CHANGE TO TEARS. FIGHTER'S DRUGS. IN THE TURKEY'S CRAW. PROSPERITY'S CHILDREN.

If, as a big income taxpayer, you had prepared smiles for the \$250,000,000 refund, change your smiles to tears.

Congress thinks the money would be better in the Pork Barrel than in the pockets of payers. There is demand for more public buildings.

And there is the Farm Block. It says that if Government has money to burn, it should spend some on solving farm problems, and cotton men want help to hold up cotton. Santa Claus is not coming with his \$250,000,000 bag to the big taxpayers this year.

Captain Mabbutt, manager of Dempsey's training says the champion fighter was drugged with poison in his coffee. That is possible. Prizefighting is not 100 per cent ethical.

But there is a drug successful prizefighters absorb after they get the championship that is potent, apart from chemistry. Its ingredients include: Too much money, self-indulgence, flattery. They all take these drugs and are all beaten by them in the end. And then there is Father Time; he drugs and knocks out all of us.

While this richest country, which solemnly believes that it won the war, tries to fly and can't, the defeated German nation goes as far ahead of us in engineering as it was in chemistry before the war started.

A German engineer is at work on a superplane to carry 10,000 H. P. engines, ten propellers, 130 passengers, a crew of twenty-five and cross the Atlantic in thirty-six hours.

Merely hearing about that makes us dizzy in this country.

Investigation of watchmen on Long Island grade crossings found eighteen of them asleep. Fourteen "watchers" are found peacefully slumbering on Staten Island. The human is uncertain—more reason for persuading railroads to use devices that do not go to sleep.

The best is the raised or sunken grade crossing. A good one would be a sharp right angle turn in the road before every grade crossing, compelling drivers to stop and think. Swinging red lights and ringing bells help.

The public should have, but hasn't, intelligence enough not to get run over—and not to depend on watchmen.

The committee will at that time be ready to turn the new hotel over to the stockholders and directors and everything will be lined up for operation of the hostelry. Every stockholder is urgently requested to be present for this meeting.

The plan for completing the financing of the new hotel, which cost approximately \$140,000 according to the committee report, contemplates a request upon all present stockholders to double their holdings in the new enterprise, it was reported. A campaign is now under way to secure these additional subscriptions to bring the capital stock up to the figure decided.

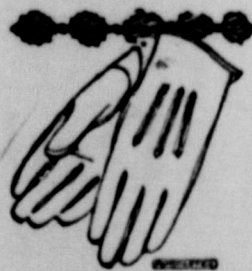

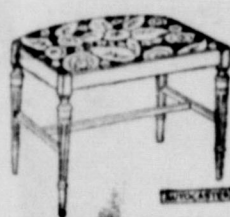

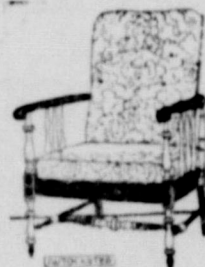

Old Santa Claus will be coming around before long now and we fellows with the big feet are going to have the laugh on the rest of you whose socks aren't big enough to hold half what you want. Ours won't either, but we'll be better off than some folks we know.

The recent heavy rains demonstrated to a nicety in Ozona just what the modern hog wallow is like. It also brought to mind one of Ozona's greatest needs—street improvement. Particularly disgraceful was the condition on the main street in front of the new Perner building and all up and down the street. Veritable bog holes were produced at the curb and automobiles that stopped in front of stores plowed through mud up to the running boards.

A lot of this mess could have been avoided if the streets had been given reasonable attention. The greatest need of all streets in town, it seems to us, is drainage and that is particularly true of the main street. For the first time in our lives we have seen a middle of a street used as a drainage ditch. Some unexplained impulse has led to a system of grading on main street whereby the dirt is thrown toward the curb until the street at the curb is several feet higher than it is in the middle. If you don't believe it, just drive up to the curb and get out of your car without pulling on the emergency brake.

