

## Three Business Houses Move To New Locations

### Ozona Market And Flowers Grocery To Perner Building; Theater In New Home

Three Ozona business enterprises went into new quarters this week and a fourth, a new business establishment for the city, is preparing to open its doors, with the completion of two new buildings.

The finishing touches were put on the beautiful new Perner building, erected on the corner where last spring fire destroyed several business houses occupying the old Perner building, and two business houses moved into the new structure early in the week and the third is preparing to open next week.

Flowers Grocery opened its doors in the big corner room of the new building Wednesday morning, after moving most of its stock and fixtures Tuesday night. Flowers plans to install attractive new fixtures at an early date and in its new stand will be one of the most attractive grocery stores in West Texas.

The Ozona Meat Market is located in the division of the building adjoining the Ozona Barber Shop. Mr. Cook will continue to serve the same high class line of fresh and cooked meats, sausages and other products and will make an effort to enlarge his business with the new and larger location.

The third business to occupy the new building is the Ozona Hardware Company, which will open its doors in the center division of the building in the next few days. W. D. Barton, a former resident of Ozona and well known throughout this section, will be manager of the new establishment, which will carry a full line of hardware, Queensware, windmills, machinery, etc.

The Ozona Theater is another business which is boasting a new home. The theater gave its first showing in the new and handsome building adjoining the rear of the postoffice Tuesday night, when a free show was given to introduce patrons to the new building. Attractive and comfortable seats have been installed in the new theater, which has a balcony and many other attractive features. Two stoves furnish an abundance of heat for the present, and a modern heating plant will be installed before next winter according to J. R. Kersey, manager. The heating plant was ordered to be installed for this winter but delays in completing the building and the work of moving has made it impossible to get the system installed.

With the removal of the Ozona Meat Market from the Davidson building, The Ozona Stockman is left to occupy the building alone. The Stockman will in the next few days rearrange its machinery and equipment to give more space for operations and will utilize the added space to take care of new equipment to be received in a few weeks.

## Christmas Gifts To Be Offered At Bazaar

One of the largest assortments of fancy work and gift selections ever offered in Ozona will be on sale at the bazaar to be held by the Ozona Women's Club at the new Joe Oberkampfs store December 6, it has been announced by officers of the club. Plans are being considered for serving refreshment during the day and some of the beautiful furniture in the Joe Oberkampfs store will be arranged for the comfort of those visiting the bazaar.

The joint recital is to be given in the high school auditorium next Saturday evening, beginning at 7:30. A very interesting program has been arranged and the public is cordially invited to attend. There will be no admission charge.

The program will include musical numbers by the Choral Club and the Orchestra and special numbers by Mrs. Moore's music pupils. A play by the first, second and third grade expression students will be a feature of the program. The program will be short but will be packed with interesting numbers and a variety of offerings, according to Miss Fox.

## Range Gossip

Three clips of wool were sold at the sale of the Wool Growers Central Storage Company in San Angelo last week, according to Crockett county ranchmen who attended the sale.

Approximately a half million pounds of wool and mohair were sold in Kerrville last week, the clips bringing an attractive price.

Demand for cattle in this section is strong at present, but buyers don't seem to be inclined to any "bullish" tendencies, according to T. A. Kincaid. Mr. Kincaid shipped a carload of fat cattle to the Fort Worth market Wednesday. S. E. Couch was reported on a deal to sell a bunch of steers early in the week but it is understood an agreement on the price could not be reached.

Good rains followed by generally mild weather have put ranges and stock in this section in fine condition and ranchmen are jubilant at the outlook for the winter. With grazing good and stock fat, the winter holds no terrors for the ranchmen.

Very little trading was reported in this section for the past week, completion of the movement of the lamb crop bringing a temporary lull in activities. Sale of wool and mohair and some shipments of cattle, however, have brought some action.

