## CONSOLIDATION IS DISCUSSED

The tentative plan which was put out by the Interstate Commerce Commission about two years ago in order to invite criticism and to encourage the roads and encourage the public to come before the Commission and give testimony, or as the lawyers say to make a record, upon which the Commission could base its findings, proposes that Texas should be served by four systems, the Santa Fe, the Southern Pacific-Rock Island, the Missouri Pacific, and the Frisco-Katy Cotton Belt. The people of Texas, both those favoring consolidation and those opposed, have objected to these proposed systems. It is felt that if the Rock Island be given to the Southern Pacific, that then the Southern Pacific may lose interest in Texas as ports upon the Atlantic seaboard and that we may not have in Texas water compelled rates as in the past. Communities like Port Arthur object to the proposed Missouri Pacific combination because the Missouri Pacific is financially interested in New Orleans, and since the Kansas City Southern is given in the tentative plan to the Missouri Pacific, Port Arthur fears that the Missouri Pacific would route its tonnage to New Orleans and would not be as much interested in developing Texas ports. The tentative plan of consolidation proposes to give the Ft. Worth & Denver City Railway to the Santa Fe. This is objectionable to most of the people served in Northwest Texas by these properties. Heretofore, as new counties and areas have developed in the Plains in the Northwest part of the State, the Santa Fe and the Denver each has constructed a feeder of short line to protect its interest in the territory. If the Denver should be given to the Santa Fe, there would no longer be any incentive to build these short lines, for all of the freight whether it should go east or west by truck would have to go out or be brought in on the Santa Fe, if the Santa Fe owned the Denver. The Denver is now owned by the Burlington interests, which also own a half interest in the Trinity & Brazos Valley. The Burlington interests want to come into and across Texas to the Gulf and they strenuously object to being deprived of the Denver and losing their outlet to the Gulf of Mexico. It would certainly be of advantage to Texas to have a real strong system like the Burlington to come into the State as a competitor to such properties as the Santa Fe.

The Frisco, the Katy and the Cotton Belt are parallel and competing lines out of St. Louis and Kansas City into Texas points. The consolidation of these roads will eliminate competition that has long existed and will not constitute a system strong enough to stand up by the side of the Union Pacific, the Burlington, or the Southern Pacific or Santa Fe. That is to say, such a system would merely perpetuate the problem of the weak road, for rates that would be sufficient to sustain the Frisco-Katy-Cotton Belt would bring undue prosperity to the strong systems of the West, and rates that would bring a fair return to the strong systems would bankrupt the weaker Frisco-Katy-Cotton Belt system.

The people in the Southwest part of Texas are also strenuously opposed to the consolidation of the San Antonio & Aransas Pass with the Southern Pacific.

Among the freshmen who will enter Simmons College at the opening, September 13, is one Harold Gary, of Tenehah, Texas, who will probably be the outstandingest freshman who ever hit a college cinder track. Up until August of this year, when a very interesting race took place at the Christoval Encampment, Harold had never been defeated in a foot race in his life. He has made his way all over Texas, and raced many people who have challenged him. At the present time he is on his way back from California, having met and defeated people along the way in races.

For three consecutive years Harold has won out in the races in the East Texas Meet and has refused to enter the State contests. Now he is going to Simmons this fall and will enter college track work, that is, if his cotton crop turns out all right. Coach Y. P. Kuhn said that this Tenehah youth was one of the best built men for track that he had ever seen.

And about that Christoval race where young Harry was defeated in running for the first time in his life--well, Homer Walton, of Bronte, Texas, was the young man who did the work. He beat Gary in a 220-yard dash. And Walton is going to enter Simmons in the fall, also. He will be registered as a sophomore. Coach Kuhn is counting on Walton to make a college record for himself and Simmons in track and in basketball and baseball, for he figures in these college sports, too.

## AMERICANISM IN TARIFFS

(From the Manufacturer)  
When one attempts to discuss tariff question, he lays himself open to the charge of arguing partisan politics. The tariff is a business proposition and not a political issue. Wage and working conditions are the biggest factors in establishing the price of practically all commodities. A publisher knows from experience that if he pays union wages and works on an eight-hour day he has to get a certain price for his advertising which twenty years would have been considered outrageously high and yet the present wage which he pays and price which he charges for his advertising is the reflection of increases all along the line in every commodity. If a foreign newspaper produced with labor paid from one-half to one-third of what the American publisher pays and working much longer hours, could be shipped in here at half the price for advertising and subscription rates it would leave the American publisher in a bad fix unless the advantages the foreigner thus had were equalized by some form of tax assessed against him when he entered this field. Many industries find themselves in just such a position as the publisher would be under such conditions.

The result has been the tariff. There have undoubtedly been unjust tariff laws enacted, and abuses in every walk of life, but the exception does not prove the rule wrong. The American people must learn to consider certain basic principles vital to the prosperity of the nation. They must know the facts in regard to such questions as the tariff and realize that business principles instead of political log-rolling should guide in the solution of these statements.

