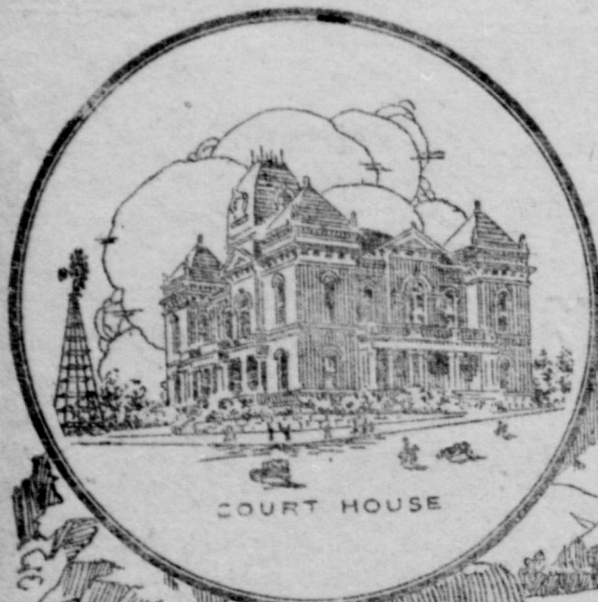

How to Vote in the Coming Election.

The Stockman is printing for your guidance in voting, three of the heads of tickets that will be up for your consideration in the election Tuesday, November 2, 1920. This will be sufficient to give you a good idea and to illustrate a few remarks the editor thinks may be some value to you, help you think about what you may do when you go to the polls, and save time and trouble.

The Democratic party is the only party in Texas which made nominations for county officers, and no party at all has candidates in many counties. For instance: in Terrell county no primary was held. Therefore the candidates in that county go on the Independent ticket, which will be the last ticket on the ballot. On your ballot, the Democratic ticket is printed first, and the Republican ticket second. These two tickets then, will serve to illustrate.

If you want to vote the straight Democratic ticket all the way through, you will scratch out all the others. If you want to vote a Republican ticket, leave all the Democratic nominees in the clear and scratch out the names of the Democratic county officers, you

will scratch the Democratic ticket only as far as such officers begin. That will give you a "mixed ticket." Republican head and Democratic county officers. If you cared to go to the trouble, you could scratch the entire Democratic ticket and write in the names of county officers in the blanks that will be provided on the ballot for that purpose. If you want to vote a Democratic ticket, with the exception of Neff for governor, you scratch all other tickets, and also Neff's name, and write in the same place, just below, the name of Culbertson, McGregor, yourself, or anyone else whom you would like to see governor. Or you could scratch out all the other tickets except the name of the man for whom you want to vote.

Only two of the parties, the Democratic and the Republican, have nominees for Congress in this, the 16th, District. In voting any of the other tickets, you may write in the name of Hudspeeth, or Eastering, or anyone else, or leave it blank.

Do not use a colored or white pencil, and do not use your names on ballot. Use a black

pencil or black ink.

On the bottom of the entire ballot are three proposed Constitutional amendments which have nothing to do with party lines, but are up for consideration by all voters. If you want to vote FOR an amendment, scratch through the paragraph beginning AGAINST, and vice versa.

It matters not how thoroughly you think you understand how a ballot should be made out, it is a good idea to ask the advice of the presiding officer, because all such officers may not see the law in exactly the same way.

On the Democratic ticket will appear the name of B. J. Stewart, of Barksdale, for the legislature, and of Newton W. Graham, of Ozona, for district attorney. As neither of these gentlemen have any opponent, their election is a foregone conclusion; but they could very well be left without a scratch as a compliment.

The proposed Constitutional amendments were printed in full in four consecutive issues of The Stockman.

If you should spoil a ballot, do not use it. If you should spoil another one.

Our Meats Must Have Protection

Unless a basis of production can be obtained that will give the producers of meat a working profit, American citizens will either have to become vegetarians or fish eaters, F. S. Hastings, representing large ranch interests in Texas, told the

southern tariff congress in New Orleans.

The future of the sheep and beef industry demands a tariff, and whether it is called a protective or revenue, the menace of free meat is increasing with every year, Mr. Hastings stated. Jos. E. Ransdall, United States senator from Louisiana, declared that he would cast his vote in favor of protection for southern industry when the next tariff

law is enacted, and stated that Senators Underwood of Alabama and Simmons of North Carolina, whose names are signed to the present tariff law, would have to revise their views on the subject, or go back home and face the wrath of producers whose industries have been destroyed.

Stockman editor acknowledges receipt of complimentary season tickets to the big fairs at Dallas and San Angelo; but thinks he has done about his share of running around until Christmas, at least.

THE RAPE OF PUBLIC OPINION.

