Billy Childress, 12, Is Injured In Ranch Accident Thursday

Billy Childress, 12-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Childress of Ozona, is recovering from injuries suffered last Thursday afternoon when a horse fell with him on his father's ranch near Ozona.

The accident occurred when young Childress went out into the pasture to bring up the horses. The horse fell and rolled over on the lad, he said.

The boy was unable to rise to his feet, after recovering consciousness, and crawled a hundred yards or more trying to catch his horse. He was found about forty minutes later by a Mexican ranch hand and brought to Ozona for medical attention. He was badly cut and bruised but his injuries are not believed to be critical.

Manual Training Uncertain; Teachers Coming In

Vacation days are over! Monday morning at 9 o'clock the bell in the high school belfry will call Ozona boys and girls from play to study, for another nine-months stretch of school work and play.

Teachers who will direct work in the local schools will begin returning to Ozona this week-end to take up their duties in the classrooms, after spending the summer attending summer normals or vacationing.

Supt. John L. Bishop and Mrs. Bishop, who have been attending summer school in Boulder, Colo., are expected to return the last of this week.

The teaching staff, with the exception of the manual training department, is complete. With the superintendent and members of the board of education out of this city this week, it was impossible to get reliable information as to whether or not the manual training post had been filled. R. H. Brisson, who was head of this department last year, will not be a member of the local staff again this year.

There will be four new teachers in the high school. Miss Duke of Miles will be in charge of the English department, succeeding Miss Ethel Kaderli, who accepted a position in the Marfa schools this year. Miss Mary Alice Stewardson of Eldorado will teach the fourth grade, Mrs. J. Lowell Littleton of Ozona will have charge of the sixth grade and Miss Catherine Chapman, who taught in the Mexican school last year, will teach the fifth grade.

Mr. Bishop will teach Spanish, Mrs. Bishop the third grade, Miss Elizabeth Fussell the primary, Mrs. R. G. Smith the second grade, Miss Norene Newsome, domestic economy, Claude Denham, principal history, Mrs. Tommy Hunter, seventh grade, and O. G. Lewis, math.

Misses Ethel Kaderli, Rose Burton and Willie Ann Wheat, all teachers in the local schools last year, will not be back this year. Mrs. O. G. Lewis, wife of the athletic coach, was also elected to teach this year, but resigned the place on account of ill health.

Mrs. Rusty Smith and Miss Helen Chapman will be the teachers in the local Mexican school. Miss Mildred Cook and sister of Colorado City will compose the staff of the Powell Field school, Mrs. Lillie Mae Smith, who was head of the school last year, having resigned. Miss Ruth Meredith, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. Meredith, will teach the Live Oak school, while Mrs. Ila Mae Cowan will succeed Miss Annie Laurie Duke in the Pecos Valley Power & Light Company school. Miss Lois Riddle, graduate of Simmons University and Baylor University music departments, will be in charge of music.

The football training season will start simultaneously with the opening of school, prospective members of the squad announce. Around 20 huskies are expected to get into uniform on the opening day for the initial work-out of the season, under Coach O. G. Lewis.

E. B. Ingham is carrying his right arm in a sling as a result of an injury suffered at his ranch several days ago. Mr. Ingham was working on the ranch machine shop when a piece of flying steel struck him in the shoulder, tearing the flesh to the bone. WORTH REMEMBERING

Were every one to sweep before his own house, every street would be clean.—J. Kressell.

A road project of particular interest to Ozona and Crockett County is that to secure state and federal designation of the north and south road through this city from Brownsville to Big Spring, connecting at the latter city with a federal north and south highway. This is one of the projects being sponsored in Texas by the United States Chamber of Commerce. Such

development, it is pointed out, would open up one of the fastest developing sections of the state to north and south traffic. At present there is no direct north and south route through this section of the state. The proposed route from Brownsville would come up the border to Del Rio and from that city straight through Ozona to Big Spring, this being the most direct route.

The only part of this proposed highway not now designated by the state is the stretch from Del Rio to Big Spring. Effort is being made to interest all counties along this route in the proposal with a view to making concerted demand upon the state to designate this road as a state highway. Such action, with consequent federal recognition, would put Ozona on two important state and federal highways east and west and north and south. This proposal should interest every resident of Crockett County to the extent that representatives from this county be sent to Austin to join in petitions to the state highway commission for designation of the route.

Several weeks ago the Crockett County Commissioners Court was approached with applications from two different concerns for franchises from the county for the operations of public utilities, a sewer system and a natural gas distributing system. Both of these franchises were granted by the court.

So far nothing has been heard of the proposed natural gas distributing system, but a field man for the sewer system visited Ozona last week and gave some encouragement to the city on the sewer project.

