There is something radically wrong with our system of administering justice when a jury composed of twelve men becomes deadlocked for days with nine of its members in favor of infliction of the death penalty on the defendant, two holding out for life imprisonment and ONE for ACQUITTAL.

It is difficult to understand why two men could consider imprisonment (in this state ours, at least, where the word has little meaning) sufficient punishment for John Brady. But how any man who has heard the evidence presented by both sides could find anything to warrant a verdict of acquittal

cannot be explained except in one way. The majority rules everything else in this land of the free except justice. To administer justice it takes an unanimous vote, one vote being sufficient to nullify eleven others. That one vote more often than we like to admit defeats justice entirely, for a thing can be dragged out again and again without a definite conclusion until finally it wears everybody out and we throw up our hands and quit. Some day the people of Texas will awaken to the faults of their jury system and demand a remedy.

The desire on the part of the people for good roads and for immediate seizure of the excellent opportunity now before this county to get them is so intense that it is likely the voters will continue to be patient in the matter until the procedure is arranged in perfect shape for presentation at the first opportunity.

### The Value of Publicity

There is nothing so deadly to corruption and mismanagement in governmental affairs as publicity.

Chicago's financial mess dates back to favoritism and incompetence that prevailed in her tax assessments. For many years the assessments were kept secret; and so, though they were amazingly unequal and unjust, no one knew it, and those who were being fleeced never protested.

A couple of years ago, however, the State Tax Commission ordered the assessment published. And then the trouble began. Chicago citizens rose in wrath, and while the present period of bankruptcy is mighty unpleasant it will end in a much fairer, more efficient assessment and Chicago will be much better off.



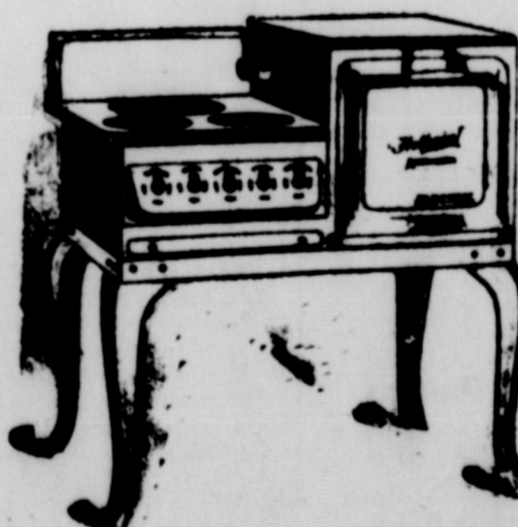

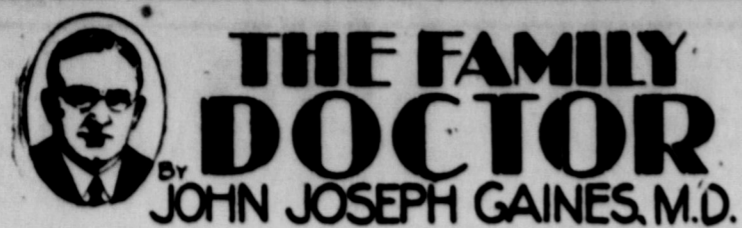

LIGHT

Fifty years from now the world may regard the discoveries made in our time about light as the greatest scientific advance of all time. Light cures disease, ordinary sunlight, light produced in various ways by artificial means. Ordinary window glass keeps the healthful part of the sunlight out of the house. New kinds of glass let it in. In fifty years every modern home will be equipped with the new glass and illness will be less common.

Light stimulates the growth of both animals and plants. An English farmer proved that exposing young pigs to ultra-violet light made them worth double their farrow-mates at six months. A French scientist recently grew straw berries in a cellar, ripening in half the normal time, using artificial light. They cost \$5 apiece, but the time will come when out-of-season fruits and vegetables can be grown in the North by artificial light as cheaply as new in Florida.

DRIVERS

Automobiles kill more people in America than any other single source of accidents, far more than are killed by railroads. The cause of accidents is usually inexpert driving. We have interpreted personal liberty to mean the right of anyone to drive a car whether he is competent or not.

