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ACCIDENTS

Automobile accident cases cost the hospitals of the United States more than \$15,000,000 last year, for the care of the injured. More than one-third of this was never collected, because the persons responsible for the accidents could not be compelled to pay for the damage they had done.

Next to industrial accidents, automobiles send more individuals to the hospitals than any other one cause. The care of the victims is a charge on all the rest of us, to the extent that the deficit in hospital expenses has to be made up out of taxes.

Almost every state makes insurance against industrial accidents compulsory on employers. Only Massachusetts requires automobile owners to carry liability insurance. If you are injured by a car with a Massachusetts license, the insurance company pays. If a car from any other state hits you, you can usually whistle for your hospital bill, or start a tedious and expensive lawsuit.

Eventually every progressive state will adopt the Massachusetts system or something like it.

MOUNTAINS

Motorists driving from Harrisburg (spelled without a final "h") to Pittsburgh (with a final "h") are interested in the signboards on the peaks of the Allegheny Mountains (spelled with an "a" after the "h") as they cross into the valley of the Allegheny River (spelled with an "e" instead of an "a").

Differences of spelling aside, the signs tell the height above sea-level of each high spot on the road. That is something we all like to know. It is surprising that the idea of marking the high places has not spread farther.

SPEED

Reports from England are that Flight Leader A. H. Orlebar, who flew 368 miles an hour for the Schneider Cup, has achieved a speed of 500 miles an hour in a private trial. At that rate a man could start westward around the world in the latitude of London and never get out from under the sun.

BOND FAILURE DANGER CITED IN LION TALK

\$375,000 Issue Will Bring \$1,500,000 In Good Roads

2-3 MUST FAVOR

Early Vote Urged; To Ballot Here At Co. Courthouse

"Having received the best proposition from the state and federal highway departments ever offered any county, I do not see how Crockett County can afford to turn down this bond issue," N. W. Graham declared in a talk before the Lions Club Monday noon in response to a request from the day's program committee that he explain some of the questions regarding the proposal to be voted on Saturday.

"Should the voters of Crockett County turn down this proposition, however, the highway department will likely resent such action and it will be a long time, if ever, before the department renews such a liberal offer as it has made us at this time. Should the time ever come, also, when the state by a statewide bond issue or through the gasoline tax assumes the burden of building state highways, Crockett County will no doubt experience delay in receiving its share of the road work by reason of this resentment on the part of the state against a county that turned down an unprecedented offer of 3-to-1 aid.

"And in connection with the possibility of the state's taking over the road building through a statewide bond issue or otherwise, I might state that such a possibility depends upon the state assuming outstanding bond issues. Unless such issues are assumed in a statewide issue the proposal will be doomed to certain defeat. But a state-wide highway building program will be hastened by the voting of bond issues by the counties. Every county that votes a heavy bond issue will then be converted to the state-wide plan, which would absorb its outstanding issue, and the state-wide issue will not be realized until a sufficient number of counties vote bond issues to form a majority of the state."

Who is entitled to vote is a question that is being asked often. Mr. Graham said. Those who have lived in the state one year and in the county six months, have a poll tax receipt for 1929 or exemption and have paid a property tax for 1929 or 1930, are eligible to vote in this election, the speaker explained. If you have rendered property for 1930 and pay your 1930 taxes before the election day, you will be entitled to vote, was Mr. Graham's interpretation.

"Women voters are also eligible to vote on the bond issue question, if their husbands pay a property tax, provided they meet the requirements of the ordinary voter, whether or not their names appear on the tax rolls," Mr. Graham said.

M. M. Fulmer, president of the Lions Club and chairman of the day's program committee declared that arguments against the bond issue could be boiled down to two—first, "Don't want to saddle a tax on unborn generations" and second, "The time is inopportune." The first Rev. Fulmer declared, is a stock argument against all public improvement projects, and in the present instance does not hold water.

"In the first place," Rev. Fulmer declared, "this issue will not be a burden on future generations. The money is to be used in building for the future as well as for the present, and it is my firm belief that the present generation will be doing the future a favor by accepting the proposition tendered by the state, for I do not believe such liberal terms will ever be offered again.

