

Dr. Fussell Buys 13-Section Ranch

\$65,000 Deal Involves Turner Ranch In Edge Of Travis Co.

A deal involving a total consideration of approximately \$65,000 was completed the first of the week whereby Dr. J. A. Fussell of Ozona became the owner of the old Turner ranch in Travis County, about 30 miles from Austin. Dr. Fussell acquired approximately 13 sections of land. The purchase was made from Mrs. Nellie T. Evans, owner.

The ranch acquired by Dr. Fussell is well improved, is fenced completely, has a rock home and is traversed by the Perdado River, one of the prettiest streams in that section. The land is well suited to cattle raising. Dr. Fussell said. No stock was included in the deal, it was reported.

Sheriff Captures 1650 Bottles Beer

Raid On El Masho Vacant House Nets Huge Haul

One of the largest quantities of beer captured in this county in many years was discovered by Sheriff W. S. Willis and Tom Casbeer in a vacant house in El Masho last Friday. Approximately 1650 bottles of beer and around 2,000 empty bottles, as well as several big crocks filled with mash, were found in the house and destroyed by the officers.

No arrests were made in connection with the find. All doors and windows to the house were locked and the local officers were unable to find who had possession of the keys.

The huge store of liquor was seen by Sheriff Willis when he peeped through one window from which the blind had fallen. The officers then broke into the house and found the beer stacked around the walls and an ice box filled with cold beer in one corner. More than a half day was spent breaking the bottles, the beer running off in little rivulets for a distance of several hundred yards from the house.

Pipe Line Worker Is Run Down By Machine

A man about 50 years old, employed on the Texas Pipe Line Company's line now being laid through this county, was taken to a San Angelo hospital in the Joe Oberkamp ambulance Monday morning for treatment for injuries received when he was run down by an air compressor.

The man, whose name was not learned here, suffered a broken nose and cheek bone, an injured shoulder and possible fracture of the skull, doctors said. The air compressor, which was being drawn by horses, backed over the man, a wheel passing over his head.

NEW PRODUCER ON TODD RANCH MAY OPEN POOL

Monteith Test Is Re- ported Swabbing 35 Barrels

MAY SHOOT WELL

Strike Produces Ex- citement; Oil Men Rush To Scene

Possibility of the discovery of a new pool in Crockett County was seen Tuesday in the W. A. Monteith and others' No. 1 J. S. Todd, about 15 miles northwest of Ozona, when it was swabbed 17 times and lowered a 400-foot column of oil only to 320 feet. The well is estimated at good for 35 barrels a day, some estimates running as high as 75 barrels, according to reports here.

The well was 1369 feet deep, four feet in sandy lime. The oil tested 26.8 gravity, according to one report, and 27.5, according to another. All information agreed that there was no water in the hole. Gas was estimated at 500,000 cubic feet. It was thought probable that the well will be given a shot; otherwise, it will run tubing and will be placed on the pump.

Monteith and others' No. 1 Todd is 660 ft. from the north and east line of section 35, block WX, G. C. & S. F. Ry. Co. survey, about 15 miles northwest of Ozona. Its performance proved surprising to most oil men, who also in most cases withheld opinions concerning the well awaiting further developments, in view of the fact that it virtually is surrounded by dry holes at some distance.

There was a showing of oil and gas at 1337 feet and at 1365 feet the well was reported Monday to have yielded three barrels of 28 gravity oil at a temperature of 80. With 400 feet of oil, free from water, in the hole Monday, the well sailed about 24 barrels of oil in two hours, lowering the column only 90 feet. Another report gave the amount bailed in two hours as 32 barrels of oil and said the column was lowered 120 feet. Elevation is 2613 feet.

The well is about eight miles east of the gasser which Joe Cooke of Fort Worth drilled on the Todd ranch and later sold to the Texas Company. Monteith and others recently completed a dry hole on the Todd ranch two miles southeast of their No. 1 Todd, and are drilling No. 1 Massey about two miles east of No. 1 Todd. Marland drilled a dry hole on the Todd ranch two miles northwest of Monteith and others' No. 1 and Republic No. 1 Todd, four miles west of the well now showing oil, also was a failure.

