ON TAKING ADVICE. MEMORIAL TO COLUMBUS. EDUCATION CAN END CRIME.

Secretary Hoover summarizes the last year as regards wages and employment thus:

"There was little unemployment except during a moderate recession near the end of the year and the rate of real wages remained higher than anywhere else in the world, or than in any other time in the world's history. The high prospect of the year did not represent merely an upward swing in the business cycle, but was the result of that general and permanent progress which has marked the nation's business."

"That is a situation for American business men to keep in their minds, thus avoiding damaging, doubtful hesitation. Business and prosperity in this country have climbed to a permanently higher plane and, barring foolishness, will stay there."

John D. Rockefeller, eighty-eight years old, immediately changes his "stance" at golf, when told by a professional that he stood too close to the ball. That change lengthened his drive by twenty yards.

Mr. Rockefeller has said that his success in the beginning was due to patience and economy. It may have been due also to his ability to listen to others and take advice. That is a thing that many young men who would like to be big men have not learned to do.

Christopher Columbus' memory is to be honored by building a magnificent lighthouse costing \$4,000,000. What is left of Columbus' body will be under the lighthouse on a reservation given by the Government of San Domingo. Columbus would be puzzled by one feature of his memorial, namely, lights shooting up into the air to guide fliers. He would think angels were expected. Architects are invited to compete in this enterprise, which should stir the imagination.

The late Gavin McNab, an extremely able lawyer of San Francisco, leaves \$40,000 to two clients to make up for McNab's bad advice about investments.

It is fortunate for the heirs of certain gentlemen in and out of Wall Street that such requests are not customary or compulsory. If Wall Street gentlemen had to make good losses caused by bad advice on investments, there would not be much left for legal heirs.

The United States Employment Service predicts good times and plenty of work for 1928.

The old bugaboo of a bad election year seems to have vanished. The banks of millionaire Americans are thinner, only 29,897 in 1926 against 30,518 in 1925. The ultra rich, however, are increasing. Two hundred and twenty-eight Americans had incomes of \$1,000,000 or more last year, only 20 in 1925.

Quite a few have incomes above \$5,000,000 a year. The Government does not give their names.

Rusty Smith Buys 27 Acres Of Land

Former Dudley Tract In North Part Of City Sold

A tract of land containing 27 acres, located just off Main Street adjoining the West Texas Utilities Company's sub-station lot in the north part of Ozona was purchased this week by Rusty Smith, proprietor of the Sunshine Dairy, from Pleas Childress and Scott Peters. Total consideration in the deal amounted to approximately \$3900, it was reported.

A well of water, windmill and rock tank are located on the land and several pecan trees are also on the tract.

Mr. Smith does not contemplate making any improvements on the property for the present, he declares, but in the future plans to erect a home on the land and possibly to move his dairy herd and equipment to that location.

Court Marks Boundaries And Designates Polling Places

Precinct boundaries were outlined, polling places designated and election officials named by the County Commissioners Court this week in preparation for holding elections in Crockett County this year.

Six precincts were designated by the court and the following polling places and election officials were named:

Precinct 1—Court House, Ozona. John Bailey and Houston Smith, Democrats, and Jones Miller and J. R. Kersey, Republicans, Judges. John Bailey, presiding judge.

Precinct 2—Leon Powell School House. L. P. Powell, Democrat, presiding judge, Henry Wiggall, Republican, associate judge.

Precinct 3—Wiley Owens Ranch House. A. C. Hoover, Democrat, presiding judge, and Claude Owens, Republican, associate judge.

Precinct 4—Collins Coates Ranch House. Collins Coates, Democrat, presiding judge, Sid Millsbaugh, Republican, associate judge.

Precinct 5—Grube School House. George Thompson, Democrat, presiding judge, W. T. Noelke, Republican, associate judge.

Precinct 6—Main Office Building of Pecos Valley Power and Light Co. J. R. Jones, Democrat, presiding judge, and Glenn Jordan, Republican, associate judge.

