TRAILINGS

Walter Young, son of J. W. Young of Ozona, delivered approximately 600 head of mutton lambs Wednesday to Jack Mans field of San Angelo. The lambs were sold several months ago at 94 cents a pound, averaging 22-3 pounds. They were shipped from Big Lake.

Steven Perner loaded 500 head of lambs at Big Lake Wednesday consigned to Jack Mans field of San Angelo. The animals were sold at 104 cents and averaged 63 and two-thirds pounds.

STUDENTS HEAR OF PRISON CONDITIONS

Mrs. Elizabeth Speer, Chief Speaker at High School Chapel Exercises

Wednesday morning the regular chapel period was occupied by Mrs. Elizabeth Speer, Executive Secretary of the Texas Committee on Prisons and Prison Labor. Mrs. Speer proved a most interesting speaker and gripped the boys and girls with the dramatic facts of her message. She described the utter lack of humane attention to physical, mental and moral conditions of Texas convicts found by the Prison Survey to exist in our penitentiary system.

She emphasized the necessity of a reorganization of the penitentiary system in such fashion as to reduce the opportunity for graft, inhumanity and incompetence. To this end she urged the abolition of the Board of Prison Commissioners with its divided authority and "pork barrel" methods. She advocated the substitution of an unsalaried board of patriotic citizens with power to select an expert salaried manager of the whole system. Mrs. Speer explained and urged the enactment of a constitutional amendment covering this reorganization.

The high school appeared deeply interested and promised its efforts in advertising the amendment to the people of Crockett County. Mrs. Speer left a quantity of literature upon request of high school instructors. This literature will be studied intensively in history and other classes between now and November 2.

HEALTH PENNANT WON BY SCHOOLS

Ozona Pupils Make Good Showing in Crusader Tournament

News has just come from the Children's Department of the Texas Public Health Association that two rooms of the junior high have again won state and national pennants in the annual Crusader Tournament. The winning of pennants in these tournaments is based on the doing of health chores during the school year. Each teacher checks daily on each child in regard to the doing of a number of these health chores. Miss Davis with her seventh grade of last year won the state and national pennants for the second time. Miss Isla Mae Chitwood with her fifth grade achieved a like triumph this year. Health work this year will be under the general direction of Miss Thelma Pearl Chitwood. Much enthusiasm is being manifested for the work. Supplies have been received from State headquarters, and teachers and pupils are entering heartily into the work. Letters of commendation have been received lately regarding the excellent showing made by the Ozona School in health work.

PRAIRIE DOG NOTICE

Be it remembered that on the 18th day of September A. D. 1926, the Honorable Commissioners Court met in Regular Session all members present except Com. J. W. Owens and the following Order was passed:

It appearing to the Court that the prairie dog is populating Crockett County to a serious extent, and it seems to the Court judging from the complaints that this Court should take some official action under the statute to the end that this nuisance be wiped out of Crockett County; but the Court is of the opinion that the severity of the law if strictly followed by this Court might work unnecessary expense and hardship on owners and lessees it is considered best to make and pass this order rather by way of notice and warning, that all prairie dogs must be exterminated and that at the regular meeting of this Court in February 1927, this Court will pass an order under the Prairie Dog Statute enforcing same so far as Crockett County is concerned.

This Court, believing and expecting cooperation of land and lease owners and desiring to assist in any reasonable way, has applied to the Commissioner of Agriculture for written formulas and suggestions as to the best ascertained mixtures and methods proper and necessary leading to such extermination, and this asked-for information when received will be placed on file in the clerk's office at Ozona subject to the inspection of all, and the Clerk of this Court is ordered to mail copies to any making written request for same. It is further ordered that this order be published in the Ozona Stockman for ten issues.

