The commissioners court has ordered sixteen new trees for the city park. A dozen of the big mulberries that have sapped the soil there for years and have finally thrown in the sponge for lack of life giving minerals are to be removed and replaced with new trees, part of them evergreens. The court is reported to be figuring on a project of filling in the low place in the south west corner of the park with a hundred or more loads of dirt. In addition to this the grass is to be given a new lease on life with fertilizer and possibly the Woman's Club, the Chamber of Commerce or some other organization can be induced to add a touch of flowers, small shrubs and some attractive benches. All of which, together with the fourteen wrought iron light standards that are to be placed around the park as part of the Ozona "White Way," will add immeasurably to the appearance of the downtown section.

This is about the time of year that the winds that blow get just the right slant on the political bushes and give them the wag that sends the candidates scampering in all directions, limbering up their legs for the great biennial dash. Sheriff Augustine has disturbed the peaceful political waters in Crockett County by flinging his sombrero into the arena for re-election. Rumor has it there are more to come. District, state and national political are beginning to take on life. By the way, have you paid up your poll tax? Tuesday of next week is the last day of grace. This is THE

year you want to pay them, things will be lively. Better trot up now and get it done before it slips your mind.

Nothing adds quite as much to the general appearance of a home as trees and shrubs. Many Ozona home owners have beautified their premises by adding trees, shrubs and flowers this year. This is about the best time of year to set out trees. The initial expense will be repaid many times in years to come.

Speaking of pretty yards, the sheep and goat population of this county should be thinned out to the extent of a hundred or so head at least. Two or three different flocks owned by Mexicans in the Mexican suburb of Ozona have waxed fat on luscious green grass, flowers and shrubs in yards of residents in the south part of town—a situation that is calculated to make owners of these yards sit up nights thinking up nice things to do for and say to these itinerant herders, these fellows who own not a foot of land but whose flocks are fatter than those of ranchers who own 50 sections. Of course, if we owned a bunch of these animals and had an opportunity to reap their golden harvest we might feel like feeding them home grown and hand cuddled sweet peas, violets, daisies and expensive shrubs, but when it comes to providing such dainty morsels and contributing of the sweat of the brow and the coin of the other fellow's herds, it gets our goat. When pleading and warning fails to bring results in getting relief from such nuisance, we recommend the old double barreled goose neck loaded with buckshot.

We have noted before that O-

zona's housing problem was serious, but recently it has been demonstrated that it is not only serious but tragic. It was so serious in fact that it lost to Ozona one of the best doctors in all West Texas (and if we were informed on a wider territory we wouldn't hesitate to include that.)

Ozona was lucky in that after Dr. Coates suffered the loss of his household furnishings and the home in which he was living by fire that he was able to rent another house. But recently that house was sold and he was ordered to vacate by the first of February. This situation coming on the heels of the other disaster, it is not surprising that Dr. and Mrs. Coates reached the decision to leave Ozona. An effort was made to induce them to reconsider and remain here upon the condition that enough interested capital could be secured to finance the construction of a home for them. But that capital could not be interested in time to place a definite proposition before them and now our loss must be California's gain. That the gods of fortune may smile on them all the days of their lives, that they may prosper and be happier with the passing days, that their lives may be full always with the best there is in living—and that dame fortune may so stack the cards that they will sometime in the future find it to their advantage to again cast their lot with us is our sincerest wish.

**West Texas Utilities Take Over Eldorado Sonora Plants Apr. 1**

Survey for a 38-mile, 66,000 volt transmission line from Ozona to Sonora were started Monday by a crew of engineers from the transmission department of the West Texas Utilities Company. Surveys for a 20-mile, 22,000 volt line from Sonora to Eldorado will be started next month.

Operation of the electric light systems of Sonora and Eldorado will be taken over by the West Texas Utilities Company April 1. The company also takes over the ice business in the two communities.

The high tension line from Ozona will follow a direct course, slightly south of east, to Sonora. It will be completed and in operation early this spring.