The Dearborn Independent, which is Henry Ford's Magazine, charges that, just at the beginning of the war, the Morgan and allied interests held a meeting and decided to buy enough of the big daily papers to control public sentiment throughout the United States. One hundred and seventy nine were selected. Through a process of elimination this number was reduced to twenty-five, and these twenty-five were bought at any price necessary to pay. The interests then put director-generals in charge of these papers.

The great danger to the country of such a dastardly control of the press is that public sentiment will be viciously controlled, not by the bought-up villians, but by the small dailies and the country weeklies trotting along like a flock of poodle dogs in the wake of the big fellows whom they seem pleased to accept as models for imitation.

The best safeguard of the people is the really independent weekly press that really reaches the people and is controlled by independent and patriotic thinkers who have both the ability and the courage to warn the people of the pitfalls that are set for them.

There are many such papers in the country, but of course, they are in the minority.

We have an editorial friend down in Texas who has for a number of years published the Ozona Stockman. He has always given his paper some Republican color, and as a kind of "pay back" for his efforts, his friends have nominated him for Congress, and we will watch the outcome with much interest. (As we understand it, the Democrats are as thick as flies in that State, and if he can make the heat it will show that he is some runner. He would slide in as slick as grease if he were up here in Iowa where Republicans are as thick as flies around a molasses jar. — Winfield (Iowa) Beacon.

If I were up there, my dear friend Hinkle, I couldn't have gotten the nomination. In the above you are partly right and partly wrong. Two-thirds of the people here are protectionists, and therefore Republicans. 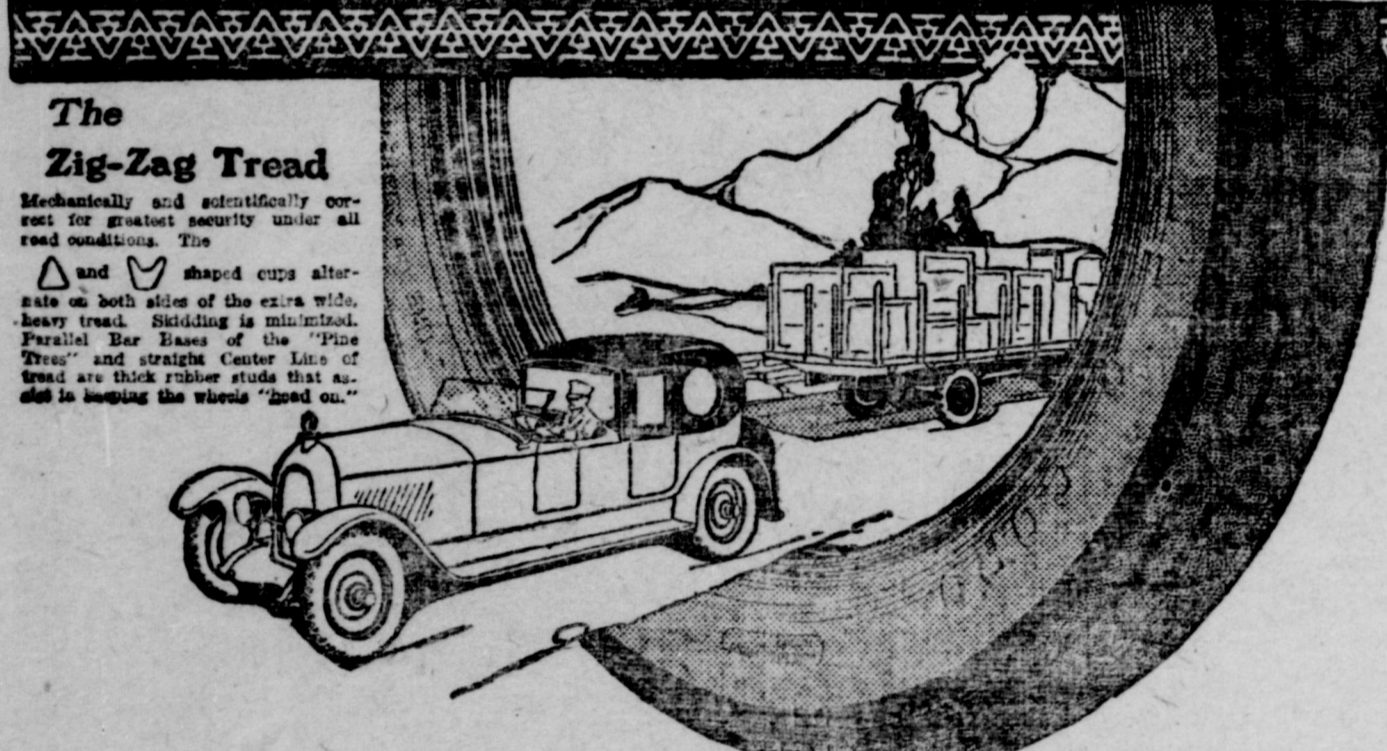