Both of these propositions are of paramount importance to the development of Ozona. They are both developments which are expected to come to a town making progress at the rate Ozona is making it, and they are modern conveniences which any town can ill afford to be without. So far as local comment has been heard, there has been nothing but whole-hearted approval of both projects. The citizenship of Ozona is ready and anxious for both of these improvements, as well as for street pav-

ing, and if it is a matter of local support that is holding up the plans, the franchise holders need experience no further delay in getting the systems in operation.

Hail the Graf Zeppelin

In the sixteenth century Magellan circumnavigated the globe in a sailing vessel, and the fact has been drummed into the heads of school children ever since as one of the most progressive steps taken by man up to that time. Now we are face to face with a new circumnavigation of the globe—by means of a modern airship—a feat that would have been thought impossible even a few years ago.

The Graf Zeppelin is now in the midst of its round-the-world tour—from Lakehurst, N. J., to Lakehurst, N. J., with only three stops in between. Think of it. Never yet has there been such an undertaking, and every indication points to complete success.

The first jump, from Lakehurst to Germany, was accomplished in the record time of 55 hours, without mishap.

Day by day the eyes of the world are focused on this great, epoch-making flight—an event that will loom far larger in the history books of the future than the famous feat of Magellan.

The flight of Dr. Eckener and his crew presages a new era of progress—it has the most vital bearing on future commerce and travel. All hail the Graf Zeppelin!

Wait Before You Denounce!

"Another group of bureaucrats pestering the farmers," and "only one more commission affording jobs at Washington at fat salaries to its members," is how Senator Glass speaks of the new Federal Farm Board.

This is not at all creditable to his judgment. As he probably knows, Mr. Legge, Chairman of the Farm Board, accepted the position at great personal financial sacrifice, and none of the other members of the board are likely to grow wealthy on the salaries they get from the government.

The Board is only a few weeks old. So far it has been making an earnest effort to gain first-hand knowledge of the problems with which it will have to deal, and its

few suggestions to various farm groups have seemed to be well considered and economically sound.

We must wait before passing judgment on the farm board. The board deserves a fair chance. It can only be judged by results and it will naturally take some time before these can be expected.

THE HUNDRED DAYS—GOOD CONDUCT—ADVICE

Fiction is a poor thing compared with facts. I suppose I know the story of the Siege of Troy from having read a little of it, and hearing of it many years. It never interested me, its incidents seeming childish, especially that one of the river taking sides, and leaving its banks, at command of the gods, to inconvenience some of the combatants.

But I read of Napoleon, a real man, with absorbing interest. Every little while there is a new book about him, and I am not satisfied until I get hold of it. His life was crowded with incidents and ordinary man can in some measure understand.

His first wife had an impudent troublesome, highly-bred and ugly little dog he hated; he was so frequently away from home on his big affairs that the dog did not know him, and it occasionally bit the conqueror. He tried to bribe a servant to get rid of the dog, but could not, with all his power.

I have heard all my life that when a man "amounts to something," his wife reverences and obeys him. Probably Napoleon amounted to more, considering everything, than any other man that ever lived, but both his wives were unfaithful, and made a specialty of nagging him.

To my mind the most remarkable incident in Napoleon's life was his return from Elba. He was a prisoner of the allied nations, after his disgrace at Waterloo. His own country was in hostile hands; his soldiers had turned against him. Yet he landed in France, almost alone, and marched toward Paris. As he encountered soldiers sent against him, he spoke to them, and they were converted to his cause; when he approached the gates of Paris, he had a vast army at his heels, and the king fled, taking his treasure with him, which the people on the other side of France captured to lay at the feet of this impudent, strangely powerful and lovable man.

closed, rolling the tongue around in each cheek.

To exercise jaw muscles, grasp

the chin firmly with one hand and move the jaw from side to side, at the same time resisting the movement. Repeat a dozen or more times.

An excellent way to build up the muscles and tissues under the eyes where the first wrinkles usually make their appearance, is to place the finger tips on the upper part of the cheekbone, open the mouth in an exaggerated smile so that the corners are drawn up, and drop the chin. Now the muscles are bunched up. Alternately open and close the jaws, at the same time steadily massaging the muscles.

A half-hearted attention to these exercises is practically useless. Good results are obtained only by regular massaging and patience. It must be remembered that facial defects are usually the result of years of abuse and neglect and that they must be removed before

the correct form and contour can be substituted.

Alternate applications of hot and cold water will bring color to the face and not produce the ruinous effect of powerful artificial astringents, such as beauty parlors advocate.

But the value of exercise, careful diet and building up of general health is seriously handicapped if

the brain is cluttered up with sick thoughts and poisonous emotions.

Envy, hate, jealousy, anger must be fought from within. Truly there are no more deadly enemies of beauty and health. On the other hand, the happy, wholesome, clean-minded person can attain beauty of expression, even though the bony structure is impossible to change.

It is believed the horse flung his head to one side or wheeled, striking Mr. Kittle on the side of the head and knocking him against the fence.

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