A few days work with a grader and roller would put that street in at least passable condition and with a little attention it could be made into a good gravel street. To provide proper drainage, of course, it should be graded up in the center with a gutter at each side of the street where the water might be carried off. Were the street thus graded round in the center and coated with fine gravel it would be equal to a gravel pike and Ozona would not be called upon to apologize to visitors and tourists for her streets. That's the cheapest way, but the best way, of course, would be to surface them with asphalt.

The new Shannon Couch Hotel is now open to receive guests and is doing a flourishing business. The people of Ozona and Crockett county are proud of that new hotel, proud to call it Shannon Couch in honor of the two men who did so much to bring about its construction, and proud to invite the rest of Texas out to see what can be accomplished with a spirit of cooperation and determination prevailing.

The Shannon Couch Hotel, costing more than \$150,000, would be a credit to a city of 25,000 or 50,000 population. It was an undertaking that no other town in Texas would attempt, yet was brought about here without an abundance of hullabaloo or idle talk just a matter of something to be done and willing hands for it. That's the spirit that builds cities.

The late Ozona Chamber of Commerce should be resurrected to life that it might be given in charge some of the many tasks now awaiting the hand of an organization of that kind. Ozona is growing rapidly out her progress is more or less unorganized, rather a matter of chance than systematic promotion. There are wonderful possibilities in this action that need but to be boosted in

the right fashion to become valuable drawing cards.

But a Chamber of Commerce is not only a booster organization, a Chamber of Commerce secretary is not entirely a windbag as is the popular conception. A Chamber of Commerce provides a community center organization through which all undertakings of a community interest may be handled. For instance, it is near Christmas time and no plans are under way for any sort of community get together, no plans for seeing to it that the poor children of the city are remembered at Christmas time. It would be worthwhile if some central organization were active to take charge of this matter and arrange some kind of community Christmas observance, a community Christmas tree, entertainment or something of that kind.

Many times there are important matters that come before the

people of any community that demand immediate attention. Where there is no one man or organization whose duty it is to see after such matters, it is the usual case that they go neglected and the town often loses heavily by such neglect. With a little effort and a nominal cost, Ozona could have a live Chamber of Commerce that would prove a great asset to the town.

Now that the first shot has been fired, so to speak, in the campaign for a hospital here, it is well that the ammunition be replenished and the guns oiled up for some real rapid firing. It is understood that at least one other counter proposition has been put before leaders of the hospital move in the last week and it is possible that some action will be taken in the near future.

Here again we see the need of a Chamber of Commerce. This is a matter of vital importance to the future of Ozona and one that needs the concentrated attention of a strong organization that it might be brought to a realization. But since we have no Chamber of Commerce just now, it is up to us to get together on this subject and work out something definite. Those who are backing the project can not guess what the people are thinking and consequently are more or less at sea

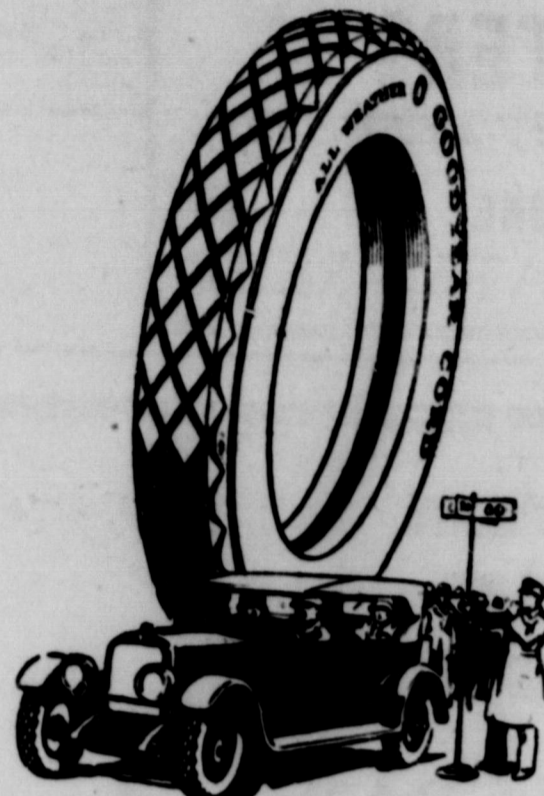
