

## OZONA GIANTS WIN 2 OUT OF 3 FROM SONORA

### Bronchs Are Completely Routed In Deciding Contest Sunday

#### SCORE IS 11 TO 3

## Bud Smith, Sonora Ace, Driven From Box By Giant Sticks

The Giants rode the Bronchs to a standstill in Sonora Sunday.

The crucial encounter of a three game series between the two teams was decisively won by the Ozona aggregation by a top-heavy score of 11 to 3 on the Sonora diamond Sunday afternoon before a big crowd of Sonora and Ozona rooters.

Bud Smith, ace hurler for Sonora, was pounded for fifteen hits by the Giants. Smith, on whom the Bronchs depended to take the deciding game from Ozona, threw down his glove in the eighth inning and left the mound. Ridley finished the game for the Bronchs in the box.

Kelly King, Giant moundsman deluxe, pitched one of the best games of the season despite the fact that his arm had not fully recovered from a recent slight injury. Bronch batsmen were able to get but six hits from his offerings.

The Giants started off with a cloud over their heads. Pudd Smith center fielder for the Bronchs in his first time at the plate in the initial frame connected with one of Kelly's fast ones and parked it over two fences back of center field for a home run. B. Hamilton another stage of the game smack on the nose and bounced it over the fence in center field. Some fast fielding and a perfect throw by Bob Weaver in the middle garden, however, wrecked Hamilton's chances for a home-run and he was tagged out at the plate by ten feet. Weaver relayed the ball from the fence to Frank Russell's glove back of second. Russell's smoking liner to Cobb behind the plate turned a home-run into an "out."

The Giants hit Smith almost at will "Slow Motion" Cobb got four safeties out of five times at bat while Rex Russell and Lockhart hit safely three times each out of five times at the plate. The Giants were credited with two errors while the Bronchs were chalked up with five.

## Russell Announces For County Clerk

### Last Minute Announcement Makes 3rd Contest For Co. Office

George Russell, a resident of Crockett County for more than 15 years and former deputy county clerk under Tom Nolan, Saturday announced his candidacy for county clerk of Crockett County subject to the action of the Democratic primary in July.

Mr. Russell's announcement for the clerk's office made the third contest for public office in this county in the coming election. The first contest to develop was that for sheriff, W. S. Willis, county road supervisor, opposing Sheriff W. H. Augustine for re-election. D. E. Dunlap is opposing Justice of the Peace Nelson Hawkins for justice of the peace in Precinct No. 1.

George Russell made a last minute announcement in the race for clerk, Saturday being the last day for making application to County Chairman Houston Smith of the Democratic party for a place on the ticket. The county ticket as drawn by the executive committee Monday is as follows:

Senate out of a field of six. J. D. Parnell of Wichita County is in first place in the line-up for lieutenant governor with four others seeking the office. Claude Pollard is unopposed for re-election as attorney general.

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## COMMITTEE IS NAMED TO PUSH BRIDGE PLANS

### Seven Representative Citizens Chosen At Mass Meeting

A committee composed of seven representative citizens of Ozona was named at a mass meeting at the Hotel Ozona Monday noon, following the regular Lions Club meeting, to work out details of a proposal to construct a bridge across Johnson Draw at some point which is found to be to the greatest advantage.

The Lions Club adjourned its meeting early in order that a delegation of residents across the draw might have an opportunity to present their proposal for the construction of a bridge and to discuss the project as a mass meeting of citizens.

L. L. Bewley and P. T. Robison headed the representatives from residents across the draw. They explained what had been done in the way of working out details toward realization of the plan. A bridge engineer was called into conference several days ago and gave estimates of the probable length of the span which would be necessary to take care of the high water and also the probable cost. A 100-foot span would be adequate for this length at approximately \$6,000.

A committee of citizens living across the draw recently circulated a petition asking that a bridge be constructed across the draw and this petition together with an explanation of the plans of residents of that area was presented to the commissioners court. At that time, Mr. Bewley explained, the committee contemplated a temporary structure to permit residents of that section to get to town in time of flood waters, but it was found that a majority was in favor of a permanent bridge. Data is now being gathered on this proposal, he said.

The committee named by Chairman M. M. Fulmer to follow up the project and attempt to work out a feasible plan for its realization is composed of P. T. Robison, Chairman, L. L. Bewley, S. E. Couch, W. R. Baggett, Early Baggett, Ira Carson and A. C. Hoover.

**BRIDGE THE DRAW**  
 (From The Batpist Bulletin)  
 The condition brought about by the overflow of Johnson's Draw Sunday brings us again to the oft discussed need of a bridge across it. While this is a religious and not a political paper, it seems that there are issues involved which should call us as citizens and Christians to a position on this matter. Indeed, there are religious reasons why the draw should be bridged, that are not alone included in a large group of people being kept from church worship. Jesus linked in his ministry preaching, teaching and healing the sick and anything that interferes with this program needs to be fixed. On several occasions He ministered to the material needs of the people, leading from that to the spiritual. Hundreds of people were held across the draw, many without food for several hours. Suppose a number of things, none of which are impossible or even improbable and the need of a bridge is apparent. A bridge ought to be built by the county out of tax money. It will be a public benefit.

**NOTICE OF ELECTION**

Pursuant to order of Commissioner's Court of Crockett County made and entered because of a legal and valid petition filed in said Court it is my order and notice that an election be held at the several voting boxes in Crockett County, Texas on June 23rd, 1928 to determine whether horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle, and also hogs, sheep and goats shall be permitted to run at large in said county.

Polls will be opened in the following places:-

In Precinct No. 1 at Court House and I appoint John Bailey presiding officer.

In Precinct No. 2 at the school house in Leon Powell, and I appoint L. P. Powell presiding officer.

In Precinct No. 3 at ranch house of Wilse Owens, and I appoint A. C. Hoover presiding officer.

In Precinct No. 4 at Collins Coates Howard Well ranch house and I appoint Sid Millsbaugh presiding officer.

In Precinct No. 5 at school house in El Masho and I appoint George L. Thompson presiding officer.

In Precinct No. 6 at main office building of Pecos Valley Power & Light Company and I appoint J. R. Jones presiding officer.

All persons qualified to vote in a general election may vote in this.

However, you are cautioned that because one statute covers hogs, sheep and goats and another statute enumerates only horses, mules, jacks, jennets and cattle it will require two ballot boxes and a set of returns for each box, and each voter will cast two ballots, one for the hogs, sheep and goat box, and the other for the horse, mule, jack jennets, and cattle box.

In either case the tickets are the same, and the voter desiring to keep hogs, sheep and goats from running at large will hand in a ticket which has written or printed on it "For the Stock Law"; if the voter does not wish to restrain hogs, sheep and goats from run-

ning at large he will hand in a ticket which has written or printed on it "Against the Stock Law." Whoever ticket he hands in will be deposited by the officers of election in the "Sheep" box, after of course it has been numbered and the voter's name and number entered on the poll list. Then the same voter in like manner hands in a ticket for the Horse, Mule, Jacks, Jennets and Cattle box. The officers of election will be supplied with two sets of Election papers, and they are asked to keep in mind that they are really holding two elections.

Officers of Election have ten days after election in which to de-

liver the Returns to County Judge of Crockett County at Ozona, Texas.
