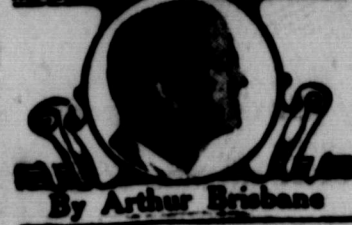

## TRIO HURT IN AUTO CRASH ON ANGELO ROAD

Fourth Occupant Of Childless Car Escapes Injury

### NO SERIOUS HURTS

Hugh Childress, Jr., Most Seriously Hurt Of Party

Hugh Childress, Jr., and Misses Maggie Mae Kay and Tessie Kyle suffered slight injuries and Claude Russell, fourth member of a party of young people headed for Barnhart to attend a dance, escaped uninjured in a head-on collision between a Ford coupe driven by Hugh Childress, Jr., and a Chrysler driven by Sheriff W. H. Augustine four miles from Ozona on the Barnhart road Friday night.

Neither Sheriff Augustine nor Mrs. Augustine, who was in the car with him, were injured. Hugh Childress was the most seriously injured of the trio injured in the Ford, suffering a deep cut on the head and other cuts and bruises. Misses Kay and Kyle suffered only slight bruises while Russell escaped without a scratch. All, however, were considerably shaken up as a result of the experience.

The accident occurred about 8 o'clock Friday night. The quartet left in the Childless car for Barnhart to attend the dance and met Sheriff Augustine at the culvert just beyond the four-mile hill. A cloud of dust hanging over the road plus bad lights were declared to be the causes of the crash.

The Ford coupe left the road after the crash, jumped a low rock wall piled up at the edge of the road and turned over into the ditch landing partly upright when it finally came to a halt. The Ford was almost completely wrecked. The top was torn off, one wheel crushed, both axles badly bent and the fenders crumpled. Sheriff Augustine's car was also badly damaged but it was not in as bad condition as the Ford. One wheel on the Chrysler was crushed and it was otherwise bent up. Both cars, after some repairs had been made, were brought to town under their own power.

Hugh Childress, Jr., was confined to his bed several days as a result of his injuries. The two young ladies, however, were up and about the next day.

## New Ford To Be Displayed Dec. 2

Grimmer Motor C. Receives Definite Announcement

Definite announcement from the Ford Motor Company that one of the new model Fords will be on display in Ozona on Friday, December 2, was received this week by the Grimmer Motor Company, local Ford dealers, and Bill Grimmer, proprietor, has announced an "open house" for Friday and Saturday, December 2 and 3, for the purpose of displaying the new car. Mr. Grimmer, with Mrs. Grimmer and Miss Dixie Davidson, left Wednesday morning for Dallas where Mr. Grimmer will attend a meeting of Ford dealers in the Dallas district. They will stop in Temple where Mrs. Grimmer will undergo medical examination and will attend the S. M. U.-T. C. U. game in Fort Worth Thanksgiving Day. The dealers meeting will be held Friday in Dallas.

Dealers attending the meeting will have an opportunity of seeing the new model Ford for the first time, it was believed. The Dallas branch is said to have received one of the new cars this week and dealers were of the opinion that the meeting of dealers was called to demonstrate the new car. Before leaving, however, Mr. Grimmer declared that he had no further information on the type of car the new model will be.

## "White Way" Plan Offered To Ozona

Utilities Co. Heads Outline Lighting System For City

Ozona is to have a "White Way" equal to that in larger cities of the state if a plan outlined by officials of the West Texas Utilities Company is adopted.

George Murphy, assistant superintendent of the company's properties in this district, was in Ozona the first of the week for the purpose of presenting to the commissioners court an outline of the lighting plan, drawn on a map of the city showing the position of the lights in both the downtown section and the residence districts.

The plan embodies a total of 48 bracket lights in the residence sections and 14 attractive lamp posts in the business section, similar to those now at Abilene. Mr. Murphy said. Eight of these lights will be scattered around the park, making it one of the beauty spots of the town at night. In addition to these lights, the plan contemplates a 500-candle-power light to be mounted on top of the courthouse tower.

## Arthur Kyle Awarded Cup As Most Valuable Man On Football Team

Arthur Kyle, fullback, was the most valuable all-around man on the 1927 Ozona High School football squad in the opinion of a committee of judges, and in recognition of his work on the team he was awarded the Flowers Cup for the most valuable player on the team.

The award was made Wednesday afternoon by Coach J. A. Floyd at a meeting of the David Crockett Literary Club, the committee having made its report the first of the week. George Bunker, tackle, was given honorable mention by the committee, being beaten by a narrow margin by Kyle on points of consideration.

Kyle is the second player to be awarded the Flowers Cup. Edward Deland won it in 1925, the first year it was awarded. The team did not finish the season last year and as a consequence the cup was not awarded.

As a prelude to the ceremony honoring the high school fullback, the Crockett Club presented a talk on Thanksgiving by Miss Mildred Davis, a poem by Miss Johnnye Cross and a playlet, "What Thanks Giving Means."