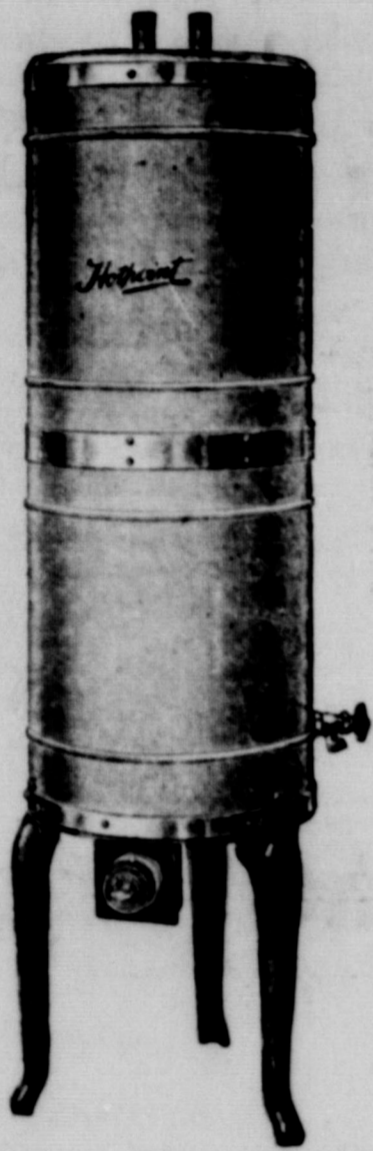

WORRIES

If we will carefully take stock of our worriesments we will find that most of them are about things that do not matter. For a caption that would be suitable at the head of the list of rules I would suggest, "What Of It?"

I suppose I had the best mother in the world. She is entitled to all of my respect and esteem because she patiently put up with me all through my childhood and cared for me until the day of her death. I can remember, however, that when I went away from home in my younger days she was solicitous that I should wear clean underwear and stockings because she said that if there was to be a train wreck and my body was found, what would people think if they found out I had on dirty underwear, as though I should care about the state of my underwear when I was a corpse.

Much of the care and trouble that mothers take is of the Martha kind, for Martha was "careful and troubled about many things." Suppose the children do litter up the floor and pick flowers in the garden and tramp into the house with muddy feet. Anybody who knows children expects that and if they don't know children they are out of luck.

It might be all right to see that our boys are washed behind the ears and that their finger nails are clean, but you should remember that while these things should not be left undone there are some more important things. It is important, for instance, that your children should always think of you pleasantly and gratefully. Four affection for your son counts more with him than your solicitude for his appearance.

It is well that the dandruff is brushed off your husband's coat collar and that his tie is right and his boots are polished, but if you do nothing else for him but call his attention to these peccadillos and by the idea will seep into

his head that you are nagging. What he wants most of all is to keep his love and esteem for you and you ought to work at making yourself worthy of that much more than to work at how he will look to other people.

I do not mean to underrate the little attentions that should be bestowed upon those we love, but I emphasize the fact that these little things are of small importance compared with the greater matters of life.

On one occasion it was said by a wise man that the Pharisees paid tithes of mint, anise and cumin, but neglected the greater matters

of the law, so we sometimes make the mistake of looking for flecks of dust when we should be admiring the landscape.

It is all a matter of proportion. The principal thing to learn in living is how to value things, how to be particular about the essentials and give small heed to the non-essentials. 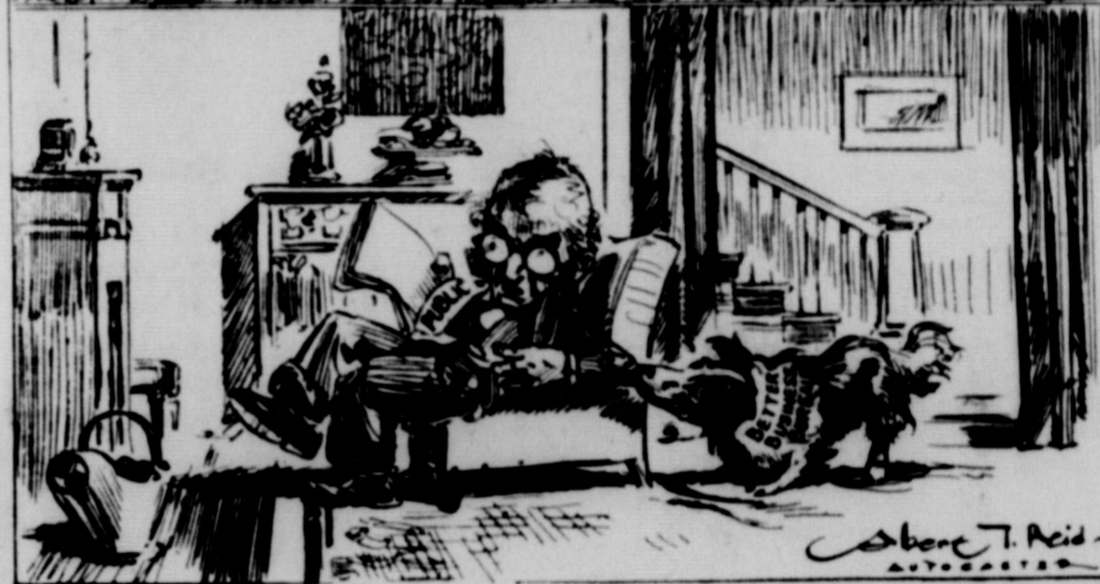