Massachusetts has stiffened its tests for drivers, so that now it is impossible in Bay State to get a license to drive a car unless one really knows how to drive. And that means a lot more than merely how to shift gears and apply the brakes; it means appreciation of the fact that there are other cars on the road as well as pedestrians.

Some day nobody will be allowed to drive a car in any state who has not some sense of responsibility to others.

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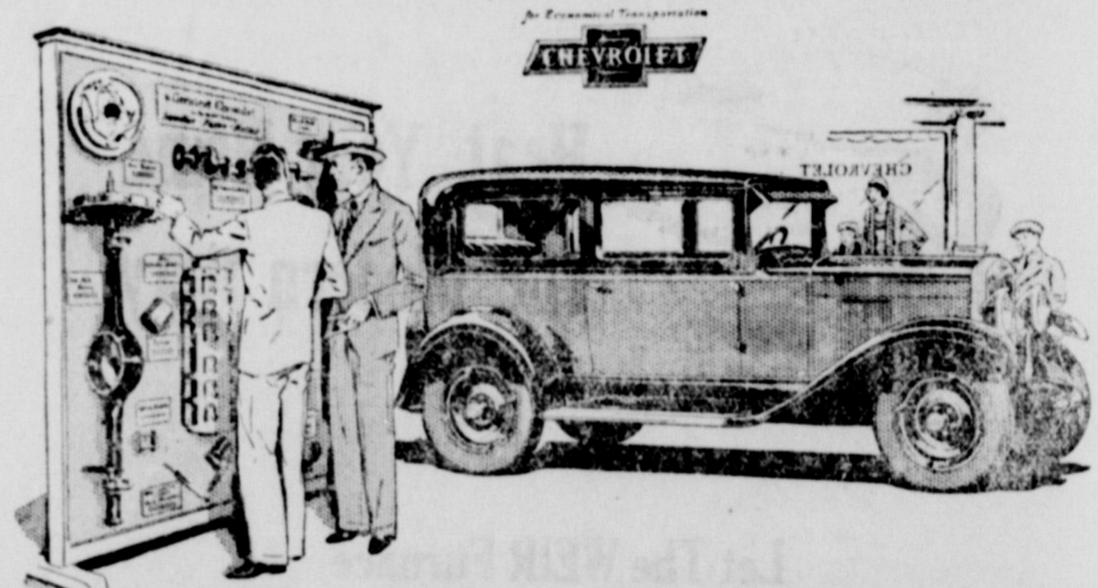

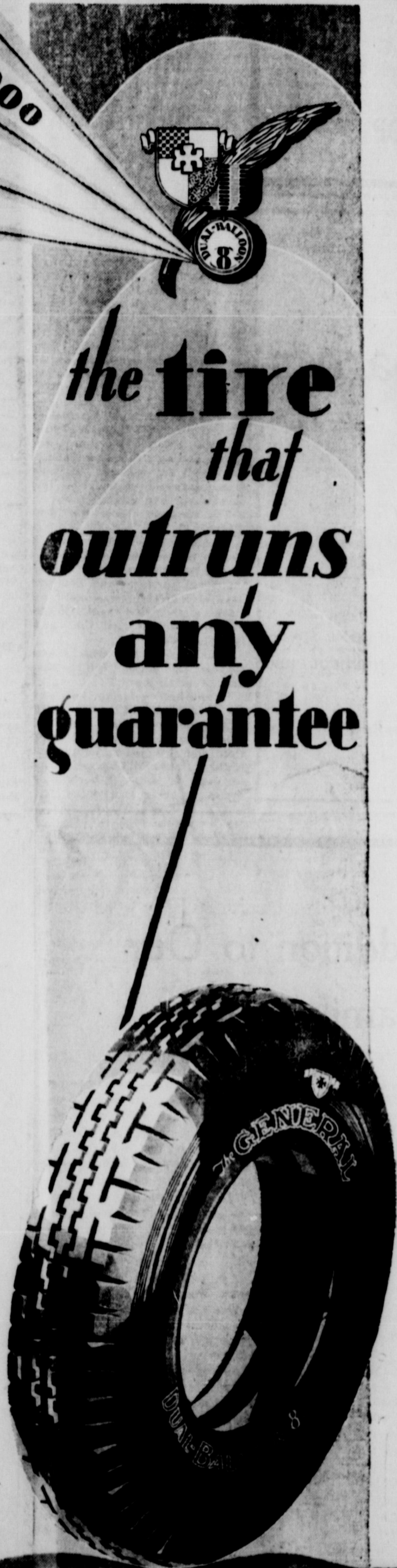

which the message was repeated to another man who was at that moment flying like a bird a hundred miles away and a couple of miles up in the air; that the man in the sky had replied to the message and the man in New York had received the reply, all in three-quarters of an hour.

Witchcraft! Sorcery! Black Magic! The pious authorities of our earlier day would have seen the handiwork of the Devil in such a manifestation as that which happened on January 22nd, when Captain Railey called up London on behalf of his friend Admiral Byrd to inquire what assistance the British whaling fleet might give in breaking a way through the ice floes to let the Antarctic explorer's relief ship get through, then passed the information on to the Admiral. Yet the news report of this occurrence passed almost unnoticed.

We have got out of the habit of attributing such things to either Divine assistance or the machinations of the Devil. We boast of them as achievements of the human mind. But the greatest men of science today affirm their belief that the human mind derives its almost illimitable power from some source which all of the experiments have not disclosed.

We are performing new miracles so fast that it seems as if there must soon be an end to human progress. Science says "no" to that. Mankind has hardly begun its upward flight in the conquest of nature, time and space. In the laboratories new discoveries about the properties of matter, far beyond any that have yet been applied to human needs, await the engineers who will translate them into machines and devices which will enable us to ascend even higher toward the stars of our ultimate destiny.

**Does the World Really Want Peace?**

The Naval Disarmament Conference which is now meeting in London is of immense importance to the whole world, but of more immediate importance to the United States than to any other country. We pride ourselves on being the most peace-loving people in the world, yet we spend more money today on military and naval preparations for war than any other nation!


Perhaps we are wrong in believing that we love peace more than other people do. Hon. Alanson Houghton, former Ambassador to Berlin and then to London, suggested as much in his address on assuming the position of Chairman of the Commission on International Justice and Good Will of the Federal Council of Churches. Pointing out that the United States has managed to get into at least one important war during every generation since the Republic was established, he said that his knowledge of European nations convinced him that each of them honestly thinks, as we do, its people love peace more than any other.

If something of that knowledge of the peace-loving nature of humanity in general, and some measure of belief in the good intentions of other nations toward us, gets into the spirit of the Disarmament Conference, there is hope that our delegates may come back with a program, agreed upon by all, which will reduce our naval burden and that of the rest of the world, and provide tangible evidence that we—and the other countries—do actually desire peace.

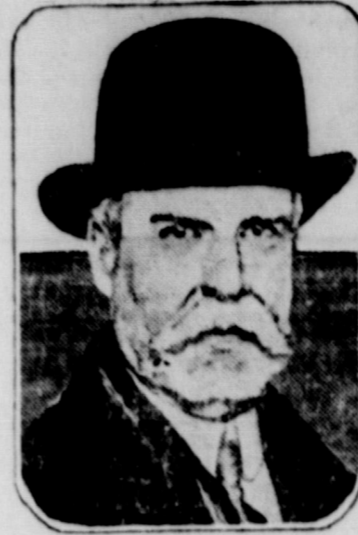

waste in Ozona was now from the business district, yet he pointed out that the stores from which this waste comes are engaged in community service and that their problem is that of every citizen. Also, while the septic tanks at the private homes are burying wastes in a manner that is not esthetically objectionable, they are still furn-

ishing a constantly increasing menace of ground and water supply pollution and are not desirable when a sanitary sewer system is made available.

Until the company's permanent representative is sent here, which will be in the next few weeks, it is suggested that those interested in a sewer connection see Judge Davidson or request any member of the Lions Club to make record of their desire and have the company's men look them up as soon

as possible. Incidentally, Mr. Dees stated that of an estimated \$25,000 required to sewer this city, at least 50 per cent would be spent locally for labor, lumber, cement, sand and gravel for the construction of the lines and plant; and as the entire system can be completed in about thirty working days, this not inappreciable amount would be poured into the community at a time when it would have a very beneficial effect on trade conditions.

Approximately 50,000 pounds of Irish Potatoes were sacked and sold by us last year. Likewise, about 200,000 pounds of flour.
