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## HUDSPETH ASKS ALL RANCHMEN TO PARTY 17TH

### Gov. Moody And Sen. Mayfield To Be Among Speakers

## DAVIDSON PRESIDE Many Crockett County Ranchers Plan To Attend

Ranchmen from all over the stock raising section of West Texas are expected to be on hand at Claude Hudspeth's Devil's River Ranch on Saturday, November 17, for the barbecue and rodeo entertainment and conference on ways and means of eradicating the blow fly and screw worm, as guests of the congressman and his brother, Roy Hudspeth.

An invitation has been broadcast by Congressman Hudspeth to ranchmen, newspaper men and all others interested in the subject and many Crockett County ranchmen have signified their intention of attending. Judge Chas. E. Davidson of Ozona will preside at the meeting. Congressman Hudspeth's health being such that he will be unable to take active charge of the meeting.

The following letter, received recently by Early Baggett, local ranchman, from Congressman Hudspeth gives complete details of the events of the day:

Ranch,  
Juno, Texas.

"Dear Early:  
"Since my return from Honolulu, a large number of stockmen have approached me on the subject of assisting in getting the Federal Government to eradicate the blow fly and screw worm in the livestock section of West Texas. I took occasion to discuss this matter with the Department of Agriculture at Washington just before I was forced to go to the Hospital last Spring. The Department is perfectly agreeable to co-operating with the State authorities and has ample funds for the purpose.

"It is estimated by Secretary Jardine that the blow fly and screw worm have cost Texas alone annually over ten million dollars. If a state law can be passed along the lines of the scab and tick bills it is believed by those who have given thought to the question, and with the efforts of ranchmen of Menard and other counties before us, that the blow fly can be eradicated.

"Therefore, after discussing this important matter with ranchmen at Merton, Sherwood, San Angelo, Sonora, Rock Springs, Leakey and Del Rio, myself and brother, Roy Hudspeth, have decided to give a barbecue at my Devil's River Ranch on November 17, an old fashioned dance at night to which all persons interested are invited to attend, accompanied by their families.

"I have written Governor Dan Moody and he will be present; also Senator Mayfield will likely be present and deliver addresses. I am also writing State Senators and Representatives in this livestock section urging them to be in attendance and deliver addresses. Some ranchmen having evidenced a desire to exhibit a good buck, billie and a good bull or cow, and expressing a desire to take up the organization of a West Texas Good Ridders Association, I will state I will be glad to have them do so and will furnish ample pens, water and feed gratis. My idea is to raise the best livestock in West Texas of any portion of the United States. So let's acquaint our people with same and keep our money at home.

"The President of the Texas Cattle Raisers Association will be present and I especially desire the President of the Sheep and Goat Raisers Association of Texas and Executive Committee to aid in the deliberations, and anyone else will be welcome who may feel an interest in this matter. ## Lions Again On Slogan Search

### Contest Winners Paid But Club Seeks New One For Sign

The Ozona Lions Club is again on the scent of a suitable slogan for Ozona.

The winning slogan in the recent contest sponsored by the club, "Land of Fleecy Flocks," which was selected by the committee of judges out of a list of 168 slogan suggestions, has been declared inappropriate to typify Ozona and at the suggestion of the author of the slogan the club has decided to again open the search to get a more satisfactory slogan to be incorporated in the proposed electric sign.

Winners of first, second and third place in the recent contest, however, will be paid the prize money offered by the club, totaling \$17.50. Mrs. J. H. Meredith, winner of first prize, through her husband, Rev. J. H. Meredith, suggested to the club that the slogan selected included only one industry here and did not do complete justice to the town of Ozona.

A committee charged with the duty of making a thorough investigation into the status of the slogan question and to report at the next meeting of the club with some plan for securing a suitable slogan was named by President Fulmer at the luncheon Monday. The committee is composed of Dr. J. A. Fustell, chairman, J. H. Meredith, Dr. R. Rosenberg, Dr. G. Miller and Scott Peters.