Things You Should Know



Winter Warnings

At this season of the year, foods improperly stored, vegetables left in corners of cellars, open milk containers and such like, may become disease carriers unsuspected. In warm weather decomposition of animal or vegetable foods liberates a warning odor or appearance or flavor, before much harm is done; in winter it is different; stale vegetables, "specked" fruits from stores, and other impurities do not make their imperfections known so quickly. It behooves our citizens and housekeepers to look well to the sanitation of homes, from every angle, and to enforce the strictest cleanliness of premises occupied, as well as of foods and water consumed.

Cold weather is preservative to many of the most dangerous bacteria; it is not known just how long typhoid and para-typhoid germs will live and remain virulent in cold, but it is a long time. Once within the human system, they develop rapidly into the very serious, winter-time diseases named for them. It is of the utmost importance that your ice-box be watched; it is not always sanitary because you notice no impure odor from the jar of cream that spilled last week, and left a greasy smear on two or three of the shelves for several days; it looks and tastes as fresh as it did then—but some of the whipped cream or minced ham overflowed into it in some way—you may have a pretty fair culture of mixed bacteria that live at low temperatures.

We should be more careful in winter than in summer, to have pure food and water. Inspections of city water should be doubled, by the most vigilant, capable officials. Dairymen who peddle milk in bottles—you have a right to demand cleanliness. Winter epidemics are among the most fatal known. Be vigilant and save trouble.

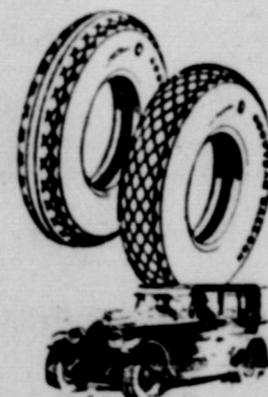

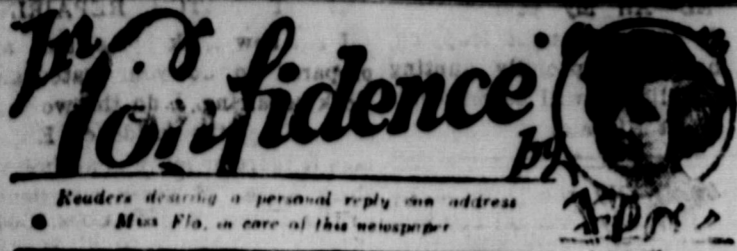

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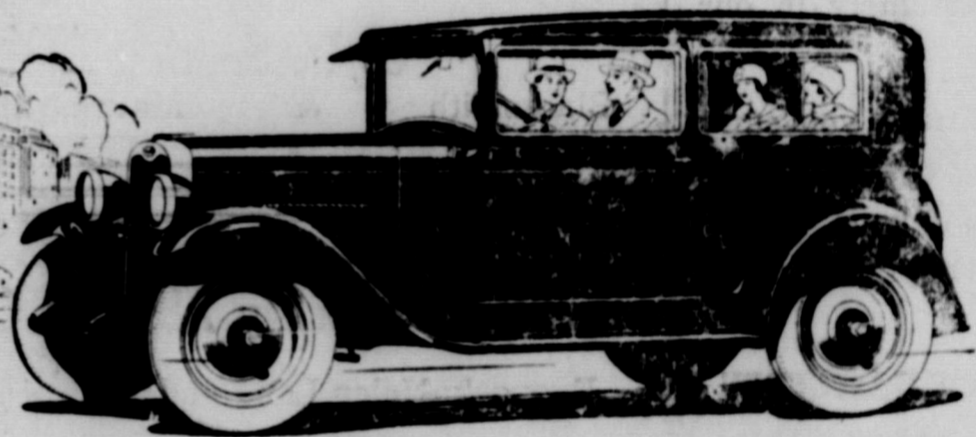
