New Oberkampff Bldg. Finished

Furniture, Hardware and Plumbing Dealer Moves Into New Home Next Week

Joe Oberkampff, one of Ozona's most progressive business men, is moving his stock and fixtures this week into his new building, just being completed next door to the bank.

Work has been under way on the attractive new home of the Oberkampff furniture and hardware store for about three months and except for some delays in the plumbing system has gone up rapidly. The structure represents an investment of approximately \$15,000 and is one of the most attractive, modern buildings in the city. It is entirely fire proof, made of brick and tile, with one story and basement.

New Well Will Solve Problem Of Water Here

Pump Being Installed, Another Big Reservoir To Be Built To Increase Pressure

Ozona's water problem will be definitely solved before another summer with the completion of an elaborate improvement program now under way at the local plant of the Ozona Improvement company.

Drilling of a new well 396 feet deep has just been completed and installation of an up to date pump with a capacity of 100 gallons a minute, is now under way, according to announcement made by J. R. Kersey, manager of the plant. The new well, drilled a few feet from the other two big wells, is standing 6 feet in water and although a pump has not yet been put on it to test its capacity it is believed that it with the other two wells will furnish an abundant supply of water for Ozona for many years to come.

The company has also laid plans for the construction of another big reservoir on top of the hill approximately 30 feet higher than the present reservoir to furnish considerably more pressure in the mains. Mr. Kersey said, the new reservoir is to be of approximately 200,000 gallon capacity, several times the capacity of the present tank. The new reservoir is to be 100 feet in diameter. The present one measures 30 feet across and is ten feet deep. The new tank is to be made of solid concrete.

The present smaller reservoir is to be retained by the company and water will be pumped into it and from there into the big tank. With the two reservoirs, water can be turned into the mains from one while the other is being cleaned, and in case of an emergency, caused by a breakdown of pumps, both tanks will be full to supply the demand while repairs are being made.

"We felt that it was necessary to increase the pressure in the mains in order to afford better fire protection and better service to water users," Mr. Kersey said, "and it was up to us either to put in larger mains or a reservoir that would afford more pressure. We now have three large wells with a pump on each and a repetition of the emergency that arose during the July celebration and on other occasions will likely not come again in many years."

The company had planned to have the new well drilled for use during the past summer and contracted with a well driller last winter. The driller, however, was not able to go to work on the project until June. Workmen were pouring concrete the first of the week for the foundation of the big pump and Mr. Kersey estimated that it would be about two weeks before it is ready for operation. Work on the new reservoir should begin in about a month, he said.

According to a letter received by Mrs. Geo. Metcalf, Mrs. Minnie Mauldin was married to M. O. Vollenhine of Estico, Ark., on September 30. Mrs. Vollenhine was a resident of Ozona for a number of years and is well known here. Mr. Vollenhine is a merchant and landowner.

Texas Breeders Save Middle Man Profit

Fort Worth, Tex., October 21. Cooperative marketing is providing a way for the Texas breeder to sell his stock direct to the feeder of the middle west with out the payment of a premium to the middle man and the speculator. Under the program launched by the National Live Stock Producers Association, 10,000 Texas calves and several thousand Texas lambs are going this fall into corn belt feed lots and the Texas producer is getting for his lambs and calves just what the feeder pays. The feeder in turn is getting his stuff for one price plus the cost of shipping.

C. B. Denman, President of the National Cooperative organization, of which the Cattle Raisers Producers Commission Company at Fort Worth is one of the thirteen central market units, personally has spent most of the past two months in Texas making the purchases.

All of the calves bought this year for the calf pool were purchased in the Highland Hereford or Big Bend district, comprising the counties of Brewster, Presidio and Jeff Davis, but another year it is likely that separate pools will be formed in the Panhandle, Midland and Lubbock areas. Corn belt feeders pleased with the operation of the pool up to date probably can take all of the available quality calves that will go from Texas in any one year.

"We can get enough choice quality light cattle in Texas," Mr. Denman said, "to supply the present demand for that class of beef. Since it appears that the day of heavy beef carcasses is past, it means decreased tonnage from point of production and high quality, which in any opinion, gives the greatest hope of restoring the cattle business in this country to a profitable basis."