Powell Field Roads Are Ordered Worked

Roads leading in and out of Powell Field, Crockett County oil field will soon be worked and put in first class condition. An order for working the roads was passed this week by the Commissioners Court in its regular session, and Alexander Krause, an experienced road worker, was put in charge of the work as overseer.

The court order cites the statute requiring all men between the ages of 21 and 45 to spend five days working the roads, offer a suitable substitute or pay \$1 a day in lieu of work on the road. The boundaries of the area included in the order are as follows: Beginning at the north line of Crockett County where it crosses the west line of Section 20, Block 7, University land, thence east to the east line of Block 12, University land, thence south to the north line of Section 30, Block BB, thence west to a point due south of the place of beginning and north to the place of beginning.

Mrs. Paul Hallcomb Suffers Two Broken Ankle Bones In Fall

Mrs. Paul Hallcomb was taken to a San Angelo hospital Tuesday morning for medical attention following a fall Tuesday morning near the postoffice which resulted in the fracture of two bones in her ankle.

Mrs. Hallcomb was on her way to visit her mother, Mrs. Jones Miller when she slipped and fell on the sidewalk in front of the postoffice. She lay on the sidewalk several minutes before her plight was discovered and she was carried to the Miller home. A message to friends here Tuesday afternoon indicated that attending physicians had found two bones in the ankle fractured. She was reported resting well at that time, however.

ICE SIGNS ORDERED

Orders for ornamental iron supports for fifteen pairs of electric signs to be placed at ice stations in eleven communities by the West Texas Utilities Company have been placed with Southern Ornamental Iron Works, Dallas. The signs will be placed in pairs this spring at ice stations at Abilene, Cisco, San Angelo, Menard, Ozona, Vernon, Quanah, Santa Anna, Coleman, Pailinger and Stamford.

Crockett County Land Now 35 Times As Valuable As It Was Thirty Years Ago

Ozona Paper Of 1898 Contains Interesting Data

Crockett County land is 35 times as valuable today as it was 30 years ago.

An interesting comparison of present land values with those of 1898 can be gained from an item in the Ozona Courier of June 21, 1898, this ancient newspaper being the property of Welton Bunger of Ozona, who loaned it to the Stockman under threat of dire consequences should it be lost or mutilated.

An item in the paper headed "Big Sale of Land" gives an account of the sale of 29 sections of land near Howard Well at 40 cents an acre. Land adjoining this tract and possibly including a part of it, we have it from old timers, was sold recently by Will Odom at \$14 an acre. Following is the item in the paper of 1898:

"The largest sale of lands ever recorded in Crockett County to private individuals was placed on record in the clerk's office this week. It was the purchase by James Bryson and W. H. Montgomery of Comanche and Francis Smith of San Antonio of 29 sections of land lying between James Mitchell's ranch and Howard Well in this county, for forty cents an acre. Mr. Montgomery is now down surveying out the land along with County Surveyor Drake. He has also leased about 30 sections more will have it fenced at once and commence drilling for water. Says he will have plenty of water if he has to go to China for it—and it is needless to say that when he gets it he will not only have one of the finest but the finest ranch in Crockett County."

The Courier was owned and edited by Claude and Roy Hudspeth. On the front page of the paper is a poem (?) written by Congressman Claude Hudspeth (then just plain Claude) entitled "A Ditty On Roy." The narrative verse relates an experience Roy had in attempting to put an end to a cat which had apparently interfered with his love-making in company with a certain young lady. In view of Congressman Hudspeth's political fortunes of the present, we will refrain, however, from dragging out the skeleton of his adolescent poetic efforts of 1898.

There are other paragraphs, advertisements, etc. in the paper that will be of interest to present residents of Ozona and especially the old timers who recognize the names of people in the day's news at that time. Below are a few items culled from the sheet:

"Ice cream 10 cents a saucer, Milk shakes and other cold drinks 5 cents. Archie Cochran's."

