The generous response of cities town and communities all over the state and the United States to the call for help from the little town of Rocksprings demonstrates very forcibly the fact that there is ever an undercurrent of brotherhood in the world, a common feeling of the helplessness of man before the onslaught of nature.

The Rocksprings storm disaster was one of the worst in the history of Texas. The havoc wrought by the winds in the little Edwards County capital, perched on top of the Edwards Plateau, can not be disioned by one who has not seen the wreckage. Not one building or residence in the town was left unlouched, and only two with but slight damage. Most of the business houses and residences in the town were demolished. After the dead and injured had been remov ed, the survivors, still dazed and not yet aware of the terrible blow that had been dealt their town, be gan methodically to repair the damage and clear away the debris in preparation for rebuilding.

A dogged, determined spirit pervaded the surviving residents. "Certainly, the town will be rebuilt," they answered in monotones to questions from curious visitors. The worst fate that any town in West Texas had ever suffered did not daunt them in the least. Half of the population dead or injured and the town almost completely in ruins, did not discourage them. And with this spirit, the material damage will be repaired and Rocksprings will be a better town than it was before the storm hit. But the rows of graves in the cemetery will always keep the memory of that awful night fresh in the minds of its an

DIABETES

My object in writing this article is to so acquaint my reader with the symptoms of the disease, that he will recognize them, and consult a physician at once; otherwise the diabetes may reach a very dif-ficult stage to handle, without ex-citing apprehension on the part of To begin with, diabetes is not a

disease, though its first nifestations appear in that quarter. The patient notices at first, very great over-action of the kidneys, with output as clear as water in the majority of cases; it may reach one, two or three gallons in quantity per day. An inordinate craving for sweets may be noticed; severe constipation is the rule though not constant—many people are constipated without having diabetes. Then, there is a "progssive feebleness" - the growing weaker and weaker, without apparent cause. I once saw a strong man begin to grow weak—"tired" all the time with no exertion to cause it; his limbs ached so much that he fancied he had rheumatism. Asked about his kidneys, he assert-of that "they had never in life acted so well, two gallons or more a day!" This man died within a day!" This man died within three months of diabetes, the disease having advanced too far to be nediable by any means known at that time, about twenty years ago. Whenever this feebleness sets in,

and the patient's muscles begin to grow flabby with loss of flesh, and the kidney discharge is increasing rapidly, with constipation and craving for sweets, and for more and more water than is naturally required, it is best to have the physician make an analysis of rena, evacuation, which in health amounts to about fifty ounces a day in the adult. No delay should be countenanced or indulged. The physician of today knows how to handle diabetes, the treatment of which would be out of place here.
