Sewage disposal is not a matter for individual decision, it is a community problem. The fact that one family has an efficient system for sewage disposal does not protect that family from the dangers of disease which might spread from some other home which does not have an efficient system ,nor does it exempt that householders from his share of the responsibility for the community health. If the community health is to be properly safeguarded it, will take concerted action on the part of the people. A sewer system will be made available for Ozona if the people will show a desire for it to the extent of tying up with it and abandoning present systems.

By taking advantage of the opportunity now offered, Ozona can have a sewer system for the actual service cost. If, on the other hand the offer of a private company is not accepted, the time will come when the town will realize that it must have such a system and it will have to build its own. with an additional drain on taxpayers. No doubt the present time is the best to install the system in view of cheaper labor and cheaper materials and if the company is to be induced to invest its capital in a local project, the present time presents the best oppor-

THOSE EUROPEAN DEBTS

The principal impression which the international financial confer. ences make upon us is that the United States is for the first time since the war taking the part in international affairs which our country's position as the world's wealthiest and most prosperous nation demands of us. It is announced from Washington that in officially representing the United States in the Conference of International Debts our Secretary of State, Mr. Stimson, and our Sec. retary of the Treasury, Mr. Mel. lon, will take no part in the political aspects of the European situation.

It is very difficult to see how they can keep out of it. International Debts are necessarily involved in politics. When a nation owes money the method whereby that debt is to be paid has to be decided in the long run by the politicians of that nation, precisely as the method of paying the interest on town or school district bonds and amortizing the principal has to be determined in the long run by the politicians of the town or the school district.

International debts are just like all other public debts, in that the promises of politicians to pay them are not always based upon the ability of the town, county, state or nation to pay. That seems to be Germany's case. She owes more than she can pay, but she has given very good evidence of desire and willingness to pay. 





provided the biggest share of live Cleveland, Tenn. They were on stock shipments from Texas during the first six months of 1931. a "fine time." according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. Forwardings of all classes of live stock in Texas during June amounted to 34 per cent more than during June of last

"Large shipments occurred among all classes of live stock, with sheep increasing 92 per cent cattle 37 per cent, calves 13 per cent, and hogs 13 per cent," the Bureau's report said. "For the first six months of the year, however, total shipments were 8.5 per cent less than for the like period of 1930. During the first half of the year, hog shipments declined 48 per cent, cattle 16 per cent and calves 1.4 per cent. On the other hand, shipments of sheep amounted to 197 per cent more during the period than during the correspond ing six months of last year.