The Producer lamb pool has invaded Texas this year for the first time. The pool took 71,000 western lambs last year. This year more than 110,000 lambs have been bought and it is like (Continued on page 2)

Incorporation Leaders Seek New Election

Movement Voted Down By Margin Of 21 Votes In Election Last Saturday

Plans for presenting another petition to County Judge Chas. E. Davison asking him to call a second election on the question of incorporating the town of Ozona are being laid by leaders of the movement, it became known following the defeat of the proposal at the polls here Saturday by a margin of 21 votes.

The petition has not yet been drawn up, but it is understood that such action is contemplated within the next few weeks. No announcement of plans has been made, but it is indicated that another election within thirty or sixty days.

A total of 267 votes were cast in Saturday's election, the final count indicating that the measure had been defeated by a vote of 114 to 93. W. E. Smith was the presiding judge of the election.

Decision to lay plans for seeking another election in the near future was reached after many voters had called on leaders of the incorporation movement advising that they had opposed the measure but had changed their minds and wanted another chance at it, according to statements from these leaders.

From this sentiment, belief is expressed that the proposal will be approved by a majority of voters at a second election.

The chief opposition to the measure was apparently a fear of increased taxation, it was declared. Lack of an active campaign, giving the people exact figures on the rate of taxation and the actual benefits that would accrue from incorporating the town was attributed by many as the cause of the failure of the move.

Cemetery Assn. Meet Thursday

Members To Hear Reports Of Work Accomplished and Outline Future Plans

The Ozona Cemetery Association has been called to meet with Mrs. Judge Montgomery, president, at the George Harrell home at 3 o'clock next Thursday afternoon, October 28. It has been announced by Mrs. Montgomery.

The purpose of this meeting, officers of the association declare, is to hear reports on the work that has been done in recent months and to outline plans for the future.

Ben H. Brown, Harry Sharp, G. J. Henshaw, G. N. King, E. F. Howard, J. E. Mills, A. A. Shelt on, B. B. Dyer, Clyde Mills, Alexander Mitchell, and O. T. Schuch, all of Sanderson, Joe F. Brown of Rocksprings, Wm. J. Niquies of San Angelo, and B. F. Cordeur of Marfa.

Senator Ben F. Berkeley of Alpine, addressed the committee at its morning session on legislation passed at the recent special session and prospective legislation to be passed at the coming regular session affecting the sheep and goat raising industry.

The secretary's financial report showed a balance of \$6,800 to the credit of the association, a total of approximately \$2800 above the balance on the same date a year ago.

President Kincaid reported on the work of the rate committee, indicating that a compromise rate on sheep and goats in double deck cars had been proposed by the carriers which if accepted would mean a saving of millions of dollars annually to the industry. The association, however, has asked that the same rate be allowed on sheep and goats as applies on cattle and a hearing on the question was to have been held October 19.

R. H. Martin of Eagle Pass was unanimously recommended by the committee for appointment by Governor-elect Dan Moody to a place in the State Livestock Sanitary Board. The Association in annual convention at Del Rio suggested that the governor be requested to name an experienced sheep and goat man to the board and the executive committee, feeling that Mr. Martin was the choice of the majority of the membership, endorsed him for the post.

Members of the committee and visiting guests were treated to a chuck wagon dinner at the home of Ed Downie at the noon hour.

The feature of the afternoon session of the meeting was the report of the resolutions committee, composed of Judge James Cornell, V. A. Brown, Ed Downie, R. H. Martin, P. L. Childress, and J. A. Whitten. The committee presented a number of interesting resolutions, all of which were adopted.

Among these was a resolution calling on the legislative committee of the association to seek passage through the legislature of a bill requiring all persons offering for sale any livestock remedy to give under oath a full statement of the contents of the mixture.

Another resolution instructed the secretary to address Hon.

Pat M. Neff, former governor, and request that he give a resume of arguments in favor of and against the Truth in Fabric bill, which Mr. Neff vetoed while governor. A resolution asking the legislative committee to prepare a Truth in Fabric bill to be presented to the legislature at the next regular session was also passed.