## SUPERB FORM WINS SECRET BEAUTY PRIZE

## Lions Drop Last Game To Big Lake

End Season With Only One Victory To Mar String Of Defeats

Dropping the last game of the season here Saturday to Big Lake by a score of 20 to 0, the Ozona High School Lions finished the season with a string of defeats marred by only one victory, against Rocksprings.

The disastrous outcome of the season, however, is not a fair indication of the calibre of team which represented the local high this year. The fact that the only team which the locals conquered during the season was also the only team which did not play ineligible men in the contests, that is, players who would be ineligible under University Interscholastic League rules which were observed by the Ozona coach, indicates that on a more equal footing, the Lions would have turned in a much better showing.

The invaders from Big Lake Saturday were too bulky for the locals to handle but despite the fact that they were outclassed from the start, they put up the most determined fight of the season in the closing contest.

The visitors got the breaks in the first quarter to jump off for a lead of two touchdowns. On the kick-off, Dock Lee received the ball but fumbled it and Big Lake recovered on the Ozona 15-yard line. A line buck or two and a pass put the ball across the goal line for the first counter of the game in the first few minutes of play. A well-placed drop-kick netted an extra point. It took just another few minutes after the ball was again in play for the visitors to cash in on another break, when an Ozona pass was intercepted and a Big Lake runner raced 20 yards for the second touchdown, another drop-kick gaining the extra point.

The play from then until the final frame was a kicking duel, with Ozona gaining on punts. Once in the third quarter, the locals threatened to score when the ball was pushed to Big Lake's 5-yard line. An incomplete pass on the fourth down, however, blighted the chance and Big Lake kicked to safety.

Arthur Kyle's bad punt in the fourth quarter, resulting from interference let through when the Ozona line weakened, gave the visitors their third touchdown. With first down on the 15-yard line, they pulled a fake play that sent the runner around right end for a touchdown. Another attempted drop-kick failed this time and the game ended 20-to-0.

The Ozona aggregation suffered more casualties in this game than any previously during the season. Cal Word suffered a deep gash over his right eye and Carlton Phillips a torn ligament in his right ankle. Several others were suffering from stiff knees and minor bruises.

## FLYING RANCHER CRASHES IN WINDY LANDING

Wing, Propeller And Landing Gear Broken In Mishap

### BOY 12, PASSENGER

Miller Robison And Pilot Escape Injury In Crash

A high wind proved the undoing of Vernon Cox, the "flying ranchman" here Sunday afternoon when in landing on the field at the southern edge of town, the strong wind caught under the wing of his plane and tipped it over as he taxied down the field.

The plane was badly damaged in the mishap, but the pilot and his passenger, Miller Robison, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. P. T. Robison, both escaped injury.

One wing of the plane was smashed, the propeller shattered and the landing gear torn off. The plane did not turn over, but was hoisted from the side by the wind sufficiently to drag the wing and to snap the propeller against the ground.

Mr. Cox had been flying for several hours before the accident, taking up passengers for short rides. Young Robison was given permission by his parents to go up in the plane after several days of pleading. He got plenty of thrill out of the experience, he declared.

The wind was unusually strong Sunday afternoon and several times in landing and circling on the ground, the plane was tossed about a bit, but the damage came when a gust caught under a wing and tipped it over.

Not daunted by the accident, Mr. Cox will continue flying. Immediately after the accident he placed an order with the factory which built the plane for another like it. The wrecked plane was loaded on a truck Tuesday for shipment and the new plane is expected to arrive in a few weeks.

The Val Verde County sheriff has posted a reward of \$50 for the arrest and conviction of any person guilty of destroying or defacing signs along the public highways of the county. The only thing wrong with that is that the reward should be offered TO anyone defacing or destroying signs.

The experience of two of Ozona's petite bathing beauties last Friday night should be a warning to those in the future who come suddenly into fame through the channels of personal charm. Like the "True Story" version of the pretty small-town lassie who after winning the local beauty contest goes to the big city and there falls into the hands of unscrupulous, be-moustached gentlemen about town, two of Ozona's pure young men, after winning the acclaim of their fellowtownsmen in a brilliant bathing beauty revue, were immediately "dated up" by two "chorus girls"—Holy Horrors!

Followed a wild mid-night ride along a country road (well, it was just four hours short of it), joy ran unbridled in the hearts of these buds of manhood, at last breathing the air of freedom and reckless abandon after a life of straightfaced dignity and righteousness. Suddenly two blinding lights flashed from immediately in front and bore down on the merry crowd, like the fiery eyes of a wild beast charging its prey. Followed a crash, a scream, and then one d. s. t. after another to the number of four as that many "chorus girls" and "bathing beauties" came down from somewhere to land broadside in confused heaps in the road, in the ditches and on rockpiles. There ended the would-be party, and the moral is plain—watch your step, young men.

