NRA CODE

Building Material Dealers

At a recent meeting of lumber men of District 31, in Del Rio, details of the requirements of the lumber dealers' code, operative under the NRA, were studied and the following discount and credit terms were adopted as uniform throughout this district. These terms are set by the government and we have no choice but to observe them. Every lumber yard in the district will sell on the same price list.

EFFECTIVE NOV. 15, the following terms, as set by the government, will apply:

10% cash discount will be allowed on items marked X on the price list. (This includes all building materials).

5% discount will be allowed if paid on or before the 20th of the month following that of purchase

Prices will be net up to the end of the next month after which interest at the rate of 8% per annum will be charged each month.

All materials purchased on deferred payments covered by contract, the contract taken at the time of purchase running six months or longer, the prices herein will be increased by not less than 10%.

The above terms are taken from a letter of instructions written by W. A. Earnest, Del Rio, Texas, Chairman district 31, and endorsed by R. G. Hyett, Houston, Texas Administrator Division No. 23.

The above terms do not apply to Hardware, Paints and other items not classed as building materials.