## Constable Faces Robbery Charge

### Complaint Against El Masho Officer After Gambling Raid

Arthur Moore, constable at El Masho, Crockett County oil town in the western edge of the county, faces a charge of robbery with firearms following the filing of a complaint in Justice W. M. Johnigan's court here Sunday morning by five of six men arrested by Moore on charges of gaming.

The six men, G. W. Davis, W. B. Burk, Jack Yaunt, L. C. Crowell, W. I. Walker and B. I. Hughes, all said to be from Pecos County, entered pleas of guilty in the local court to charges of gaming and paid fines of \$10 and costs. Five of the number then swore out a complaint against the constable charging robbery with firearms, alleging that Moore raided the poker game, took all money on the table and made one of the number "dig up" the rest from his pocket. When they asked Moore what he wanted them to do, the complainants alleged, the officer told them they could "go back to Pecos County for all he cared."

Moore was arrested by Sheriff W. H. Augustine and was immediately released under \$500 bond to await the action of the grand jury.

## Cemetery Association Completes Drive For 1928 Expense Funds

The drive recently launched by the Ozona Cemetery Association for the purpose of raising enough money to pay the salary of the keeper, H. A. Ellledge, and to meet other necessary expenses until the first of the year, has been brought to a successful conclusion, according to reports by Mrs. Jas. J. Berkamp, chairman.

Approximately \$250 was needed by the association to take care of its expenses until the first of the year. At that time the dues of the membership will be payable and the association's treasury will be replenished.

## Furhman No. 1. Padgett Gets Sulphur Water; Test Will Be Shot

Furhman Petroleum Corporation's No. 1 Padgett in west central Crockett County was plugging back Friday from 1897 feet, in lime, where Thursday it encountered three to four bails of sulphur water.

The test will be shot with 260 quarts from 1780 to 1835 feet in lime, which at this interval of 55 feet was saturated with oil.

## HOOVER WINS PRESIDENCY BY LANDSLIDE

### Democrats Concede Election Of Republican Nominee

## CROCKETT HOOVER

### State Demo Ticket Wins Here But Presidential Vote Is G. O. P.

Piling up an unprecedented majority of the popular vote in the general election held Tuesday, Herbert Hoover, Republican nominee for the Presidency of the United States, will receive the largest vote in the electoral college of any President in the history of the Republic.

Latest returns available Wednesday night gave Hoover a total of 444 electoral votes while Al Smith accounted for only 87. It was being predicted that complete returns from states whose count had not been completed would run Hoover's majority still higher.

For the first time in the history of Texas, voters of this state cast a majority for a Republican nominee and Hoover will receive the 29 electoral votes from Texas. This fact was practically assured Wednesday night, although complete returns were not in. Hoover held a lead of approximately 17,000 over Smith in this state and observers predicted that a final count would run the total to 25,000.

Smith lost his home state of New York by a total of 75,000 votes. The Democratic nominee for Senator in New York carried the state by a majority of 100,000 while the Democratic governor was elected by a majority of 60,000.

Crockett County gave the Republican nominee a sweeping majority, a total of 266 votes being cast for Hoover and 68 for Smith. The Democratic state and county ticket carried easily over the state. All proposed amendments to the Texas constitution, submitted at the general election, carried by a big majority.