ELABORATE PLANS FOR HOTEL OPENING BEING MADE; WORK IS RUSHED

Prison Reform Speaker Here

Mrs. Elizabeth M. Speer Urges Co-Operation Of People In Plan

Removal of the Texas prison system to a site near Austin, supervision of prison farms by the Texas A & M College, segregation of diseased inmates of the prison and other Texas prison reforms were advocated by Mrs. Elizabeth M. Speer of Austin representing the Federated Women's Clubs of Texas in a speech at the Methodist church here Tuesday night under the auspices of the Ozona Women's Club.

Mrs. Speer is working in the interest of prison reform advocated by the Federated Clubs and a group of prominent citizens actively engaged in carrying out the plan. She told of many instances of brutality revealed in various prison investigations, of the need for medical facilities and advocated general revision of the system.

The Texas Medical Society was one of the first organizations to become interested in the proposed reform plan, Mrs. Speer said, and Texas physicians volunteered their services in making a thorough medical survey of the prison system. This survey revealed the fact that inmates suffering from tuberculosis and other communicable diseases are grouped with other prisoners with the result that many times men who go into the prison sound physically come out broken in health.

The plan for removing the prison system to a site near Austin is the same one being advocated by Governor-Elect Dan Moody and will be urged upon the legislature at its next session. The aid and co-operation of the people of Texas in getting these reforms through is being urged by the organization which Mrs. Speer represents.

Elaborate plans for a suitable program at the opening of the new \$130,000 Hotel Ozona are being made, according to C. T. Brazington, manager, and one of the most important events in the history of Ozona will be celebrated with proper pomp.

The date for opening the new hotel is not yet known, delay in receiving materials having tied up operations to some extent and delayed completion of the building, according to contractors J. W. Fuqua, builder, however, set a month or six weeks as the time required for completing the structure and indicated that unless unforeseen difficulties arise it will be ready for opening not later than the middle of December.

Furniture for the building has already arrived, manager Brazington said and as soon as the inside finishing work is completed in the rooms will be installed. The furniture is all steel finished in a rich oak, making the structure entirely fireproof both as to furniture and building.

Practically all of the outside work has been done, the builder said, and removal of scaffolding from the exterior will get under way in a few days. Laying of concrete sidewalks around the building is being rushed and as soon as this is completed the new hotel will take on a much more attractive appearance from the outside.

The new hotel will contain 50 rooms. The bottom floor will be occupied by the lobby, a coffee shop and dining room, an auditorium and ball room, and a barber shop and beauty parlor. Dances by the hotel management at intervals in the big auditorium are planned and the room will be rented out for private dances, it was stated. Storage for automobiles of guests will be provided and the hotel will be modern in every way.

The program for the opening has not yet been definitely worked out but one of the features will be a banquet at which stockholders of the hotel and citizens of Ozona will be guests. A musical program for the evening is being arranged and other elaborate entertainment features will be worked out later.

Mr. and Mrs. Brazington have been here a some time getting things in readiness for the opening. They are at present located at the Ozona Hotel but will have quarters in the new hotel as soon as a room can be fixed up for them.

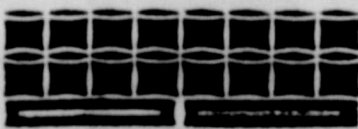

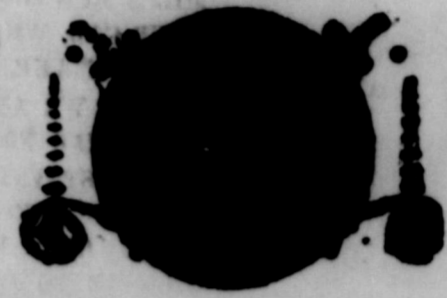

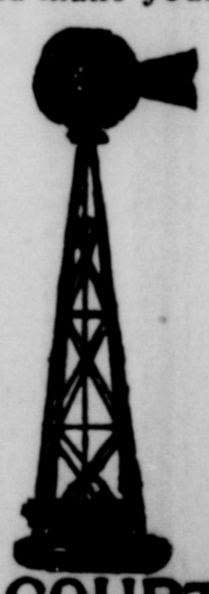
