provement for the town. A project similar to the plan Sonora has worked out has been agitated in Ozona for some time. Such a plan would take in a mile of road through Ozona, beginning at the fair grounds gate and ending a block off the main street on the road west, following the route of the Old Spanish Trail through the business section of Ozona. This mile of road would take in about twelve blocks through the town.

If the State Highway Departcenter strip of this mile of the Old Spanish Trail no doubt Ozona property owners would be interested in paving the side strips. If the county would take care of say a third of the cost and the property owners two-thirds, the project might be realized.

A mile of paved road through Ozona would be no small improve ment for the town. It would eliminate two-thirds of the dust and would prove itself worth many times the cost.

But while a mile of paved road through the town of Ozona would be a worthwhile undertaking. if the project were extended to include paving the Old Spanish Trail from the west edge of town to the Sutton County line and an agree-
