Fed Farm Loan Branch Plan Fails; Seek New Credit Channel

Plan To Form Production Credit Corp. Assn. In Angelo

Efforts of a committee named w ranchmen at a recent mass meeting in San Angelo to secure establishment at San Angelo of a branch of the Federal Farm Loan ank having failed, the committee has issued a new call for another meeting of producers in San Angelo next Monday for the purpose of considering other plans for providing credit faciliies in the producing areas.

The committee, named at the San Angelo meeting October 20. went to Houston and there conferred with Dr. W. I. Myers, deputy governor the Farm Credit Admir. istration, Geo. M. Erennan, Intermediate Credit Bank commissioner, S. M. Garwood, Production Credit Corporation Commissioner, and directors of the Federal Farm Loan Bank of Houston. The committee was composed of W. F. Boggess, chairman, Soi Mayer, Tully Garner, Houston Harte, Roy Vance, James Cornell, Brown F. Lee, P. L. Childress and Culberson