No further reports have been received on the efforts of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association to bring about a reduction in the double deck rates on sheep and goat shipments, according to T. A. Kincaid, president of the association. A meeting of representatives of the railroad to discuss the question was scheduled for Thursday of this week. Mr. Kincaid said, "The carriers have offered a compromise rate of \$7.70 above the rate of a car of cattle, but members of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association believe that the same rate should apply on sheep and goats as does on cattle and the association is holding out for this rate."

## Plan Program For Community Thanksgiving

### Churches Unite In Sponsoring Community Sing Song And Thanksgiving Service

Plans for a community program for the observance of Thanksgiving Day in Ozona are being worked out by ministers of the city and a committee of interested citizens. It was announced this week by Rev. Stanley Haver, pastor of the Methodist church. Ministers and churches of the city have combined in fostering the movement and details of the program were being worked out this week.

If the weather will permit, it is planned to stage the program front of the high school building. If the weather is bad, however, the meeting will probably be held in the high school auditorium or some other suitable place indoors.

The program will be held Wednesday afternoon before Thanksgiving. L. B. Cox has been designated to have charge of the matter of selecting speakers. A few local citizens will be called upon for brief talks during the program, but the afternoon will be devoted for the most part to community singing and instrumental music.

Speakers will be assigned a subject of local interest, dwelling on various things for which this community should be thankful and pointing out things for which the community as a whole should strive. Each speaker will be limited to a few minutes. Rev. Haver said, "The program as a whole will be brief."

The community Thanksgiving program is being fostered for the purpose of promoting a healthier community spirit here and to give the citizenship as a whole an opportunity to offer thanks for the many blessings which the community enjoys." Rev. Haver declared, "We want everybody in the city to be present."

### PRAIRIE DOG NOTICE

Be it remembered that on the 18th day of September A. D. 1925, the Honorable Commissioners Court met in regular Session all members present except Com. J. W. Owens and the following Order was passed:

It appearing to the Court that the prairie dog is populating Crockett County to a ruinous extent, and it seems to the Court, judging from the complaints, that this Court should take some official action under the statute to the end that this nuisance be wiped out of Crockett County, and the court is of the opinion that the severity of the law if strictly followed by this Court might work unnecessary expense and hardship on owners and lessees if it is considered best to make and pass this order rather by way of notice and warning that all prairie dogs must be exterminated and that at the regular meeting of this Court in February, 1927, this Court will pass an order under the Prairie Dog Statute enforcing same so far as Crockett County is concerned.

This Court, believing and expecting cooperation of land and lease owners and desiring to assist in any reasonable way, has applied to the Commissioner of Agriculture for written formulas and suggestions as to the best ascertained mixtures and methods proper and necessary leading to such extermination, and this asked for information when received will be placed on file in the clerk's office at Ozona subject to the inspection of all; and the Clerk of this Court is ordered to mail copies to any making written request for same. ## Pharis Hurst Is Called By Death

### Father of Mrs. Chris Meinecke Succumbs to Illness Early Sunday Morning

Pharis Hurst, 85 years old, father of Mrs. Chris Meinecke of Ozona, died at three o'clock Sunday morning at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Meinecke here, after an illness lasting several weeks. Funeral services were held from the Meinecke home at 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon, the Rev. Walter Cook, pastor of the Church of Christ of this city officiating. Burial followed in the Ozona cemetery.

Mr. Hurst was born in Pennsylvania in 1841. He moved with his family to Ohio in 1850 where he lived until the Civil War when he enlisted with the Federal Army and served until his arm was shot away in battle and he was discharged. He moved to Texas soon after the war and settled at Sonora. He built the first residence house in Sonora and was one of the pioneer settlers of this section of the state.

Mr. Hurst's home was still in Sonora but he had been here with Mr. and Mrs. Meinecke for several months. He is survived by four children, two boys, John Hurst of Sonora and Bud Hurst of Ransin, and two daughters, Mrs. Chris Meinecke of Ozona, and Mrs. Clarence Hetherington of Hominy, Okla. All of the children were at his bedside when death came.

