So don't worry when this happens to you. Go right on about your business and wait until you are really hungry.

A word about proper eating when the appetite is normal:

Try to eat the foods that appeal to you most, provided they are sensible and nourishing. Eat only two or three different dishes at one meal and avoid those combinations that fight with each other. No matter how hungry you may be, don't fall on your food ravenously. Give yourself the pleasure of prolonging the enjoyment of eating something you like. This stimulates the entire digestive mechanism all along the alimentary canal and causes the salivary juices to pour into the mouth. Then when you swallow your food it is met in the stomach by the proper solvents.

There is an old adage that says: "The platter kills more than the sword." Remember that. If there were any way of checking up, it would unquestionably be found that the number of people killed in war is less than the number of people who have committed suicide by overeating.



Farewell, Sherlock Holmes!
 Sherlock Holmes is dead. Sir Arthur Conan Doyle has again announced that he will never revive this world-famous character.

But not only is he dead in fiction—the Sherlock Holmes type of detective is now seen as doomed in fact.

Baffling mysteries are no longer to be solved by cleverness. They are to be unraveled by scientific experts relying upon standardization methods of precise identification.

Before the National Conference of Weights and Measures at Washington, William Souder, of the Bureau of Standards, some weeks ago made prediction that may eventually take all the romance out of criminal hunting.

He showed how the most cunning criminal of the future will be discovered through super-microscopes that will tear his identity from a typewritten document, a pistol ball, a cartridge shell or a signature.

The coming out and dried methods may take some of the thrill out of the accounts of the exploits of detectives on the trail. But they may eventually reduce crime to a minimum by making discovery virtually certain.

Endurance Ford Makes Stop Here

Trio Visiting Every Co. Seat In State; Started June 20

Circling the public square a few times in the 97th county seat in Texas they have visited on their non-stop run in a model A Ford car, H. C. Gore, Walter Wright and W. C. Breedlove of Levelland, Texas, stopped in Ozona Monday long enough to replenish their gas and oil supply and were on their way to the next county seat in their round of West Texas, going from here to Sanderson, county seat of Terrell County.

The run was started at 9:12 o'clock on the morning of June 20 and since that time the motor of the new Ford has not stopped, and the trio do no plan on letting it stop until every county seat town in Texas has been visited. The motor was purring easily here and the men declared they had had no trouble whatever except an enforced wait of four hours between Alpine and Fort Stockton on account of high water.

The Ford will have completed approximately 25,000 miles when the trip is finally completed, while it is estimated the motor will have made twice the number of revolutions necessary for that mileage.
