Mr. Moyston is a successful operator of natural gas distributing systems in the smaller towns through this area. A number of gas wells in this section are available for a supply for this city, it is pointed out, and it is necessary only to get the local distributing system installed to make these cources available for the local sup-

The franchise granted Mr. Moyston is for a 25-year period, but is not an exclusive franchise. Another application is said to be on file in the Commissioners Court for a similar franchise by another company.

The section of the franchise granted Mr. Moyston concerning to relation of the gas supply to local consumers reads as follows:


