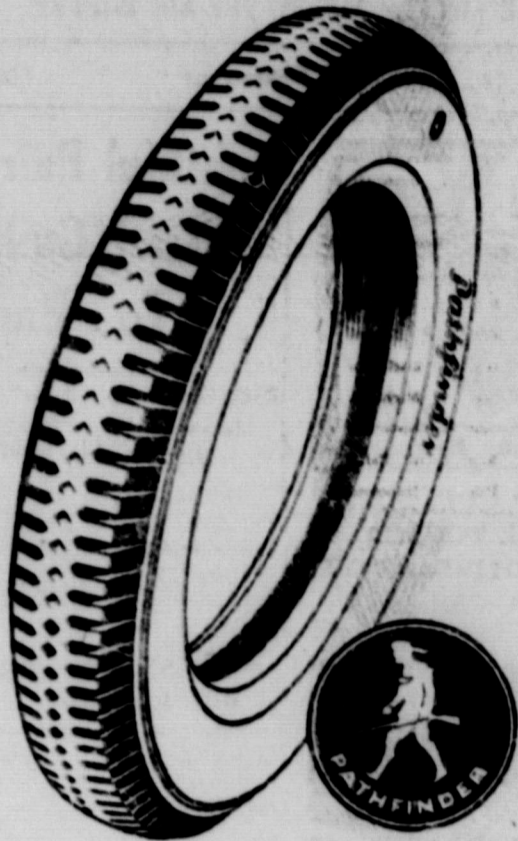

"The Obervor" last week had a crowd to pick with Ozona for calling herself a community. Now we also have a crowd to pick with Ozona, and it's nothing abstract, in fact, it's very mundane and utterly material.

Some time ago the county employed a keeper for the park in front of the courthouse, or the park in front of most any other place we might mention in the business section. The keeper has been keeping the park all right, and our crowd picking is not with him. He was employed to keep the park and he is doing his duty.

The fault lies not in his keeping of it, but the shape it was in when it was given to him to keep. The fact is, brutally speaking, that that park looks our "aesthetic soul" something terrible. It's not to us like it is to most everybody else in town who go past it day after day and scarcely ever see it—it's right across the street from our editorial sanctum and when we are searching vainly for a glimmer of an idea for our weekly outburst in this column, we can't help letting our eyes rest on that unkempt underbrush—and wondering if we would ever have the exquisite pleasure of casting our glimmers on a beautiful park in that spot to give us bountiful inspiration in our daily labors.

A tree is a treasure in West Texas—and anywhere else for that matter. There are a number of trees in the park that might form the setting for one of the prettiest spots in this section. Let's just take an imaginary peep under and between those trees and see what might be.

Down the center from the courthouse side to the main street side there is a handsome flag walk fringed with beautiful flowers. (This is in the spring time, of course.) The grass covers the entire plot snugly, and is mowed smoothly at all times, marred not in a single spot by a weed or blade of outlaw grass.

Somewhere near the center of the plot there is a handsome bandstand, made of succo or is it tile brick, beautifully decorated and a masterpiece of architecture. Seated about on the lawn, on the grass and in quaint but attractive rustic benches and the like, are a goodly portion of the citizenship of Ozona, boys and girls, men and women listening to the weekly concert given by the Ozona Orchestra or the Ozona Band, composed of local talent, or attending some community gathering. The park is well lighted by a string of electric lights stretched over the plot.

At one end of the park is a beautiful fountain, a round pool bordered with granite or stone in the center of which is a handsome statue that is continuously bathed in the spray of the fountain. In the other end of the park is another decorative status: fountain or is it a community house? At any rate, that end of the park is as attractive as the other, and sprinkled about are swings, merry go rounds, seesaws and the like where the youngsters may work off that surplus energy. And, of course, from side to side there is a narrow walk of concrete or flag which is used by those who insist on saving a few dozen steps and wear an unlighty trail through the park. There are flowers, hedges, vines, etc. growing in profusion all over the plot, all well watered and cared for.

It's hard to awaken from such a dream, but the bare, ugly reality must be faced as we again reach the point where we must get other ideas and consequent to our eyes roam the untamed meadows northward.

Some people profit from the Christmas Seeds now being distributed by local schools. The sentiment is worthwhile and the angle. Numerous in fact are given \$1 or more. Several stores are selling several dollars each. The young are buying liberally and selling to others.

They hope before the sale stops on the morning of the seventeenth to have equalled or even exceeded last year's total of slightly more than one hundred dollars. The reaction on the young salesman in doing this unselfish work must be most beneficial. They deserve encouragement in every way. No work more truly represents the genuine Christmas spirit than this drive for the prevention of tuberculosis in our State.

THE MANIFOLD MENU.

Yes, I mean just that. You may see it demonstrated in the "company dinner," whereas people sit down and reverently return thanks (sometimes) for the intimate presence of their worst enemy. If you take the trouble to itemize at any of these feasts, you will discover fifteen or twenty formidable articles of diet, roaring their defiance at the half-dyspeptic stomachs.

Appetite, frail at best, and subject to all sorts of intemperance by habit, is, nevertheless, an imperious master that slays remorselessly. The human being that holds his appetite in subjection is a hero worthy of a medal. I once made a professional call to a patient in Dubuque, Iowa, five hundred miles from my home; it was winter—the temperature below zero. I partook of noon-dinner with the family, reluctantly, dreading the "company dinner." Imagine my surprise to behold the table set with the following: a well-done beef-roast, a loaf of rye bread, four baked potatoes and (horrors!) a pint bottle of beer—one at each plate. There may have been a tomato-relish or a small dish of pickles—I forget; a simple custard was the desert.

The simplicity of this diet impressed me so that I have never forgotten. It was a German family, very well-to-do. Never had a member of this family suffered from a digestive disorder. So far as the malt drink was concerned, it was my first and only experience of that kind.

The healthy man or woman who would remain so, does not need more than two or three articles of food at a sitting, the plainer the better. And, the farther we wander astray, the more abrupt the fall.

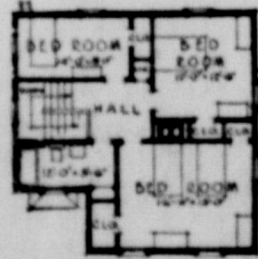
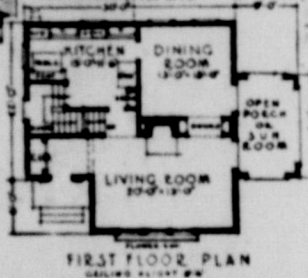

FOR THE family of four or five there is this attractive two-story, six-room house of beveled siding and slate or shingle roof.

One of the interesting features of this house is that every room has a double exposure, while the living room has three sides exposed. Extra windows not shown in the plan may at slight expense be added at either end of the living room.



This type of house affords the utmost in light and cross-ventilation. It would be well to protect it against the extremes of cold and heat by insulation with celotex for the walls and roof. Such insulation will also cut down outside noises to a marked degree, as in addition to its insulating property, celotex is an efficient sound deadener.

The living room has the much desired open fireplace and cleverly arranged bookshelves flanking the entrance to the dining room. The sun porch may be put either to the side or the back of the house, according to the builders' wishes or to conform to the demands of the lot.

Christmas Seal Sales Are Heavy

School Students May Exceed Record Of Last Year; Sale Closes Dec. 17

The Christmas seal sale contest, an annual event in Ozona schools, is doing well in its initial stages. The fifth grade, Miss Wheat's room, is leading with a total sale of \$15.57. The seventh grade, Miss Doty's room, comes next with a sale of \$12.43. The third grade, Mrs. Bishop's room, has fourth place with a total of \$6.42. The fourth grade, Miss Burton's room, comes fifth with a total of \$5.00. The freshman class leads the high school and takes third place in the whole school with a sale of \$6.85. Miss Harris and her first grade pupils

have done well with a sale of \$3.75. The second grade, Miss Evans' room, and the sixth grade, Miss Chitwood's pupils, report only slightly more than \$2.00 each. No definite report has come in from the sophomore, junior and senior classes. From the amount of stamps being called for from the central office, one of these grades may prove a "dark horse" winner at the last moment.

The tuberculosis death rate in the United States Registration area has declined almost yearly since 1900 as a result of efforts of the National Tuberculosis Association, whose work is financed through the sale of Christmas Seals. In 1924 the death rate was 90.6. In 1904, when the National Association was formed, it was 200, or over twice as high as the 1924 rate. The death rate has been more than cut in half, which means a saving at the present time, of approximately 120,000 lives each year.

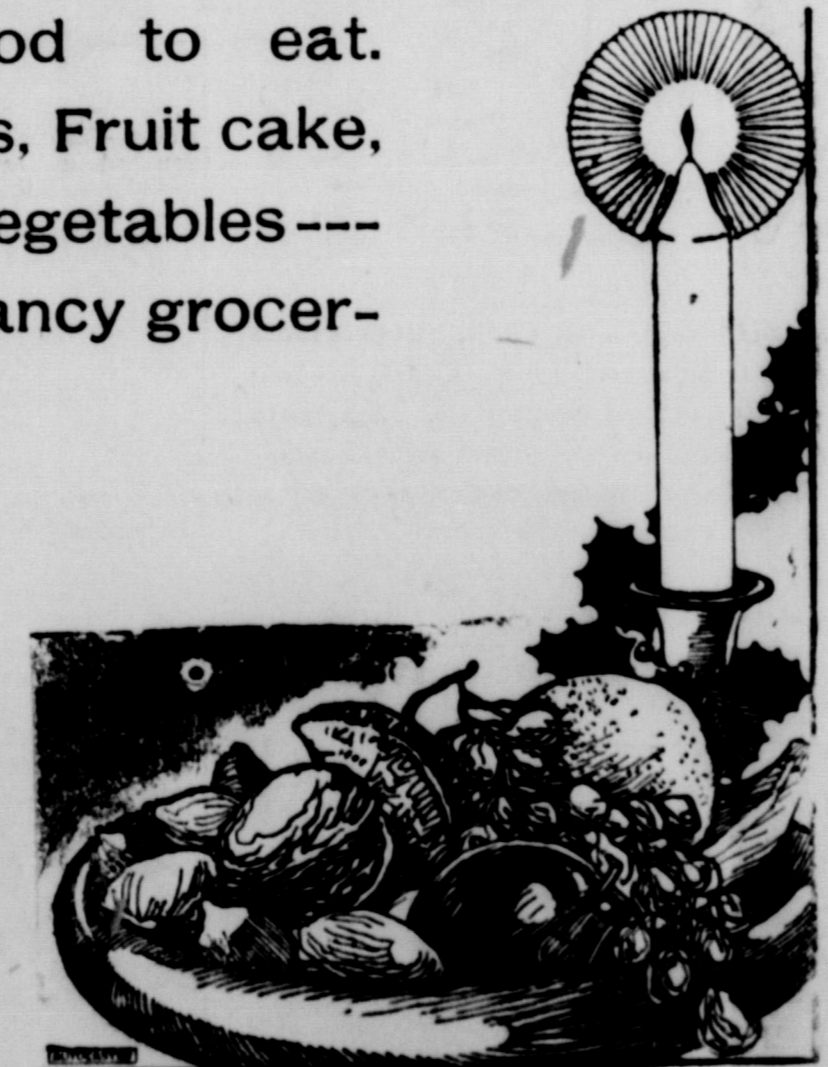

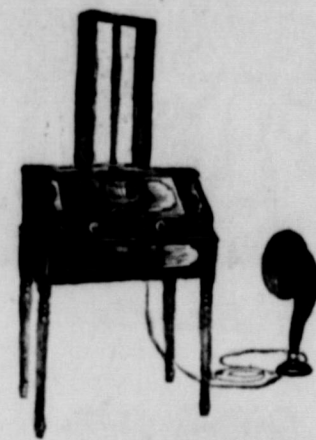
