of our rights. Then I am Irish enough to want to shake hands and make up as soon as the fight is over.

I believe in human liberty, and for that I shall fight as long as I shall possess the strength. If it is right for the "smaller nations" to have "self-determination," it is right for the States of the American Union to have self-determination. It is right for each county of every State to have "self-determination." It is right for the individual to have "self-determination." We should, as Nations, as States, as individuals, attend to our own

business and let that of our neighbors alone. The laws necessary for the regulation of society should be enforced, but no intolerant fanaticism should be allowed to destroy our liberties, and our God-given freedom of conscience and of action. If I keep Will Easterling tolerably decent and respectable, I shall have no time to either supervise or control the morals of the neighbor who is not interfering with me.

I have opposed women in politics, because I believe it is against Bible teaching and it tends to injure the home life and influence. But, since woman suffrage is with us to stay, I believe we should help the women to vote understandingly, if they are determined to vote.

I am glad the saloons were closed, and I would oppose re-opening them; but I regard the Volstead and the Dean liquor laws unjust, absurd and tyrannical. I believe, with Thomas Jefferson, that if the people were allowed beer and wine, they would not want stronger drinks. I would be in favor of a return to the old-time ways, when a person could order liquor with his groceries, get it in a jug and keep it on the premises if he cared to. The open saloon was a public nuisance, but no government should seek to control what a man may have to eat or drink in his own house. Paul so taught. "Let no man control you as to what ye shall eat or drink."

I believe in equal rights to all and special privileges to none. Therefore I believe in a man's right to work how, when and for whom he wants to, and to make contracts, either individually or collectively; and I believe it is every man's right to hire another at such terms as he may, to hire as many or as few people as he may wish to, and terminate such employment at his pleasure, consistent with his legal obligations.

These, briefly, are the principles upon which I am willing to stand or fall.

**"Hardboiled" Smith Gets Off Easy Mrs. Roosevelt Appeals to Women**

New York, Sept. 30.—Frank H. (Hardboiled) Smith, former lieutenant convicted by court-martial of brutal treatment to prisoners in France, was paroled from Fort Jay on March 20, after he had served less than nine and a half months of his 18-month term.

This made known today by the military authorities at Governor's Island after a search of records at Fort Jay had cleared up the mystery surrounding what disposal had been made of Smith. It was said at Governor's Island that the order for Smith's release had been issued by the Adjutant General's office at Washington and had been approved by the Secretary of War.

Military authorities said they were uncertain as to Smith's present whereabouts, but believed he had returned to his home in Ohio.

New York, Sept. 30.—Mrs. Edith Roosevelt, widow of former President Theodore Roosevelt, tonight appealed to the "manhood and womanhood of America" to elect Senator Harding and Governor Coolidge.

In a statement made at Sagamore Hill, Oyster Bay, and given out by the Republican committee Mrs. Roosevelt said: "The country's vital need is the election of the Republican candidates. Only will the full measure of Americanism in the next administration be attained, if the people shall declare for the party which holds true nationalism as its ideal. It is not necessary to forget our duty to our neighbor in doing our duty at home."

"The time appeals most strongly to the manhood and womanhood of America—to woman more than ever, because to her has come the perfected opportunity to make her opinion weighty in behalf of the nation. "This year as never before with world conditions as they are, steadiness and staunchness of American purpose are obligatory if we would first bring back our country to its stable place, and then, by strong endeavor, do all that can be done for peace and the general welfare in all lands."