And in the third place, when people become highly civilized they will have fewer children. Providence leaves nothing important to chance.

A private detective engaged to shadow jurors in the Fall-Sinclair oil case and "ascertain the financial condition of jurors" has been found. When government detectives got him, he had enlisted in the marines, and would have been on his way to Haiti. One juror in this case, involving a rich man and former Cabinet officer accused of bribery, said, according to government testimony, that he expected, when the case was over, to have an

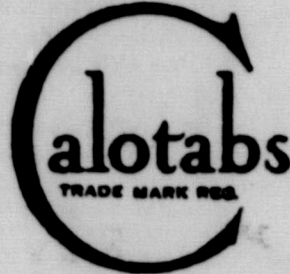

## There's Too Much Concentration At Times

Sir Oliver Lodge the other day said: "Science pursues a narrow road in the search of truth, looking neither to the right nor to the left. Well, it will soon have to take its blinkers off. The roads are not the whole universe. There is a good deal of ground between. It looks at present like a jungle and thicket—uncivilized. Well, we will have to civilize it."

The fault to which Sir Oliver refers is not confined to scientists, although it is common among them. A man may look so intently at that thing upon which his attention is fixed that he fails to see important things about him to which he gives no heed.

Some of the most important things of life come unexpectedly. Some of our most vital events are not those toward which we labored. A man should keep his eyes and be able to see things "out of the tail of his eye."

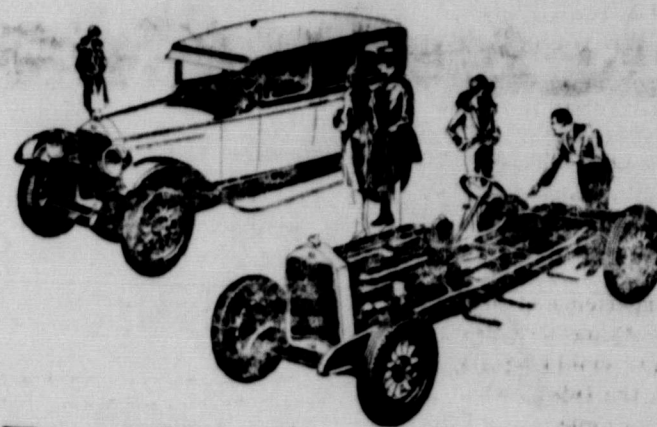

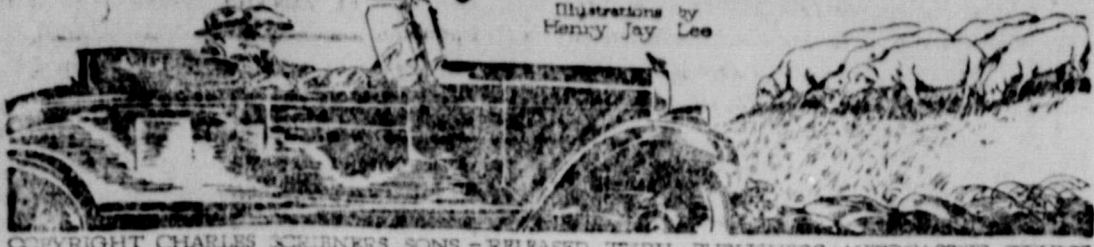

prize animals at the All-West Texas Exposition in San Angelo for the last three years. Nearly all of the boys have paid off their three-year notes in full and have increased their flocks.

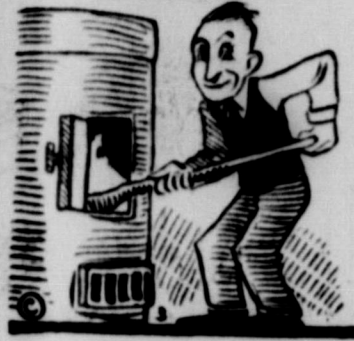

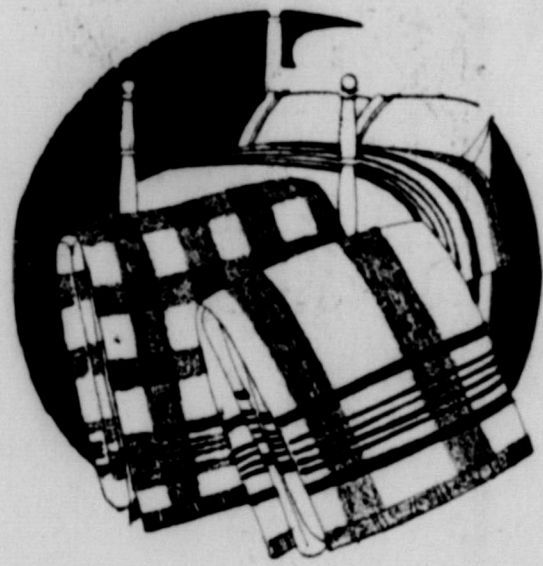