## LARGER SCHOOL BUILDING IN OZONA RECOMMENDED BY INSPECTOR FOR STATE

### Hotel Opening Set For Dec. 10

### Contractors Unable To Have New Structure Completed By Thanksgiving

Opening of Ozona's new \$179,000 hotel will take place on December 10 if no further hitches in construction work are encountered, according to County Judge Chas. E. Davidson, a member of the hotel committee.

It was at first planned to have the building ready for the opening on Thanksgiving Day, but contractors report that they will be unable to have it ready by that time and hotel officials set December 10 as the date.

Details of the opening program have not yet been announced by the committee, but Judge Davidson declared that an interesting affair is being contemplated. Further announcement of plans for the opening will be made through The Stockman at a later date, the judge said.

No announcement has yet been made of the outcome of a movement to change the name of the hotel. This matter is still under consideration, it was announced, but hopes were expressed that it would be finally settled in the next few days.

### New Shipping Pens At Barnhart Are Promised

New shipping pens at Barnhart for the convenience of stockmen in this section who load their animals at that point for shipment to market centers have been promised by officials of the Orient railroad, it was announced this week. A committee of Crockett county ranchers recently was called in by officials of the road for the purpose of making suggestions as to the location and style of the pens.

The Orient has been doing a splendid business recently judging from recent reports. It was reported this week that the road has put on 75 new men in the last thirty days and the line is crowded with freight and stock trains. The lamb shipping season in this section gave the road considerable business and one oil fields have put it on a paying basis after many years of struggle.

That action be taken in the near future to provide for a more adequate building and larger grounds for the Ozona school was one of several interesting recommendations made by Miss Carrie Belle Sterrett, school supervisor for the state department of education, who recently made a thorough inspection of the local school. A copy of the report has just been received by Supt. C. C. Minatra and John R. Bailey, president of the board.

"The Ozona Public Schools are in unusually good condition now," the paragraph in the report recommending a new building declares, "but they have gone as far as they can go until more room can be added. With well paid teachers, living expenses reduced, adequate room and equipment, Ozona can easily have one of the best school systems in Texas."

The first recommendation made by Miss Sterrett in her report was "that a definite salary schedule be adopted by the Ozona school board." On this point she makes the following comment:

"Such a policy as the one stated above will do much toward retaining well qualified teachers from year to year. A school with a constantly shifting faculty rarely does consistently good work."

Another recommendation was that the teacherage, provided several years ago, be remodelled and made into attractive but in expensive living quarters for the teachers. "This step will also help keep good teachers in Ozona," the report says.

The local school system was highly complimented by the supervisor on "the excellent school organization, the good behavior of the pupils, the character of work served, and the well kept building and grounds."

Other recommendations made by the supervisor in her report were "that a more up to date set of maps and charts be provided for the lower grades," "that inasmuch as English history has not been taught for two years, credit in this subject be withdrawn" and "that application be made for an additional half unit in American history."

The report of the supervisor will be read at the next meeting of the board of trustees and the board will take whatever action it sees fit on the matters presented.

There is a lot of the well known food for thought for Ozona people in the report of the high school supervisor for the state department of education on Ozona Schools. Most of the citizens of Ozona were probably aware of the fact that the schools will need more room in a short while, that conditions are becoming crowded and that plans are going to have to be considered before very long for enlarging the equipment.

The report of the supervisor sets out the fact that the schools are at present crowded to capacity, not overcrowded, but if there is to be any more growth in the system additional room must be provided. And the school will grow, Ozona is growing and the schools will grow with it. The matter has reached a point, then, of being a definite need, and the sooner plans are started for taking care of the situation the better it will be for Ozona.