"As for the second argument,

On account of pre-Christmas activities, it was impossible the middle of the week to get a quorum of the club in meeting for an official vote on the issue, but the members with whom communication was established were a heavy majority in favor of the good roads project, the president said.

A number of club members have volunteered their services in getting out the women voters to cast their ballots in the election Saturday, it was declared.

VOTE FOR GOOD ROADS SAT.; IT'S COUNTY'S LAST CHANCE

Baptists Observe Students' Night

All College Students And Alumni Invited To Services

Sunday night, December 29, is Annual Student Night at the First Baptist Church. The entire evening service will center around student life and activities, particularly emphasizing the religious life of the campus. The students home from the colleges for the holidays will be the guests of honor and will contribute to the program. Others who will be honored in the services are College Alumni, parents of students, high school pupils, teachers and educators.

In observing Student Night, the local Baptist Church is co-operating with the Southwide Program of Southern Baptist Student Work. The religious work among college students by Baptists is headed by Frank Leavell of the Sunday School Board. In each of the southern states there is a Baptist Student Secretary giving full time to the work. A number of secretaries are employed to give their full time to the campus of one institution. There are about 100,000 Baptist students in the Southland, about 35 per cent of whom are in Baptist schools. The other 65 per cent are in state or private schools.

To supervise the work among that 65 per cent is the Department of Student Work's greatest task. On half the campuses of the south there are Baptist Student Organizations. The local church delights to honor these students. Every Ozona student, regardless of religious affiliation, is cordially and personally invited to be present. And college alumni of any school, any year; in fact, those who are interested in higher education ought to be there. It will be inspirational, informing, and in every sense worthwhile.

The issue, if voted, will be used in paving the Old Spanish Trail from the Sutton County line to the Pecos River, from one edge of the county to the other, a distance of approximately 52 miles, and the Ozona-Barnhart road from the intersection of the Old Spanish Trail to the Iron County line a short distance this side of Barnhart, approximately 30 miles.

The voting places in this election will be the same as those used in other elections. The voting place in Ozona will be the district court room in the courthouse. Polls will be open from about 8 o'clock in the morning until 7 at night. Voters are urged to cast their ballots early so that the count can be completed as soon after the polls close as possible.

The "official ballot" to be used in this election carries the following wording: "FOR: The issuance of Road Bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof." and "AGAINST: The issuance of Road Bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

It is necessary, under state laws, to vote the necessary tax to retire the bonds and it is in compliance with this provision that the words "and the levying of the tax in payment thereof" are added. To vote FOR the issuance of bonds run a pencil mark through the last two lines on the ballot, or through the words "AGAINST the issuance of Road Bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof."

To vote AGAINST the bond issue run a pencil mark through the first two lines on the ballot, or the words "FOR the issuance of Road Bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof." In other words, scratch out the side of the proposition you don't want.

This is the best chance Crockett County has ever had and probably the last chance she will ever get to take her place among the modern progressive counties of the state, to serve her own interests in the best manner possible, to get a system of modern, hard-surfaced

roads, and if you want Crockett County ever to have hard-surfaced roads, vote FOR the road bonds Saturday.

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EVERY VOTER IS URGED TO CAST BALLOT

State Will Be Reluctant To Renew Offer If Refused

FULL VOTE URGED

Graham Urges Fair Expression Of People At Polls Sat.

The most important issue that has come before the people of Crockett County in many decades will be decided at the polls next Saturday when the property tax paying voters of the county will register their decision on whether or not bonds in the sum of \$375,000 shall be voted for the purpose of matching state and federal funds to three times that amount for the hard surfacing of approximately 82 miles of highways through this county.

This election was called by the Commissioners Court in response to a request contained in a petition signed by more than 100 of the leading taxpayers of the county presented to the court at its November term.

The election request followed an interview by a committee of Crockett County citizens with the highway commission at Austin during which the state body promised to build, with state and federal aid, \$1,500,000 worth of modern hard-surfaced roads in Crockett County if this county would issue bonds in the sum of \$375,000 to match the liberal state and federal aid offer of three to one.

