## New Hi-way Thru Ozona Is Proposed

### Northern Counties Ask Designation Of Route To Del Rio

Designation of a new north and south highway through Ozona, extending from Claude, Texas in Armstrong County, where it would connect with No. 117, to Del Rio, is sought by a group of road enthusiasts from the counties to the north of Crockett.

In an effort to interest citizens of this county in the project, representatives of the northern counties will be in Ozona Friday, Dec. 22, for the purpose of explaining the project and feeling out the local sentiment.

The proposed new highway would touch the towns of Claude, Silverton, Floydada, Ralls, Post, Gail, Big Spring, Garden City, Big Lake, Ozona and Del Rio. Designation of such a route will lead to another improved highway through Crockett County and would provide a paved road south in time.

Notice of the movement was received by The Stockman from C. J. Watson, manager of the Chamber of Commerce at Big Spring, who gave notice of the meeting in Ozona Friday. Mr. Watson did not advise who would be here from the other interested counties at the time the party would ar-

## 2800 Feet Sewer Ditch Is Opened

### Full Crew At Work On C.W.A. Sewer Extension Project

Approximately 2,800 feet of sewer ditch to carry the new 8-inch main to serve the Mexican section of Ozona had been opened yesterday by crews of workmen undertaking this project through the Civil Works Administration grants, according to Royce Smith, county administrator.

J. S. Barlow, engineer, who designed and supervised construction of the local sewer plant and lines, is in charge of the extension work under authority of CWA officials.

A 6,000 foot extension to serve the Mexican quarter is planned. The new main will go from the fair grounds along the south bank of the draw to the disposal plant, with laterals serving the Mexican area.

A request was issued from the local administrator's office this week that all laborers who quit jobs to accept work on the C.W.A. projects be reported promptly to that office. Under rulings from the administration, any worker on the relief rolls who quits a job to secure the relief work, or who refuses a job offered by a private individual or firm, is promptly cut off from the relief rolls and denied any further work on the C.W.A. projects, Mr. Smith said. All ranchmen who have had trouble of this nature are earnestly requested to report all cases to the administration office.

## Missing Rubber Heel On Shoe Leads To Capture Of Mexican Wanted For Theft Of Valuable Furs In Pecos County

A missing rubber heel on one shoe and a break in the sole under the ball of the foot proved the undoing of an Ozona Mexican early this week and landed him in the Crockett County jail to face felony theft charges, together with a companion.

Sheriff W. S. Willis received word from Collins Coates, who ranches near Fort Stockton in Pecos County, that around \$50 worth of furs had been stolen from his ranch, Mr. Coates naming a Mexican whom he suspected as the thief. The thief, Mr. Coates advised, left tracks about the place and from these tracks it was established that one of them wore one shoe with a heel and one without, the latter shoe having a break in the sole.

Mr. Willis donned his Sherlock Holmes cap and pipe and went to "heeling" Mexicans in the Mexican quarter of Ozona. The one that Mr. Coates had named was first made to show the bottoms of his shoes, but he exhibited two good heels on his shoes. Then Mexican after Mexican was required to turn up the soles of his shoes for inspection until one finally showed up with a heel missing and the tell-tale broken sole.

The Mexican, Chijena Dilema, was promptly arrested, confessed his part in the theft and implicated another Mexican, Sheriff Willis said. The other Mexican was also arrested. The furs had been taken to San Angelo and sold, they said.

## Bank Code Into Effect January 2

### New Service Charges Outlined By Local Institution

Details of the new banking code which becomes effective January 2, and which carries a scale of service charges that are new to the local institution, are explained in an announcement of the Ozona National Bank in this issue of The Stockman.

The service charges made by the Ozona bank are more liberal toward the customer than those announced by banks in the cities, many of the charges levied there being omitted here.

Provisions of the code and the scale of service charges are briefly as follows:

A charge of 50 cents a month will be made for active accounts under \$50 average balance. No charge will be made if no checks are written against the account.

A charge of 50 cents will be made for opening a new account if the initial deposit is under \$50.

A charge of 25 cents will be made for each check drawn with insufficient funds on deposit to cover if the check reaches the bank through the mails.

Exchange and drafts will be charged for at the rate of 25 cents per \$100, this charge to be waived if the customer's account is sufficient to compensate for this service.

Drafts for collection at out-of-town points will carry a charge of 25 cents per \$100. Notes for collection will be charged for at the same rate.

A "float" charge will be levied for all out-of-town checks.

Persons not customers of the bank will be required to pay 25 cents per \$100 for all out-of-town checks cashed, the minimum charge being 10 cents.

A charge of 25 cents will be made for each credit report.

Travelers checks will be charged for at the rate of 75 cents per \$100, with a minimum charge of 40 cents.

Special checks printed for customers, overprinting, rubber stamps, etc. will be charged for at the cost price to the bank.