The supervisor's report also points out another vital need, that of putting the teacherage in shape to make attractive yet inexpensive living quarters for teachers. A definite salary schedule for teachers was also recommended. With these two improvements the local schools would be in position to secure the best teachers in the country and to keep them. Putting the teacherage in shape would materially reduce the living expenses of teachers and would prove an added attraction for the best talent.

Good schools are among the most valuable assets a town can have and it will pay any town to look well after its schools. So far Ozona can claim rank up around the top among towns its size all over the state and it is now up to us to maintain our standing.

The fellow who shot and killed a man and woman at a dance in West the other night did a magnanimous act by shooting himself to death. It saved somebody else's ammunition.

The cotton farmer is having a hard time of it what with the cotton market holding cellar position and everything else at the top of the ladder. But the business interests of the country are coming to his rescue by buying up the surplus to take it off the market. Although the wool man doesn't hear the slogan "Buy a sack of wool and save the wool man," he does have a little advantage over the cotton farmer. When cotton is ready to pick it must be picked or else, while the little sheepie can carry his fleece a few months longer if necessary and the clip gets heavier the longer the wait.

Old man winter has given us a pretty good sample of his 1926 wares during the past week and will no doubt deliver some of his choice goods during the coming few weeks. But we can't be worried—it's near Thanksgiving, Christmas is just around the corner and we think maybe a nice big turkey, roasted a golden brown with trimmings and perhaps a new pair of socks. For Christmas will put us in a frame of mind for the worst the old man has to offer.

**WEST TEXAS NOTES**

Fort Worth—The committee named by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to investigate the cotton situation in Texas went on record at its recent meeting here as endorsing the Texas Cotton Corporation to be organized with a \$5,000,000 subscribed capital stock by a special cotton committee of the Texas Bankers Association in accordance with plans adopted by six other States for the entire production of 1,250,000 bales of Texas

cotton. The committee also adopted a resolution relative to a plan for cotton acreage reduction in the state of Texas to an extent of not less than 25 per cent.

Ballinger—The more Feed, Food and Conservation Campaign of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce is to be launched at the Central West Texas District Convention of that organization which meets here November 15. The movement for living at home and encouraging thrift through more livestock for West Texas farms, involves a contest in which prizes aggregating \$2,000 will be awarded by the regional chamber of commerce to farmers in its territory.

Plainview—A new addition to the Missouri hotel here to cost \$5,200 has been planned by its proprietor to consist of ten rooms of brick and tile construction. The improvement program will make the Missouri Hotel a first rate structure, fireproof throughout.

Tulia—In line with the increasing business in the local postoffice, a second regular clerk has been employed by the Tulia postmaster.

Robert Lee—Lights in this community are to be installed upon receipt of a transformer which was ordered some time ago.

Paint Rock—A new produce house has been opened up in this section. It will handle poultry, pecans, wool, mohair furs and other products.

Big Lake—Conditional acceptance of a bid for the construction of a City Hall was made recently by city officials, and work upon the building is expected to start soon.

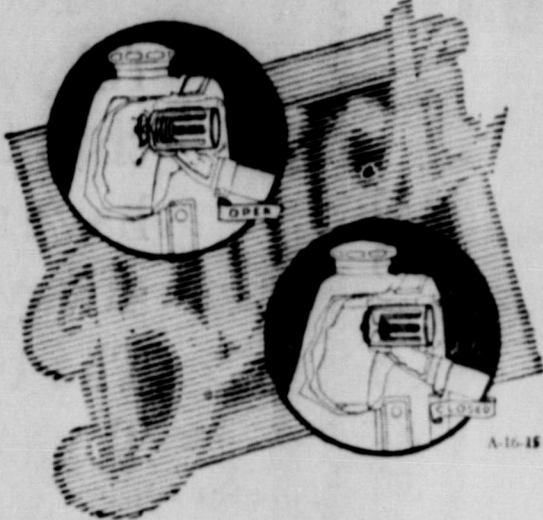