Ozona is one of the best county seat towns in this section of the State, and every citizen in the county will uphold this assertion. They will say to anyone who has occasion to ask, that Ozona's public school and school building is the best of any town of Ozona's size in the entire State, and will gladly do what they can to further the interests of the school. Yet these same Ozona citizens, and especially those who are really in a position to help the town and school, are overlooking the one thing essential to their growth. We are crying in Ozona for more houses for the shelter of those who would come in to the school from the various ranches, and possibly the small towns in this section. But they are prevented from doing so by a woful lack of houses, either for rent or for sale.

It is known that there are a number of families in this section who would be glad to come to Ozona for the school session, and have tried to do so. But it is also known that there are no places for these families to stay, and it is still further known among Ozona residents that the parents who are fortunate enough to find a place to keep their children in school either have to keep eternally on the watch for a house or else must make arrangements to have the children take up board and lodging with some family that owns a home in town.

Of course, it is best that all people should own their own home, but it is true that many peo-

ple with families cannot make arrangements to build homes, either from lack of money, or from the fact that their business would not permit them to keep up both a home in town and at some other place.

Yet these people have children that should, by all means, have a chance to go to school.

There is only one solution: Some person, well able to meet a first expense of erecting a house, or houses, should build a few for the purpose of providing residences for those families who need and desire a place of residence during the school term. These families can make arrangements to either rent the place during the school term, or in case it is desirable, can buy the place on long time with a reasonable monthly payment.

By this method there would not be the annual rush for rent houses which is experienced at the beginning of every school term, and the community as a whole would be greatly benefited from the fact that more names would be added to the list of tax payers in the county. Whether the houses thus built were rented or bought, it would result in giving Ozona a better name in regard to housing conditions, and would mean also that someone who has a surplus of money could put it to work in a good cause.

It is argued that as a rule, all residence property which is used for renting purposes is not good property, because no matter how careful an owner may be, he will lose part of his rent from various causes—sometimes willfully on the part of the renter, and at other times because unforeseen circumstances prevent a good-intentioned renter from meeting his obligations as he readily desires to meet them. But if the houses are built and then sold to families on an easy monthly installment plan, the renter will be more likely to meet the payments as they fall due. Let us have more houses in Ozona and more taxpaying home owners. It will result in good for the person who erects the house, for the one who buys it, and for the community at large.

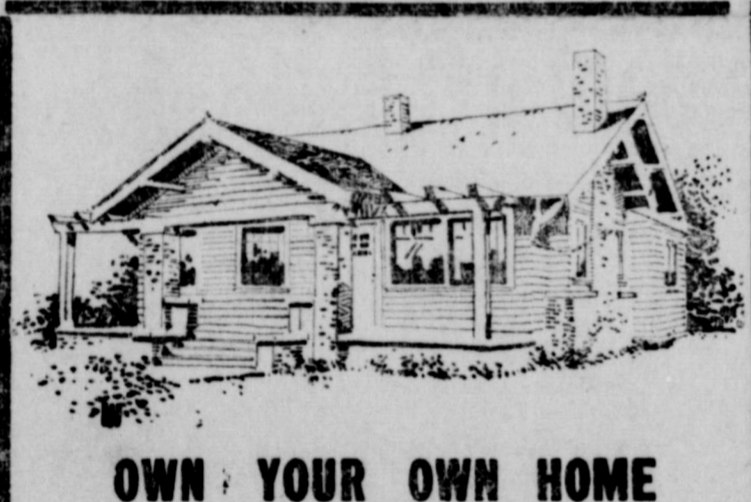

**CONSOLIDATION IS  
DISCUSSED**

(Continued from First Page)

Since Congress has commanded  
that the Interstate Commerce  
Commission prepare this plan  
for consolidation, and since there  
are powerful financial interests  
and political interests that are  
opposing any modification of the  
law, and since we do not know  
what the Courts will finally hold  
with reference to its constitu-  
tionality, it is necessary that we  
in Texas play safe, that is, we  
must get from the Interstate  
Commerce Commission as favor-  
able plan as possible, for the  
plan put out by the Interstate  
Commerce Commission may be  
possibly sustained, and under it  
the railroads may consolidate in  
spite of all that the opponents  
of consolidation may do. That  
being true, Texas is demanding  
of the Interstate Commerce Com-  
mission very radical changes in  
its tentative proposal. For ex-  
ample, it is asking that what-  
ever great systems are created  
to the west of the Mississippi River,

**OZONA TAKES THE

that they shall be brought into  
and across Texas; that the pro-  
posed Frisco-Katy-Cotton Belt  
consolidation be abandoned and  
that these properties be used to  
bring such roads as the Union  
Pacific and the Burlington into  
Texas.

In that way existing competi-  
tion would be preserved and the  
great systems would be inter-  
ested in Texas and would seek to  
develop their Texas properties,  
and would encourage the agri-  
cultural, commercial, and indus-  
trial development of the State.  
That would be an infinitely bet-  
ter plan than the tentative one  
which would fix upon the South-  
west two relatively weak sys-  
tems that give no promise dur-  
ing this generation of being able  
to compete with the strong sys-  
tems. In fact, we might have to  
look forward to bankruptcies,  
receiverships, and "life unsatisfac-  
tory service attending the finan-  
cial failure of railroad compa-  
nies. Moreover, modifications,  
such as requested in the plan,  
would bring across Texas much  
heavier tonnage than would be  
possible under the tentative  
plan and this would encourage a  
rapid improvement of roadbeds,  
of equipment, and of service.