### 1,351,700 Doses Soremouth Vaccine Distributed By Experiment Station; To Make and Sell Again During 1934

The Ranch Experiment Station between Sonora and Rocksprings manufactured and distributed during the year of 1933, to Texas ranchmen, 1,351,700 doses of soremouth vaccine for sheep and goats. Reports of the users of the product and examinations of large numbers of treated animals by the Experiment Station veterinarians, show that the results secured with this vaccine were entirely satisfactory in warding off the disease soremouth and its accompanying grievances as appear on the ranches.

In addition to making field observations, Station investigators, in response to reports that soremouth outbreaks frequently occur

after the lambs arrive at the feedlot and progress of fattening is retarded some 2 or 3 weeks, inspected 33,699 of these spring-vaccinated Texas lambs in the feed lots of Kansas and Colorado after they were shipped out this fall, and found that none of them had soremouth; whereas, of 15,480 head of non-vaccinated lambs in the same feed lots there were found 1532 cases of 10 per cent infection of soremouth. In the feed lots around Plainview, Texas, 2,600 vaccinated and 1790 non-vaccinated lambs were examined. In the non-vaccinated group, 5 per cent of the lambs had soremouth, while in the vaccinated group there was not a case of soremouth.

### Picture Proves Ancient Texas Legend True



One of the Southwest's moot questions has been settled for all time. Legend tells that chaparral birds, or paisanos, or road runners, as they are sometimes called, are natural enemies of rattlesnakes. The bird pictured above, caught by dogs on the farm of J. C. Carraway near Robstown, Texas, proves the story, for six inches of an 18-inch rattler dangled from his beak.

The soremouth vaccine was manufactured and distributed by the Ranch Experiment Station this year at the request of the ranchmen but more or less in an experimental way, so as to acquaint them with the product and the methods of handling it. Some vaccine above the amount specified was sent out with each order so that the ranchmen would have no difficulty in getting the number of doses requested on his order, in case he should use an excessive amount. It was also felt that for the first year of its use the vaccine should be distributed more or less in an introductory way so as to encourage its wide use and distribution when needed. For these purposes it was decided early in the season that the cost of the vaccine to the ranchmen should be at a minimum and the price was set at one-half cent per dose to defray the expense of manufacture and distribution. It is felt that its value and the methods of handling it have been well established.

The Experiment Station has been urged by the sheepmen to manufacture and distribute the vaccine for this coming year, which will be done. It will be necessary to raise the price to one cent per dose, beginning January 1, 1934. At this price the Station will be able to defray additional overhead expenses in the manufacture and distribution of the vaccine and at the same time conduct the regular experimental work without interruption.

The Ranch Experiment Station does not hesitate to encourage the use and wide distribution of this vaccine where soremouth has been prevalent. One cent per dose is in line with the cost of production and the cheapest insurance that sheepmen can buy to prevent an outbreak of this dreaded disease at the most critical time in the life

of their lambs. Sheepmen are urged to place their orders early, and in writing as was done the past year. The dosage shipped in 1934 will be the exact amount ordered and growers should not figure on excess dosage such as was included with orders in 1933.

and his good works here on earth will follow him and become stars in his Crown.

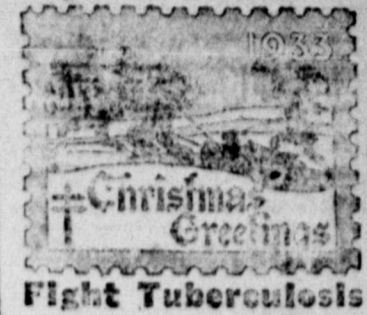

Civil Works Program An Opportunity For Health Improvement

Austin, Tex., Dec. 19.—A new stimulus to construction of needed sanitary improvements exists in the opportunity for cities and towns in Texas to secure federal aid in relieving unemployment through Civil Works Administration Board. This financial assistance will be devoted to payment of labor employed on public works projects and does not extend to cost of materials. The State Department of Health is maintaining a school in which men are being trained for this work in the various counties.

There are numerous cities and towns where this represents a golden opportunity not only to relieve unemployment but also to carry through needed sanitary improvements which have been held in abeyance for lack of funds. Mosquito control work has already been given considerable publicity as one necessity.

The elimination of surface toilets and installation of pit toilets, protection of private water supplies, nursing service, statistics, and other activities that will protect the public health are eligible under this work.

Sewer extensions in unsewered localities represent work that will utilize a large amount of hand labor. In many instances, such extensions would greatly improve living conditions and enhance the value of property. Some health nuisances exist that cannot be completely remedied until public sewers are provided.

Another aid to sanitation exists in the possibility of covering over, and in some cases eliminating, community refuse dumps that constitute eye-sores as well as breeding places for flies and rats.

Federal Land Bank Loans Over a Half Million In One Day

Houston, Dec. 19.—Loans totaling \$685,750 were closed Monday, December 11, making the best day's record for the Federal Land Bank and Land Bank Commissioner up to date, according to A. C. Williams, President of the land bank and general agent of the Farm Credit Administration of Houston, today. Records have fallen fast as officers and employees of the land bank are doing all possible to expedite the handling and closing of loans.

