A MESSAGE FROM OZONA SERVICE STATIONS

OPC Regulations Say No More Credit

Except to Truck Operators, Government Agencies or Local Government Agencies. Petroleum directive 62, as amended January 19, reads in part as follows:

Extension of Credit at Retail Outlets Prohibited

SEC. 1525.1 (b) (1)

"Commencing February 1, 1943, no person shall, directly or indirectly, grant or accept or participate in the granting or accepting of credit in connection with the sale of any petroleum product by or through any retail outlet: PROVIDED, (i) that nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to apply to the sale of any

petroleum product: (a) to the United States, any State, Territory of the United States, or any political subdivision of the foregoing, or the District of Columbia, for its exclusive use; (b) for use in motor boats used for commercial purposes; or (c) for use in motor vehicles displaying "T" Ration stickers, and (ii) that nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to prohibit the use or distribution of coupon or script books when sold for cash."

AND PROVIDE FOR A MAXIMUM OF A 12-Hour Day or 72-Hour Week

Effective January 23 we may operate not over 12 hours a day or 72 hours a week. Hours must be posted at each station covering a regular schedule. Deliveries of gasoline at other times may be made to individuals only in emergencies involving health, life or property.

We regret any inconvenience these regulations may cause our customers, but ask your fullest co-operation, for violations are punishable by fine or imprisonment on conviction.

A MESSAGE FROM OZONA SERVICE STATIONS

OPC Regulations Say No More Credit

Except to Truck Operators, Government Agencies or Local Government Agencies. Petroleum directive 62, as amended January 19, reads in part as follows:

Extension of Credit at Retail Outlets Prohibited

SEC. 1525.1 (b) (1)

"Commencing February 1, 1943, no person shall, directly or indirectly, grant or accept or participate in the granting or accepting of credit in connection with the sale of any petroleum product by or through any retail outlet: PROVIDED, (i) that nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to apply to the sale of any

petroleum product: (a) to the United States, any State, Territory of the United States, or any political subdivision of the foregoing, or the District of Columbia, for its exclusive use; (b) for use in motor boats used for commercial purposes; or (c) for use in motor vehicles displaying "T" Ration stickers, and (ii) that nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to prohibit the use or distribution of coupon or script books when sold for cash."

AND PROVIDE FOR A MAXIMUM OF A 12-Hour Day or 72-Hour Week

Effective January 23 we may operate not over 12 hours a day or 72 hours a week. Hours must be posted at each station covering a regular schedule. Deliveries of gasoline at other times may be made to individuals only in emergencies involving health, life or property.

We regret any inconvenience these regulations may cause our customers, but ask your fullest co-operation, for violations are punishable by fine or imprisonment on conviction.
