for trucks and commercial vehicles also may be obtained at the local board office or authorized tire inspection stations. This blank, form R-536, is for the "T" book. Mr. Bailey emphasized that the truck or commercial vehicle should not register at the school but should apply at the office of the ration board and present a certificate of war necessity executed by the ODT.

Applicants for gasoline for non-highway purposes such as tractors gasoline engines used with machinery or lawn mowers may obtain their application forms at the local board office or tire inspection stations, but these executed forms also must be presented directly to the local board office.