Peters Asks For Paving Estimates

HJR No. 6 Legislature may provide."

A JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court.—

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 2 and 3 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows: "Article 5. Section 2. The Supreme Court shall consist of a Chief Justice and eight Associate Justices, any five of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of five shall be necessary to a decision of a case; in other matters, until otherwise provided by Law, the jurisdiction of the Court shall be exercised under such regulations and orders as the Court by a majority vote may prescribe. No person shall be eligible to the office of Chief Justice or Associate Justice of the Supreme Court unless he be, at the time of his election, a citizen of the United States and of this State and unless he shall have attained the age of thirty years, and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a judge of a court, or such lawyer and judge together at least seven years. Said Chief Justice and Associate Justices shall be elected by the qualified voters of the State at a general election, shall hold their offices six years, or until their successors are elected and qualified, and shall receive such compensation as may be provided by law. In case of a vacancy in the office of Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, the Governor shall fill the vacancy until the next general election for State officers, and at such general election the vacancy for the unexpired term shall be filled by election by the qualified voters of the State. The Judges of the Supreme Court who may be in office at the time this amendment takes effect shall continue in office until the expiration of their term of office under the present Constitution, and until their successors are elected and qualified. When this amendment takes effect, the Governor shall immediately appoint six additional Associate Justices of the Supreme Court for terms of office so that the terms of two of such appointed Associate Justices shall expire with the term of office of each of the present members of the Supreme Court, and upon the qualification of such new Justices, the Commission of Appeals of the State of Texas shall terminate."

Section 2. Said proposed Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on Tuesday, July 16, 1929, at which election each voter opposing said proposed amendment shall scratch off of the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot: "For the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." and each voter favoring said proposed amendment shall scratch off the following words printed on said ballot: "Against the amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Supreme Court of nine members, and for continuous session of that Court." If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and said election held as provided by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary is hereby appropriated out of the State Treasury to pay for the expenses of said publication and election.

Houston's Mayor Out For Governor

Oscar Holcombe Will Begin Active Campaign Soon

Houston, Texas, April 18.—Following the completion of his fourth term as Mayor of Houston, Oscar P. Holcombe today announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Governor of Texas. The announcement came just after Mayor Holcombe had finished administering the oath of office to his successor, Judge Walter Monteth. He announced he would conduct

an intensive campaign, starting at a later date, and lasting until the Primaries in July, 1930. His campaign will carry him into every County of the State, he said.

The eight years of Mayor Holcombe's services as chief executive of the City of Houston have been marked by the City's greatest municipal expansion. The City's population in that time has doubled. More streets, sewers and public buildings have been constructed than in all the previous history of the City. A great park

system has been developed, and the City placed on the very highest business basis.

"On my record of eight years as Mayor of the metropolis of South Texas I will ask the people of Texas to elect me Governor of this great State," said Mayor Holcombe in his announcement. "I believe the people of Texas want the same constructive policies applied to the State government which my Administration has applied to the growth and development of Houston."

"Article V, Section 3. The Supreme Court shall have appellate jurisdiction only except as herein specified, which shall be co-extensive with the limits of the State. Its appellate jurisdiction shall extend to questions of law arising in cases of which the Courts of Civil Appeals have appellate jurisdiction under such restrictions and regulations as the Legislature may prescribe. Until otherwise provided by law, the appellate jurisdiction of the Supreme Court shall extend to questions of law arising in the cases in the Courts of Civil Appeals in which the Judges of any Court of Civil Appeals may disagree or where the several Courts of Civil Appeals may hold differently on the same question of law, or where a Statute of the State is held void, and shall extend to such other questions as may be within the Court's Appellate Jurisdiction under the Statutes of the State in force when this amendment takes effect. The Supreme Court and the Justices thereof shall have power to issue writs of habeas corpus, as may be prescribed by Law, and under such regulations as may be prescribed by Law, the said Court and the Justices thereof may issue writs of mandamus, procedendo, certiorari and such other writs, as may be necessary to enforce its jurisdiction. The Legislature may confer original jurisdiction on the Supreme Court to issue writs of quo warranto and mandamus, in such cases as may be specified, except as against the Governor of the State.