"During the first nine days of December loans were made to 1,125 farmers and ranchmen amounting to \$3,906,350 on a basis that will enable them to pay these obligations from the earnings of their farms or ranches," Mr. Williams said. "This money is going to refinance the borrowers' property on a sound basis."

Loans made by the Federal Land Bank through national farm loan associations are of two types: the regular land bank loans secured by first mortgages on farm lands and the Land Bank Commissioner's loans upon the security of first or second mortgages upon real and personal property. To be eligible as a borrower an applicant must be engaged or shortly to become engaged in farming operations, or the principal part of his income must be derived from farming operations.

The land bank loans may be used for buying or improving a farm for purchasing livestock, equipment, or fertilizer, for refinancing farm mortgages and for paying other debts. The commissioner's loans can be used only for refinancing or paying debts and for redeeming or repurchasing farms lost through tax sales or foreclosure.

OZONA NATL. BANK ANNOUNCES NRA Service Charges Effective Jan. 2, 1934 UNDER BANKERS CODE SIGNED BY THE PRESIDENT In order to comply with the code adopted by the National and State Bankers Association and to meet the requirements of the NRA, the Ozona National Bank is making the following charges effective January 2, 1934. CHECKING ACCOUNT CHARGES No charge will be made against your account so long as you do not give checks regardless of the amount of your balance, but if you do make withdrawals and your average balance for the previous month is less than \$50.00 we will charge your account fifty cents. EXCEPTIONS Affiliated accounts will be treated as a single balance. Churches, Lodges and Charitable organizations. NEW ACCOUNTS A minimum charge of fifty cents for opening a new account with an initial deposit of less than \$50.00. This charge will be waived where the account is inter-related with a profitable account, or where the account proves profitable over a reasonable period of time. CHARGE BACKS There will be a charge of twenty-five cents made against the account of any customer, who gives a check and does not have sufficient funds to pay it if this check reaches us through the mails. EXCHANGE AND DRAFTS No charge will be made so long as your account in this bank is sufficient to compensate us for the service, otherwise a charge of twenty-five cents on each \$100.00 purchased, with a minimum fee of ten cents. COLLECTIONS TO AND FROM OUT OF TOWN POINTS On drafts, a charge of twenty-five cents on each \$100.00 with a minimum charge of twenty-five cents. On notes for collection a charge of twenty-five cents on the \$100.00, except where considerable detail is required, in which event a fair charge will be made. FLOAT CHARGES Where balances do not justify otherwise, "float" will be charged on items drawn on out of town banks. OUT OF TOWN CHECKS CASHED FOR NON-CUSTOMERS On all checks cashed on out of town banks for people other than customers of the bank, a charge of twenty-five cents per hundred dollars will be made with a minimum charge of ten cents per check. CREDIT REPORTS There will be a charge of twenty-five cents for each and every credit report made. TRAVELERS' CHECKS A charge of seventy-five cents per \$100.00 with a minimum charge of forty cents shall be made on any and all travelers' checks issued. STATIONERY On all special checks, over-printing and endorsement stamps the actual cost to the bank shall be charged to the customer. BANKING HOURS This bank shall observe the following hours: 8 A. M. to 4 P. M. with the privilege of closing from 12 to 1 noon.



### of T. Building Program Near End

#### Administration-Library Structure Final Lap in 6 Million Plan

Austin, Tex., Dec. 19.—With the allotment to The University of Texas of a loan and 30 per cent grant, totaling \$1,633,000, for the construction of the final unit of the Administration-Library Building, which will replace the remainder of the original Main Building, the rounding out of the great building program of the University is in sight. It is expected that construction will be started within six months and will require seventeen months. With equipment, this additional structure and the nine other buildings which were recently erected on the University campus will represent an investment well over \$6,000,000. This is exclusive of landscaping, Memorial Gateway and other beautifications and ornamentalations, which when the program has been completed shall have cost an additional \$400,000, or more.

Not a cent of money that has been and will continue to be used for these and other recent improvements has come from the taxpayers of Texas. The money has come from the sale of oil and gas from the land endowment of 2,000,000 acres which the University owns.

The legislature approved a plan whereby the Board of Regents would issue obligation bonds in the maximum amount of \$1,200,000, secured by the unencumbered part of the available fund, that is, from grazing and other surface leases, which would be pledged as collateral with the Federal government to guarantee the repayment of the loan requested. The regents submitted originally a request for \$2,800,000, of which \$1,800,000 would be for the main building-library extension and \$1,000,000 for four or five self-liquidating dormitories.

The most striking feature of the new administration-library building will be a tower of 31 stories in levels, to be used for book stacks, and perhaps some offices. The height of the tower will be 286 feet, including the elevation of the building upon which it will rest. The new addition is designed to house the offices of the president, comptroller, registrar, auditor and other administrative offices.