"Mr. W. F. Sheffield was in from Boone City the latter part of the week looking into the matter of securing a carrier for the O-

zona-Boone City mail-said town now being changed to Sheffield."

This item goes on to relate that the carrier had been offered two-thirds of the proceeds of the Sheffield postoffice, and the gross business of the office was estimated at 45 cents a month. "Mr. Sheffield could not find anyone so destitute of principle as to rob Uncle Sam in any such manner as to take as much as two-thirds of the proceeds of said office for carrying the mail," the article concludes.

"George Metcalf came down Tuesday morning and smole a smile upon his customers at Carmichael, Perner & Co's that had not been visible before in many months. The smile was not forced for a girl had arrived at George's house the previous night, and everybody who saw it remarked that it resembled its father just a little bit."

"Silver Exchange Saloon, James Gillespie, Propr. Finest brands of wine, whisky and cigars. Come around and see us, boys, when you want to have a nice sociable time."

The following paragraph is taken from an account of the Democratic convention:

"Mr. Johnson—Mr. Chairman, I move you that this convention instruct its delegate to vote for Hon. Joseph D. Sayers for governor. (First, last and all the time," added Mr. Foote.) The motion carried unanimously."

"Mail route. Through route from Ozona to San Angelo in a day. Single trip \$5, round trip, \$8."

"Chas. Schauer was up from Ozona this week after his household goods. He has leased his beautiful residence property on Twelfth Avenue for one year at \$250 having bought the elegant Joe M. is place in Ozona for \$3,500. Charlie says he has quit Angelo for good. Hope not. — Press"

"Mrs. A. M. Buck was in the city yesterday sporting a bran new back, presented as a birthday present."

"General J. M. McKenzie, the Big Lake cattle baron, was in Ozona today shaking hands with his many friends and each handshake was usually accompanied by a loaded schooner, ice cold, or the schooner followed immediately thereafter."

"O. K. Livery and Feed Stable, Elie Schwalbe, propr. Hacks, Surrys, Buggies and all classes of vehicles to hire."

"Fourth in Ozona. Three days of Amusement. Barbecue, cow pony races, roping contests, grand ball, etc."

Sees Big Hike In Frigidaire Sales

Otho Drake Returns From Interesting Dealers Meet

More electric refrigerators will be installed in 1928 than in any previous year in the history of the business, according to Otho Drake local commercial manager of the West Texas Utilities Co., who has returned from a regional convention of Frigidaire Corporation held recently in Dallas. Nostrums and Quacks.

Fake cure-alls still abound on druggists' shelves, and to our credit be it said they remain there longer than they would have done fifteen years ago. Our people are learning better than to trust their health to dangerous experiments—the experiment with bottled guess-work.

At present the radio seems to be favorite instrument of the charlatan; he can reach the patient with his oily tongue, his persuasive voice—his glittering promise, and, always for the fee in advance! Our enterprising broadcasters, perfectly willing to get "overnight" expenses, seem to take on the vast army of peddlers—even the evil propaganda of those who prey on the sick and afflicted.

The listening sick man can protect himself, if he will exercise common-sense and reasonable business sagacity; the following suggestions may be helpful:

(1) No really capable, honest physician or surgeon advertises over radio, or by any other method, he doesn't need to.

(2) All quacks advertise, because their cash receipts depend upon the number of people who do not know them, that they can inveigle; their former dupes are no more profitable to them.

(3) If you have a chronic disease, and hear an alluring proposition over the radio to cure you, write to your State Board of Health for reliable information before nibbling at the bait.

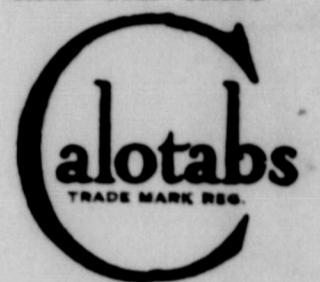