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Texon Grid Stars Beat Locals 13-6

Return Game Here Sunday Afternoon At 3 O'Clock

A town team representing Ozona took a 13-6 defeat at the hands of a team from Texon on the latter's gridiron last Sunday afternoon in the first of a two-game series to be played between the two teams.

The return game of the series will be played at Powell Field next Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The Ozona lads scored the first marker of the day in the game at Texon Sunday when Bob Weaver snatched a Texon pass from the air and ran 65 yards for a touchdown. That was in the first quarter, and a try at goal failed and the count was 6-0 in favor of Ozona.

In the second quarter, the Texon huskies took the lead when they resorted to an aerial attack that netted a touchdown and a successful kick for the extra point after touchdown. In the third quarter, Texon piled on another touchdown when they started from midfield with a passing and end run attack which placed the ball almost on the Ozona goal line. Four punches at the line were needed to push the ball across. The try for point after touchdown was unsuccessful and the score was 13-6.

Numerous fumbles at crucial points and heavy penalties were factors contributing to the local's defeat. Daily workouts are in order this week and the local team is confident of returning the compliment when Texon invades this city next Sunday.

Substitutes were Walter Kyle, Arthur Kyle, and Woodrow Wilson in the backfield, and Dock Lee and Carl North in the line.

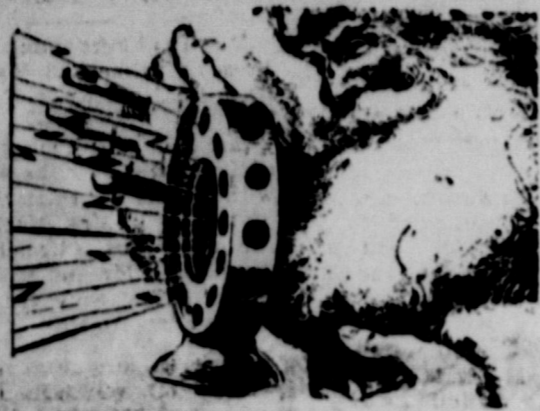

that the time is inopportune, this argument arises from a temporary depression that can not be weighed against a proposition that extends over a period of probably thirty years and especially in favor of an offer of \$3 to \$1. As a matter of fact this argument could be turned in favor of the issue, for the expenditure of a million and a half dollars in the county, more than half of which will go to labor, will go far toward relieving the financial depression which ex-

ists in this section.

"The need of good roads is so apparent that there is scarcely need to mention this phase of the project. It just resolves itself into a matter of life and death, for within my knowledge at least one life has been lost in this county recently on account of the bad roads. A woman lay dying in an Ozona home and attending physicians said that only an operation could save her life. But rains had fallen for more than a week and it was impossible for a car to traverse the roads out of Ozona. The night this woman died, sixty automobiles spent the night stuck in the mud between here and So-

norra.

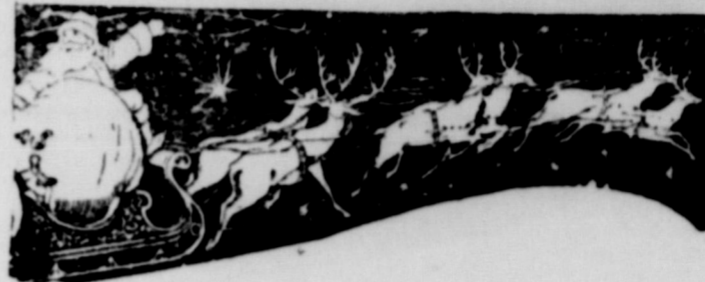

TEACHERS

Public education will never be as good as it ought to be so long as most school teachers never get outside of their home countries, says Edward A. Filene, Boston merchant and philanthropist. Teachers cannot present a true view of the world to their pupils unless they know something about

the world out of their own experience.

That is true for others besides teachers. The only really educated persons are those who have seen other countries besides their own. It is getting easier and easier to do that. A trip to Europe with a week in London and another week in Paris can be had for \$250 from New York. Mr. Filene is working on a plan to reduce this to \$150 for teachers and the next step will be to have such trips made compulsory for every teacher above the primary grades.