The Supreme Court shall have power, upon affidavit or otherwise as by the Court may be determined, to ascertain such matters of fact as may be necessary to the proper exercise of its jurisdiction. The Supreme Court shall be open at all times and shall sit at the State Capitol for the transaction of business at such times as may be designated by the Court.

The Supreme Court shall appoint a clerk, who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter, be required by law, and he may hold his office for four years and shall be subject to removal by said Court, for good cause entered of record on the Minutes of said Court who shall receive such compensation as the

APRIL LIVESTOCK REPORT (Texas)

U. S. Dept. of Agriculture
Rains and warm weather during March have improved range conditions and assured good spring and summer grazing in most sections. New vegetation has made excellent growth and plenty of feed is available generally. Heavy feeding on the range is no longer necessary. Cattle are putting on flesh. Calves, lambs and kids are coming rapidly. Sheep and goats are in much better condition than a month ago. Goat shearing is about over, and sheep shearing will be at its height in two weeks. Mohair sales have been inactive, and little spring wool has been con-

tracted.

It is estimated that the spring movement of Texas cattle this year will be approximately the same as in 1928. Shipments from March to June, inclusive, are expected to total 339,000 head of which about 45 per cent will probably move interstate. In 1928, 839,462 head were shipped during the four spring months, 48 per cent or 413,610 head being sent to other states. The number of cattle on farms and ranches in Texas on January 1, 1929, was about equal to that of the previous year. Although shipments to markets and to other states were heavy during 1928 many replacements were shipped in from Mexico. Receipts were also heavy from Arizona and New Mexico which supplied large numbers of steers and calves to be grazed on Texas ranges during the winter. Receipts of cattle and calves at the Ft. Worth Stockyards since January 1 have been about 50,000 head less than for the same period last year.

The winter and spring in South Texas have been dry and unfavorable for cattle until recently, when beneficial rains relieved the situation. Cattle are thin, as a rule, but no unusual losses have been suffered. During the past three weeks ranges have improved greatly and cattle have begun to fatten. Based on reports from station agents and reporters, it is estimated that the spring movement, March to June, will be about 10 per cent greater than that of a year ago.

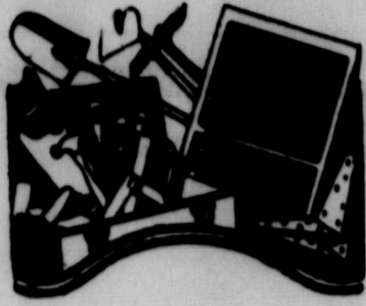

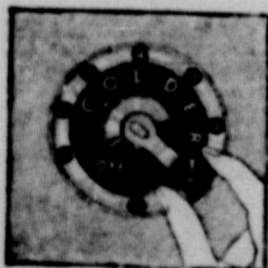

A JOINT RESOLUTION

proposing an amendment to Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor; providing for its submission to the voters of the State of Texas as required by the Constitution, and making appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to

hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary of Ten Thousand Dollars and no more, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture; provided that this amendment shall not become effective until the third Tuesday in January, 1931."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on July 16, 1929, at which election all voters favoring said proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballots the words: "For the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor." And those voters opposing said

proposed amendment shall write or have printed on their ballot the words: "Against the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas fixing the salary of the Governor."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclama-

tion for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution for amendments thereto.

Section 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the

State of Texas not otherwise appropriated to pay the expense of such publication and election.

Approved March 19, 1929.