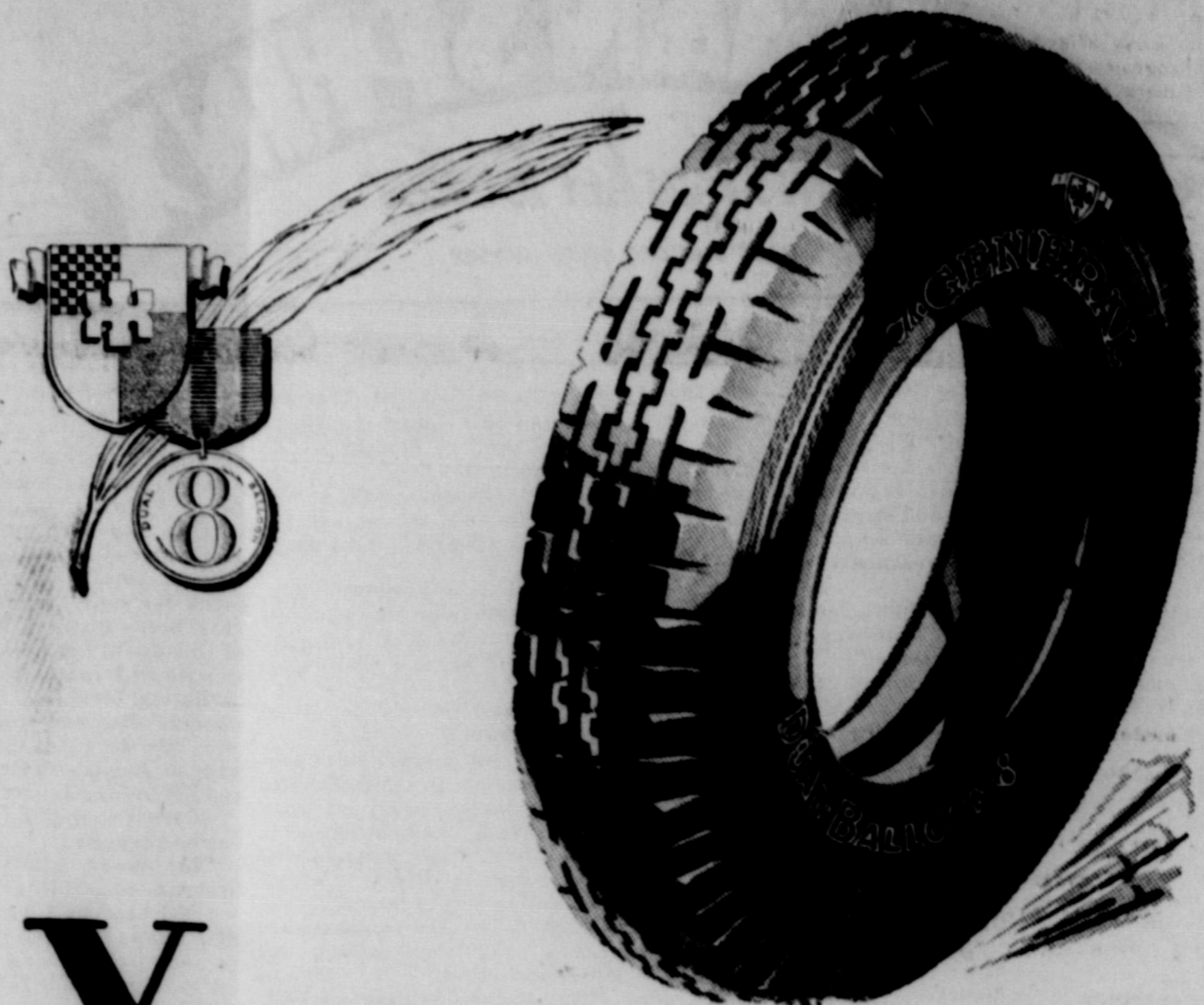

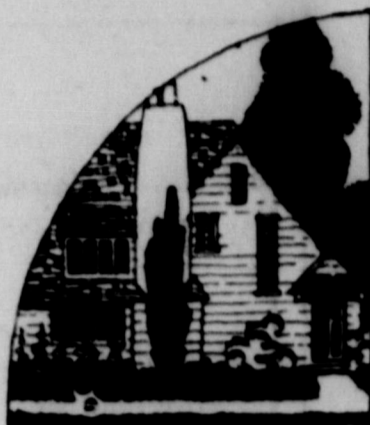

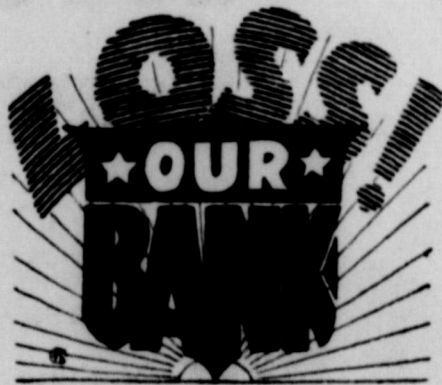