The secretary was instructed in another resolution to communicate with all county judges and commissioners courts in counties of these localities in destroying cockleburrs and horehound from public roads, highways streets, alleys and lanes.

A resolution asking the president to call a special session of the executive committee at Del Rio in December to meet with all shearing captains for the purpose of discussing questions of importance both to owners and shearing captains and their crew

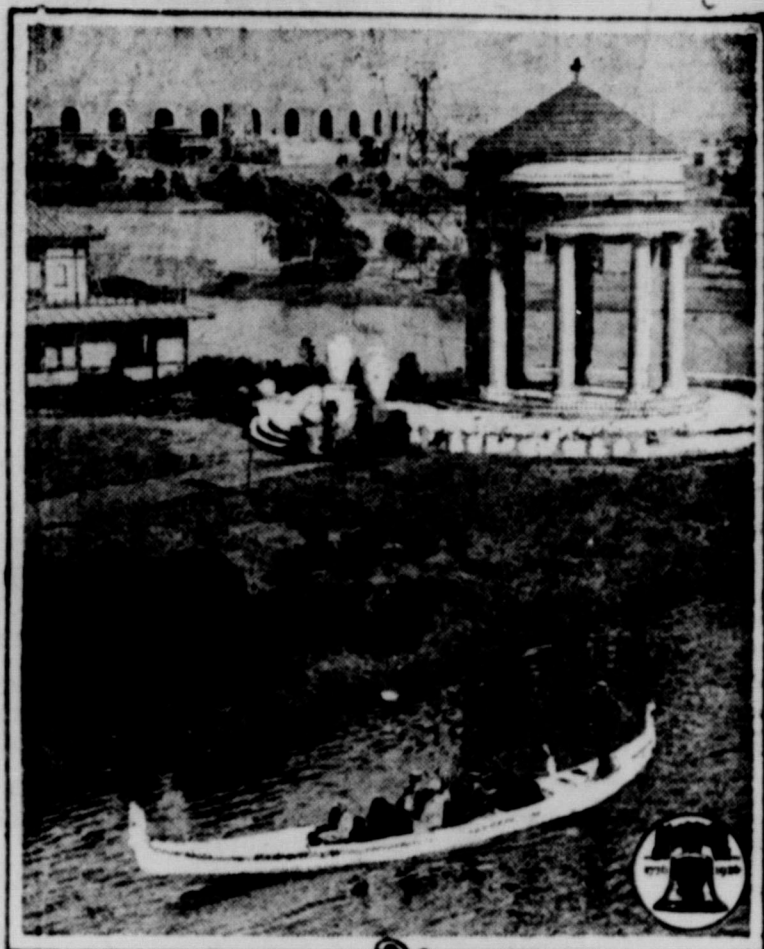

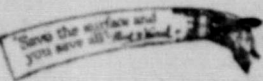

statute to the end that this nuisance be wiped out of Crockett County; but the Court is of the opinion that the severity of the law if strictly followed by this Court might work unnecessary expense and hardship on owners and lessees it is considered best to make and pass this order rather by way of notice and warning, that all prairie dogs must be exterminated and that at the regular meeting of this Court in February 1927, this Court will pass an order under the Prairie Dog Statute enforcing same so far as Crockett County is concerned.

This Court, believing and expecting cooperation of land and lease owners and desiring to assist in any reasonable way, has applied to the Commissioner of Agriculture for written formulas

and suggestions as to the best ascertained mixtures and methods proper and necessary leading to such extermination, and this asked for information when received will be placed on file in the clerk's office at Ozona subject to the inspection of all; and the Clerk of this Court is ordered to mail copies to any making written request for same. It is further ordered that this order be published in the Ozona Stockman for ten issues.

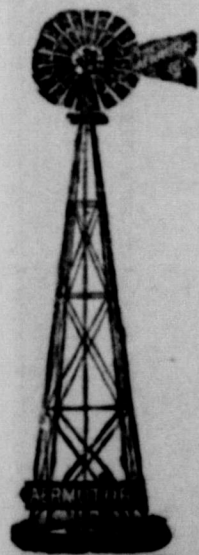
